Does it get any better than this?


Today—Independence Day—we celebrate the birthday of America. It's a time for picnics, parades and fireworks—

## Teen shows support of troops through letters

WASHINGTON — High school freshman Shauna Fleming is a busy young lady.

The 15-year-old has collected and distributed hundreds of thousands of letters of support for America's troops and veterans. To get the word out on her letter-writing campaign, "A Million Thanks," she has set up booths at NASCAR events, been a guest on news shows and even has her own radio show.

On July 2, she sent thousands of letters to 1st Armored Division soldiers serving in Iraq.

The student of Lutheran High School in Orange, Calif., said she has been contacted by many service members and their families, who've told her the letters and emails help their morale. "I have had the opportunity to hear from many soldiers overseas who have received our letters," said Shauna. "They've e-mailed me and even called me from Iraq to say thanks."

And that was the teen's opportunity to ask the deployed soldiers what else they could use. The answer: CDs and DVDs.

Shauna said she hopes people all over the United States will answer her call to send used music and movies with their letters so she can include them in her next mailing.

Though Shauna and her high school friends had hoped to reach their 1-million-letter goal in June, the teen said she knows they will hit their goal sometime soon.

"The incoming mail has slowed because I think people thought we were only collecting the letters for Military Appreciation Month (May

but this campaign is year-round," she said. "I know we'll hit our goal pretty soon as we are so close right now. When we do, we'll go for another million!"

Shauna's "A Million Thanks" radio show discusses her campaign and includes guest interviews. Station owner Chris Murch, a former Marine captain, contacted Shauna after seeing her on Fox News on Memorial Day.

"Doing an Internet radio show gives me the opportunity to tell people around the world that Americans do appreciate what our military men and women do for our country, and not to believe everything they read," said Shauna. "It also lets me inform everyone what I hear from our soldiers who are out there, and how we can help them and their families."

# New physicals required for Kwaj youth

New contracts mean change, either in personnel or policy. This is especially true in the Child and Youth Services office as they prepare to implement a new requirement for Kwajalein youth.

When school starts this fall, any child from pre-kindergarten to sixth grade must have a physical in order to participate in any sports program throughout the year.

"It's a new requirement for the children on Kwajalein," said Ann McCoy, CYS coordinator.

Prior to the contract change-over, youth sports activities fell under Community Activities, according to McCoy. With the new contract, CYS was created to deal specifically with the needs of Kwajalein youth. Any program under CYS now has to follow Army guidelines.

In a recent Performance Work Statement done by the Army, these new guidelines were laid out to be followed, according to Gerry Wolf, Chief Community Activities

for USAKA.

"Under this new contract they have to fall under Army guidelines," he said. "This requires all

children who are going to participate in youth sports to get an annual physical."

This only applies to children from pre-kindergarten to sixth grade.

"The high school still does their team with the high school and the Rec league," McCoy said.

Based on a recent survey done

by the CYS staff, 175 families said they participated in the sports program last year. McCoy said she hopes the numbers won't fall because of the new requirement.

"This is basically the only sports program available," she said. "If they want to participate they have to follow whatever policies the Army requires us to have."

All other Army installations require physicals for students participating in sports programs.

"The program of CYS was required with the new contract as were the changes in policy," McCoy said.

Letters will be mailed home to parents next week detailing the new policy and how parents can get their child prepared for the upcoming school year. One physical can cover an entire year for a student as long as it lists all of the sports they will participate in.

"We're doing the best we can to meet what the community wants and what they Army does require," McCoy said. "And it's a fine balancing act."

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## Trees planted to honor fallen service members

WASHINGTON — Hundreds of newly planted trees are blooming along a six-mile highway median strip that links downtown Albany, Ga., to its newer suburbs to the northwest.

More than 660 trees and shrubs — live oaks, magnolias and crepe myrtles among them — were planted this spring by members of First Union Methodist Church and its community to honor service members who have made the ultimate sacrifice during the war on terror.

Scott Hagan, the church's associate minister for missions, said the "Trees of Courage" program was conceived to help grieving families heal and let them know that their losses are recognized and appreciated. But just as

importantly, he said, it offers a continual reminder to community members of the importance of national defense, in both peacetime and war.

Home of Marine Corps Logistics Base, Albany, the community has a long and close relationship with the U.S. military. As an extension of this relationship, the tree-planting effort provides a lasting tribute to those killed in the line of duty in America's defense, Hagan said.

The trees, which Hagan said are now just beginning to stretch their branches and pop into full bloom, offer a constant reminder of their service and source of inspiration to those who pass them along Westover Boulevard. "I've driven by and even thought of a couple of sermons," he said.

Hagan said he's not yet aware of

any families of fallen service members who have ventured along the six-mile stretch. But he's hopeful that when they do, they'll see the message the trees convey: where once stood a barren median strip, now blooms a beautiful grove that honors those lost.

"We are confident that the lives of individuals who see the plantings in the coming decades will be positively impacted by the reminder of the sacrifice of your loved one and others," church members wrote in a letter telling families who have lost a loved one in Iraq or Afghanistan of the project.

"As residents and visitors to Albany ride down Westover Boulevard, this living memorial will continue to remind us that our freedom is precious and comes at a very high price."

# LandWarNet equips Soldiers with battlefield info

WASHINGTON — Just as Soldiers need the best equipment and training to be successful on the battlefield, a steady diet of information is just as vital, Army leaders believe.

"Information is power," said Brig. Gen. Jan Hicks, commanding general of the U.S. Army Signal Corps and Fort Gordon, Ga. "We want to know things about the battlefield and we want to know things about our enemy on the battlefield. At the same time, we don't want the enemy to know what we know, or to know things about us."

Connecting Soldiers to information they need, whenever they need it and wherever they are, is the job of the Network, recently renamed LandWarNet. It's one of 17 focus areas the Army is emphasizing to win the Global War on Terrorism.

Hicks heads the task force assigned to make recommendations on how best to develop and improve LandWarNet so that it delivers better battle command capabilities to current, future, and joint forces.

The joint aspect is of particular interest, Hicks said.

"We're not going to war as an Army. We're going to war with our sailor and airmen friends," Hicks said. "We must be able to communicate with them without an extra step. We need a system that allows one call."

Ultimately, the task force wants to see a LandWarNet that gives combatant commanders the same capabilities for accessing information in any location, whether that's at a desktop computer in their office, in an aircraft, on a vessel at sea, in a vehicle en route to battle or in a post-battle camp, Hicks said.

"We're working on different ways to get there," she added.

One of those ways is through the Global Information Grid, or GIG. Hicks describes it as scaffolding built up around the globe.

"Communication lines go all over, pulsing through the GIG," she said. "It services the defense information switch network, or DISN, which is provided by the Defense Information Services Agency."

Forces can reach into the DISN with satellites and pull information services down to wherever they are in the world, she explained.

A combination of military and commercial technology powers LandWarNet, with leaders committed to pursuing programs that will enhance it even more.

"Our current IT investment strategy is centered on leveraging the best available commercial technology," said Col. James Costigan, director of Combat Development at the U.S. Army Signal Center.

Leaders acknowledge that getting the network to the level the task force envisions is an expensive endeavor. Just how much is still being determined.

"We're talking about an almost clean sweep of the kind of equipment we have now," Hicks said. "It will take a great deal of money to retool our networks while at war."

Many leaders believe the Army can't afford not to make LandWarNet all it can be, however.

"The application of information technology can enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of the processes involved in war fighting," said Costigan. "Our experimentation with objective force concepts and our real-world experience in OIF shows us this notion is valid. Investing in IT systems to enable war fighting is therefore logical and necessary."

# Fly control is everyone's business

Recently a dead fish was found in one of the recycle containers on Emon Beach, which if left for the regular recycle pick-up, on Tuesday, could have resulted in many uninvited guests at the Fourth of July celebrations.

Mike Nicholson, installation pest management lead said, flies are the biggest complaint, but are controllable if everyone helps to eliminate the source of the fly's food source and breeding ground. The food source and breeding grounds are the same for flies.

Flies need a food source to lay their eggs then the eggs hatch into maggots within 12 hours. At that point the maggots' only job is to eat. They feed on solid food items, such as meat. They then migrate into the ground for the next stage of their evolution into flies and four days later the pupa hatches into a fly.

A female housefly can live for 15 to 25 days and lay five to six batches of eggs, in her lifetime, with each batch containing 75-150 eggs.

According to Nicholson, if a pair of

not enough. The bag must be completely sealed.

Nicholson said once a maggot enters the ground and starts the pupa stage there is no chemical that can kill it.

"There is only so much anybody can do after the fact, Nicholson said.

"Chemicals are not the solution," Nicholson said. "It doesn't kill things that will hatch tomorrow."

He suggests one way to help decrease the fly population in to actively become involved in various ways to eliminate a fly's food source.

"If you are fed up, get yourself involved," Nicholson said. "Anything

houseflies began breeding in April the result could be over 191 quintillion flies by August. The flies could cover the earth, 47 feet deep.

This is why he stresses sealing garbage sacks either with tape or tying the opening closed so a fly's food source is cutoff.

Nicholson said a bunny ear tie is

you take to the beach goes back home with you. We generate what flies eat."

Nicholson suggest including garbage sacks as part of the party planning. Place all leftover food items in the sack and seal it so flies can not get in. Meat scraps left on the barbecue such as a steak, hotdogs and chicken also needs to be removed.





## June temperatures high, precipitation low

The month of June continued this year's trend of below normal precipitation and above normal temperatures. It wasn't warm enough to break records like January and February of this year. Nevertheless, it was warm enough to rank in the top 10 warmest Junes. In fact, it was the seventh warmest June on record, and tied with the years 2003 and 1954. The average temperature for the month was 83.1°F, which is 0.9°F above normal. The highest monthly average temperature for June is 83.8°F, which occurred in 1953, and the lowest is 80.9°F, which occurred in 1955. The high temperature

for the month was 89°F, which occurred on four separate days: the 13th, 28th, 29th, and 30th. The low temperature of 76°F occurred during a heavy rain shower on the morning of the 10th. The records for the month are 92°F and 71°F, which occurred in 1958 and 1976, respectively.

Analyses reveal that ocean temperatures around Kwajalein Atoll averaged 0.9°F above normal for the month of June, which corresponds perfectly with the air temperature anomaly for the month. Computer model forecasts suggest that this trend may continue for the next several months.

As stated earlier, precipitation was below normal for the month of

June. By June 27th, 6.92 inches of rain had fallen, which was all that the weather station would receive for the month. The last three days of the month were rather hot and dry with only a trace of precipitation. The wettest day was the 22nd when the weather station recorded 1.26 inches, most of it falling during the late morning and afternoon hours. The record high and low rainfall for the month of June are 19.61 inches, which occurred in 1954, and 3.56 inches which fell in 1984. Incidentally, the rainiest day ever in June was June 2nd, 1995 when the weather station recorded 8.86 inches during heavy showers and thunderstorms.
