Bad checks are a losing prospect at USAKA/KMR

Not paying debts owed to the federal government could turn out to be a bad investment.

As of June 10, a new policy regarding returned or bad checks written at USAKA/KMR cash-handling facilities, like Macy's and Ten-Ten, will provide for more severe penalties against check writers who don't make restitution.

"When you write a bad check to Raytheon, you're writing a bad check to the government," explained Mike Paris, RSE manager of Internal Audit. "The government is willing to take some steps that, if you write some bad checks, some bad things might happen to you."

Paris said that while checks are written to RSE, Raytheon is only an agent of the government — the money belongs to Uncle Sam.

"The command wants to crack down on people who make no serious effort on

making restitution on a bad check," Paris said.

The policy covers USAKA/KMR residents, TDY personnel, visitors, and citizens of the Republic of the Marshall Islands.

Based on the new regulation, a matter involving a bad check could end up before the U.S. magistrate judge at Kwajalein. But there are plenty of opportunities to avoid that.

Checks returned for any reason are processed through RSE Finance Department, which prepares invoices and assesses any penalties that apply. The individual who wrote the bad check is notified by mail and has 15 days to make restitution. Payment must be made by cash, cashier's check, or money order.

"We try to work with the check writer," said Pat Bronson, RSE Finance Department accounts manager.

If no response is made

Rainfall shortage leads to water conservation request

Water Department officials are asking residents to cut back on watering lawns.

Residents should water only one hour every other day, said Flynn Gideon, resource conservation program coordinator.

The request — no watering bans have been imposed yet — comes after May rains have failed to keep pace with monthly water requirements, according to Kevin Ehart, Utilities

manager.

Holmberg Fairways and the Kwajalein Public Gardens were asked to suspend watering for two days this week as part of the conservation effort.

Normal rainfall for May is nearly 10 inches, and Kwajalein has received only 1.62 inches so far. Rainwater supplies the island's freshwater system, the water residents drink, cook, and shower with. That water in turn, after it runs down the drain, feeds the reclaimed water system,

which primarily is used for flushing toilets, and lately for construction projects and watering lawns.

As rainfall has dropped off, however, reclaimed water consumption has increased.

"A lot of activity is driving up consumption," said Stan Jazwinski, Liquid Plants supervisor.

Construction projects including road paving, dome housing, and BQ work, all use water.

High blood pressure can be a silent killer

Approximately one out of every four adults in the United States has high blood pressure. Hypertension is the medical term for high blood pressure, which is defined as blood pressure equal to or greater than 140/90.

Symptoms can include headache, dizziness, irregular or increased heartbeat, fatigue, nosebleeds, and blurred vision. Many people are unaware that they have hypertension

because they exhibit no symptoms until complications occur. Stroke, heart attack, blindness, and kidney failure are complications that can result if it's left untreated.

Although the cause of hypertension cannot always be determined, there are some factors that put people at risk. Easily controlled risk factors include obesity, diet, smoking, lack of exercise, and excessive alcohol intake. Uncontrollable risk factors include gender, heredity, age, and race.

within 15 days, all check-cashing privileges are revoked until payment is made in full. Also, the person's name is placed on a bad checks list at all check-writing facilities. A mandatory restitution session is then scheduled. If the person declines or fails to make arrangements to pay, a letter is sent out to the check writer and USAKA/KMR command, as well as that person's supervisor, site manager, or commanding officer.

After 15 more days, if the matter has not been resolved, the case is referred to the Kwajalein Police Department and USAKA/KMR for administrative action. Consequences could include legal action, temporary or permanent administrative bar, loss or restriction of security clearance, and loss of island recreational privileges.



"We can bring criminal cases to the magistrate's court here on Kwajalein," said Kent Duncan, special assistant U.S. attorney. According to Duncan, several criminal codes might apply, including the Hawaii Revised Code, Negotiating a Worthless Negotiable Instrument (check), and Theft under both U.S. and Hawaii law.

"For TDY personnel, we could potentially do the same thing," he added. "If necessary, we could send the case to their local U.S. attorney for prosecution or take administrative action."

The new regulation still provides for penalties against repeat offenders, in addition to penalties against delinquent check writers. Someone who writes more than three bad checks in one month, or writes checks that total over \$1,000 in one month, can have their check-writing privileges suspended for three months. A second suspension will cause the check writer to lose those privileges for six months. A third suspension will cause permanent suspension of check-writing privileges.

Paris noted that not many people hit a third and final suspension.

"We've had a few over the years. Most people don't get into that," he said.



In conjunction with the range operation Monday, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll. A range operation is scheduled for Monday, May 29. Caution times are 6 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday.

In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within Kwajalein Atoll, defined by the area bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef, and bounded on the south by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, lon-

gitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef.

Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein police island clearance procedures began at approximately 7:30 a.m. today, and will continue until evacuation has been ac-

complished. Egress of all air and sea-craft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

- 6 a.m. through 1 p.m. Tuesday, May 30.

Kwajalein basketball teams dominate at Majuro tournament

Justin Dohrman and Floyd Corder Jr. led the charge against the Republic of the Marshall Islands basketball teams in a goodwill tournament held May 13-15 at Majuro.

The duo played on both the Kwajalein High School team and the community Kwajalein All-Star Team in a series of four games. The Kwaj teams swept the series, with an exclamation point coming in the third game May 15.

Trailing by five points with just under three minutes left in the game, Corder Jr. caught fire, hitting a three-pointer from the right side of the key. Robert Pinho of the RMI national team returned the favor with a three-pointer of his own. A flurry of scoring ensued, as Corder Jr. and Pinho both dropped in three-pointers.

As the seconds ticked away, the Kwaj All-Stars were still three points behind when Corder Jr. was fouled attempting yet another three-pointer with two seconds on the clock. To send the game into overtime, he would have to make all three foul shots.

He did. Knotted at 63-63, the game turned into a shootout, as play spilled into overtime. Corder Jr. and Pinho fired three-pointer after three-pointer, seeking an edge. When the final

buzzer sounded, the All-Stars held a two-point margin of victory, 77-75.

"It was a [great] ending," exclaimed coach Floyd Corder Sr. "This was the most exciting game of the event."

Corder Jr. finished with 24 points, while Dohrman played the workhorse of the evening, accounting for 21 points. Dave Gray chipped in 12 points, including crucial foul shots in the overtime barrage.

"Justin [Dohrman] had a great game," Corder Sr. added.

In the first adult game played May 13, the Kwaj All-Stars won with less drama, 79-66. Corder Jr. led the team with 21 points, while Dohrman added 20, Robby Cheatham sank 12 points including two three-pointers. Kenny Leines was good for 10 points with two of his shots from downtown. Gray supported the team effort with seven points and excellent rebounding. Pinho led the scoring for both teams with 23 points.

The Kwajalein High School team, Spartans I Men, also played well, topping the Marshall Islands High School team by a score of 71-68 on May 13. Corder Jr. again hit the double digits with 16 points. He was joined by Josh Talley, who added 14, and Dohrman was good for nine points.

On May 15, the teen team took on

the Bad Boyz, the RMI's Constitution Day men's basketball champions. Spartans I wrapped up the series with a 67-58 win over the RMI's best young basketball players.

Corder Sr. said the All-Stars were some of the best players picked out of the teams participating in the regular basketball season on Kwaj. The team was composed of teens and adults.

Not that the Spartans I Men are slouches. They carry a record of 11-1 heading into tonight's A Division Championship game against INYAZ.

The trip to Majuro was not all work. According to Corder Sr., the teams were treated to a barbecue by their hosts on May 14 with the visiting Samoan circus, which is expected on Ebeye this week.

"They treated us like kings," Corder Sr. said.
