Command issues fatality review report

A fatal bicycle accident last month has led to a push for greater safety awareness, according to Tom Webber, director USAKA Command Safety Directorate.

The command recently released excerpts of its investigation, conducted in conjunction with Kwajalein Range Services Safety, into the death of Robert Wagner, 55, who died of complications from a severe head injury Feb. 11 (Kwaj time) at Queens Hospital in Honolulu. Wagner suffered the injury in a bicycle accident around 7:15 p.m., on Feb. 10, near the Corlett Recreation Center.

"Mr. Wagner's death was a result of losing control of his bicycle," the report stated. "Mr. Wagner was traveling in a residential area 5 to 10 mph above posted speed limits [which is 15

INS requires proper papers

It would be a good idea for local residents to listen to the AFN commercials about marrying a foreign citizen. Entry to the U.S. and U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll "isn't automatic" for foreign nationals, even if they are married to a U.S. citizen, according to the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service and Francoise Standifer, USAKA paralegal specialist and INS liaison.

"Becoming a spouse does not mean a person is authorized to enter USAKA or America ... [and] does not

Hello, my name is Karen, and I'm a sugar wafer addict

I have an addiction. There I admitted it. No, it's not caffeine. Just because I drink buckets of the stuff doesn't mean I can't stop anytime I want to. Really.

This weekend in Surfway, after 35 years of abstinence, I came face to face with my addiction — Bisco Sugar Wafers— and I lost the fight.

Don't laugh and for those with serious, health-impairing addictions like alcohol, tobacco and drugs, I want you to know that I'm not making fun of addictions. Although mine may be rather trivial, it gives me a glimpse of the strength it takes to overcome an addiction.

The strange part is that I really didn't know I had this unusual addiction; the last time I drowned in a virtual sea of the nefarious sugar wafers, I had a good excuse — I was seven months pregnant.

Just over 35 years ago, I first experienced the addiction to those light, crispy, not-too-sweet, melt-in-the mouth ... back to the sordid tale.

My husband and I were very broke, he was an Airmen 3rd Class and I was pregnant, which in those days meant we had just enough money for half a month's worth of food and I couldn't get a job because no one hired pregnant military



spouses then. Suffice it to say, there were quite a few weeks each month that we ate popcorn or rice, which are both very good with catsup — remember catsup is a vegetable.

Home in our tiny basement apartment with my husband at work, I started to crave those heavenly cookies which I had a few sweet times as a young child. Getting those cookies quickly became a consuming passion. Now don't just sit there and give this column that "I never did anything like that" look. I'm sure there are very few people who have not secretly stuffed their face with chocolate or raspberries or stood in front of the open freezer in the middle of the night with a spoon in a container of chocolate almond fudge ice cream. We all have our cravings.

I knew I needed \$2.29 to purchase the gold-foil covered box containing three wax-paper covered sleeves of those ethereal sweets. I had only 25 cents in my purse, but scrounged through every container I had in our place to find the remaining \$2.05, mostly in pennies.

Then I waddled — I was seven months pregnant and walking is good for you — to the local Albertson's in Aurora, Colo. and guiltily bought a box. I couldn't get home fast enough. I opened the box and proceeded to eat one, then two sleeves. Each sleeve contains probably six servings — if you want to go by the container information — actually the two sleeves were only 2/3 of a serving for me. I agonized for 30 or 40 seconds over whether to save the last sleeve of cookies for my husband. Overwhelmed with the guilt of actually spending money on a treat and already eating two packets, I did the reasonable thing and tidily did away with the evidence — chomp, chomp.

Ironically, this addiction is either not genetic or my daughter overdosed on those sugar wafers before she was born, because she can't stand them to this day.

It was at least 15 years before I told my husband about the sugar wafer fiasco. All

he said was that he wished I had saved him some. Argh — even after 15 years, the guilt was overwhelming. As penance I never bought another box.

Although there were other sugar wafer cookies, just like in the Goldilocks story, they were never just right. Some were too sweet, some not the proper balance of filling and wafer, some were too soft, and so on. If someone did offer me *the* sugar wafer, I declined and convinced myself that it had been a pregnancy craving and I really didn't want one — yeah, sure.

Now 35 years later, I found myself breaking into a cold sweat at Surfway. I was face to face with a new item on the cookie shelf — THE sugar wafers. They sat lurking between long-time residents of the cookie/cracker shelf: Fig Newtons, vanilla wafers and saltines.

"Why not?" I said laughing nervously. "I can just have a couple and put them away and enjoy them over a period of time."

Within minutes of getting home, the box and one of the three familiar wax-paper covered sleeves of cookies was open. The tantalizing smell of sugar and just baked slightly-brown waffle cookie hit me square in the nose.

You know, now that I've come to my senses, I truly believe that the box and the cookies must have been much smaller than 35 years ago, because one, then two, then three sleeves were gone — *Poof!*

I'm an addict, but I now admit it. I can see it; I'm standing in front of vast auditorium filled with other folks each with their own secret addiction, be it Dove bars or peanuts or chips and dip. My voice whispers tentatively into the microphone, "My name is Karen and I'm a Bisco Sugar Wafer addict."

Confiding in LuAnne Fantasia, she said, "I'm glad someone else does that."

Now I didn't ask her what her addiction is, it could be Hagen Daz ice cream or Oreo cookies or even nachos. Whatever it is, I believe that at any one moment someone, somewhere is savoring yet another bite of a treat that calls to them, again and again until the treat is completely gone.

I'm asking the community for help. If you see me at Surfway's checkout with a box of those sugar wafers — stop me please. I am actually going to put those cookies down on Surfway's "least requested items" list located on the Post Office bulletin board.

I promise. I'll do that next week.

mph] on his Cannondale high-speed racing bike without a helmet. At the high rate of speed his actions, whether to avoid a collision with another bike or to simply swing around traffic, caused him to lose control of his bike resulting in a collision with a palm tree."

After reviewing the accident, investigators found "many policies and procedures are not fully adhered to by the island community and that a stronger emphasis should be made on identifying bicycle safety issues," the report stated.

Bicycle safety, is a year-round concern on the island, as bikes represent the primary mode of transportation for almost all of the 2,000 residents of all ages and even many of the 1,000 or more daily commuters, Webber said.

In fact, Kwajalein Hospital treats, on average, a bicycle-related injury every week, ranging from minor cuts and bruises to broken bones or other injuries requiring surgery or therapy later, according to Valerie Janikowski, Out-patient Department Nurse manager. The hospital has treated three minor

bicycle injuries since March 1.

But the report comes out at a time when many residents are training for the upcoming Rustman triathlon on high-speed bicycles similar to the Cannondale Wagner was operating.

Those training must ride the circuit around the runway, south of Ninth Street; helmets are required; flashlights are required after dark; and speed limits are 25 mph. Riders must also slow down when they return to residential areas.

And training or not, flashlights are required after dark on all non-paved roads including Perimeter Road, which runs along the lagoon from the Dock Security Checkpoint up to North Point, Webber said. Those with children must use approved child carriers and only one person may ride a bike, if that's what it's designed for.

"These are absolutely not new regulations," Webber said. "We have existing regulations both through safety and traffic regulations that identify the rules of the road."

Webber said the command will add to the Island Orientation and local

driver's test information about the bicycle training circuit including the speed limits and helmet policy. The command will publish bicycle safety information in the phone book, as well, he added.

Also, look for greater enforcement of bicycle policies and regulations, with Kwajalein Police issuing citations for violations.

"We really keep an eye out for it," said Chief Kevin Dykema. "If we see those bikes traveling in excessive speeds, we're going to stop and talk to them."

In the end, Webber said, he hopes the efforts prevent another accident like the one last month.

"This was something that potentially could have been avoided," Webber said. "But this goes certainly beyond the bike issue. We need to look at everything across the board, all the things we take for granted. The community must take an active role in helping to ensure the safety of our friends, family, and co-workers by speaking up when they see unsafe practices. If you must, call the safety Hotline for KRS [54828] or USAKA [54723]."

Tax deferred for deployed soldiers, not civilians

WASHINGTON — Soldiers deployed to Kuwait, Afghanistan and other countries in that theater, along with those in the Balkans, will be allowed extra time to file and pay their income taxes.

Soldiers will have at least 180 days after they redeploy home to file their federal tax returns, and no penalty or interest will accrue during this period. Deployed civilian employees, though, do not have this automatic deferral. They must pay penalties on any owed taxes, even if they file a request for an extension of time to file, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

IRS Acting Commissioner Bob Wenzel sent a letter last month to Secretary of the Army Thomas White urging tax compliance among civilian employees. The letter stated that almost 4.5 percent of the Army's employees had some type of federal income tax delinquency as of October.

"The rate of (tax) compliance among federal employees and retirees continues to be better than that of the general public," Wenzel said in the letter. "However, our most recent data shows a sig-

nificant number of potentially non-compliant federal employees and retirees."

"If the public perceives that federal employees do not maintain the highest level of tax compliance," Wenzel wrote, "public confidence in government will suffer."

The automatic extension of time for soldiers to file their taxes is based on service in a combat zone or qualified hazardous duty area.

Army civilian employees and DoD contractors serving in the Balkans and Southwest Asia, though, have no such automatic deferral, IRS officials said. They must file Form 4868, an Application for Automatic Extension to File U.S. Individual Income Tax. This will provide an automatic four-month extension to file until Aug. 15, but this will not eliminate interest on late payments.

"Bottom line is, civilians are not included in the exemption, no matter who they work for," said Cassandra Charlton, an IRS senior analyst. She said deployed soldiers are exempt because "they're putting their lives on the line for us."

The Richardson Theater is the place to be at 7 p.m. on Saturday night to see two completely different entertainers, magician Eric Anderson and singer/musician/song writer Arthur Lee.

Anderson and Lee performed at Pearl Harbor just before coming to Kwaj as part of the DoD tour that will take them to Kosrae, Pohnpei, Chuuk, Guam and Tokyo, Cole said.

Anderson, billed as "the ultimate wizard of sorcery," combines comedy with slight-of-hand, illusions and mind-reading and works with corporations to motivate and entertain, according to Jest for Fun! Productions.

Involved in magic since he was five, Anderson is co-author of AH-HA!, a compendium of magic, and in 1996 was a feature performer for the Olympics held in Atlanta. He was also a semi-finalist in the "Funniest Person in America" contest.

Lee's distinct musical talent and sound is called "a refreshing new, American fold rock sound," by Harold Chiles, Record Industry consultant and A&M Records Marketing vice-president.

Innovation has been the key to Lee's sound according to his Web site, www.arthurleemusic.com. Starting

with "air drums" at 4-years-old, Lee mastered multiple instruments and wove his unique sounds, drawing from his rhythm and blues Chicago background, from artists like Santana and The Grateful Dead, from his travels to Africa and from other diverse sources.

He is currently working on a new release with songwriter/producer Wendy Waldman who is famous for "Save the Best for Last." Waldman heard him play at the 2002 Rocky Mountain Folk Festival.

Lee plays original compositions blending "African percussion, bass, acoustic and electric guitars and guitar synthesizer into a one-man afrograss flavored folk rock ensemble," according to his Web site.

The show will travel to Roi for Sunday's 7 p.m. show at The Outrigger. **Local talent presents Kaleidoscope**

Classical, country, jazz, pop and original music is on tap at 7 p.m. in the high school multi-purpose room, according to Eileen Carson, YYWC event co-chairperson.

The popular event, which last year raised \$3,075 used as scholarship money for graduating seniors and other YYWC programs, at first had trouble finding

musicians. Seven of last year's performers had or are getting ready to PCS, Carson said.

But the community came though and more than 15 local musicians, performing in different combinations from solos to quartets, will sing or play an instrument or both, she said.

"There is an incredible amount of musical talent here and not a lot of opportunities for the community to enjoy it and the musicians to perform," said Denise Bottomley, YYWC event co-chairperson.

The event grew out of two different causes. Five years ago, Carson put on a fundraising event for Kwajalein Atoll Relief for Ebeye or KARE which raised funds to put water catchment systems on Ebeye. Three years ago, Bottomley, looking for a way to raise money for scholarships, "hooked up" with Carson and set up the Kaleidoscope of Music.

"We're hoping to raise \$2,000 or more," Carson said, adding she would set up the event even if it wasn't raising money for a cause. "I've had several members of the community tell me it's one of the nicest evenings they've enjoyed and are surprised at the level and amount of talent on Kwaj."

Tickets are \$10 each and will be on sale at the door.

Troops engage in Afghan firefight, drop leaflets in Iraq

WASHINGTON, March 13, 2003 — U.S. Special Forces soldiers came under fire in Afghanistan March 12,

prompting a firefight that left five enemy dead, military officials said.

A U.S. spokesman at Bagram Air Base, Afghanistan, reported this morning that enemy troops fired small arms and machine guns at the U.S. soldiers on the road between Khowst and Gardez in eastern Afghanistan, at about 3:20 p.m. local time.

The Americans called in close-air support, and coalition F-16 fighters and A-10 Thunderbolts responded. The aircraft reportedly dropped two 500-pound bombs and strafed the area with 30 mm rounds, killing five of the ambushers.

In a separate incident in Afghanistan early this morning, unknown forces fired a rocket at the U.S. base in Asadabad manned by troops of the 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C. Officials sent a patrol to investigate, but had no other details. No U.S. or coalition casualties were reported.

Elsewhere within the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility, coalition forces dropped 120,000 informational leaflets over southern Iraq March 12 at about 7 a.m. local time.

Command officials said the leaflets dropped over several areas south of Baghdad and north of Basrah conveyed information on coalition radio broadcasts, U.N. Security Council Resolution 1441, and injustices carried out by Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein's regime.


"One leaflet type encouraged Iraqi troops not to use weapons of mass destruction, while another contrasted Saddam Hussein's wealth with the poverty in which many Iraqis live," a CENTCOM release stated.

mean he or she is an American citizen" Standifer said. "The spouse has to go to the American embassy where the foreign national was from and submit the proper paperwork."

In the past, reliance on travel orders to and from Kwajalein by the INS, Entry/Exit and airlines servicing the island has led to foreign nationals living here without the proper documentation, said Sgt. 1st Class Travis Tikka, Provost Marshal sergeant. It has also led to problems for foreign nationals who are trying to enter either Honolulu or Guam, including a recent incident.

"The problem is we have many, many wives and husbands out here that are just here," Tikka said. "They have no permanent resident card, they have no visa, they have nothing."

Recently a resident went to Hawaii and was detained by INS when the person walked off the plane with just a foreign passport, Tikka said. Since the person was on U.S. soil, INS requires a visa because, although Kwajalein is a U.S. Army base, it is not U.S. soil.

There is a basic confusion of what foreign nationals need to do and it stems from misunderstandings by the INS, contractors on island and U.S. citizens married to foreign nationals, Standifer said. "It is the responsibility of each contractor on island to verify that the person who has been hired and their family members who will reside on the island have proper paperwork."

Standifer just returned from a visit with INS officials verifying they were not relying on Kwajalein TDY, sponsorship or resident travel orders to determine nationality.

Traveling to and from Kwajalein

"The INS was confused about our situation and is now straightened out," she said. Whether the person is a military retiree, USAKA, contract personnel or a dependent, the INS "is demanding passports with visa or a permanent resident card."

Travel orders, even if they list the country of origin, won't be enough when departing from or arriving at Kwajalein anymore.

If a person is leaving on a commercial flight, "we ask for passport or photo ID and a copy of their birth certificate," said Donna Groth, Terminal supervisor. Groth said they check for passports and visas if the person is not a

U.S. citizen.

If leaving on the AMC, then in addition to the other documentation, the person must have travel orders, she said.

If someone does get to Hawaii or Guam without the proper documentation, they can be deported, said Lt. Joanna Buckman, Entry/Exit officer-in-charge.

On incoming flights, the Entry/Exit desk checks for proper documentation too.

"We're not looking at just travel orders anymore," Buckman said

Entry/Exit is having a problem with Guam, she said. New workers from there are being allowed to get on the plane with just travel orders. When that happens, it is a problem for both the worker and his or her supervisor.

"We detain them and call their sponsor," she said. "They get put on a prisoner release form and their sponsor needs to be with them at all times on the island until they get verification of paperwork. Usually the passport comes in on the next flight."

Before a visitor can even set foot on the island, Entry/Exit turns the sponsorship request form over to the Provost Marshal's office which requires passport and visa information from the traveler.

Residents who can't leave

Some foreign national residents have been on island for years and without visas or permanent resident cards, Tikka said.

"If the family all wants to go to Hawaii, sorry they can't go," he said.

They can fly to Pohnpei, Kosrae and Majuro, but not to the U.S. even if they buy a ticket. They can travel through Hawaii or Guam to another location on a connecting flight, but cannot stay in the U.S.

"We had one a couple of weeks back that AMC let on the plane to go to Honolulu," he said. When the person arrived in Honolulu, the INS deported the person back to Kwajalein.

For local U.S. residents with foreign national spouses, they need to start working on getting proper documentation right away and the place to start is with Standifer, Tikka said.

"We're not punishing anyone here," he said. "I'm trying to get the word out.

"If we were in the states, they would go to their houses and take them out

and deport them, but we're not going to do that here," he said. "We're trying to get everybody to do the right thing ... we're trying to help everyone."

Although it is each sponsor's responsibility to get their paperwork in order not the government's, the information about what paperwork is required and how to go about getting it, is confusing on INS's Web site, Standifer said. So her office is the place to start.

"The first thing they should do is come and visit me," she said. "I will see their situation. I will take their names and passport numbers, not their passports. I am only going to tell them what they need to do and will give them advice of making the paperwork correct."

Both Tikka and Standifer warned that each case is a little different and what has worked to get the proper documentation for one person does not necessarily work for another, even if they are from the same country.

"Get the information directly from her, do not listen to how someone else got their documents," Tikka said.

Keeping residency or visas current

A foreign national can only get a permanent resident card or green card by living in America. After a certain amount of time on U.S. soil, the card holder is eligible to become a U.S. citizen.

"Prior to getting to accepting a job on Kwajalein or wherever and leaving the U.S., they must contact the INS," Standifer said. "There is another form to complete and that can be done on the [Internet], so they can preserve their residency."

Foreign nationals with green cards aren't doing that, she said. So two things happen, their stay on this island does not count towards becoming a citizen and their green card expires after a time. Then they have to leave.

Since this is not considered U.S. soil for visa holders, some visas require a visit to the U.S. a certain number of times a year. The proof of the visit is a passport stamp. One problem is that Hickam AFB does not automatically stamp passports although Honolulu International does.

"The person should request Hickam to stamp their passports," Standifer said.

Beech 1900Ds make return flight

When the Beech 1900Ds took off early Monday morning they flew not only stateside, but into the annals of Kwajalein aviation history.

The aircraft began service at USAKA/RTS in October 2000. Since then, the three planes flew a combined 4,015.2 flight hours and made 14,051 landings, mostly between Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, but also including flights to Majuro, Bikini, Enewetak, Wake Island and Midway, according to Richard Perry, director of Maintenance.

The 1900Ds now join a line of aircraft that have served the range dating back

to the four-engine C-54s that served until 1972, according to *Avialantic.com*, which has a Website dedicated to the aircraft of Kwajalein.

Following the C-54s, Perry has records of the DeHavilland C-4 Caribou that worked from the '70s until 1986, followed by the Shorts 3-60 that served from 1986-1990. After that, the DeHavilland C-7, or DASH-7, came online flying for the range for 10 years until the 1900Ds took over in 2000.

Fairchild Metroliners have taken the place of the 1900Ds, though on a temporary basis only, until a more permanent aircraft is named.
