Kwajalein possible test site for THAAD system

In about five years, the Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site could be the launching pad for the final series of tests on the nation's premiere Theater Missile Defense program.

This week a group of 11 people, mostly with the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, toured Kwajalein, Roi-Namur and Meck to assess the range. BMDO oversees America's missile defense programs, including TMD and National Missile Defense.

The Reagan Test Site is in competition with the Pacific Missile Range Facility at Barking Sands in Hawaii for BMDO's business, which could mean hundreds of millions of dollars in direct benefits to the chosen range. And while RTS appears to have the technical and geographical edge in terms of test space, there are concerns over housing, program scheduling conflicts and other logistics issues, according to BMDO evaluators.

"This is a comprehensive study," said Kenneth Rackers, BMDO deputy director for the TMD program support team. "We know this facility has world-class assets."

Specifically, the range is under consideration to test the Theater High Altitude Area Defense system. Like the highly publicized NMD, THAAD is designed to

Fireworks to cap July 4 event

Yes to both questions: Independence Day will be celebrated on July 4 and there will be fireworks.

This is the fifth year in a row that Kwajalein will celebrate the country's most patriotic event with a fireworks display by Hawaii Explosives and Pyrotechnics Inc. at Emon Beach.

"They have been a pretty big hit. Everybody enjoys it," said Steve Snider, Community Activities superintendent of Entertainment Services.

The fireworks show was rein-

stated in 1997 by former USAKA commander, Col. Scott B. Cottrell. It was the first big show in about 20 years. The event, which features shells as large as 15 inches, has grown into an annual event.

"There's a lot that goes into it before the fireworks," Snider said. While Community Activities coordinates the show, as well as the rest of the day's activities at Emon Beach, a lot of other departments get involved.

For example, commercial divers with the local Dive Locker set moorings for the barge, which will

New Kwaj website offers up-to-date schedule, news

Kwajalein's 90-day calendar is as extinct as the dinosaurs. Long live "Kwaj!" — USAKA's very own web page.

Kwajalein's first intranet website, www.kwajalein.com, goes live Sunday.

"On the surface, the site may appear as an ordinary website," explained Dave Robinson, IT senior information tech. "Behind the scenes, however, is a completely different picture. The site is actually a powerful data management program that looks like a website."

Todd Seitz, USAKA Community Services chief, said the website will be a far more powerful tool than the defunct 90-day calendar, as input from a number of different sources will keep it current and evolving.

"It's going to be a real neat thing," Seitz said. "No one has anything like this [at overseas installations]."

More than 30 people, or data managers, will be responsible for keeping the site up-to-date with information about events, current news, weather alerts and flight information. A virtual suggestion box will also be available

Getting passports, visas need not be a bumpy ride

If you live here on Kwajalein, you need a passport.

OK, technically, you *might* skate by for a few years flying into Hickam every time you return to the states and merely showing travel orders and your K-badge. This writer did.

The law allows military personnel and families to enter the U.S. without passports provided they have travel orders and military IDs. The law makes no mention of contractors, so I was lucky.

Hickam is tightening down, according to the Legal Office, and at some point, you may have to fly Continental, which does REQUIRE a passport, valid for a year after the travel date. Aloha recommends a passport, as well, but technically will permit a birth certificate and valid driver's license.

One fellow I met at the Photo Lab got through OK with his driver's license about a year ago, but only after a serious scolding. He was renewing his passport for that reason.

Besides, living out here, you have the opportunity to go to OTHER countries, and that, most definitely, presupposes a passport.

I got one last week, and it was easy. Simply pick up the form from Francoise Standifer at the Legal Office. Fill it out. On a Tuesday, go to the RSE Finance

Office and tell the cashier you want a passport photo. You'll give her \$10 and she'll give you a receipt. You take the receipt to the Photo Lab between 1 and 4 p.m., where Tom, or someone else there, takes your picture. A couple of minutes later, you take the application form, the two photos, your birth certificate and a check for \$60 to Ms. Standifer. Voila, you're done.

The passport should arrive in four weeks or so. My friend at the Photo Lab said his girlfriend got hers in three weeks.

Give Ms. Standifer a check for \$95, instead, and the passport office will expedite your order. You might get your passport back in as little as two weeks.

If you have a kid under 14, you have an additional problem ... with the passport, folks. Most often, a parent simply goes through the steps, proves he or she is the parent or legal guardian, signs for the kid and gets the passport. *Both* parents' signatures, however, are required after July 2. If both are not here, one must show he or she has sole custody, or get nota-

rized consent of the other parent. A notarized explanation of why the other parent is unavailable may also work. Check with Ms. Standifer for details.

Now that you have a passport, there's a little more work involved in getting to many foreign countries. You'll need a visa, and there seem to be as many different visa requirements as countries.

Many European countries, for instance, extend an automatic visa for 30, 60 or more days upon entry with a valid passport. Other nations, like China, require a fee and additional photo, along with an application and submission of your passport. The cost goes up for a multi-entry visa. Make sure to check out time limits. The China visa, for example, is good for 90 days from the date it's issued — a very important thing to keep in mind before applying.

While it's possible to apply for individual visas directly, one option is to go through an agency that specializes in acquiring visas — for a an additional fee, of course. While this alternative is more pricey — visas for Vietnam and China through an agency cost \$180 per person — it might be worth the peace of mind for travelers with a complex itinerary.

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Police dog teams sniff out illegal activity

They know by smell the island is safe from illegal narcotics when planes and ships arrive at Kwajalein.

Sergeants DJ, Reini and Iron are Belgian Malinois dogs and, along with their handlers and partners, Sgts. Steve Dunham, Crystal Greer and Ken Gaymon, comprise the Kwajalein Police Department K-9 Unit.

Originally from Holland, all three dogs attended the Global Training Academy in Texas and are certified as narcotic dogs, Gaymon said.

Iron, only one and a half years old and just out of school, arrived on island last week; Reini, now three, arrived last year, and 10-year-old DJ is a grizzled veteran of eight years, getting ready to retire.

"Our job as the handler is to continue training and get them better at odor recognition," Gaymon said. Iron's sense of smell will become more sophisticated. With just basic training, a dog can find drugs no matter how people try to disguise it, he said.

"People have tried all types of stuff—fishing buoys, crabs, in a trailer—they still found it," Gaymon said.

A dog's sense of smell is different from a human's, Gaymon said, using a pizza as an

example.

Humans smell the whole pizza, he said, while dogs break the pizza down to its components—pepperoni, cheese and tomato sauce.

Waiting for the Aloha flight last Tuesday, Iron gently pestered Gaymon for attention.

From the moment the first passenger placed his bag on the red line in the Entry/Exit room, Iron was working. Giving credence to his school nickname of "Iron Lightning," Iron quickly sniffed each bag.

Out on the tarmac, a baggage cart full of fragrant fruit and vegetables, followed by the travelers' luggage, received thorough inspections.

Since Iron is young, he is faced with new odors, which may make the dog take a second sniff.

"I've seen pigs, both dead and alive, chickens and fish coming through," Gaymon said. "We look for the change in behavior. The dog will pick up a scent. He will show a visible change in behavior and the handler will have to learn that change."

A 10-year veteran of dog handling, Gaymon grew up with dogs; his dad raised Labrador hunting dogs. Gaymon later attended K-9 school during his days in the Navy.

Gaymon was originally assigned to Brenda, another narcotics dog and sister to DJ. Brenda died in April 2000 and is buried on Kwajalein.

Reini and Greer

If Reini and Greer were not compatible, then they would have found another handler, Greer said, explaining that she had two weeks to get certified when the dog arrived.

"[Reini] was brought here with the person who trained her... the only person she knew and trusted," Greer said. "We had to make it work and had to make the basic certification as a team. It was quite a workout."

Last Tuesday morning found Greer and Reini preparing to search the mountains of mail at the Post Office.

Treading the narrow aisles, Greer pointed

to each cubicle of packages. Reini quickly stuck her muzzle around the packages. One particular mail-

box seemed to interest Reini more than the others. After "breathing" the box and taking an extra sniff, she continued her inspection.

When a handler or the dog pushes down on an item, it is called "breathing," Greer said. Breathing allows the air in the package or suitcase to escape along with odors.

"Good work, girlfriend," Greer said, praising Reini. Praise is Reini's secondary reward, Greer said. Her primary reward is playing with a rubber toy called a "kong."

Greer, who grew up around German Shepherds, went into K-9 service during her enlistment in the Air Force in 1998.

DJ and Dunham

DJ and Dunham are both getting ready to leave the island this fall—Dunham to work in a penitentiary and DJ to just be his pet.

"DJ's retirement coincided with my PCS," Dunham said. "So I went to the owner of the company to see if I could adopt him."

Since DJ and Brenda were brother and sister, when Brenda died, there was fear that the same thing could happen to DJ. So Reini and Iron were brought out to replace Brenda and DJ.

DJ and Dunham are still a certified team and could be called upon, if necessary.

Dunham, who grew up on a farm but did not have any dogs, attended K-9 school as part of his reenlistment bonus in the Army.

The team has worked and trained on Kwajalein, Roi-Namur and the outer islands.

When DJ leaves, the police department has two young dogs to take over, Dunham said.

for residents to interact with the site, allowing users to not only offer suggestions but also to review those already made by others.

"It's going to be a very useful tool," Seitz said. "It's going to get it away from the control of just one person ... It puts responsibility on the people, and when you put responsibility on the people, it tends to ensure the information is updated."

Robinson agreed that the success of the site is dependent on the data managers.

"After all, if the information is not current, especially in the area of community activities, people will not find it useful," he said.

For instance, news alerts and other immediate information, like a flight cancellation, will appear on the site's main page as soon as possible.

"Also, if an event is cancelled or rescheduled, an event alert will appear on the main page, which may save us a trip to the ballpark during the rainy season," Robinson said.

And just when residents get used to the website, they should look out for Version 2.0 in the future. Additional features could include an electronic contact/phone list, hours of operations and classified ads.

"We have also provided to those personnel who are keeping the event up-to-date the option of including a URL, or link, to point to a site that may be somehow relevant," Robinson

said. "A good use of that feature may be to point to a movie review or fan site for a movie event at the Richardson, for example."

For the last two weeks, the site has undergone a "soft opening," allowing selected users to "kick the tires" to work any bugs out, according to Robinson.

Steve Snider, superintendent of Entertainment Services at Community Activities, is one of the data managers for the website's community calendar. He said the site is user-friendly, taking only a few minutes to download information about upcoming events, such as July's concert schedule for the band Soulflower or September's visit by the basketball team, Harlem Ambassadors.

"People will be able to get to a lot of information that you can't get into the roller or a single article in the newspaper," Snider said.

Links are another feature of the site that should grow in the future. The only link right now is one to the U.S. Army Judge Advocate General. Seitz said he expects there would be official links, as well local links, such as to the Kwajalein Scuba Club.

"It's just unlimited," he said.

Robinson said links must first be approved by USAKA, but residents may offer possible links in the suggestion box. "I, for one, hope there are many suggestions for additions and improvements to the site as it keeps me busy. The links page will certainly evolve," he added.

sit off Emon Beach for the show. The FOM department loads the barge with containers and supplies. EOD gets involved, along with Safety, to ensure the pyrotechnics are properly stored and handled. Incidentally, a safety zone with an 860-foot radius will be in effect during the show, according to Snider.

As far as the best place to see the spectacle, he suggested, "Get your air mattress, your water wings or whatever and float out into the water."

But there's lots to keep celebrants busy before the evening's main event.

The party begins at 1:45 p.m. with a bike parade from the CRC to Emon Beach, where a brief opening ceremony is scheduled at 2 p.m.

Other events include a sail parade by the Kwajalein Yacht Club at 4 p.m. and the second annual Krazy Kwaj Olympics from 5 to 7 p.m. The Fourth of July volleyball tournament begins at 4:30 p.m. This year

features a new event — horse racing. Snider is being uncharacteristically quiet about that one.

"You're just going to have to come out and see," he said mischievously.

Sodexo Marriott will serve a varied menu, including Kahlua pork sandwiches, coconut rice and Kwaj burgers. A number of vendors will offer goods from Bali, cosmetics, scuba club paraphernalia, beach items, Marshallese handicrafts and many other items.

Residents are reminded there's no bike parking at the beach. Designated parking places will be available around the grounds.



intercept missiles at long range and high altitude, as well as in short- and medium-range scenarios. It employs the same "hit-to-kill" theory, as well. The system, unlike NMD, is mobile, and all of the components can be transported by a C-141 airplane. Range testing is scheduled to begin in 2006.

While RTS had been the "baseline" range for testing, a study was ordered by Lt. Gen. Ronald Kadish, BMDO director, to determine which facility would be best suited for THAAD, according to Rackers. Competition had included eight test ranges, he said, adding that a final decision is due in September.

Col. Curtis L. Wrenn Jr., USAKA commander, said the program is an important one for RTS, and brings with it \$10 to \$11 million in new construction alone.

"This would be the second largest program at Kwajalein," Wrenn said. NMD, at an estimated \$100 million per Integrated Flight Test, is the largest.

The THAAD system consists of four principal segments: Truck-mounted launchers, interceptors, the THAAD radar system and the THAAD battle management/command, control, communications and intelligence system. System development began in 1992 and is expected to produce combat-ready missiles by 2007,

with a battery fielded in 2008. The entire system should be deployed by 2013, Rackers said.

Since 1995, the system has undergone 11 tests — Program Definition and Risk Reduction flight tests — at White Sands Missile Range to integrate its various components. Following six misses, the last two flight tests resulted in intercepts, propelling the program into its next phase, Engineering and Manufacturing Development. Flight tests will start at White Sands sometime in 2004-2005, but will eventually move to RTS or PMRF.

Tests at either range would follow a "very ambitious" schedule, with launches taking place at a pace of about one every six weeks, according to Debbie Giordano, BMDO project integrator for ranges and instrumentation. That kind of schedule means an increase in TDY traffic, with an operation surge of up to 120 people, as well as 25 to 50 permanent residents, she said.

Proponents of THAAD say it offers U.S. forces an early opportunity to knock down incoming missiles far enough away that debris from weapons of mass destruction will not harm soldiers on the ground. Second, the system allows the U.S. enough time to launch a second interceptor if necessary.

"This is to protect our troops, our allies in the field," Rackers said.

Japan Open features tradition

Editor's Note: The following is part one of a two-part series on golf leagues which gather weekly to play at Holmberg Fairways. Next week we'll look at the Haole Open.

They depart for Holmberg Fairways before the sun rises on Sunday morning. A ritual many of its participants have engaged in during three, even four, different decades. The Japan Open, a.k.a. Sunday Morning Golf, is a Kwajalein institution steeped with tradition and history, much like the game itself.

It all started back in the late 1960s.

A group of friends who played together on various sports teams started to golf on Sunday morning. At the time, they called themselves the "Left Overs," recalled Jack Shipman, a long-time participant. It became known as the Japan Open during the 1970s and has kept that name ever since.

Players are required to show up at Holmberg Fairways by 6:45 a.m. At that time, the day's groupings are determined by handicap, which is based on a player's three best rounds out of the last 10 Japan Opens played.

"Tee off is 7 a.m.," said Alan Uda, who currently runs the golf syndicate.

A typical Japan Open will draw between 25 and 30 people, according to Tracy Hampson.

Like the sport itself, there is little pomp and circumstance involved in the Japan Open. Show up Sunday morning, play your round, settle up and spend the rest of the weekend as you see fit.

With over 30 years of history, there is, undoubtedly, a moment or two that is forever frozen in Japan Open lore.

"About 15 years ago, we had back-to-back holes-in-one on number 4," Uda recalled.

New players can establish a Japan Open handicap after five weeks. Until then, the golfer will be assigned an adjusted handicap based on his KGA or USGA handicap.

Loyalty is the underlying characteristic of the Japan Open members. A significant number of participants are entering their third decade of golf with the Japan Open. While others, who may not have the longevity, show up religiously nearly every Sunday morning as the sun peeks over the eastern horizon.


