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Reader reviews Marshallese language course

How many of you *ri belles* are like me? You really want to get more involved and gain a better understanding of the local culture, but you just don't have that natural ability to soak up the language by hanging out at the bar eavesdropping on Marshallese conversations. After three years of frustration from trying to find any decent language books or an audible copy of Alice Buck's mythical tapes, I have finally found relief in the form of Alan Taylor's recently released two CD course simply titled "The Marshallese Language."

As a lifelong student of foreign languages, I find CDs to be the most user-friendly and effective medium for learning. You can jump from topic to topic easily without waiting for a tape to rewind or flipping through pages. I did not hesitate to get a copy of this course for because it's a CD, because there really are no alternatives out there and mostly because of Alan Taylor's qualifications.

Alan has lived in the Marshall Islands for 14 years of his life. He grew up and currently works on Kwajalein, but he also spent a year living on Kili teaching



English and Math to 6th, 7th and 8th grade students, and he has a master of arts in second language learning from the University of Hawaii. It is hard to beat that combination of practical and academic experience to qualify a person to author a language course.

The Marshallese Language course includes a 13-lesson, data CD that you can print or review directly from your computer. It also has an audio CD you play simultaneously. I believe an auditory component is important for most language instruction, but it is critical to learning Marshallese because the sound combinations are so foreign to English speakers. Alan Taylor is gifted with a soft voice and very precise articulation. I find this combination makes the words and phrases easier to grasp, retain and repeat.

I would categorize this as a beginner-level course, but because of the scope of the lessons and the sophisticated pronoun chart, I think mastery of this course content could very well result in an intermediate to advanced Marshallese language ability.

The first several lessons follow a sensible progression from pronunciation of the written letters, to basic phrases and tense, to more complicated scenario-based lessons. The course also features basic English to Marshallese and Marshallese to English dictionaries, as

well as historical and cultural overviews of the Marshall Islands.

A couple of minor complaints about the course: (1) The volume on the audio CD was very low. I had to turn the volume on my computer speakers up all the way and this introduced a little bit of static and background noise. (2) The data CD is incompatible with Macintosh computers.

Alan is aware of both these issues and has plans to address them as well as further refine the course in future editions. Having said that, I would not wait (unless I owned a Macintosh) because the course is a great value as it is.

The Marshallese Language package makes up for any minor failings by offering a very reasonably priced (\$25 to \$30), well-organized, thorough learning program. Whether you will be speaking Marshallese with confidence in just six weeks or not is up to you. This course gives you the tools and I highly recommend it to anyone who wants to get a solid start.

As this is a relatively new release, I am sure it is still difficult to find. I know it is available through the Mic Shop on Kwajalein or you can contact Alan Taylor directly at growpapayas@hotmail.com if you are interested in carrying them in your store or in purchasing a set for yourself.

Air travel rates change with departing discounts

The cost of air travel may go up after the Continental Travel ticket office announced this week that Aloha's reduced child rates and Delta's Visit USA, or VUSA, passes are no longer available after April 1.

The topic highlighted this month's Sensing Session, which gathers together representatives from the various government and contractor organizations and living groups to address quality of life issues.

"Airline ticket prices are exorbitant," said Larry Roberts, who represents Roi-Namur.

"Airlines are struggling," said Yvonne Duarte, Continental's manager.

Duarte described how her office received notice early this week, prompting her and her staff to notify people who had reserved seats, but not yet paid for them.

In short, Aloha eliminated an additional discount for child passengers, which ran on top of a discounted ticket in the first place. The airline also recently reduced its weight allowance for baggage to two bags, 70 pounds total. As Duarte explained, the airlines are trying to reduce baggage weight to allow more passengers to fly aboard its international flights.

Meanwhile, Delta announced this week they would no longer allow Continental to purchase VUSA tickets. Duarte said the move was based on the theory behind VUSAs, whereby airlines hope to entice their international customers entering the states to travel throughout the states on their planes.

"They don't want you to come to the states and then fly around on another airline," she said.

But since Kwajalein passengers can't enter the U.S. at Honolulu aboard a Delta airplane, they no longer qualify for the special tickets.

VUSAs have long been a popular ticket for Kwajalein travelers because they allowed multiple stops in the U.S. at 30 percent or more discounts, Duarte said, adding her office has sold them for at least the 14 years she's worked there.

"You could go see your parents, then grandma and grandpa," she said.

A group of airlines including Continental, Hawaiian and Northwest still offers a VUSA to Kwajalein residents, and has for some time. Historically, this VUSA was less popular than the Delta VUSA because of flight times, availability and Delta's popular frequent flyer program, she said.

But much has changed in the industry since 9/11, and Kwajalein travelers will feel the effects, she cautioned.

If the three-airline VUSA doesn't fit one's needs, Duarte has some other suggestions.

First, airlines have teamed up under a plan called "code sharing," in which travelers are routed onto flights, sometimes on different airlines than they originally intended, to ensure that planes are full when they leave the ground.

"Because of code-sharing, the seats are already full," she said. "People can't wait for the last minute."

Duarte advises that Kwaj travelers plan their dates carefully earlier than in the past. Also, shop online and compare prices. Online specials are not published fares and the staff at Continental can't necessarily lock in those rates, she said. Ask about special rates.

And some specials are available. Continental still offers its companion rates, a ticket for two round trip from Kwajalein to anywhere in the U.S. for around \$2,000.

For those who have less restrictive schedules, shopping later may work to their advantage. Airlines check seat sales on every flight up to six months in advance, she said, and when two months or less remains before the flight, the airline will often discount the seat to ensure it's filled before the flight.

There are risks, though, and before buying a ticket, travelers should ask about penalties and fees associated with canceling or changing flight plans. Many tickets are non-refundable and cost hundreds of dollars to change flight times.

Duarte said that while the costs are going up, the travel benefit

money provided employees should still get them to their home of record, though admittedly with less pocket money to spend.

In other business:

The session discussed a suggestion to merge Surfway and Ten-Ten into a 24-hour store with some additional construction to the current Ten-Ten building. The concept would allow for reduced operational costs, a safer environment with less forklift work and additional space for the schools in the former Surfway building.

Session Chairman Joe Marshall, KRS vice president and deputy program manager, tabled the matter, forwarding it to the island's master planners for them to examine feasibility.

In Community Activities' matters, officials are still evaluating the concept of adding a miniature golf course. Also rumors of a batting cage from Johnston Island are unfounded, reported Simone Smead, Community Activities manager. In fact, Kwajalein received a pitching machine, and officials have not determined yet how best to utilize it.

Marshall addressed concerns about children frequenting the bar side of the Yokwe Yuk Club since the club's management co-located the fine dining in the same area. Marshall said he would add signs to the front entrance suggesting dining patrons use the west entrance, which does not pass through the bar before entering the dining area.

Addressing a concern over retail stores carrying "basic items," such as bicycle parts, Marshall said, "we try to listen to the pulse of the community, and there are some basic things we need to keep in the stores."

Smead asked, "What are the basics?"

Paul Divinski, Merchandising-Provisions manager, replied that Retail maintained a 100-item list of "basics."

Concerning Roi, Marshall reported that he hoped to hire two more part-time postal workers in order to keep the Roi post office open at least two hours a day, five days a week.

Blessid frontman brings spirit to beach concert

White sand, blue water, good tunes, food and a Kwaj sunset all blended for a relaxing Wednesday evening.

Eliot Sloan lead singer and song writer for Blessid Union of Souls played to a packed crowd on Emon Beach, a new location for the Community Activities stage.

"This is the first time we have had the stage on the beach. It's always been near, but not on," said Kathleen Bates, Community Activities entertainment superintendent. "We wanted to do something different with our beach shows. This is an experiment, and we will see how it goes before we decide if it will be done again.

"We figured with the band looking out at the white sand and blue water would be great and with the fans watching the show with the sunset behind them would be spectacular," Bates added.

Children frolicked in the water and made sand castles on the beach while concertgoers dined on barbecue.

Meanwhile, Sloan entertained young and old with his ballad and

pop-rock songs.

"Some songs are more aggressive than others," Sloan said.

Blessid Union of Souls had their first hit album, "Home," in 1995 and have had other hits such as "Hey Leonardo," "Let Me Be The One," "Light In Your Eyes" and the smash hit, "I Believe."

Sloan is currently touring with American Forces Entertainment and billed as a solo artist as he plays at bases in Hawaii, Kwajalein, Guam, Japan and South Korea. But he is traveling with his wife, Angie Schlinkert, and performing with several members of Blessid Union of Souls including Bryan Billhimer on guitar; Shaun Schaefer on drums; and sound man Rug.

Sloan and the other members of the band commented on Kwajalein and the location of the stage during their concert.

"We wish we were here longer," said Billhimer.

"Very breath taking," said Sloan.

"[Kwajalein] is awesome," said Rug.

Sloan started playing the piano when he was six years old and singing at 10.

"All of our songs are spiritual," Sloan said. "It is who we are. We want to write songs that make people feel good."

Billhimer, a member of Blessid Union of Souls, started playing his brother's guitar at 12 and Schaefer, another member of the band, has been playing drums since the sixth

Command, KALGOV work toward safer taxis

Every day for years, overloaded, small boats with little or no safety equipment and untrained operators have made their way from Ebeye to Kwajalein's Pier One to disgorge their passengers and then fill the boat to capacity for the return trip.

During that time some of the boats flipped, sank or went adrift and passengers had to be rescued, according to Bob Babcock, Marine Operations manager.

But starting April 1, any water taxi entering USAKA's harbor must have required safety equipment and operators must have attended Kwajalein Police Department's free Water Taxi Training, said Maj. David Coffey, Host Nation chief.

On Monday, from 10 a.m. to noon, in one of the catamarans docked near Pier One, Mike Herrington, KPD Senior Boat operator, will teach the first of a series of classes focused on operator safety awareness, boat safety and USAKA's harbor operating procedures to water taxi operators and owners and to anyone, other than USAKA residents, who use the harbor. Every USAKA boat owner or operator already is required to attend even more stringent safety classes and be licensed to operate a boat in Kwajalein's waters.

Working together, USAKA Host Nation, Kwajalein Atoll Local Government, Kwajalein Police Department and Marine Operations agreed to a plan last month that improves water taxi safety and trains both operators and owners of taxis entering Kwajalein's harbor.

The water taxis are already safer for passengers, since, in February, the newly-elected KALGOV started to require both safety equipment and better maintenance before licensing water taxis as businesses, said Noda Lojkar, USAKA/KMR ombudsman.

KALGOV's new requirements actually shut down the service while water taxi owners repaired their boats and acquired some safety equipment.

"There were a couple of days [mid-February] where there were no taxis," Lojkar said.

The agreement between KALGOV and USAKA allowing KPD to

inspect boats for basic safety and knowledge of operating rules was necessary because, in the past, USAKA did not have any jurisdiction over the Marshallese boats coming in the harbor, Babcock said. Water taxis have been a mode of transportation between the two islands for many years, and many have had experiences with unsafe boats.

"A year and a half ago, I was going to church on Ebeye and [former legal affairs officer] Kent Duncan and I were on a boat when the engine stopped. We drifted for an hour before we were found," Lojkar said, explaining that his father and his cousin used to run water taxis without any safety equipment in the '70s.

The lack of safety equipment, including radios, is especially troublesome in Kwajalein Harbor where the harbor master is required to direct and have control over vessels entering the harbor.

"We are worried about loss of life," Herrington said, explaining that he has seen many dangerous situations caused by boat operators who are untrained. Working for KPD's marine operations, he has seen boat operators filling up gas cans with cigarettes in their mouths; boats overloaded to the point of sinking; and water taxis cutting in and out of the transit lanes, getting in the way of bigger work boats which always have the right of way, and into the recreational areas where snorkelers, divers, windsurfers and kayakers play.

"I have seen an LCM, which is on a schedule, come to a dead stop to keep from hitting a guy in a water taxi who got in the LCM's way," he said.

Some of the water taxi operators are trying to comply, but without knowing the basic rules, can create a hazard.

"We saw one the other night trying to comply, but he had his running lights on the wrong sides," Herrington said. "Some shine their lights in the LCM operator's cabin to let him know they are there, but that blinds the operator."

Although there haven't been any major accidents, it's just a matter of time, Babcock said.

"Each day that goes by that

this is not acted on, increases the chances [of an accident]," he said.

The Water Taxi Training class, designed and taught voluntarily by Herrington, who also teaches B-Boat classes on Kwajalein, covers requirements for basic safety equipment and use, the rules of the road — including which boats have the right of way, safe speeds and recreational areas to avoid — good seamanship, boat lights, seating capacity, radio usage, man overboard training, authorized docking and violations.

One life preserver per passenger, no matter what age, is required for water taxis to operate in USAKA's harbor, along with a fire extinguisher, working marine radio set to channel 12, anchor with line, two paddles, navigational lights in working order and a flashlight, Herrington said.

"We require a lot more [equipment] of USAKA people," he said. Some water taxi operators have already tried to comply and have asked him about the rules and equipment.

Although some taxi boat owners may balk at the extra cost for the equipment, adding safety equipment and a trained operator should increase business.

"I believe the minimal cost to the boat owners for improved safety items will be more than justified and offset by the increase in business, especially from USAKA residents, as confidence in the water taxis rises," Coffey said. "I know that overcrowding and concerns for safety has prevented many Kwajalein residents from taking advantage of this service."

Lojkar agreed with Coffey, adding, "Someone could buy a bigger boat and run on a schedule between LCM runs ... and when a small boat warning is in effect, then they can still run."

Included in the agreement between USAKA and KALGOV, as of April 1, KPD will inspect all water taxis and RMI private boats for safety equipment and maximum seating capacity, Coffey said. If the boats do not meet the safety standards they will not be allowed in the harbor.

Coming up with the maximum

number of passengers allowed per boat was difficult because normally boat manufacturers state seating capacity guidelines, Herrington said. KPD decided that as long as each passenger is seated within the vessel, not on the edge or on the bow, and has a life jacket available to them regardless of age, then the taxi meets the guidelines.

Herrington said he would stress in the class that the ultimate responsibility for the safety of the passengers and the boat is the operators', not the boat owners', because the operators would be the ones cited if there were violations.

"Violations will be dealt with on a case by case basis depending on the violation and the severity," said Sgt. 1st Class Travis Tikka, Provost sergeant.

From the first offense which requires a written warning to the fourth offense which dictates termination of privileges, every boat operator is subject to these rules, he said.

Compliance to the safety rules is going to make a difference.

"We are going to save some lives," Herrington said.
