I think it started out when I was a child, the need to search, find and collect things.



Then I was given a large cowry, a trident trumpet and a conch which now sit in places of honor in my living room.

I will still travel the beaches of Kwaj searching for shells, glass and maybe the shark teeth I still haven't found but heard so much about.

# New cold storage begins operations

The old cold storage building on Lagoon Road and area surrounding it will change over the next few weeks as the new cold storage facility begins operation.

In about three weeks to a month, yellow tape will block Lagoon Road in front of the old cold storage building for the last time, and the building will be torn down.

"The road will never be blocked off with yellow tape again," said Alan Stone, supply department manager.

The containers in the lot behind the old facility will also be removed and the area will be cleared.

The new facility is finally up and running and supplies from the old cold storage were moved to the new building beginning Monday. The May barge containers went directly from the barge to the new building site.

Last week, USAKA Commander Col. Jerry Brown, KRS President Ike Richardson and several members of the command toured the new cold storage facility.

There are only a few cosmetic details yet to be complete at the new facility, according to David Smith, site manager for Dick Pacific.

The new facility has around 25,000 square feet, about the same floor space as the old one, but the new facility has much more height to store items and

many more features, according to Stone.

An added feature to the new facility is the separate compartment where products for Meck and Roi are stored until it is shipped.

It has galvanized steel shelves, as opposed to the old wooden ones.

The new facility is automated where as all the movement of supplies in the old facility was done manually. Supplies are moved directly from the storage containers in the side-yard by forklift to the cold storage doors where an internal electric forklift takes the pallets to either a chill room or freezer.

"A lot more efficient and less temperature abuse [to supplies]," said Manny Kapahu, cold storage warehouse supervisor.

At the old facility, when the containers arrived on the barge, they had to be unloaded in the back of the facility and then driven around to the front with a forklift.

The supplies then had to be sorted by what type of item it was and then taken to one of the seven chill boxes or one of the six freezer compartments. All this was done manually.

In the new facility the forklift removes the items directly from the containers and drives it directly to the loading doors.

"It is more efficient and better utilizes our manpower," Stone said. "We're able to supply the food facilities and stores much more efficiently than in the past."

The old facility had limited space, but with the new facility and increased space available a wider variety of items can be stored.

The new facility also has heating elements in the floors to cut down on frost and ice build-up and reduce safety hazards.

The new facility has a locker room with showers. At the old facility the employees used a hose at the back of the facility to wash off.

## Students celebrate local culture

Students at George Seitz Elementary School shared their experience with Marshallese Culture Saturday in what has become an annual celebration and study event.

Kids danced, sang, portrayed characters and presented written material during the Marshallese Cultural Experience, presented to faculty, parents and friends at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room.

"We're trying to pay attention to what the kids really want to do and use that to meet curriculum goals," said Deb Mawhar, co-chair for the event. "It was all theirs. That makes a difference. They're totally involved."

Mawhar co-chaired the event with Kris and Bob Curtin. Bob Curtin emceed the event throwing in jokes with Marshallese punch-lines between acts.

Variations of the experience have been around for

more than 10 years, but the most recent iteration, an event at the multi-purpose room began three years ago, in part, as a response to a North Central Association accreditation goal of "writing across the curriculum," Mawhar said.

"We wanted to get a common experience that was student-driven that the students could write about," Mawhar said.

The students wrote and worked on Marshallese culture, along with some performances.

This year's event was more "performance-oriented" with dances, and even a play written by fourth-graders, based on a mythological story of race between a needlefish and a crab.

Kindergartners opened the events with Marshallese versions of "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes," and "Old MacDonald." First graders created art works. Third grade students presented a fashion show, while

the second and fifth grades teamed up for Marshallese group dances.

Dance served as part of both the music and physical education curriculum and crossed grade levels.

Sixth graders wrote and produced PowerPoint presentations based on a trip to Ebeye.

"It was a lot of hard work," Mawhar said.

Students had to do original research, interviews, pre-writing and, finally, work with the software.

"It's all about learning culture, the idea of inclusion, being who you are and accepting others for who they are," Mawhar said. "It's absolutely magic and the magic is the kids. Being able to see them and how totally into it they were ... They were vibrant and so engaged. It was the most wonderful thing."

## Service members named to explore space

WASHINGTON — Four service members were among 11 candidates NASA has chosen to be the next generation of space explorers, officials announced May 6.

Marine Corps Maj. Randolph Bresnik, 36, and Air Force Maj. James Dutton, 35, were chosen to be space shuttle pilots. Navy Lt. Cmdr. Christopher Cassidy, 34, and Army Maj. Shane Kimbrough, 36, will be mission specialists.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration grounded shuttle flights after the Feb. 1, 2003, breakup of Columbia above north-central Texas on as it maneuvered for a planned landing at the Kennedy Space Center, Fla. The shuttle was at about 203,000 feet, was going about 12,500 mph, or Mach 18, and was slated to land in about 15 minutes when the accident occurred.

All seven astronauts aboard were killed; five were serving U.S. military officers. NASA suspended the shuttle flight program while investigations have followed the Columbia trag-

edy. On April 30, 2004, the agency announced its intent to resume the flight program in Spring 2005.

Bresnik is an F/A-18 pilot and experimental test pilot based in San Diego, Calif. The Fort Knox, Ky., native has degrees from The Citadel in Charleston, S.C., and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

Dutton, an F/A-22 test pilot stationed at Edwards Air Force Base, Calif., has flown combat air patrols over northern Iraq. He was raised in Eugene, Ore., and has degrees from the U.S. Air Force Academy and the University of Washington.

Cassidy, a Navy SEAL based in Norfolk, Va., completed two tours of duty in Afghanistan and earned a Bronze Star for leading his SEAL team on 23 missions. The Salem, Mass., native has degrees from the U.S. Naval Academy and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Kimbrough, born in Killeen, Texas, served as a platoon leader in an Apache attack helicopter company during Operation Desert Storm, and has degrees from the U.S. Military Academy and the Georgia Institute

of Technology.

Four civilians — three school teachers and an orthopedic surgeon — will join the service members when their training begins this summer at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston.

During a news briefing welcoming the new candidates, NASA Administrator Sean O'Keefe said the astronauts are the "next steps in the new exploration vision."

"The class is made up of pilots and engineers who will help us develop the next-generation vehicle, scientists who will do research to help humans live and travel in space, and three new educator astronauts to help ensure a new generation is ready for the challenges of exploration," he said.

The candidates are the first announced by NASA under President Bush's new space initiative. Earlier this year, the president committed the United States to long-term human and robotic programs to explore the solar system, starting with a return to the moon as well as future exploration of Mars.

# Rusty Family logs record

High school freshman Chris Berling has participated in the Rusty Family triathlon since he was 9 years old, always improving his times.

"It's definitely a challenge to keep my times improving, and I never actually won, so I wanted to win one," Berling said.

Monday he earned a win, finishing first in the Rusty Family at 55:01. Of course, he's only 15 now.

Berling was among 33 individual participants and 44 teams made up of families and friends, some with four to five members each. The participation marked an all-time record for the event which is sponsored by the Kwajalein Running Club, according to Bob Sholar, KRC president.

The event annually takes on a family-oriented nature with other participants and spectators cheering on swimmers, bikers and runners as they complete the 500-yard swim, 10-mile bicycle ride and 2-mile run.

Berling finished his swim in 6:29, and turned to the bicycle, completing the two laps around the airport runway in 31:30. Then he got the news.

"Someone told me when I started the run I was in first, and no one passed me," Berling said. "It was a little bit of shock."

Since his first Rusty Family, six years ago, Berling joined the Kwajalein swim team and ran in the various Kwajalein Running Club events, fitting all that within a school schedule and band. It doesn't hurt he's grown quite a bit, too, he said.

ner on the beach and another gift certificate.

"There were people literally knocking down my door, waking me up at night, chasing me down the street to contribute," Brewster said.

Sholar was evidently humbled by the gift.

"I feel kind of funny, because so many people do so much," he said. "I participated [in KRC] for 10 years before doing anything, so this is my penance.

"I arrived on-island in September 1979, and about the first thing I did was a fun run and then the Columbus Day Run," he said.

He began volunteering for KRC in the late 80s, preparing water stations and the like. He has organized the Rustman and Rusty Family 10 of the last 11 years, being off-island for one of the years.

"The biggest change [in the

Rustman] is the arrival of the top echelon of triathlon athletes," he said. "We have a few seasoned athletes and I worry that they scare off the Kwaj biker and one-speeds, and they should not ... They're the exception. Let them go on and finish."

Sholar said the island presented an opportunity for people to train for something they might never do in the states, whether it's run or finish part or all of the triathlons.

"It would be nice to see more high school kids participate [in the Rustman]," he added.

Both events have seen the addition of teams in the past 10 years, a big change, he said and, based on an idea from Ed Hillman, the organization started cooking burgers and hot dogs at the event about five years ago, increasing attendance for the awards ceremony and making it "more of a festival, celebrating the event, and that's good."







# Air Guard receives space-launch tracking system

CLEARWATER, Fla. — For nearly half a century, Florida has been at the forefront of space-launch technology, and recently the state's Air National Guard acquired new equipment to help maintain that distinction.

On April 30 members of the Florida Air National Guard received a state-of-the-art mobile system designed to monitor space-vehicle launches from Cape Canaveral. The Ballistic Missile Range Safety Technology, or BMRST, system will enable the citizen-airmen to track – and if necessary assist in destroying – rockets or launch vehicles after liftoff.

Defense contractor Honeywell built the system, the second of its type manufactured and delivered to the Air Force.

During a presentation at the Honeywell plant here, Adjutant General of Florida Maj. Gen. Douglas Burnett accepted the ceremonial keys to the system from BMRST acquisition manager for the Air Force Dr. Sam Kuennen. The general, in turn, presented the keys to members of the 114th Combat Communications Squadron and 114th Range Flight – the two Florida Air National Guard units that will use the new system.

The BMRST system consists of a control center van and two trailer-mounted tracking antennas. All data processing and range safety displays are housed in the control center; the antennas are designed to receive data from launched rockets and space vehicles and transmit the information back to the control center. From the control center, the airmen will also be able to assist in

destroying an off-course rocket or launch vehicle for safety reasons.

The manpower of the 114th Range Flight and the 114th Combat Communications Squadron will be combined into the Air National Guard's first range operations support squadron.

Lt. Col. Rembert Schofield, who will command the squadron, noted the mobile BMRST would be tested at Cape Canaveral during upcoming rocket launches, as well as in "various launch tracking sites along the East Coast."

Schofield explained the Florida Air National Guard units – which are able to work hand-in-hand with the active duty Air Force's 45th

Space Wing during launches – are now even more invaluable to the space program with the addition of the BMRST.

“It has a lot of potential uses from the 45th Space Wing's perspective,” Schofield said. “As opposed to keeping a seldom-used tracking site opened and manned year-round, you can use this (mobile) system in place of that, and only use it and pay for it when you need it. So you have a potential savings of \$50 or 60 million per year for the 45th Space Wing, and that is significant.”

Schofield's units are able to track and assist in a variety of space launches from Cape Canaveral, and past missions have included the Delta II rocket and the space

shuttle.

“We can track anything you want. It doesn't matter what it is,” Schofield said. “There is absolutely no other National Guard that has the type of mission we do, or even does space-launch tracking. So this is the only space unit in the National Guard.”

The 114th Range Flight has been working with a prototype of the BMRST, and last year participated in a joint exercise with the Air Force in Alaska, where they successfully tracked a rocket launch using the BMRST system. Schofield said the addition of the new launch-tracking system to the Air National Guard's capabilities is not only important to Florida, but has a great potential for other state National Guards.

“This obviously means a lot to Florida, but it also has a far-reaching potential for more of the country,” Schofield explained. “A lot of the launches coming out of the eastern range go either up the coast or down the coast, and if your (launch) is going up the coast, you could have one of these (BMRST systems) stationed in another state. And another Air National Guard unit could simply pull it out and set it up, participate in a launch, and then shut it down. You wouldn't have to transport it up there, and you don't have to pay a large upkeep.”

“This is a big responsibility,” he added. “But this is the perfect mission for the Guard.”

Schofield said the 114th could be ready to track rocket launches using the new BMRST system as early as mid-May.
