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

# New signals arrive on Kwajalein

New TV channels and radio stations are arriving on Kwajalein and reception is being upgraded at the same time in an ongoing effort to improve quality of life for residents here and on Roi-Namur.

On Christmas Eve, the first of four new TV signals was seen, when Spectrum on Channel 23 started broadcasting, said Craig McCarraher, AFN Kwajalein Chief engineer. On Jan. 4, residents will see and hear one more of the new TV signals and four new radio signals.

New signals from Huntsville are now transmitting to Kwajalein, with more expected in the next few months, McCarraher said.

"Our AFN Engineer and an IT person went back to Huntsville for our portion of the DS3 cutover project which was completed Dec. 13," said Lloyd Jordan, KRS Community Services deputy manager, explaining that the overall project which is designed to bring in more TV and radio channels to Kwajalein residents is scheduled for final completion early next year.

This effort started as a bandwidth project with Huntsville, described in Sep. 9 *Hourglass* issue. In anticipation of the arrival of the new signals, two new antennas and eight transmitters were installed on Kwajalein.

Although the signal is better than it was, some residents may need new home antennas to improve reception, Jordan said, explaining that beginning Jan. 6, residents can call Macy's West customer service counter, 53542, to schedule a free consultation with a member of the Antenna Test Bed Team to determine which antenna to buy.

The ATBT will come to residents' homes with three amplified indoor antennas, Jordan said. The ATBT will determine which one is best suited for each residence in terms of reception.

The appointments are on a first come, first serve basis, Jordan said. Residents must be present while the ATBT technician is in their home and also must make the back of the television set accessible to the technician.

"I don't want our guys moving stuff, they're not movers," Jordan said.

The ATBT will only offer consulta-

tions on indoor antennas, since a new policy is going into place regarding outdoor antennas, Jordan said.

"Those of you that have [outdoor] antennas right now, they are OK to use until they break down, then you cannot replace them with another outdoor antenna," he said. "The command does not want outdoor antennas put up all over the island."

## Bachelor Quarters Update

New TV antennas have been installed on all of the Kwajalein BQs, replacing the old ones which were wearing out, McCarraher said. Three of the BQs have been upgraded with new amplifiers and the rest are scheduled to be upgraded by Jan. 5.

"I've already heard good comments from [residents in] the three that were replaced, that they have real good reception," Jordan said. "It appears that the [improved] reception and what we're doing is going to fix the BQs."

## Roi Update

A purchase order has already been submitted for the Roi-Namur update, McCarraher said, and the signal from Kwajalein will be put in place as soon as it arrives.

"We haven't forgotten Roi," Jordan said. "They will get the TV signal and we will install it and ensure that our people do the right things to get them that signal for their community."

## TV Channel Update

"As of Christmas Eve, we established the link and successfully started transmitting the new TV and radio stations to Kwajalein," McCarraher said.

Starting Sunday, Jan. 4, AFN Atlantic will begin to air on Channel 9 instead of Direct-to-Sailors, McCarraher said.

The two remaining signals will be available later this year, Jordan said.

## Radio Update

On Jan. 4, residents will hear four new programs, National Public Radio International, Hot AC or top 40, Adult Rock or classic rock, and Country, will broadcast 24-hours a day on the AFN radio stations with frequencies to be determined, McCarraher said. DTS music stations will remain on the TV behind the weather radar, the roller and flight information. Additional information regarding the new TV signals and radio frequencies will be on the roller and in next Saturday's *Hourglass*.

# Johnston Island closure increases Kwaj assets

Since May, 176 Matson containers filled with items from vehicles to paperclips have arrived on Kwajalein from Johnston Island and there are more containers to come.

Johnston Island is closing down its operations. In preparation for the 2004 closure, everything has to be sent elsewhere — and a total of \$10 million in equipment is coming to Kwajalein, said Robert Tucker, USA-KA Property administrator.

A shipment of 15 dumpsters with an approximate assessed value of \$10,000 each, along with three rolls of high voltage wire, valued at \$30,000 each, were just a few of the items which comprise the \$10 million in acquisition value, he said.

“All in all we are going to come out ahead,” Tucker said.

Putting the Johnston Island closure in prospective, he said, that if Kwajalein closed tomorrow, everything here would have to be packed and shipped to another facility.

Several times over the past few months, Tucker took a proactive approach by taking the shipping containers and a packing team to Johnston Island when he went there to identify items that could be used on Kwajalein.

On Johnston Island, CH2M Hill is the company in charge of property disposal, demolition and environmental cleanup.

CH2M Hill will be packing and

shipping the balance of the inventory since “KRS will make no more trips,” said Larry Roberts, KRS property manager.

The items shipped to Kwajalein include general office supplies, boats, automotive supplies, computers, church pews and hymnals, hospital equipment, refrigerators, housing furniture and recreational equipment

A baby grand piano and a spinet piano are included in the items still to be sent to Kwajalein along with several vehicles and the Johnston Island Tiki Lounge.

There is a process set up to disperse items from Johnston Island, Tucker said.

First KRS utilizes what they can, then the remaining items are offered to the Republic of the Marshall Islands and they have the “right of first refusal,” he said.

The department-specific items go directly to the different departments on island, such as hospital supplies going to Kwajalein Hospital, and non-department specific supplies, such as Bachelor Quarters refrigerators, are open to all departments during the Wednesday and Saturday showings, Roberts said.

However, the showings are not public showings and items are not for the public use, he added.

Items that are left over are put up for sale to the general public in a sealed bid auction and if they do not sell during the DCCB auction, the items are then scrapped, Tucker said.

About 95 percent of the items received are being utilized, Roberts said.

Most of the furniture acquired on Johnston is BQ type furniture, said Flynn Gideon, KRS Housing super-

visor. Housing is currently sorting through the containers they have already received and have upgraded the Pacific BQ, and some vacant rooms in the Shell BQ were also upgraded. The furniture will upgrade both the TDY rooms over Macy’s and rooms in the Kwaj Lodge.

Cataloging and sorting the furniture is an ongoing project which is expected to go on for a long period of time, he said.

Most of the equipment is older, but there are some 300-class computers. IT is utilizing some of the better equipment to upgrade machines in the field, said Trish Wildfang, IT Technical Support manager.

The items from Johnston Island helped to boost the parts supply in the IT Department, said J. Martinez, Desktop Administration supervisor.

“Some of the items have already gone to the RMI, they are in the loop, but the main thrust is to use it on our own contract here,” Roberts said.

But it isn’t just government items used in Johnston Island’s work operations that are in the containers. When most of the island’s residents left, there weren’t any buyers at the Johnston Island residents’ patio sales.

So the church congregation on Johnston Island donated personal items they did not want to the chapel on Kwajalein. These personal items were sold at a patio-style sale two weeks ago, and the money will be used to support the missionaries on Ebeye, said Rev. Rick Funk, Protestant chaplain.

Then a few personal items such as a microwave, toaster, crock pot and coffee pot were sent to the Ebeye missionaries for their use, he added.

# First time celebration on Lib

The sun had just come over the horizon when the Great Bridge began its journey to Lib Island, Monday morning participating in one of the largest Christmas drops ever made from Kwajalein.

For the past several years, members of the Kwajalein Atoll International Sportfishing Club have traveled to Lib Island for the excellent fishing opportunities and decided that Lib's need was great enough to warrant a drop similar to Carlos or Enniburr, said Dave Walner, KAISC member.

Lib Island, located south of Kwajalein Atoll, does not belong to any specific atoll and only receives a supply boat three to four times a year, but has never received a Christmas drop from Kwajalein despite it being a favorite destination for many Kwajalein fisherman, sailors and scuba divers.

What started out as a KAISC project to help Lib residents and also thank them for the wonderful recreational outlet, turned into an island-wide effort, said Steve Moore, KAISC member, explaining that his club worked closely with USAKA to gather food items and supplies for the journey.

Volunteers from the Kwajalein Yacht Club and the Kwajalein Scuba Club also donated their time, in an effort to show their gratitude for the warm welcome they always receive when they visit Lib, Moore said.

"The thing that really impressed me the most was the Kwajalein community and how they came together and how much support there was for it," Moore said. "The Marine department [and the Aviation department] really came together to support it."

In addition to the Great Bridge, three

helicopter loads of volunteers were flown into Lib to help with unloading, organizing and repair of the Lib school house

The helicopters arrived first and the Lib islanders showed their gratitude for the visit, Moore said.

"When you got off the helicopter, the reception was just great," he said. "They had a bunch of ladies with *wuts* [head wreaths] and they were singing."

USAKA Commander Col. Jerry Brown and other visitors aboard the helicopters shook hands with each islander in an impromptu receiving line.

When the Great Bridge arrived about 11:30 a.m., all the people went down to the shore and greeted those volunteers too.

Then the real work and fun began.

"The people on the ship unloaded cargo to support the guys on the helicopter," said Ron Clark, Kwajalein volunteer. "We basically spent the entire afternoon unloading the cargo and transferring it to shore."

Desks and chairs were some of the school supplies unloaded from the Great Bridge along with construction material to repair the roof and interior of Lib's school, which had been damaged from water leakage.

"They told us they had the labor, they just needed the supplies," Moore said. "We brought over a generator and power tools and cut up some stuff for them so when they get ready to do it, it will make the job go a lot faster."

Also on board were KAISC gift bags for each school child on island with notebooks, pens and pencils.

On shore, both children and adults dove into gallons of strawberry ice cream until sticky hands and faces were all that could be seen.

Residents and volunteers then gathered together for a presentation ceremony so Lib residents could officially receive the gifts from Kwajalein. Lib residents then cooked a huge feast for all from supplies brought on the Great Bridge.

Volunteer carpenters helped with the reconstruction of Lib's school house roof while teaching the residents skills which will allow them to finish the job. Enough materials were left

for residents to complete the reconstruction.

This Herculean effort wasn't a last minute decision, but instead a project that started last fall, Moore said. Last October a fishing tournament was held to raise funds for the supplies and gifts. Major drivers behind the success of the project were Terry Yearly, Tom Krasuski and David Coffey, he said.

"The response from the [Kwajalein] community was really overwhelming," Moore said. "There was about eight or nine people who threw in a bunch of money and [the total] rose about \$1,000 right there."

Between that donation and the tournament, KAISC raised about \$2,200.

But the effort was very worthwhile, Moore said.

"I was carrying a bicycle up the beach and there was this little girl and she saw that bicycle and her eyes just lit up," he said. "It's moments like that; it was really a heartwarming experience to see that. It was a big event for them."

The success of the project and the experiences from the day will stay with the volunteers for a long while, according to Moore.

"I know I felt, and I think everybody that went felt, it was probably the best thing that any of us had done for Christmas in a long time," he said.

## Ring in the New Year, sky gazing

At midnight New Year's Eve, Earth will once again be in close proximity to another planet in the solar system.

Saturn will be only 748 million miles away, another close approach like Mars, said Bob Carson.

"It will rise in the East, about sunset, on New Year's Eve and will be nearly overhead at midnight on that night," Carson said. "It will be yellowish, bright and like all planets, should not twinkle like the stars do."

Not only will Saturn be as close to Earth as it can get, but its rings will be tilted toward the Earth, according to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Sunlight reflected from the rings will make Saturn very bright.

Saturn will be visible for several months, rising earlier and setting later each day, Carson said.

"To see Saturn's rings, you will need a telescope," he said.





# Former patients return to thank hospital staff

The two girls, 8-year-old Miriam Ned dressed in bright blue clothes and 9-year-old Corina Calep, dressed in bright pink — both with spandex bandages covering part of their faces and their bodies — and surrounded by family members, walked into Kwajalein Hospital Christmas Eve at noon.

“They wanted to come over and see where they were taken care of,” said Nancy Ned, Miriam’s mother, watching the two little girls, standing in front of the hospital Christmas tree, smiling shyly at Kwajalein Hospital staff surgeon and Shrine Club president Dr. Edward Paget who helped get them into the Shriners Children’s Hospital in California. Dr. Lance Ray, who was their primary care physician during their 11-day stay at Kwajalein and Nursing director Jane Cassel knelt down to talk face to face with the two girls. Staff members from all over the hospital came out of offices and examining rooms and smiled at the two girls and their families.

“They wanted to thank the hospital staff for the good care and for arranging so the girls could go onto the Shriner’s hospital,” Ray said.

The last time the staff had seen both girls was Oct. 21, when the pair left the hospital covered in gauze, medicated against pain and on stretchers — Ned with burns covering 64 percent of her body and Calep with 48 percent of her body burned. The girls, each with a family member, boarded a plane bound for Honolulu and then on to the Shriners Hospital in

Sacramento. Twelve days before, as reported in the Oct. 21 Hourglass issue, the two girls were playing with matches and a discarded container from a copy machine which blew up and caught their clothes on fire.

At first, the Republic of the Marshall Islands was going to transport the girls to the Philippines for care, but when the girls were sent to Kwajalein in anticipation of the flight, Paget reminded Ray that the children were eligible for care at a Shriner Hospital.

“All the medical care is provided free to children that are presented to the door of a Shriners Hospital,” Paget said, explaining Shriner hospitals focus primarily on three specialty areas — orthopedic congenital problems or injuries, spinal cord injuries and burns.

At least four times this year, the local Kwajalein Shrine Club has provided transportation costs for a child and one of their parents to travel to the Shriners Children’s Hospital in Honolulu, Hawaii for care, Paget said. But since the RMI government was picking up the transportation costs for the girls, the money can be used for other children needing care.

As far as acute injuries go, the two girls’ injuries were some of the worst cases the Shriners have sent off island from Kwajalein, Paget said.

“What we are providing is care to Marshallese children who don’t have access to that kind of care,” he said.

On Thursday, the two girls visited with the hospital staff members and were examined by Ray, who had previously worked with burn patients during a stint at Brooke Army burn unit in San Antonio, Texas.

“They have been healing very well, but they still have extensive scarring and will wear spandex suits, which covers their whole body, for a year to reduce scarring,” he said. “They have to do daily exercises because some of the joints are stiffening.”

Both girls do tire easily.

“They will be home-schooled for a while and they need a little extra care because stamina is not back to where it was,” he said.
