Stakeholders can expect open door from superintendent

From her hot, muggy south Texas location, incoming school superintendent, Dr. Cynthia Clary says that she's excited about the opportunity to work on Kwajalein.

"Learning a new system is always a challenge, but I'm ready for the task," Clary said.

Clary beat out 15 other applicants from all over the world to win the hearts of the selection committee, which included Joe Marshall, deputy program manager for Community Services; Bob Bills, KRS Human Resources manager; Karen Ammann, outgoing school superintendent; Kevin Finn, deputy site manager; and Dr. John Szczepanski, site manager of MIT/Lincoln Lab.

The first challenge for Clary is just getting here, says Marshall, referring to the medical clearances required for herself and her family, as well as shipment of her belongings.

"She's never been here, so she'll spend the first week or so getting acclimated and adapting to the island," Marshall explained.

Marshall expects the new super-

intendent, "to carry on with the school program and maintain our excellent posture."

He said that what made Clary the successful candidate was her background as a high school principal and superintendent.

Whether Clary serves as elementary school principal will be worked out once she gets here, according to Marshall. The timing of her arrival looks to be the last week in July, which will allow for a transition period with Ammann.

Clary says that since becoming an educator 19 years ago, she has wanted to work in a school where academics are the focus.

"I want all children to experience a strong academic foundation that will allow them to choose their path," Clary said. "Whatever their choice, they have to be prepared and it is the school's job to do that."

One of the first things on Clary's agenda is to meet with the stakeholders of the school. She says she believes that everyone has an opinion, and there is always something valuable in what people have to say, adding that everyone has an

interest in the success of Kwajalein students.

Though Clary knows that everyone purports to having an open-door policy, as she does, hers may be a little different.

"To me, having an open door doesn't just mean a stakeholder can always come and see me," Clary said. "It means that I'll be out of the office seeing the stakeholder."

With children entering ninth, seventh and sixth grades next fall, Clary says it's the norm to have her kids attend the schools where she works. When asked if that has hurt her in the position of superintendent, she responds, "quite the contrary."

"My kids are involved with school and that has allowed me a kid's perspective on all sorts of things," Clary said.

Marshall hopes Clary will bring her experience and professionalism to bear on improving the high school-to-college program, which according to Marshall, may involve more use of the University of Maryland facility.

Though her contract is for one year, Clary is planning to stay longer, according to Marshall, who said that a criterion for the position was that applicants agree to stay at least three years.

Marshall's expectations of the new superintendent are that she bring some new ideas, but keep the old standards.

"I want to thank Karen Ammann for all she's done," said Marshall. "Dr. Clary's challenge is to make it better."

52-year overdue book returns

We’re not sure what the Kwajalein library looked like in 1952. That was before Grace Sherwood made her mark on the facility.

It might have been a Quonset hut or a ramshackle building, but we know it existed, and we know an unknown Marine checked out “Report of the United States Olympic Committee, 1948 Games.”

This anonymous Marine returned the book a few weeks ago, according to librarian Amy Hansen. He left a note on a sheet of paper slid in behind the cover.

“When I wasn’t reading it, I stashed it at the bottom of my locker box. I was called up to the front in Korea and forgot about it until I reached home two years later,” he wrote. “Don’t ask why I waited this long to return it. I return it now with my deepest apology.”

And he signed it, “guilty Marine.” It’s only an estimated 18,993 days late. A quick calculation tells me, at .20 a day, he owes the library \$3,798.60, but Hansen tells me there’s a cap at \$6.

I think we can waive that one. You have to admire a fellow whose



integrity demands he return a 52-year-overdue library book. Group exercises safety in lifting

Information Technology recently expanded its safety ‘minute’ used at the start of staff and all-hands meetings to a full-blown exercise, with help from Environmental Safety and Health.

Using computer equipment frequently handled by the group, approximately 60 IT staff spent an hour Saturday at the Yokwe Yuk Club learning and practicing proper lifting techniques.

The training exercise was held in response to three back-related injuries suffered by IT employees since transition to KRS. The injuries were reportedly from improper lifting of computer equipment.

“This is a serious issue,” said Mark Owens, chief information officer, who addressed employees at the exercise. “My responsibility is that you go home in the same shape that you came to work.”

Don Swanby, safety trainer from ES&H, led the afternoon session and explained that there are several basic things you can do to prevent back injuries.

“Clear obstacles out of your way, stretch before lifting, and if something is too heavy, walk away. Don’t get in the middle (of a lift) and decide it’s too heavy,” Swanby said.

Equipment used for the exercise included two desktop computers, a scanner and a monitor. Some items were placed on the floor, others on a table and a few were situated higher. After learning safe lifting techniques for each, employees were required to complete tasks at each station to be given credit for the training.

Help desk specialist, Annie Consul, said about the exercise, “It’s not as easy as it looks, but with the proper technique, it’s simple. What’s most important is knowing your limits.”

“This is about raising awareness,” said John Tompkins, server administrator. “If you don’t talk about it, people get lax and in a hurry, and they forget.”

On May 30, 1868, flowers were placed on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers recognizing the first official observance of Memorial Day.

On Monday, residents of Kwajalein gathered at the flag poles to pay respect to those who have fallen in the fight for freedom.

“Memorial Day is one special day of reverence, a day for decorating graves. One-hundred and thirty-six years later we are still honoring Memorial Day,” said Ike Richardson, KRS president.

The Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School band played the national anthems of both the United States and the Republic of the Marshall Islands.

Father William Sullivan gave a brief invocation and Lt. Col. Gerald Davie, acting United States Kwajalein Atoll Commander, welcomed special guests including a past USAKA commander, Col. John J. MacNeil (ret.), who commanded the island from 1990-92.

Richardson gave the Memorial Day address asking everyone to keep in mind the men who died in past wars, whether popular or not.

He said the conflicts first to come to mind were WWI, WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Afghanistan and Iraq, but that does not include all conflicts in which Americans had died.

He also asked everyone to remember, “Sixty-one years ago 30 courageous men lost their lives in the Makin Atoll while defending our nation’s freedom against a fearsome threat. It is also fitting that we choose this place of honor, on the atoll, for today’s observation, where their memorials are proudly displayed.”

Richardson added, “I spent 31 years in the military and have seen many young men and women depart for duty and fail to return. Several while following my orders.”

Richardson urged everyone to protect the freedoms which are enjoyed and said, “Let’s never forget, nor let our children forget the cost of war so they will never again have to pay the price for neglect or naiveté.”

Davie, Richardson and Sandy Steveson then laid wreaths at the three memorials.

As a tribute to all who died Spencer Barrs played “Taps” during the 21-gun salute, by local veterans.

Rev. Rick Funk then gave the benediction.

Army develops policy to address sexual assault

WASHINGTON — The Army is devising a policy that will re-emphasize that all offenses of sexual assault must be reported to the Criminal Investigation Command, officials have announced.

A task force spent 90 days conducting a detailed review of the Army's current policies and programs on sexual assault. One of the findings was that while all commanders had taken action against assailants accused of sexual assault, not all were going through the proper investigation channels, said Darlene Sullivan, the facilitator for the task force.

The task force was assembled from various Army organizations and began looking into how the Army addresses matters of sexual assault in February. Acting Secretary of the Army Les Brownlee authorized the task force.

The task force recommendations were approved by Brownlee, and were briefed to the House Armed Services Committee June 3 by Reginald J. Brown, the assistant secretary of the Army for Manpower and Reserve Affairs.

There were nine shortfalls the task force noted in its 80-page report. One major finding pointed out there was no standard way of handling sexual assault cases, making it hard to collect data and keep track of what services had been rendered to victims.

There were 24 recommendations made to improve the system. One was to develop a sexual assault policy for inclusion in Army Regulation 600-20, Army Command Policy. The chief of personnel, Army G-1 is responsible for the overall sexual assault policy.

The policy will define sexual assault as alleged offenses of rape, forcible sodomy, assault with intent to commit rape or sodomy, indecent assault or an attempt to commit any of these offenses, Sullivan said. The definition is the same one given by the Department of Defense in its recent report "Care for Victims of Sexual Assault."

The roles and responsibilities of commanders from major command to the unit level will be addressed in the new policy and become a part

of AR 600-20, said Lt. Col. John McPhaul of Army G-1.

"Commanders must create a command climate where victims feel comfortable reporting acts of sexual assault," said Sullivan. "Rape is one of the most unreported crimes nationwide.

As a first sergeant, if you don't know your Soldier was attacked or raped, how can you protect that Soldier? What if you put that Soldier on guard duty with his or her attacker?"

It's imperative that leaders know that prevention, training and assistance are a commander's responsibility."

Company commanders will no longer have the authority to sign the disciplinary paperwork for Soldiers who are accused of a sexual offense, when the cases don't go to court. The battalion commander's signature will be required, Sullivan said.

Department of the Army form 4833, Commander's Report of Disciplinary or Administrative Action, is a permanent record that states what a Soldier was accused of, and what action was taken against him.

Sullivan said the task force found that about 20 percent of the commanders had not filled out the form because of operational tempo. Another recommendation of the task force is to alter the form, so that instead of stating that administrative action was taken against a Soldier, his or her specific punishments will be listed on the form.

Commanders alone cannot round out a successful program to prevent sexual assault, according to the task force. Commanders alone cannot be the judge, juror and prosecutor.

In AR 600-20 one of the responsibilities commanders will have is to assign a unit victim advocate to support victims of sexual assault. It is important to keep the victim and the chain of command informed of all case actions as they occur with the case. The unit victim advocate will work to provide emotional support to victims while assisting them in the step-by-step processes involved, McPhaul said.

Other agencies whose roles will be

outlined in the chapter will include CID, the Provost Marshal, the Surgeon General, Staff Judge Advocate and Assistant Chief of Staff for Installation Management (Community and Family Support Center), McPhaul said.

"The Army agencies already have some procedures in place and know what to do, and are doing it, if an act of sexual assault occurs," McPhaul said, "but we must develop comprehensive policy of dealing with sexual assault from awareness/prevention, to victim support and data collection.

"We are developing a mechanism that gets all the agencies in concert with each other by establishing a policy that deals with sexual assault not only in garrison but in a deployed setting as well," McPhaul said.

Training requirements will also be addressed in the regulation, McPhaul said. Within the next 60 to 90 days, new chapters will be added to the regulation and staffed with the field, he added.

Training and Doctrine Command is currently devising lesson plans on the prevention of sexual assault to be included in all professional development schools, refresher courses at the unit level and additional training for law enforcement, medical and legal personnel, Sullivan said.

When looking for ways to improve the Army's policies and programs, the task force sought advice from outside agencies to include Department of Veteran Affairs; National Organization of Victim Assistance; Rape, Abuse, and Incest National Network; The Miles Foundation, Navy, Coast Guard and the University of Arizona and Purdue University in Indiana.

Both universities were given grants from the Department of Justice for their prevention programs, Sullivan said. The age category for the Soldiers who report the assaults and their assailants are in the same age category as the university students, she added. Nearly 84 percent of alleged perpetrators were identified as junior Soldiers, and 95 percent of the victims were in the rank of staff sergeant and below, according the task force report.


