After reading the article "Parents say 'no' to tolerance," I am concerned that so many are willing to simply discard members of our own community.

Few town leaders have the option to throw out troublesome citizens, as does our commander. However, zero tolerance does not require that the most severe punishment be served as a first course. Just like the rest of us, these families having "drug problems" come here, make time and emotional investments and hope to integrate themselves into the Kwajalein community. Granted, we all have responsibilities to live as good citizens, yet it is unreasonable to expect that teenagers be perfect.

It is difficult to believe that we cannot envision a solution to a group of kids doing illicit drugs, short of banishment. I am sure these families are suffering enough without shouldering the level of contempt described in last Friday's article. Of course, it is

understandable that other parents should fear the possibility of finding themselves in such a situation. At the same time, it is a sad fact that frightened people often target a smaller, weaker group for vilification. It puts a face to their fear and allows them an imagined sense of separateness from the object of that fear.

However, to hear such a level of hostility coming from professional educators is somewhat frightening in itself. I would expect teachers to have a level of experience or at least imagination to formulate a less damaging solution.

Have we created a world of such intolerance that we can offer nothing to these families but separation from their support structure? We should not only judge the value of our community by how we treat each other during good times, but also how we treat our friends and neighbors in times of need.

# Holiday mailing deadlines only a few weeks away

With the holiday season approaching quickly, following some simple guidelines can help make sending and receiving packages and letters an easier and timelier experience.

The deadline for mailing parcel post and space-available mail, or SAM, is Nov. 20; and for first class and priority mail, Dec. 5.

“There are no guarantees,” said Karla Long, postal manager. “All our mail flies military flights.”

But if mailing deadlines are followed, the mail has a better chance of making it to the destination on time, she said.

Mail sent from Kwaj goes first to Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii and then to Travis Air Force Base, Calif. where the mail, bundled on pallets, is broken down and the mail enters the regular U.S. Postal Service.

The mail’s destination can determine how to send it, Long said. Mail addressed to the West Coast — California, Washington or Oregon — if it was sent SAM, the mail will be shipped 4th class once it enters the main stream mail from Travis.

But even traveling 4th class mail, mail destined for the West Coast should arrive in a timely manner no matter how it is sent from Kwaj, she said. The further away from California the mail destination is, the longer

it will take, meaning priority or first class mailing might be to the sender’s advantage.

“Each state the mail has to cross, the longer it takes,” Long said. “Don’t be in a hurry for it to get there.”

Military planes bring mail to Kwajalein three times a week — Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday — but according to Long, mission cargo, medical cargo, medical passengers or passengers can bump the mail. This also applies to mail leaving Hickam for California. Since the mail travels via military transport, the same criteria can bump the mail from its scheduled flights, but, according to Long, mail has never remained on Kwajalein for these reasons.

All mail, except letters, must have a customs form, even Kwajalein calendars and issues of the Hourglass, she said. The customer can complete the forms before they reach the postal counter.

“People should get a handful of [custom forms] and take them home and fill them out,” Long said.

One may not mail coconuts, giant clam shells, even a small piece of coral, Long said. Postal authorities will confiscate the package.

To be on the safe side, Long recommends that if someone wants to send shells as gifts then they should buy them at the Mic Shop.

Also, patrons may not mail batteries, liquor, plants or currency, she said. Postal customers run the risk of fines and losing postal privileges if they ship any prohibited items.

When shipping packages from Kwaj, patrons may wrap packages in strapping tape, clear packing tape or brown packing tape; not string, duct tape, masking tape or

scotch tape, she said.

Each package should be clearly addressed, she said, adding that if items are sent in manufacturer’s boxes and they are not clearly labeled or the address is small, then the package could be returned or not reach the destination on time.

Long recommends using a large sheet of white paper as an address label and the address label should be covered in clear tape. The dampness and rain could smear or destroy the address and then the package would be undeliverable.

Tape is available at the Post Office lobby wrapping station for customers’ use, she said, explaining they do not sell rolls of tape.

Unlike previous years, the Post Office will not use volunteers to process the mail this year, but Long said she hopes to have a volunteer in the lobby area to help postal customers find and fill out the correct forms so that, “the person will be ready to go when they reach the counter.”

# 'The New Guy' talks issues, answers questions

KRS President Ike Richardson took aim at the rumor mill Wednesday night in the first of what he promised to be regularly scheduled employee forums.

"The rumor mill and coconut drums are really good, but that doesn't mean they're fact," he said opening the meeting, held to a packed 300-plus crowd in the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room.

Putting a focus on safety, Richardson began the session pointing out fire exits and asking employees to use flashlights at night, though there is no Army regulation to do so. He reminded the audience of the recent safety seminar held for more than 250 supervisors and managers and alluded to the two fatal accidents since KRS took over the primary island contract March 1.

"The things that happened in the past were pretty much preventable if someone had intervened in the chain of events," he said.

## Meeting "The New Guy"

Richardson then dove into the agenda, an open format where he offered opening remarks followed by a question and answer session on issues ranging from budgets to building inspectors.

In his introduction, Richardson described his 31-year Navy career working his way up from a fighter pilot to skipper of the U.S.S. *Coronado* and U.S.S. *Nimitz* and finally to admiral, and his subsequent transition to the civilian sector that took him to O'Hare International Airport as the federal security director.

"I point this out to say that I have a varied background, and I don't ask people to do something I haven't or wouldn't do myself," he said.

Richardson went on to describe himself as a taskmaster, but added he tried to give "fair, consistent treatment to everybody. I will tell you what I think, and I won't sugar-coat it ... I reward loyalty, and I reward integrity."

Next, the new president, having held the position for 2½ weeks, promised change.

"Change is really good," he said.

"It moves people forward, holds them to a higher standard .. There are some great things about this island that you would never want to change, but there are some things we could be doing better."

## On contracts and medical care

Beginning with contracts, Richardson asked how many people in the crowd held a contract that came up in March with the majority holding their hands in the air. He then asked if employees would prefer to restructure their current one-year standard agreements to a more flexible arrangement, such as the potential, under special circumstances, to break contract with 90 days notice.

The crowd said yes.

Richardson said annual raises would take effect March 1 and annual leave programs would continue as currently set.

Hitting the hotline, Richardson said the island's TDY orthodontist had signed his contract and would continue services; and referencing the rumor mill, the investigation into the death of TDY worker Brett LeJeune, 29, who died suddenly Oct. 27, continues with professionals at Tripler Medical Center conducting an autopsy this past week. Norm Black, Environmental, Safety and Health

manager, reported the autopsy revealed, "no unusual findings." Richardson said he would release details as they became available, but asked that residents refrain from speculating or spreading rumors on the tragic event.

"That's not the way we want to do business," he said.

On the medical front, Richardson said he visited with StayWell Insurance officials, receiving assurances of new coverage plans. Human Resources will mail specific details to employees by Dec. 10, according to Cathy Tuttle, HR manager, and enrollment will follow in December and January.

Seemingly weighing heavily on much of the crowd, budget concerns became a topic with Richardson who said, "the money available is not what we were expecting. It's millions of dollars short of what we're expecting. the command and RTS are working with us hand-in-hand, and it's not just KRS giving up stuff," he said.

In a subsequent interview, Richardson said layoffs have not been considered as part of the budget talks.

This led to a discussion on medical leaves, which cost the contract and government more than \$500,000 in past years. Richard-

son indicated he would tighten controls on medical leaves, cutting back on elective referrals or anything that might be postponed.

"I'm a big proponent of getting the best medical care, but I have to be fiscally responsible to the government," he said.

Later, in discussing the lack of a pharmacist, Dr. Eric Lindborg said that the hiring process was underway, and in the meantime, he has filled prescriptions.

Black interjected praise for the medical professionals, backed by audience applause, and cited a recent example of caring for a pair of young burn victims.

**Visiting quality of life issues**

Richardson said a new third grade teacher had been hired and was in the process of PCSing to the island.

Playground equipment in New Housing, deemed unsafe by USAKA Safety officials, would either undergo maintenance or be removed, depending on how budget negotiations go.

Meanwhile, Johnston Island continues to provide materials for Kwajalein in the form of more than 170 barge containers, carrying everything from base infrastructure goods to furniture to toys.

The president then queried the audience on their willingness to pitch in labor for community self-help construction projects where budget shortfalls otherwise prevented progress and the crowd responded positively.

Talking TV reception, he described a plan to work to improve the pictures on home sets by moving the transmitter antennas further out from the poles where they are mounted. Work should conclude by the end of next week, reported Joe Marshall, Community Services manager.

In addition, a crew of workers in the near future will respond to home calls and test out four available antennas, giving consumers an idea of which antenna will give them the best reception. Those antennas will then be on sale at Macy's West. They may also offer suggestions on moving televisions to less obstructed locations, another wall, for example, in the house.

Retail has formed a committee to explore store selection and hours of operation, Marshall reported, with a 60-day plan for

improvements. Marshall promised more details in the coming weeks.

**Q and A**

Just after opening the floor to questions, Richardson received perhaps the toughest question of the night first when Johnny Gardner asked "What is KRS?" and went on to explain that during the contract turnover, employees had been told it would be one company, with one set of benefits working together.

Richardson acknowledged the question, and in fact, alluded to the different ways of doing business during his introduction. He then, "as the new guy," asked for 90 days to work the issues, "but hold me to task on this one," he added.

**In other questions:**

- Self Help is not closing down, contrary to rumors.
- Unaccompanieds choosing to live in trailers or housing with access to a kitchen will not receive meal cards after March 1.

Likewise, a program to allow meal-card holders to use their cards at various eating establishments on-island is still in the works, hampered by problems with a point-of-sale computerized check out system that would monitor the card's usage.

• An ice cream parlor, offering sundaes, floats and shakes, will open in the CRC before Christmas. Much of the equipment for the parlor comes from Johnston Island.

KRS and the command are exploring other dining options to include new construction of dining facilities, but those options are dependent on funding.

• A profit-sharing program is in the works with excellent scores directing a portion of the award fee to a fund that augments salary raises.

Also in the works is a savings bond program.

• Eight dome homes will be built north of the CRC, and south of the existing dome homes.

• A new Standard Practice of Instruction, set to take effect in the coming weeks, will govern housing improvements including the work previously managed by the building inspector.

• Richardson will look into expanding vending choices in BQs and installing ice machines, if any are available from Johnston Island.

# **Counsel offers financial tips**

Financial planning and saving is difficult for most people trying to keep their head above water in today's challenging times, but the need for future financial planning and budgeting is necessary since many people do not realize where the money goes every month.

Budgeting and controlled spending can help people meet their financial goals, according to Militaryloans.com.

Kent Duncan, former U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Command counsel, agreed. People should list all their assets and liabilities and stay within a budget they set for themselves, he added.

One way to take control of monthly spending and to track spending habits, according to Militaryloans.com, is set up a spread sheet with three columns. In column one, put all monthly take home pay. In column two, list all monthly expenses such as rent/mortgage, homeowners/renters insurance, utilities, food, car payment, car insurance, life insurance premiums, cable, Internet, cash withdrawals, credit card payments, eating out, entertainment, phone and all other monthly expenses. In column three, list unexpected expenses such as birthdays, computer purchase, major repairs or travel due to family illness. The total of column one should exceed the total in two and three combined.

Credit cards can be a down-fall.

According to the Nolo Web site, a credit card with a \$5,000 balance, at 17 percent interest and a monthly payment of \$50, would never be paid off. The same credit card paid at \$75 a month would take 17 years, and the interest alone would come to a whopping \$10,410.12. But if the monthly payment was increased to \$500 it would only take 11 months to pay off and the interest would come to only \$430.

Duncan stressed three things in order to achieve financial stability and growth — pay off credit cards, plan for the financial future and have liquid assets.

"We need to look at more long-term estate planning," Duncan said.

The Baby Boomer generation is coming to retirement age and the WWII generation is dying and passing on their wealth, he added. Therefore, people need to prepare for retirement and prepare for possible unexpected expenses to care for elderly family members.

Duncan suggests people follow a savings plan.

"I recommend a one- to two-month liquid reserve for emergencies such as family illness, unexpected travel or unexpected major purchases," Duncan said.

Airfare to Honolulu is about \$1,000 round-trip, Duncan said.

While saving money, be flexible, Duncan added.

There are short-term, medium-term, and long term investments and people should set goals depending on their age, Duncan said. What is it you want to accomplish? Do you want to work until you die, retire at age 60 or have a sizable savings to pass on to your children? What you invest in is determined by how much you can afford to lose, Duncan said.

When considering which savings or investment plans you will use, he added, risk is a good factor to consider.

Bank saving accounts are a low-risk plan, Duncan said. There are also money markets, CDs and mutual funds for government institutions. The higher risk savings plans include the broad spectrum funds and sector funds.

He also stressed, to start now with financial planning, access your "time value of money." For example, if you start to save now with \$100 a month, and you are age 20, then when you reach retirement age the amount saved will be dramatically larger than if at age 50 you start to put away \$100 a month for retirement. If you start to save later in life then you have to increase how much you are putting into savings each month to have financial security upon retirement, Duncan said.

If you are in debt, get out as quickly as possible, Duncan said. Avoid debt in the future.

Some other ways to aid with starting a budget and saving for retirement or unexpected expenses are listed at left.

# VA kicks off kids Web site

WASHINGTON – The Department of Veterans Affairs announced the launch of “VA Kids” this week, a new Web page designed to help young people understand what it means to be a veteran.

“The ideals of military service and patriotism can be unfamiliar to some children and young adults,” said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Anthony J. Principi. “The VA Kids Web page supports President Bush’s initiatives on education and volunteerism by providing an entertaining and informative way for young people to learn why veterans are special.”

The site [<http://www.va.gov/kids>], contains areas for students in kindergarten through Grade 5, for Grades 6 through 12, and for teachers. VA Kids also has information about VA, Veterans Day, scholarships, student volunteer opportunities, rehabilitative and special events for disabled veterans and links to veteran-related sites.

For younger students, the site has interactive activities such as puzzles, coloring pages, matching contests and age-appropriate language to describe a number of patriotic topics.

For older students, the page has information on volunteer programs, scholarships and more sophisticated educational resources, games and reference links. The teachers’ section contains more information, links and suggested classroom activities.

## Baghdad zoo gets a little help from the Army

BAGHDAD, Iraq, – The residents of the Baghdad Zoo will benefit from recent equipment purchases by U.S. Army civil affairs and medical command soldiers.

"We purchased new surgical and diagnostic equipment for use on the animals at the Baghdad Zoo," said Dr. (Lt. Col.) Jose Lozada, veterinarian with the 490th Civil Affairs Battalion, an Army Reserve unit from Abilene, Texas. The battalion is part of Task Force 1st Armored Division.

The zoo was reportedly once the largest in the Middle East. Looters stole some animals that survived combat operations in the Iraq war. Others remained abandoned and malnourished till the U.S. military, with help from civilian non-profit agencies, stepped in and improved conditions.

The veterinarians purchased \$42,000 in equipment for the zoo, including an autoclave for instrument sterilization, an X-ray machine for animal bone-structure assessment, and a vaporizer to accurately measure anesthesia drugs, Lozada said.

"The idea is to bring the veterinary capabilities of the Baghdad Zoo up to a 21st century standard," he said. "The value of these machines is immeasurable when it comes to the functionality and effectiveness of the zoo."

Dr. Adel Salman, chief veterinarian and director of the Baghdad Zoo, has seen the daily impact of the Army's reconstruction efforts at the zoo. He said the new equipment is a huge stride forward for the facility in animal care and welfare.

"Before the help from the U.S. Army, the zoo was very poor for equipment. There was no surgical

capability and little treatment ability because we had no anesthesia or instruments," said Salman. "We really appreciate support from Lt. Col. Lozada and the U.S. Army."

The portable X-ray machine, part of the equipment purchased with Commander's Emergency Response Program funds from the 352nd Civil Affairs Command, an Army Reserve unit from Riverdale, Md., will add significant mission flexibility to the zoo staff by allowing them to X-ray animals inside their enclosures, said Lozada.

In the past, this process would have taken several helpers to sedate and truck the animals being treated to a local clinic for examination, said Lozada. This is considerably more difficult, and more dangerous, than on-site treatment.

Another benefit of the new equipment, he said, is the opportunity to train the zoo staff on modern equipment and medical technology.

"Our No. 1 priority is to train the zoo vets on their equipment and teach them how to perform surgical procedures," Lozada said.

## Meteor shower set for next week

### Peaks set for morning of Nov. 14 and evening of Nov. 19

November skies hold not only one meteor shower this year, but two.

On Nov. 14 and 19 the Leonid meteor shower will be visible, said Robert Carson.

“The Leonid meteor shower will have two peaks this year, one on Nov. 14 at 5:17 a.m. and one on Nov. 19 at 7:28 p.m.,” he said.

The first November meteor show comes from the comet Tempel-Tuttle’s dust from the year 1499, according to NASA’s Web site [www.science.nasa.gov](http://www.science.nasa.gov).

The Nov. 19 show also comes

from the Tempel-Tuttle dust from the year 1533.

“Neither should be a spectacular shower,” Carson said. “In both cases, we only pass close to a stream of comet debris, not through one as we did in 2001.”

There are differing of opinions about how many meteors will be seen, according to the Web site, but there is an agreement that this will not be as spectacular as the meteor shower in 2001.

“For the 14th, the numbers are expected to be low,” Carson said. “For the 19th, the peak will occur when the radiant is still below our horizon and before midnight.

According to Science@NASA, the Nov. 14 shower prediction ranges from a few meteors to 40 per hour while on the 19th the prediction ranges from 30 to 100 meteors per hour.



# October weather runs wet and afoul of normal

Perhaps October seemed a little rainy to you. That's certainly understandable. Kwajalein was actually a little wet, even for a location in the tropics. The 14.03 inches of rainfall received in October was 2.57 inches above normal for the month.

For weather fans, the wettest and driest records for October are 20.05 inches, in 1964, and 5.04 inches, which occurred in 1969.

On the rainiest day, which was the Oct. 16, the island received a whopping 3.98 inches of rainfall. That's still a bit shy of the maximum 24-hour rainfall during any October, which occurred in 1968 when the weather station recorded 6.53 inches of precipitation.

In addition to the heavy rain on the 16th, the Oct. 3 was a noticeably rainy day as well, but not so much in volume of rain as in duration. The weather station recorded 10 separate shower events that day, which lasted much of the day.

Weather watchers also tallied three thunderstorms during the month, one more than normal for October. Thunderstorms occurred on the 12th, 14th, and one that lasted for approximately two hours on the 28th.

Temperatures were above normal again for the month of October. The average temperature for the month was 82.9 F, coming in at .7 F above normal. This makes the seventh month this year that temperatures have averaged above normal. The high and low temperatures for the month were 89 F and 76 F, compared to a record high for the month of 92 F set in 1977, and a record low of 71 F set in 1967.

Sea-surface temperatures continued an above normal trend that began in February. Sea-surface temperatures in the vicinity averaged about 85.9 F, which is 1.3 F above the long-term average. Since ocean surface temperatures are largely responsible for regulating climate in the central Pacific, warmer than normal air temperatures have been the rule this year.

If you're eagerly anticipating some kind of change in the weather; you're partially in luck. While the long-range forecast from the scientists at the Pacific Applications Center indicates a continuation of trends for slightly higher than normal temperatures, slightly below normal rainfall is expected through the end of the year. In addition, we begin to transition out of the wet season during the month of November. On average, temperatures and precipitation decrease from October values during the month of November.

# Soldiers on R&R benefit from donated air miles

WASHINGTON – Travelers can donate frequent-flier miles to help troops on leave from Iraq reach their destinations through Operation Hero Miles.

Service members participating in the two-week "rest and recuperation" leave program are flown free to Rhein-Main Air Base, Germany, or Baltimore-Washington International Airport by the Defense Department, but must pay for connecting flights from and back to those ports. The Atlanta and Dallas-Fort Worth airports are scheduled to be added to the program Nov. 1, said Rhonda Paige, chief of strategic communications, G-1, Army Well-Being Division.

More than 200 soldiers arrive at BWI daily as part of the R&R program, said Lt. Col. Robert Hagen, Army spokesman.

"I think Operation Hero Miles is a fantastic program," said Hagen, who has been the on-site public affairs

Delta, Southwest and Alaska Airlines/Horizon Airlines have joined the operation.

I am confident that other airlines will want to join this effort to help our soldiers risking their lives for our country."
