## E-Commerce is a click away

Surfing the net is as common on Kwajalein as the boxes of merchandise, stamped with recognizable Web sites such as Amazon.com and Gateway, which periodically threatens to take over the Post Office. Up until now all those boxes represented a loss to the island.

"As you know when you buy [on island] a certain amount goes to the Rec Fund from all of our merchants," said Bill Kearney, KRS E-Commerce manager. "When you buy on the Internet that is lost revenue."

During a brainstorming session to find a logistically possible way to meet the USAKA/RTS Performance Work Statement requirement to "manage

## Communications alert Long-distance service enhanced

Keeping in touch just got easier.

Better long distance phone service is now available with the recent addition of 47 new telephone lines, said Mike Nelson, Communications manager.

"It's the same as it's always been except it's got a greater capacity," he said.

In March, residents noticed phone line difficulties including busy signals and echoing on the line due to a communications capacity upgrade.

Residents may still have occasional difficulty calling into the states, he said.

The problem is going through each city's individual trunking system which is why residents may find them-

selves listening to the busy signal when dialing the United States. A reduction in busy signals is one of the goals of the Communications office.

Calling Kwajalein from the states is better than ever because additional lines were added giving a higher probability of accessing the island, he said.

Problems with sending information via fax machines have also been reported to his office, Nelson said. The fix is not as easy for fax machines since they require a matching code and those problems have to be dealt with on an individual basis.

"A lot of times the problem you're going to find is not here [on Kwajalein]. But if there is a problem, contact us and we'll find it and we'll fix it," Nelson said.

Residents facing telephone difficulties should contact Telephone Repair, 55111.

## Standardizing quarters raises emotions

One by one, on a schedule set three years ago, a dwelling unit is emptied of occupants, gutted, rebuilt and completely refitted with appliances and amenities including a second bathroom. In a matter of just 14 weeks, a completely renovated unit emerges. But, not everyone is happy with the projected or completed renovation of their quarters.

"You still become attached and put down roots, even though it is base housing," said resident Pat Savage whose house, quarters 206-A, is scheduled for renovation in October after she and her husband PCS. "A lot of us did not keep homes stateside so we don't think of, say, Massachusetts as home because we don't have a home there."

Kwajalein Operations is three years into an estimated eight-year renovation of Kwajalein's old Navy hard housing worth a projected \$18 to \$20 million. With a congressional cap of \$116,000 per unit, the military's world-wide focus is standardization of hous-

## New surgeon prepared for Kwaj

Since he arrived from Phoenix, Ariz. a month ago, new Kwajalein Hospital staff surgeon Dr. Lance Ray is happy that he is able to spend more time with his patients and, after work, with his family.

"It gives me more time with my family; I'm only working at one hospital instead of two or three, which is the case with a lot of surgeons in the U.S. right now," Ray said.


He is impressed by Kwajalein Hospital's staff's professionalism and training.

"They try to keep the best interest of the patient as their primary objective," he said.

Keeping his patients' best interests in mind, he said one of his personal goals is to get residents to keep doctors here informed of any off-island medical treatment.

His varied medical interests including trauma, cardiovascular disease, diabetic foot problems and cancer are a result of Ray's schooling and experience gained over the years.

Originally from the state of Washington, He earned his graduate degree from Tulane Medical School, New Orleans, LA. and completed his internship at Harver View Medical School, Seattle, Wash. before working as a Navy flight surgeon during the Vietnam War. After Vietnam, he tended pilots, families and retirees at Lake Hurst, N.J.

which prepared him for his general surgery residency at the Medical College of Wisconsin, he said.

Not a stranger to island living, Ray and his wife, Renee, and five children lived on Midway Island from 1997-1998 after ten years of private practice in Seattle.

Working on Midway as the only doctor required him to be in contact with doctors on other islands including Kwajalein Hospital's chief medical officer Dr. Eric Lindborg. This contact led to his current position on Kwajalein.

After the Rays moved to Arizona, Lindborg contacted him twice to fill a position on Kwajalein, Ray said. The first time, Ray was already committed elsewhere.

The second time occurred just before the contract changeover in March, Ray said. He accepted.

"[My family] were really excited," he said. "So we decided to do it."

Not all of the family is on island since the oldest three children are in college.

Currently William, 12, and Marcus, 9, are here. In July, Natalie, 22, the Rays' oldest daughter, who is currently attending school in Seattle, Wash., will work for a month as a medical assistant at Kwajalein Hospital.

The Rays' oldest son Adam, 21, is attending school in South Carolina while Ryan, 19, is a student in Phoenix, Ariz.

The Rays' don't plan on getting bored. "People could be bored if they're not go-getters," he said. "There's plenty to do if you take advantage of it. We've tried snorkeling, beach combing."

Ray already has his B boat license and the family wants to try sailing and scuba diving

"There's really not anything I don't like about being here," he said.

ing which meets Department of Defense quality of life requirements, said Byron Brown, USAKA acting Housing manager.

Each unit, in addition to central air and new kitchen appliances, receives roof repairs, an additional bath or half bath, window blinds, new windows and doors, larger water heater, interior and exterior paint and a covered lanai or patio cover, among other upgrades.

The move to upgrade the units also removes any additional structures added by the tenants over the years. And there's the rub.

"If we were going to be staying, we probably wouldn't be overly happy about losing our lanai," Savage said. "We would have probably cried at losing that."

What quarters 206-A will lose is the enclosed back room used by the Savages as a dining room.

With the addition we are able to entertain a dozen people, she said. Without it, the living and dining area will only accommodate a small group.

Besides losing the addition, a new bathroom will also take away space and if the Savages were planning on staying, they would have to think about selling some of their furniture.

"We would have had a problem with too much furniture and I wouldn't have been happy to sell some of my Rosewood," she said.

During their first tour in the late '60s, Savage said 206-A was probably modified since so many patios were enclosed during that time.

In the '60s and '70s housing on Kwajalein was critical and families with three or four children were living in very small homes, Brown said. The Army permitted tenants to modify homes by enclosing open patios or adding additional structures to the home.

"Some people even put in electrical fixtures and some added water pipes — any variation you could think of," he said.

Both Brown and USAKA Public Works director Larry Ryan understand that some of the units lose square footage with the addition of a second full or half bathroom or if the unit has attached, enclosed structures, but that standardization is the key to meeting cost requirements and building for the future.

The differences in add on structures along with electrical and plumbing, which weren't necessarily built under

any guidelines or overview, add a significant additional cost in maintenance and cannot be rebuilt under the congressional cost Ryan said.

When a plumber or electrician responds to a Help Desk call, they don't always have what they need on the truck or have to take time to figure out the circuit breakers or water connections because of the add-on or enclosed structures, he said.

"What we're trying to do is establish long-term maintainability," Brown said.

Rebuilding each set of like units the same way not only reduces construction and planning costs, but also speeds up the process, Ryan said.

"It is like we are building a [Boeing] 767. We're ordering the material as kits," he said. Then the workers build each unit the exact same way gaining expertise and speed as they work, assembly-line fashion, through each identical unit.

"There is a learning curve every time we start a different design, but they become more efficient," he added.

The residents of the units scheduled for refurbishing are notified usually 60 days in advance by letter, although the contract changeover disrupted that process, for a time, Brown said. After the final coat of paint is dry on the refurbished unit, the residents move back to their quarters unless in the first move they were already relocated to suitable, permanent quarters.

During the temporary move, "each family gets an air-conditioned container to put [their belongings] in, which they have access to," Ryan said.

Because the refurbishing process is done in assembly line form with specialized groups working on different units at the same time — plumbers and electricians working on one type of unit while the demolition team starts on another set of housing units— only some accommodations can be made for people who are PCSing, he said.

"If it's possible in the context of the program we will make accommodation," Ryan said. "They don't necessarily have to make that second move."

Even though the unit next door, 206B, is just beginning refurbishing, the Savages will be able to stay in their quarters until they PCS. A combination of the number of units in the process, the date that the work is scheduled to begin on a particular unit and the PCS date are all looked at to see if the resident can be accommodated. But there are limits and six months is way too long, Ryan said.

Along with the disadvantages, Savage said that there were advantages to the refurbishing that she would enjoy if she planned to stay.

"If I was staying, one of the advantages would be an updated kitchen because I do a lot of cooking," she said.

A veteran of frequent moves since both Savages have done contract work for 30 years, she said she understands why housing standardization needs to occur.

"But for those who have never worked or lived on a military base before, their outlook may be different," she added.

and administrate a web-based cash-back shopping program" to return money to the Rec Fund and also "allow shoppers to receive a discount from the Internet vendors," someone suggested Schoolpop, Kearney said.

"The reason that [Schoolpop] is so attractive is because it doesn't cost KRS anything, it doesn't cost the Army anything, it doesn't cost the community anything," he said.

The on-line program, which is an established fund-raiser for schools and other organizations, meets all the PWS requirements and offers the user benefits.

"There are three benefits — the ability to purchase things not in Macy's ... at a discount rate and the efforts will come back into the Rec Fund," said Joe Marshall, KRS Community Services deputy program manager.

An added plus, said Kearney, is "it is certainly painless to use. The trick is you have to navigate first to [Schoolpop] Web site and then make a left or right turn to get to a selected merchant."

### Vendors

Currently there are almost 300 vendors that can be accessed through Schoolpop and more can be added, Kearney said. The percentage returned to the Rec Fund varies from 1 to 7 percent depending on the merchant.

These are not unknown merchants like John's Vacation Buys or Books-

R-Us, instead the current list of vendors reads like a who's who of top retail outlets. American Airlines Vacations shares the list with Barnes and Noble.com and Nordstrom. There are also 785 magazines available for subscription through the site.

### Registering:

Access to the Schoolpop program is simple, said Kearney while navigating his way through the Web site:

- On the Internet, type in [www.schoolpop.com](http://www.schoolpop.com) .

- Click on the "Register Now" button in the middle, not at the top, of the Web page and a notice pops up indicating you are entering a secure area.

- Click "OK."

- Click "Register Now" on the next page after reading the registration process, although the program will step you through the process.

- On the next page, skip to the bottom entry asking for "School/Group/Organization ID#."

- Enter: 0620726, then click "Search."

- "Kwajalein Community Activities Organization Kwajalein Atoll AP 96555" is displayed at the top of the next page.

- Enter contact information, then profile information, selecting "Community member" from the list for the "School Organization Relationship" entry.

- Select any answer to the "Where did you hear about Schoolpop" question.

- Then answer the last two questions,

yes or no, depending on your preference and click "Next."

- Enter your credit card information on the next screen and press "Enter."

Now you are officially set up to use Schoolpop, Kearney said.

### Credit card entry

"It's very important to register a personal credit card ... this is how it ties your purchase to the Kwajalein Rec Fund," he said.

### Schoolpop Visa

A Schoolpop Visa is available and using it also benefits the Rec Fund no matter where it is used, he said. Applications are on order.

"Everytime you use it, an extra 1 percent goes to [the Rec Fund]," Kearney said. "The first time you use it \$20 is returned."

### Optional sign-ups

"Sign-up" boxes offering additional promotions will pop-up at different merchant sites, he said. If you don't want the additional e-mail information, be sure to mark the boxes "No."

### Rec Fund

The Rec Fund pays for all the Community Activities programs including the upcoming Fourth of July celebration, running the Small Boat Marina, organizing and running all the sports programs and maintaining the beaches, pools and fields.

"It goes back into the community," Marshall said.

Call Kearney, 50744, if problems are encountered during registration.

"It's like when a commander wants to conduct a search for contraband material in the soldiers' barracks...it's completely unannounced," Hansen said.

Ferguson said it was a new experience for him since he had never done a health and welfare inspection nor worked with USAKA on a drug inspection.

"Usually, [KPD, we] do our own checks," Ferguson said.

During the search Ferguson repeatedly hid a 10-gram bag of marijuana in different offices for Tanja to find, demonstrating her capability.

"Even if she finds a rag with any residue of some kind of drug on it, she'll

sniff it out," Ferguson said.

As with any regular police drug check, anything that is uncovered during a health and welfare inspection remains strictly confidential, Ferguson said.

Normal procedure for findings in any drug search, even a health and welfare inspection, always begins with a person's right to privacy, Moreno said. The responsibility then falls to the officer who conducted the search to make an official statement citing the substance found and where it was found. Finally, the findings go from the K-9 unit officer to the KPD Investigations office for a field test, Moreno said.

"First, they have to test the material and figure out if it's indicative of some narcotic," he said.

If it is established that the material is a narcotic, the suspect is taken down to the police station for further questioning and then the case is sent on to the appropriate office for disposition.

Previous cases have resulted in the suspect being permanently barred from the island, he said.

"Last year we had four finds," Ferguson said. "The biggest find was more than a pound."

Wednesday's run-through of the second and third floors of USAKA's command group offices resulted in no finds.

"This search is a high profile statement which emphasizes that no matter who it is, the command has a zero tolerance for any illegal drugs or substances," Hansen said.



**Search emphasizes zero drug tolerance**

When a dog ran through USAKA offices sniffing people's file cabinets and closets, personnel in building 901 were startled to say the least. However, there was no need for panic since the dog was being led through by Sgt. Kevin Ferguson, Kwajalein Police Department K-9 unit.

The health and welfare inspection search is performed Army-wide, said Sgt. Chris Hansen, USAKA Alcohol and Substance Abuse Coordinator. The reason for the search on Wednesday
