RMI tourism officials courting airlines for flights to Japan, Oz

Tourism officials in Majuro are hoping to open the Marshall Islands to visitors from as far away as Australia and Japan.

The *Marianas Variety*, a newspaper that serves the Commonwealth of Northern Mariana Islands in the far northern region of Micronesia, reported earlier this month that the Marshall Islands Tourism Association is discussing new air routes that would link the Marshalls with Australia and Japan.

One scenario has Air Nauru ferrying passengers along a route that includes Brisbane, Australia-Nauru-Majuro-Nadi, Fiji-Brisbane. The second proposal under discussion by Marshallese tourism officials is a route between Majuro and Narita, Japan that would be linked to Aloha's regular service to Majuro and Kwajalein.

Mark Stege, with the Marshall Islands Visitors Authority, said, via e-mail, that MIVA "is hopeful that ongoing discussions with Air Nauru as well as preliminary discussions with Aloha Airlines both result in improved airline access not only for the

Malolo returns as RMI representative to USAKA

Hiram Malolo, RMI representative to USAKA, plans on keeping strong U.S. and RMI ties.

Malolo took over as the RMI rep for Botlang Loeak July 18. This is not his first stint at the post; he held the position from 1994 to 2000.

"My goals are the same as the previous RMI representative, and that is to maintain the good working relationship that has long existed between the RMI and USAKA," Malolo said.

Malolo has an extensive background in education, working first as a teacher after graduating from the University of Guam, and eventually moving up the ranks to vice principal and then principal for the Kwajalein Atoll public school system. As principal, he had a staff of 52 teachers and 1,200 students.

He was soon selected to help with projects for the Pacific Regional Education Laboratory in Hawaii as an educational specialist. It was during that time that he was called back to the Marshalls by

Piers repaired, returned to SBM

The Kwajalein Small Boat Marina should be fully functional as the Labor Day weekend opens Sunday, assuming the weather cooperates. And that hasn't been the case most of the summer.

The south pier and fuel pier were removed last week for repairs. Both had taken a beating the last few months with all

of the west wind action, according to Les Wynne, SBM supervisor.

The removal of the piers forced the marina to scale back its operation last weekend, with only four B-boats in the water. The only boats available were those with outdoor hookups for external gas tanks, Wynne explained.

The FOM Metal Shop and

or I'm in line at Surfway or Ten-Ten, or I'm waiting in line to pick up a package or even eating in the PDR, that when I come across you in your job and ask you for help, I will do it with compassion. I will allow you to do your job to the best of your ability, allow you to do what you've got to do and understand that it's just your job, it doesn't define you. I will consider that you might be on your 12th hour, you might be doing your job and someone else's job, a job that isn't yours and one that you weren't trained for, it might be your first day on the job, maybe your last. I'll take into consideration that you might be having problems at home, with your kids or maybe your girlfriend or your wife. I'll have the mind to know that you aren't your job and your job isn't you — it's just that somebody's got to do it.

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

USAKA pushes auto rental issue to SMDC, Army for resolution

USAKA Army personnel and family members got the chance to help improve the quality of life for military members everywhere when they attended the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command Army Family Action Plan conference earlier this month in Arlington, Va.

Delegates included Department of Army civilians, active duty military, military spouses and teenage dependents of civilians and military members from all SMDC organizations from as far away as Germany, Okinawa and Kwajalein, as well as stateside locations like Colorado Springs and Huntsville.

Larry Paul Lewis, teen delegate Timothy Paul Lewis, Sgt. 1st Class Jacqueline Chatman, Stephan Notarianni and coordinator Cris Foster represented USAKA.

The Army Family Action Plan, or AFAP, explores quality of life issues. USAKA held a local conference in June to discuss issues pertinent to military members, their family members, DA civilians, reservists and retirees

Topics discussed in June ranged from sponsorship of personnel who PCS to and from Kwajalein, team building and organizational communication, according to Foster.

The local AFAP conferences in the last couple of years had included contract personnel as well, but Foster said the program is really meant for the Department of the Army.

"There are other forums for the Kwajalein community to bring their issues, such as town halls and various advisory boards," she noted.

The USAKA delegates voted to take one issue, auto rental reimbursement, to the SMDC conference. It was one of five out of about 35 topics that will be forwarded on to the Army level for resolution, according to Notarianni.

"It's like sitting on a jury," he said of the program. "It's an extensive process that takes two full days."

The USAKA issue that SMDC delegates voted forward to DA level involves personnel who ship personally owned vehicles as part of a PCS move to and from CONUS. Until the vehicle

arrives, they are without transportation, and no substitute vehicle is provided during the interim. If they rent a vehicle, they are responsible for the cost. The delegates recommended changing the Joint Federal Travel Regulations and Joint Travel Regulations to authorize reimbursement for auto rentals, which would not exceed 30 days.

Other SMDC issues headed to the Armywide level meeting in November include:

- Capital gains tax: Based on current law, a homeowner must live in a home for two of the last five years in order to avoid capital gains tax. Prior to this law, a military family ordered to PCS could roll the money from the sale of their home into the purchase of a new home. Because of the new law, this option is no longer available.

- The conference recommended changing the law to exempt military homeowners from the capital gains tax requirement.

- Survivor benefits plan option: Retired service members who are single, divorced or have deceased spouses and no children under 21 years are not allowed to designate other family members, such as a brother, as a beneficiary of retirement benefits.

The conference recommended changing the law to allow all retirees to designate benefits to other family members and to allow service members to contribute reduced retirement pay through another channel such as the Military Thrift Savings Plan.

- TRICARE referral process for long-term/extended health conditions: Currently, every time patients, even those suffering from long-term illnesses, need a referral for outside medical care, they must see their primary care provider.

The conference recommended eliminating the primary care provider requirement.

- Moving in middle of the school year: The conference recommended creating a policy to stabilize tours during the school year.

Foster said USAKA will continue to hold quarterly AFAP meetings in hopes of continuing to improve quality of life.

"We're going to keep our program active," she said.

Kwaj, Roi theater systems enter the digital age

USAKA movie theaters are entering a golden age. Well, in this case, the digital age.

Gone are the muffled, scratchy sounds. Gone are the blurred pictures and the overwhelming need to shout "Focus!" to the projectionist. Gone is 16mm film.

Thanks to Casey Kamps with Cinema Equipment Sales, the Yuk Theater on Kwaj and C Building on Roi-Namur are outfitted with state-of-the-art movie and sound systems featuring Dolby/THX surround sound.

"I think I have both theaters sounding pretty good," said Kamps, a technical sounds and projection engineer with the California-based company.

On Roi, the set-up includes six surround speakers, three screen speakers, a subwoofer, amplifiers, processor and Super VHS and DVD players, along with 65-inch high-definition TV. The system is simple to use, according to Kamps, and allows viewers to choose from three different volume settings, depending on their decibel level tolerance.

Down on Kwaj, the system is even more elaborate, with eight large surround speakers (three on the left, three on the right and two in the rear), three center channel speakers and a booming subwoofer.

"It's a standard cinema setup," Kamps said. "This is not your home."

Throwing the image onto a brand

new perforated screen, which allows the sound from the three center channel speakers and the subwoofer behind it to be heard, is a commercial digital projector. A rack in the projector room holds four amplifiers and a processor, along with the Super VHS and DVD players.

The Kwaj system is "studio standard," meaning it can produce the same 140-decibel level one experiences in stateside theaters.

"It's loud," Kamps said.

Ironically, the sound, which was hard to hear before, may be a problem because of just the opposite reason: The sound is powerful enough to leak outside the movie theater. A sneak preview Wednesday night of the special-effects movie "Twister" could be heard in the Sands BQ.

"The fact that it is too loud is a good problem," said Steve Snider, superintendent of Entertainment Services at Community Activities, alluding to the poor sound quality before the installation.

Said resident Chris Robbins, who helped with the installation over the weekend, the sound is "a lot crisper, clearer ... It's more robust.

"During 'Twister' you can literally hear [the tornado] go from in front of you to the back of you," he

added.

Neither system requires the operator to do much more than put the DVD or Super VHS into the proper player and hit the play button. Maintenance is also easy, Kamps said, explaining that the lamp for the digital projector is rated for 1,500 hours and is no problem to replace.

"It's going to be a real simple operation," he said.

The only concern, he explained, is corrosion, which was worse than he first thought. The screw mounts that were holding up the relatively new speakers in the Yuk, which were replaced by larger speakers during the project, had already started rusting.

"They looked like barbecues that had been sitting out for a couple of years," Kamps said.

Kamps said he has set up similar 35mm and digital systems in the homes of such stars as George Clooney and Tom Cruise. He was the sole cinema technician for Africa's first 35mm THX theater, located in Kenya. That theater has stadium seating and a 60-foot screen. "When it was done, it was awesome," Kamps said.

To make the most of the new technology, Snider said he's planned a special weekend of special effects movies at the Yuk, including "Lord of the Rings" and the fourth installment of the Star Wars epic, "Phantom Menace." Roi will also show "Phantom Menace," along with "High Crimes." See page 12 for full movie schedule on Roi and Kwaj.

It took less than a week to complete both theaters. And this may not be Kamps' last trip to Kwaj, as he and Snider are already putting together a plan for the Richardson Theater. The Rich will be upgraded, assuming the community can at least double the aluminum can recycling rate from its current 30 percent.

"I'm going to be working with Cinema Equipment, putting a package together," Snider said. The upgrade will be the same as the Yuk, just bigger.

"It will be done to that quality," Snider said.

Heavy Equipment departments assisted with the work.

"They have gone out of their way to help us," Wynne said.

The project wasn't expected to affect last weekend's boaters, but, once again, weather played the spoiler.

"The reason it's taking so long is because of the west winds," Wynne lamented.

Aeromet has issued 15 west wind warnings since May, according to Mary Steeves, Aeromet chief meteorologist. A west wind warning involves sustained winds of at least 10 knots. Normally, the trade winds blow from the east and northeast.

Three warnings were issued between May and June, while the weather really got stirred up in July, with eight days of west winds. Steeves said the warning was issued "almost continuously" from July 14-20. So far in Au-

gust, four west wind warnings have been issued, she added.

While this is the season that would normally see winds out of the west, if they were to occur, there's another factor involved this year: El Niño.

"It is related to El Niño," Steeves said.

The west winds have also taken their toll on the pier at Ebeye. Last Sunday, during another west wind event in conjunction with a squall, one of the LCMs was docking and knocked a rubber fender off, according to Tom Dillon, Marine Department manager. The fender hit a crew member, who received only minor injuries, Dillon said.

The bumper fell into the water, leaving a steel bracket exposed. While the steel-hulled LCMs are not in any real danger, the aluminum-hulled catamarans are, Dillon explained. The catama-

rans stop at Ebeye en route to Meck to pick up about 20 or so Marshallese employees who work on the east reef island. Until the pier is repaired, those employees are first coming to Kwajalein on the 4:20 a.m. or 4:50 a.m. ferries and then leaving on the catamaran.

Dillon said he hopes to repair the pier next Friday, when the new moon brings an extremely low tide. The exposed metal could, depending on the tides, punch a hole in the catamaran below the waterline. He said the department has scheduled two days for the repairs.

Other minor damage has occurred at the Ebeye pier because of the excessive west winds, Dillon said. The police shack at the pier has actually been pushed out of place because of the strong winds.

"It's such an exposed harbor," Dillon noted.

Marshall Islands, but the region."

An official with Aloha Airlines said there are no immediate changes planned in Aloha's service to the Pacific region.

"There have been some discussions here in Honolulu," said Stu Glauberman, a spokesperson for Aloha. He declined to comment on the specifics mentioned in the article, saying that those discussions were among

Marshallese officials.

An official with Air Nauru could not be reached. Air Nauru halted its regular service to Majuro in the early 1990s and now flies only infrequent charters to the Marshalls, according to the *Marianas* article.

Stege said the plan is in the beginning stages.

"Much leg work remains, as well as agreements that need to be met by top officials on all sides," he said.

the national government to be the new RMI rep to USAKA.

"Many times I deal with issues where I have to benefit both sides," he explained. "I really try to maintain smooth transactions between our two governments."

Prior to returning to Kwajalein Atoll, Malolo served as chief of missions to the Marshall Islands ambassador in Fiji. He was in Fiji during the 2000 coup against the national government, calling it "an unusual experience." He briefly worked in foreign affairs in Majuro between the Fiji and Kwajalein assignments.

"Interesting things happen everyday," Malolo said. "Every day's a new challenge. I learn a lot from what I see, and it is very challenging work environment."


Both Fred and Rochelle remain on Kwajalein.

Softball season throws a curve with new rules

While Major League Baseball may strike, local ballplayers will start up the annual fall softball season next week with some new rules and new teams.

Most notably, batters now will step up to the plate with a 1-1 count when the season starts next Friday.

"It's going to turn the game into a hitter's game, more now," said Scott Pratt, Adult Athletics supervisor. "I'm all for helping pitchers here, too, with the winds."

The rule has been debated for some time among softball circles and was included in last summer's tournament.

"It will speed up games," said Mark McCollum, manager for A Division's Old, Fat & Lazy. "It's a hitter's game. A batter may take a pretty strike, and the next one is ugly, but with a 1-1 count, a lot of batters will have to swing at the first two pitches."

McCollum added the rule addresses a common pet peeve when close games are called for time.

"It worked out for the summer tournament," he said. "We had one-hour games, and we thought 'This'll never work,' but you get through the games."

As part of the rule change, batters will receive a "courtesy foul," similar to a mulligan in golf. In short, should a batter take strike two, he or she may then foul off a ball and remain at bat. The next foul would count as strike three. A batter may not, however, foul off the first pitch for strike two, then take strike three and remain at bat. That batter would be called out.

In addition to the 1-1 count, games will now include a 20-run rule that goes into effect after four innings or 3½ if the home team is ahead. The 10-run rule after five innings remains in effect, as well.

In the convenience column, Pratt said he will schedule games for teams on designated nights, thus reducing confusion. For example, A League teams might play on Thursdays and Saturdays every week, or Team 1 in the C Division East might play every Tuesday night, hypothetically speaking.

"The only thing that will change will be the times they play," Pratt said, adding that he sees no problem evenly distributing men's games among Dally and Brandon Fields.

Post-season action will follow the regular double round-robin season, which concludes in mid-October, with the top two teams from each division playing for the title of their respective divisions, Pratt said.

A new league system was introduced, with A division teams now in the Alpha Division, and so forth. Teams registered this season, as of press time, include:

Alpha Division

For McCollum's team, the name is different, and so are a few new "pick-ups," but they're still Podunkers, and right in the mix is Criminals, which returns veteran leadership in Flynn Gideon and Steve Fuchs, among others. Rukwajleen, known in the past as Sunrise, and a team headed by Cody Boren, rounds out the Alpha Division.

Beta Division

In the Beta Division, Paul Balag heads Mo Fo, a group of primarily Hawaiian all-stars. Growing up this year are the Spartan I Boys, who are moving out of the C division, now called the Gamma Division, where they played numerous past seasons. Two Marshallese teams called HP1 and HP2 are a couple of last-minute additions.

Gamma Division

With last season's champions Spartans I Boys moving up, regulars G-4, Barnacles, Gummos and Tarlang will fight for supremacy along with new addition Zero Balance.

Omega Division

Less competitive, but featuring much barbecue grilling and cooler action, this division includes Spartan II Boys, Queen of Peace, FOM Construction, Da Bomb, KPD and HP III.

Women's Division

With only up to five teams, Spartans I Girls and 30 Something make up the A Division and Spartans II Girls and Lady Doves form B Division. A team to be named later may also join the mix, Pratt said.

Kimble, named after the character Richard Kimble from the TV show and movie "The Fugitive," because he took so long to catch, washed up on Kwajalein from Ebeye.

This was not the first time Kwajalein police and pest control services have searched for animals roaming around wildly.

Paige Colclough, Veterinarian tech, said, "We've caught chickens on island and injured turtles before."

But Kimble was a bit more elusive to catch than other animals. Colclough spotted the yellow lab mix while riding near the airport.

"He was afraid so [police] and pest control services spent an hour trying to catch the dog. Kimble is an extremely smart dog," Colclough said.

Kimble was finally found in the downtown area and taken to the Veterinary Clinic. Kimble was going to be "put to sleep" until Noda Lojkar, USAKA ombudsman, decided to take ownership of the dog.

"The dog seemed too nice to put to sleep," Lojkar said. "We'll let him have a lot of space on Big Bustard,

just roaming around, and we've had dogs before, so I know how to care for him. The kids will also be real happy about getting a new dog."

Capt. Connie Schmit, licensed veterinarian, was vacationing on Kwajalein when Kimble was finally caught and lent her services by neutering Kimble in the clinic. Thanks to the operation, Kimble will not reproduce, will live longer and will have less chance of developing testicular cancer.

After the operation Kimble received a new dog tag, collar and, finally, a new home.

"I think he's very fortunate to have Noda speak up for him," Colclough said.
