## RMI residents receive money

People involved in the 1946-1958 nuclear testing program in the Marshall Islands received the biggest payday to date this week from the Marshall Islands Nuclear Claims Tribunal.

Oscar deBrum, Nuclear Claims Tribunal chairman and chief justice, brought about a thousand checks to Kwajalein Atoll Saturday. In addition to about 600 delivered on Majuro earlier this month, those checks represent 50 percent of the remaining compensation. That's \$16.9 million, according to deBrum. More than 40 people stopped by the RMI liaison office Saturday to

- **Fitness Center:** A program is in the works to assist newcomers with equipment use.


A formal attendant training program is under development.

# Library prepares to close doors Nov. 16

The Grace Sherwood Library will close its doors Nov. 16 for recarpeting.

Library staff stopped checking out books Thursday, so as many volumes as possible can be collected and boxed, according to Steve Snider, Community Activities acting manager. However, the library will still be open for browsing, copier services and computer use.

"This will be a time-consuming project that will require a lot of detail and organization," Snider said of the carpeting project.

The task is an enormous one because of the large amount of materials and furniture. The carpeting will be done in two sections, Snider said. Not only that, but all of the books

have to come off the shelves in a specific order, he said. That will take about 450 boxes for each side of the library.

Snider said he hopes the library will reopen before Christmas.

The original plan had called for the library to be moved to a satellite location while it was closed. Snider said the new plan is to get the carpeting work done in less time — about four weeks — and reopen the library as soon as possible, rather than stretch limited labor resources by moving materials to another site.

The new computers for the library's cybercafé have been identified and will be ordered as soon as possible, with hopes to have them on the December barge, Snider said.

# Breathe easy: Great American Smokeout is Nov. 15

A smoker since she was 15 years old, resident Kim Rogers has a good reason not to light up even one cigarette on Nov. 15, The Great American Smokeout Day.

"I have a five-year-old and I know it's not good for him to be around it. I also stopped when I was pregnant ... I think stopping because Michael may pick it up is a good reason. It is easier for me to stop for someone else, like when I was pregnant, than for myself," Rogers said. "It seems like a good day to stop, a good goal day."

Over 430,000, or one in every five, deaths each year are due to cigarette smoking, and there is a 50 percent chance of dying or becoming disabled if a person smokes on a regular basis, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. The CDC is leading the national effort to prevent and control tobacco use, particularly among adolescents, according to its Web site.

Locally, the Kwajalein Hospital Health Awareness Committee is hoping adult and teen smokers use The Great American Smokeout Day to take the first step toward stopping this destructive habit, said Kathy Campbell, Health Awareness Committee chairperson.

"I started when I was seven," said Phillip "Smitty" Smith. "Everybody smoked then ... all our movie heroes smoked. The real reason [I started] was being surrounded by adults who smoked."

Telling a child not to smoke and then smoking yourself doesn't work, said Smith, whose family has a history of smoking-related illnesses.

"I didn't realize until [later, that] it was dangerous," he explained. "My father died of emphysema and my mother died of cancer at the age of 29. My brother has emphysema, and has had open heart surgery."

Although Smith has quit eight times, he still fights the urge everyday. Sometimes he wins, sometimes not. "Addiction is addiction, no matter what it is ... it's a daily battle; I can't think of a day when I don't want a cigarette," Smith said.

Not everyone is getting the message. One local 17-year-old, who spoke to the *Hourglass* on the condition of anonymity, said, "I'm not going to quit because I don't have a problem yet."

School psychologist Shawna Ferstl said that anyone who smokes may not know the extent of the problem. "It's as addictive as cocaine is,"

she said. "That's the scary part — they think it's not and they can stop whenever, but it's very addictive and it's a health hazard.

"[Smokers] are always welcome to come and see me because I do work with people on stopping smoking and can set up programs for them," she added.

Access to cigarettes for teens is easy; they usually get it from their friends, Ferstl said. As to why teens smoke, she said, "Peer pressure is a big one ... it's a way to fit in and to deal with stress — it's a coping mechanism."

The old cigarette slogan, "You've come a long way baby," reflects a current trend.

Women, especially teenage women, are smoking more and dying more of smoking-related diseases, according to a March 2001

report by U.S. Surgeon General Dr. David Satcher.

"Lung cancer is now the leading cause of cancer death among U.S. women; it surpassed breast cancer in 1987," Satcher said. "About 90 percent of all lung cancer deaths among women who continue to smoke are attributable to smoking."

Reduced fertility and premature menopause, along with stillbirths and sudden infant death syndrome, are health risks females can encounter along with lung cancer and heart disease, Satcher's report said.

"It also ages the skin and causes wrinkles," Ferstl said, adding that smoking can shorten life by 12 to 15 years.

Two 17-year-old Kwajalein females, speaking anonymously, said that they started smoking early, one at 12 when her brother "found a pack of cigarettes" and the other when she got together with friends before school at Emon



Beach. One said "it cools my nerves," and the other said she didn't want to quit and would be able to buy her own soon.

Knowing the risks, some residents have been successful at quitting.

"I started at 17, but I was probably sneaking them at 16," said Carol Adler, who stopped eight years ago. "I wanted to stop for 20 years, because it was not good for my health ... I tried numerous things — gum, cold turkey, tapering off — the only thing that worked was the patch ... it didn't make it easy but it made it bearable."

A smoker since age 12, one 16-year-old, speaking anonymously, said he quit because smoking "hurts your lungs." He got a patch from an older friend, but once the patch didn't work anymore, he "toughed it out" and quit.

Nicotine patches and gum are available over the counter at the pharmacy, and there are also prescriptions available from the staff doctors, said Rita Lemmie, Kwajalein Hospital Pharmacy technician.

"If they are under 18, they will need to speak with the doctor about the patch or the gum," Lemmie said.

Health risks aren't the only reason some residents quit or tried to quit smoking.

"When these kids start working, it's going to cause problems," Smith said. "When you are in a five-hour meeting, you can't concentrate and all you want to do is to go out and smoke."

Rogers said that the increasing antagonism against smokers is another reason to quit.

She added, "Little kids from Michael's class come up to me and say, 'You know smoking will kill you?' What do you say to that?"

collect their checks, while more picked up checks at the Nuclear Claims Tribunal office on Ebeye.

DeBrum said that as of Oct. 1, the tribunal had awarded personal injury compensation totaling more than \$75 million to 1,735 people. The checks delivered this week, which were handed out on Kwajalein, Ebeye, Third Island and Majetto, ranged from a few thousand dollars to as much as \$48,000.

U.S. Ambassador to the RMI Mike Senko offered a brief speech to claimants Monday morning when the office first opened. He told that crowd that he recognized "the sacrifices you made in the Cold War ... This is a great honor for me to be here with you."

DeBrum, a long-time statesmen for the Marshall Islands since its Trust Territory days, said he hopes claimants will use their new-found wealth wisely. "I hope they save their money."

The Nuclear Claims Tribunal was established in 1988 under Section 177 of the Compact of Free Association. Section 177 includes a trust fund of \$150 million that was to provide \$270 million in compensation payments over the 15-year life of the Compact. Funds are distributed among the people of four atolls for medical and radiological monitoring and payment of claims. The tribunal first implemented a compensation program for personal injuries in 1991.

## Pentagon, contractors mull restructuring missile defense

The Pentagon is weighing a restructuring of its missile-defense programs to better respond to enemy attacks here and abroad.

Lt. Gen. Ronald Kadish, who heads the Pentagon's Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, met secretly Saturday with top executives of five big defense companies to enlist their help.

Among the companies that attended were those already playing key roles in developing missile-defense systems, including Boeing Co., Raytheon Co. and Lockheed Martin Corp.

Kadish asked the companies to craft a plan for restructuring the missile-defense work, possibly to create a "national team" of partners working more closely together.

The companies are to provide their responses before the end of the year. Then Kadish and top Pentagon officials are expected to decide how sweeping a realignment to undertake.

One possibility would be cre-



ation of an uber-integrator within the industry to oversee all missile-defense systems being developed, including the one currently managed by Boeing.

The goal, said one defense official, is a cohesive military system to track the path of an incoming enemy missile and use any number of defensive measures to stop it before it hits U.S. territory.

The U.S. might choose to name three lead integrators to divvy up work according to the point at which a missile is intercepted—either right after launch in the "boost" phase, in midflight or just before descent.


"We're hoping to have a big crowd out," Lockridge said. "We had such good success with the candlelight ceremony after the Sept. 11 attacks."

The ceremony includes remarks by Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA commander, and Lt. Col. Clarence Johnson, range commander, who will represent all veterans. Also expect a more musical program this year, with performances by the Jr./Sr. High School Band, the Chapel Quintet, the Chapel Trio and "Amazing Grace" by the Kwajalein Pipes and Drums Corps. Veterans Day traces its origins back to 1918, when on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month a hush fell over the battlefields of Europe. World War I, the war to end all wars, was over. One year later, President Woodrow Wilson proclaimed Nov. 11 Armistice Day to celebrate the end of the war and to honor those who fought.

In 1954, Armistice Day was re-designated "Veterans Day" to honor all American veterans, living and dead, whether they served in war or in peace.

"It should be a very nice ceremony and we hope everybody comes out," Lockridge said.

melting pot of the world’s cultures,” said club president Harold Fellows in an opening address before the audience lined up for a buffet feast. Dinner included, among other items, shredded pork, chicken adobo, skewered meats and spare ribs fritata, along with an equally long list of dessert items like sweet rice wrapped in banana leaves and banana lumpia.

“Filipinos do not like spicy foods,” said cook Leah Fellows, who started preparing parts of the meal as much as three weeks in advance.

But the food was only an appetizer to the evening’s main course – a diverse program of dancing from the archipelago’s three main island groups.

“There are different dances on every island,” said Gina Hubshman, chief organizer of the event.

The last dance extravaganza was about three years ago, according to Hubshman, who designed the costumes for the many dancers, and produced and directed the finale piece, the *singkil* suite.

Dancer Gail Tavares said it took her five months to rehearse her performances. “And, hopefully, it worked.”

Few, if any of the performers had any previous dance experience, Hubshman noted. “The beauty of it is they’re not dancers ... I have more fun than them, I think.”


