Scuba Club Dive

They greeted the sun. Close to 70 water lovers, of varying age and experience gathered at the Mc-Millen Small Boat Marina Monday morning at sunrise to embark on a day-long adventure sponsored by the Kwajalein Scuba Club.

Before the adventure started, however, they had to load 150 oxygen tanks, chests of food and beverages along with an assortment of gear on to the *Manassas*.

Once everyone was on board checked settled in for the two-hour ride up the toll with a final destination of Lone Palm Island. Upon arrival the Master Divers, which included Mac Kipp-McGuire, Maryellen Gibson, Mike Malone, Lisa Shire, and rescue certified diver Travis Tikka,

split up into teams to inspect the conditions of the water and help the other divers get ready. Once the dive brief was given, which included the depth of the water, strength of current and nearby spots of interest, all of the divers suited up with their buddies and lined up to take a giant step off the end of the *Manassas* into the deep blue ocean.

Tikka, KSC Vice President and organizer of the trip, was very pleased with the turnout.

"We had a lot more people interested this time," he said. "This year was very nice with all of the participation and all of the different groups of people that came out."

Despite the large number of divers out for an adventure, after the first dive most

commented on how it didn't feel as though there were 70 people underwater.

"I didn't think it was crowded at all," said Connie Guidi. "I was actually surprised for having that many people, I only saw a couple of divers underwater. I thought it was wonderful."

While the divers were underwater, the Master Divers were on board preparing to bring them all back on and move to the next location. Once everyone was brought back on the ship and settled in, the *Manassas* began its journey to the next dive site, off of Tarwoj Island. With the sun high in the sky, the divers settled down with sandwiches from the bakery and bottles of water to keep them hydrated as they traveled to Tarwoj.

When the *Manassas* anchored off of the shore of Tarwoj, a different set of Master Divers jumped into the water to inspect the conditions.

By switching up the responsibility everyone got a chance to do a bit of diving while still fulfilling their obligations to the group.

"My main thing is as long as everyone else has fun if we get a dive that's just bonus," Tikka said.

This was Tikka's third dive trip since he arrived two and a half years ago. The dive trips have actually been an annual event for over three years, according to Kipp-McGuire, KSC President.

"We try and keep it new and interesting," Tikka said.

In the past, dive trips have gone to Legan and Lone Palm. Often the Yacht Club will scout out possible dive sites for the KSC before a big trip is planned, he said. Organizing such a large venture takes a great deal of teamwork.

"A lot of people helped out," Tikka said. "It's worth it to see people have a good time and know that they enjoyed the day."

Along with the Master Divers and the Sunrise

Aviation unveils life without Comanche copter

Editor's note: *This is one article in a series on the 17 Army focus areas directed by Army Chief of Staff General Peter Schoomaker. This one focuses on "Army Aviation."*

WASHINGTON — The Army's aviation fleet is undergoing a total overhaul, and the main priority is increasing survivability to protect the aircraft and the Soldiers it carries. Aviators, crewmen, commanders and the technology community gathered to unfold the Army's aviation transformation plan during the Army Aviation Association of America Annual Convention in Nashville, Tenn., March 24-27.

By 2011, the Army will purchase 903 new aircraft, upgrade the current fleet to be more survivable, lethal and agile and work with the sister services to develop a Joint Multi-Role Helicopter. During a four-and-a-half month study, members on the Army Aviation Task Force made more than 120 recommendations on how to turn aviation brigades into joint and expeditionary forces that are modular units of action.

The total bill comes out to \$12.8 billion, the Pentagon official said.

"We're going to ask industry what weapon systems our potential adversaries may have, and we're going to be very innovative in how we deal with those threats," said Lt. Gen. Richard Cody, the Deputy Chief of Staff of Operations, G3.

Out of the recommendations came the idea to develop three new aircraft — a light utility helicopter, an armored reconnaissance helicopter and a cargo aircraft.

"It would be premature to talk about what the helicopters are going to look like. Right now we're in the capabilities phase," Cody said.

In a concerted effort Fort Rucker, Ala., Training and Doctrine Command and the Headquarters Department of the Army Staff will decide on the capabilities they want, and then let industry meet the niche, Cody said.

A more immediate addition to the aviation ranks will be unmanned aerial vehicles. The Army was given three I-GNAT UAVs as a congressional plus up and right now two are deployed to Iraq.

It's not just about I-GNAT, UAVs in general are a great contribution to the war fighter, the Pentagon official said. They perform reconnaissance and surveillance missions, and are becoming more and more important, the official added.

The Army will spend \$390 million toward UAV acceleration. Currently in the Central Command area there are Ravens, which are tactical UAVs used at the platoon level. The smaller UAVs are referred to as Shadow and the larger ones, I-GNAT and Hunter, are used at division and brigade level.

The Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Peter Schoomaker advised the Aviation Task Force to improve survivability, increase deployability, optimize capabilities and shorten the logistics tail, the Pentagon official said.

Now the aviation field is follow-

ing the infantry's example of the Stryker by creating a "common cockpit." Like the Stryker, which has 10 variants but same or similar parts, helicopters will share the same hardware and software.

In 2003, the 160th Special Operations Aviation Regiment, Fort Campbell, Ky., implemented their version of "common cockpit" referred to as the Common Avionics Architecture System or CAAS. By placing common hardware and software in three of the regiment's aircraft, training was simplified and the logistics demands on the unit were reduced, the G3 official said.

The open avionics architecture also will make it easier to upgrade the aircraft with third-party vendor software. The use of CAAS by the conventional Army is one initiative that will be adopted from the Special Operations community, Cody said.

"We always want the 160th to be the premier aviation force in the Army," Cody said. "We always want

them well ahead of the conventional force."

Schoomaker, who has served with both conventional and Special Operations forces, challenges the aviation community to use Special Operations initiatives that can be sustained and resourced, Cody said.

In an interview at Fort Rucker, Schoomaker said that in the future there will be a closer relationship between what's occurring in Special Operations aviation and conventional aviation. Army Aviation in the conventional sense will move to another level, a higher level. At the same time it allows the 160th to move to an even higher-level capability, he added.

The need to purchase and upgrade the current fleet is the reason behind the Comanche termination, officials said.

"Had we not terminated the Comanche, I would be absolutely concerned," Cody said. "By 2011 we would have had to cut our aviation fleet by a sizable number."

At the termination of the Comanche, only two aircraft had been built, and \$6.9 billion spent since 1983, said the Pentagon official. If the Army had continued to fund the program it would cost \$14.6 billion more to purchase 121 aircraft by 2011 and up to \$2 billion more to add the survivability equipment that is being added to the rest of the Army's fleet, the official added.

However, the technology that was developed for the Comanche will not be lost, but will be harvested in other Army aviation programs.

"We needed a place where we could take the Comanche technology and ensure that it was retained," the Pentagon official said.

The goal is to work through a joint solution with the sister services and decide on a new rotorcraft by 2020 or 2025, the official added.

Transformation plans for the aviation field complement the combined arms fight, Cody said. If you take any one weapon system, a Bradley, Abrams or UAV and put it up against an enemy, the enemy will learn to deal with it, the official said. It's a combination of all those weapon systems, the official added.

A warm reception expected for new TV antennas

Kwajalein residents will soon have a new way to receive AFN television.

Responding to community concerns over reception, the command and KRS have created a means and method for installing external antennas.

"This solution meets USAKA requirements and should provide an acceptable level of reception for all residents," said Maj. Joe Southerland, Information Management director.

But these are not the large clothesline antennas of days gone by, but rather what appear to be small plastic squares. The UV-protected plastic should keep the antenna inside working despite the harsh corrosive elements.

AFN Chief Engineer Craig McCarraher researched antennas and arrived at the command-approved model in March, based on its ability to receive the UHF and VHF channels and its ability to stand up to the harsh elements of the local environment.

With the model approved, the command next determined that a uniform, safe mounting system was needed. Besides, numerous residents climbing atop roofs, drilling various holes in the government housing, spelled only trouble with the potential for injury and damage to quarters. What's more, the antennas need to be installed in a certain manner to gain the best reception.

"They're going to put it in the best location possible," Southerland said. "Reception may vary from location to location. RTS can not guarantee crystal clear reception at each residence, only the best reception possible at each location."

The process for installation now calls for residents to first visit the KRS Finance office, starting Thursday morning, and pay a \$175 installation and service fee.

"There are 50 antennas currently in stock with 70 more coming on the 20 July barge," Southerland said. "Further antenna orders will be placed once demand is determined. If necessary, the command will consider air-ship-

ping additional antennas."

The resident will next go to the Service Desk at Building 804 and have his or her name put on the installation list.

A Kwajalein Operations will install according to a first-come, first-served basis, except where several installations occur in a given area, said John Brown, Kwajalein Operations manager.

Someone from the Service Desk will call the resident with a time for their installation, at least 24 hours before the appointed time, and the resident must be home for the installation.

Tuesday, a crew installed a test unit on a two-story home. A team of three men on the roof coordinated the installation with a man inside using walkie-talkies and test cable run through an open window. The roof team moved the antenna along the rooftop while the man below watched the television. Once they found the best spot, the roof team marked the spot and mounted the antenna. The crew then ran cable into the house with two drop points, one in the living room and another in the master bedroom.

A trailer will receive three drop points, since they are often shared among roommates making each bedroom a master bedroom, Brown said.

Residents may add plug-in-style "splitters" at the drop point and run cables to other rooms, Southerland said, but the longer the cable, the more the signal degrades, McCarraher added.

After installation, the antenna becomes a part of the house and, therefore, government property, Southerland said. Residents may not remove installed antennas, sell them or take them when they leave the quarters.

"Each resident must determine for themselves whether this investment is a good one considering their time remaining on island and lifestyle," Southerland said.

Future residents of the home will pay a hook-up fee for the antenna, if they so choose, Brown said.

The command originally released the approved model to the public in March, and those who bought antennas online may have theirs installed for \$75, through Sept. 1. Those who bought the selected

model at Macy’s West paid \$133 for the antenna. They will pay \$52, or the difference from \$175.

“If a resident is not happy with the initial reception within the first week, KRS will remove the antenna and they will receive a full refund,” Southerland added. “Otherwise no refund is possible.”

The model has been tested at various locations on the island, including the furthest house from the transmitter poles and a few other spots.

“Of the four installed antennas, residents are extremely pleased with the quality of the signal,” Southerland said.

McCarragher also said residents must remember to switch TV and VCR settings to “ANT,” or antenna, rather than “CATV,” the setting for

cable television.

Bachelor’s Quarters were completed late last year, though officials have acknowledged an antenna wiring problem in the Palm BQ. The newly approved antennas come on the heels of a project to

increase television offerings on the island, which began last fall. AFN then, using satellite signals routed through the U.S. Army Space and Missile De-

fense Command headquarters in Huntsville, added additional AFN channels including AFN Atlantic, separate news and sports channels and AFN Spectrum.

Broadcast over ultra-, or UHF, instead of very high, or VHF, frequencies as before, AFN encountered reduced reception quality on-island.



Water taxis classes pay off for Marine dept.

A few classes, some new equipment and the local water taxis have become a big help for the Marine Operations, according to Robin Ridout, Marine Operations Harbor Master.

"I just really want to tell them thank you," she said. "We notice [the difference]. We want to thank them for being professional, they're doing a really good job and to keep it up."

Just a few months ago the local water taxis had come under some scrutiny for their boating practices and the lack of safety equipment (*The Hourglass* March 12). After much discussion a program was developed through the combined efforts of USAKA Host Nation, Kwajalein Atoll Local Government, Kwajalein Police Department and Marine Operations to train the boat operators in proper procedures and outfit the boats

with appropriate safety equipment. Each boat had to install a VH radio, life jackets and running lights. The change really shone through during the recent RMI shopping day last Saturday.

"[The water taxis] were really spot-on as far as performance," Ridout said. "I think they did the Marshallese a service as well as us."

In addition to normal ferry schedule, Marine Operations added 4 extra runs, and with the help of the 8 certified water taxis, travel ran smoothly back and forth between Ebeye and Kwajalein all day.

"I think it's nice for Marshallese shoppers [as well] wanting to get back and forth to Ebeye, they didn't have to wait," she said.

Over the course of the shopping day, the water taxis brought 230 passengers over to Kwaj and took 382 back. This was in addition to the al-

most 1500 passengers that rode on the ferry. A ferry can only carry 170 passengers on a full load, so the taxis were a big help, Ridout said.

"It really benefits all and it increases the income for the Marshallese boat operators," she said.

Currently there are eight water taxis with two to three operators per taxi. Prior to the new regulations, none of them had the required equipment, Ridout said. The safety courses have been well received.

"[The courses] have been very successful," she said. "We've had tremendous interest."

The Marine Dept is planning on continuing the courses to keep operators up to date while training new operators and crews, she said. The change has been magnificent, Ridout said.

"They make my job a lot easier," she said.

Friend of a nation, missionary, translator dies

Alice Buck, missionary, wife, mother and friend, died Tuesday morning, ending a life dedicated in service to others.

Buck, who was diagnosed with cancer a little over three weeks ago, lost the battle just before sunrise. She is survived by husband Elden, daughters Lisa and Lauren and their Marshallese son Kyle.

Buck was most well known for her service to the Marshallese community. She, with assistance from members of the Catholic and Protestant community, translated the Bible into modern Marshallese, an effort which took almost 20 years.

She was completing translation on a Bible in Kosrae when she died.

Buck was raised on Kosrae by missionary parents, Dr. and Mrs. Harold Hanlon, who also spent a great deal of their lives in service to Micronesian nations.

"She was truly a good woman, a person who loved God first and showed it in how she treated each person she met," said Helen Claire Sievers, WorldTeach executive director.

Sievers was a student in Buck's Marshallese language classes and utilized her language tapes during her first year on Kwajalein, she said. Inspired by Buck's love for the Marshallese culture, Sievers became

very interested in the islands and their history.

"The profound respect she held for the Micronesian cultures, especially that of the Marshall Islands and Kosrae deeply influenced two generations of Americans who came to these islands," Sievers said. "The cross-cultural activities that she organized during the years she was on Kwaj were instrumental in building warm relations and respect between the two cultures."

The memorial celebration is set for Saturday, 11 a.m. at Claremont United Church of Christ.

More on Buck's life of service and her time in the Marshall Islands will run in Wednesday's *Hourglass*.
