

That's why I want to acknowledge the personnel that are involved in the practical side of the program.

Since I started the program we have certified over 2,000 climbers with the help of Joe Campbell, assistant climbing instructor, Banny Tanaka, Joe Loeak and others.

Joe Campbell has been my assistant instructor for over two years. Since then, we have put more than 100 contract workers through the practical course. Joe Loeak and Banny Tanaka are responsible for the tower setup (safety and fall protection devices) and language translation, as needed. They all have done outstanding work to ensure the safety and confidence of the personnel taking the practical course.

This letter of appreciation is long overdue. It's not an easy job when you are responsible for the lives of others when training conditions are well over 100 feet from the ground.

I would also like to thank Jim Roby (Climber II, 1993), Mike Waters (Climber II, 1992) and Rick Kelly. These guys have also made a contribution to the program.

Job Corps student sets sights on nursing

Francine Reimers' father had a heart attack 14 years ago, and the nurse who helped him inspired her to want to do the same for others.

Born on Ebeye, Reimers went to school through sixth grade at Queen of Peace then moved with her family to Majuro, where she attended Assumption High School.

Just short of completing her general studies program at the University of South Pacific on Majuro, Reimers stopped attending after discovering it was not accredited and would not aid in her pursuit of a nursing degree.

That's when the 21-year-old Reimers decided that the Job Corps program was for her.

"I thought I might get a better future by coming here. So I signed up," Reimers said. "I came here not knowing anybody."

Reimers began attending Job Corps in March and recently passed the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test. The test is designed to screen people before they enter the military and covers vocabulary, reading comprehension, math, science and even engines and tools in an effort to pinpoint what careers might be best suited for students.

The version of the test offered at this Job Corps site is a second-language type test, which non-U.S. citizens must pass to join. Passing the test gives Reimers the option of joining the military after completing the Job Corps program.

In the near term, Reimers will enter the Job Corps' nursing assistant trade program when she transfers to the Tucson, Arizona site in July. After that, she will decide whether to apply for college and pursue her licensed practical nurse certification or join

the Army, which entitles her to educational benefits.

"I've always wanted to work in a surgical area — that's what interests me," Reimers said.

According to Job Corps site director, Ruby Butterworth, Reimers has good goals and knows what she wants to do.

"She has a plan. USP was not accredited, so this is a good way for her to get into a college program," Butterworth said. "She's really focused, good at math, and reads all the time. She's never absent or late. She's the kind of person you would hire — I would."

Reimers, in turn, gives Job Corps an "A" for helping her learn about things she never knew existed and giving her a way to achieve her goal. She also thanks the Job Corps teachers and staff for their "patience and

kindness."

"Job Corps gets you to another level," Reimers said, whose goal is to return to Ebeye as a nurse because she believes there is a need there.

"She's one of the most assertive students. She's a leader and others look up to and respect her," Butterworth said. "I'm confident she'll get where she wants to go."

Job Corps offers low-income students from ages 18 to 24 the training they need to get a quality job or go on to college. The program on Kwajalein offers academic and employability skills. Students then can transfer to one of the 100 Job Corps sites in the

U.S.

The site on Kwajalein has three full-time and two part-time staff members. Approximately 90 students per year go through the program. Those students come from Majuro, Jaluit, Third Island and Ebeye. Currently, there are 36 students enrolled. The program is year-round with breaks in the summer and winter.

USAKA provides the facility on Kwaj, while the U.S. Department of Labor funds the program.

To enroll, interested persons should visit Job Corps, where they will be given a pre-enrollment test, mainly covering English reading. Students then commit to completing the program, which takes between one and two years. Once the program is completed, they must then either get a job or go to advanced training.

Fireworks and banana boat rides are just a few of the treats typically found on island when Kwaj residents celebrate the Fourth of July. Typical is not the goal this year according to Kathy Bates, Community Activities Entertainment Superintendent.

"It's going to be a big event with a lot to do," she said.

New events are on the calendar, destined to bring joy to the hearts of both young and old. In the early afternoon, an RC Car race is set to thrill while the kids compete in carnival games and let loose in the bounce house. For those looking for a more active way to spend the day, the CA staff is aiming to please.

An inflatable jousting pit is set up for those who wish to prove both their skill and strength, for anyone in the ninth grade and up.

"You stand on big columns and fight with your opponent," Bates said.

An Army style obstacle course is also available for anyone in the third grade and up. With tunnels and walls and other challenges, two people can race each other to the finish line.

All of these new events are in addition to what is usually seen on Kwaj, including the Family Fun Frenzy with the egg toss and relay races, and banana and kayak rides.

"Things we know the public loves we keep," she said. "We wanted to add some more for the adults."

A public sing along led by volunteers will entertain the crowd before the firework extravaganza and the evening will close with a special performance by an off island band, Hometown News.

KRS Food Services is also lending a big hand, Bates said. After they close down their regular food services at eight, they are reopening with a late night menu so residents can stay and enjoy the fireworks and the band without going hungry.

In order to appeal to all, the CA staff changed the layout of the event placing the stage in the middle of the action on the basketball court. Private vendors and KRS retail services will be canvassing the area throughout the afternoon selling a variety of memorabilia including shirts, hats, cards, and sand toys.

Community Activities also got creative when they designed a special event t-shirt which will be on sale

throughout the day for ten dollars. The design is done by the same company that created the Kwaj Kickball t-shirts.

"We were waiting for the right event to bring out new shirts," Bates said. "They were designed by Grindog, a company out of College Station, Texas."

Many of the new ideas for this event have been tossed around and discussed in the CA office over the past year, according to Bates.

"After every event we always do a detailed after action report," she said.

Using their notes and ideas, the CA staff thought of new ways to make the event special for everyone.

"After working together for a year, we felt we were able to take more risks, try new things," she said.

Bates and the rest of the staff are hoping that residents will come out ready to celebrate, she said.

"It's on a Sunday so everyone has two days to recover," Bates said. "Be prepared to have a great day at the beach."

What's the buzz on Fourth of July pest control

It began innocently enough, with a group of friends or co-workers, relaxing at the beach, perhaps doing a spot of fishing. Except they caught more than they could eat. So they decided to toss what was left of their catch into the garbage. And so the problem grows, because they mistakenly put their garbage into the recycle bin.

With the approaching Fourth of July celebration, several departments are working together to help this event run smoothly. But year in and year out, complaints about the fly problem flood the Pest Control office. So they turn to the Community Activities office. How can these two departments work together to combat this problem?

"[Mike Nicholson] and his crew work really, really hard. We need to help them out by doing our part," said Kaya Landers, Community Activities Pools and Beaches supervisor.

Landers, along with the Community Activities staff, is running a public awareness campaign to remind residents of the basic rules of housekeeping at the beach. One of the biggest issues she is facing are adults bringing glass bottles onto the beach.

"We're going to really enforce it on the Fourth of July," she said. "People need to put their beverages

in unbreakable containers."

Even one broken bottle could pose a major danger to an unsuspecting passer-by, Landers said. In addition to keeping glass off the beach and away from pool areas, Landers said she wants to remind people to dispose of their trash correctly and use recycle bins for what they are labeled for.

"Do not put raw fish in the [bins]," she said. "The actions of a few can affect everybody."

As usual, the Community Activities staff will be patrolling the beach, in an effort to keep the beach as clean as possible.

"Our maintenance workers do a great job cleaning as often as they can," Landers said. "They [just] can't keep up with the entire population of this island."

If residents will pay attention to their own personal garbage and put it where it belongs, it'll assist greatly with the general maintenance of the island, she said.

"It's just amazing how much people litter here and expect other people to clean it up," Landers said. "If people are responsible for their own trash, it'll make it easier."

Army studies leadership development, education

Editor's note: *This is one article in a series on Army focus areas directed by Army Chief of Staff General Peter Schoomaker to increase the Army's relevance and readiness.*

WASHINGTON — Today's methods of training and educating the force and growing leaders are effective, but they do need some tweaks to ensure continued success on tomorrow's battlefields, according to the findings of Task Force Leader Development and Education.

"We have what I consider a world-class Army and world-class leaders today — you have to recognize they are products of the (education) system we have in place today," said Brig. Gen. James Hirai, deputy commandant, Army Command and General Staff College. "Recognizing that level of competence, we still need to grow. We need to anticipate and prepare for the unknown."

As part of its charter, the task force reviewed the findings from the officer, warrant officer, noncommissioned officer and civilian Army Training and Leader Development Panel surveys that were conducted over the past few years.

The task force validated the majority of those findings, Hirai said. However, the task force did not limit itself to just validating past studies. It has taken a broad look across the Army, Hirai said.

He talked about what the task force has determined to date under several categories:

Lifelong Learning

While the Army has long espoused a culture of lifelong learning in leaders of all levels, accountability for that lifelong learning has not been

well defined. The individual Soldier, the organizations the Soldier belongs to during an Army career and the institution itself all have roles to play in that lifelong learning journey, Hirai said. Those roles need to be clearly defined and understood by each player, he continued. Additionally, there must be some form of formal standards-based assessment and feedback mechanism in place in order to determine if lifelong learning goals are being met and to adapt to changing learning needs or emerging technologies.

High-Payoff Initiatives

The task force is recommending that Army schoolhouses move toward a common scenario based upon today's asymmetrical threat. Working off a common scenario may allow different career field training centers to build synergies in conducting collective joint exercises via linked simulators and computer networks, Hirai said. Another high-payoff initiative the task force recommends is conducting a formal reoccurring training needs assessment across the Army, Hirai said.

Education System

Task Force Leader Development and Education is also reviewing content delivery and timing of training. Part of that is determining when a Soldier should get resident training and the duration of that training.

"The question is what type and amount of training does the Soldier or leader need to be comfortable with in current and future operations," Hirai said.

Joint operations training is one area that should be done at a lower level than most Army school curriculum — likely at the basic qualification course, the general said.

Not all institutional training may

need to be done at the schoolhouse, Hirai said, especially with off-the-shelf technology that allows for more distance education than available 10 years ago.

Leveraging Technologies

Leveraging technologies includes distance learning via linked simulators and distance learning via the Web, but it is more.

"We are looking at the human dimension — how people learn," Hirai said. "It's about identifying what leaders and Soldiers have to do and how to most effectively deliver the training they need to do those tasks."

Single Education Proponent

Agreeing wholeheartedly with the Civilian Army Training and Leader Development Panel finding, the task force is recommending a single education proponent for all Soldier and Department of the Army civilian training.

Under the current system, civilian training is managed through the Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel, G1, with major commands footing the bill. Soldier training management is an Office of the Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations, G3, responsibility, with the Human Resource Command paying travel and other costs. Hirai said he envisions a single organization responsible for managing the training of both the military and civilian workforces.

Whatever that organization ends up being, it would still need to coordinate with G1 and G3 to ensure legal mandates are met. As far as civilian leader development, Hirai said there are many courses out there, but none tied to career progression.

The task force recommends the Army establish a specific civilian leader development program.
