Marshallese WWII survivors to share their stories with Kwajalein community

Marshallese elders who lived through World War II will share some of their stories of those days at a program sponsored by the Marshallese Cultural Society Friday at 7 p.m. in the Religious Education Building.

"To my knowledge, this is the first time that a program of this kind has been presented at Kwajalein," said Cris Lindborg, Marshallese Cultural Center exhibits director.

She originated the idea for the

oral history session and set it up.

The Japanese occupation and military build-up prior to the war, the battles of 1944, and the subsequent American presence in the islands are the background for the tales that will be told.

The program will be videotaped for the archives of the Marshallese Cultural Center.

The community is welcome, Lindborg said, and members of the cultural society are urged to attend.

Ivey Gym scheduled for facility make-over, equipment upgrade

Look for thousands of dollars worth of new gym equipment, plus new paint and flooring, as the Ivey Gym gets an overhaul and upgrade.

USAKA/KMR has allocated \$100,000 from the base support budget to complete the project, which includes new free weights, weight machines, cardiovascular equipment, and audio/video enhancements.

The equipment has been ordered, and the make-over is expected to be completed within the next several months. Plans are for the gym to remain open as much as possible during the renovation to reduce inconvenience to the community.

Lt. Col. David Stoddard, USAKA/KMR deputy commander, was the driving force behind the upgrade, according to Todd Seitz, USAKA/KMR Community Services retail operations specialist. Seitz, who is overseeing the upgrade, said the deputy commander is a strong supporter of community fitness.

According to Seitz, both USAKA/KMR and Raytheon believe that physical fitness benefits island morale and work product.

"A recreation facility upgrade of this magnitude should last for years and is a great benefit to the community," Seitz said.

The facility is open 78 hours a week and records 1,500 visits a month.

Most of the existing equipment has been in place since 1992, when the gym was created from the former Ivey Family Theater, said Simone Smead, manager of Community Activities.

"There have been a few equipment additions over the years, but this is

Island orientation briefing gets high-tech look

All that was missing from last Wednesday's island orientation meeting was a surround-sound system, as missiles collided and other high-tech graphics danced across a screen in a PowerPoint presentation meant to improve the introductory briefing for newcomers.

According to Jack Martindale, RSE Environmental, Health, and Safety training coordinator, the new gadgetry is just the beginning of a process to change the look and content of the island orientation meeting.

"We've added a couple of video clips," Martindale noted. "We try to keep it light."

Lt. Col. David Stoddard, USAKA/KMR deputy commander, initiated the changes. Stoddard said he was reacting to comments he received from other people who attended the three-hour briefing in the past.

"I challenged Jack to make this a briefing that is automated, that appeals to our senses of sight and sound ... to make it meaningful," explained Stoddard, who has been on Kwajalein for about seven months. "He's done a good job."

Besides the PowerPoint presentation, which replaced the more unwieldy overhead projector with the click of a mouse button, newcomers are provided with an island orientation booklet that supplements and reinforces the briefing information. In those 37 pages, new residents can find everything from where to buy fire extinguishers to what dangerous creatures lurk in the lagoon, such as the poisonous stonefish or sea urchin.

"We try to include useful and need-to-know information," Martindale said, adding that comments from residents have led to the inclusion of more diverse data, such as flight schedules and the Community Activities calendar.

More information was also added about Kwajalein Missile Range itself, as Lt. Col. Ray Jones, range commander, explained the operation in detail during the briefing. Martindale said the expansion of the briefings

by Jones, Stoddard, and Col. Gary K. McMillen, USAKA/KMR commander, was by design.

"We thought it was important for people to know why we're here," he explained.

Wednesday's orientation was the first one to incorporate the high-tech look. Both Martindale and Stoddard noted the new presentation is still evolving, as rough spots are smoothed over, and the process is further streamlined.

New resident Kane Farabaugh, a master controller at AFRTS, said he was impressed with the presentation and found the information enlightening, particularly the briefing about KMR.

"I didn't know anything about the

mission," he said.

About 25 people — employees and families — attended Wednesday's briefing. Most filled out and returned evaluation questionnaires, with comments like, "great graphics" and "covered everything I wanted to know about this island."

Martindale said some new residents suggested lengthening the presentation, while others preferred something briefer. He said the presentation will remain about three hours long, though some tweaking will be done to the sequence of speakers. Martindale encouraged both new and old-time residents to see the presentation's fresh look.

"I learn something new, a little different, each time," he said.
