Reef not as rich as it used to be

Ain't it all wonderful?? The crystal waters, the painted sunsets, the palm trees silhouetted against a moonlit ocean, the reef – an aquarium at your doorstep, abounding with.....wait a minute, not bounding with much these days.

When I came here in 1980, like many people, I took my kids reefing – looking for shells, mainly cowries, hiding in the remote crevices or under rocks. There were lots of money cowries, some gold ringers and brownies, and occasionally larger shells. A regular bonanza of creatures!

This past low tide I did my last nostalgic look at the reef. After three tours over 24-years, we're leaving.

So, I'm doing all the things you



do in your last two weeks on the island that has been your second home; visit all the old haunts, relive the laughter of your children (now

grown) at the beach, and stroll the reef at low tide.

Anyone who has visited my home knows I have a fixation with sea shells. I have big shells, little shells, shells in glass bowls, shells in frames, shells in candles, and BOXES of beach-washed shells on the back porch. I think God relaxes by dreaming up new designs for sea creatures.

I love walking the reef. This time I saw lots of sea urchins, both the little black and the mauve ones, and even a couple of my favorite pencil urchins near the surge channels. I saw colorful corals and small fish and even a baby octopus. What I didn't see were any cowries. No money cowries – which used to be a dime a dozen. No gold ringers. No reticulateds or humpbacks – the larger treasures.

In an hour and a half of strolling the oceanside coral garden, I only saw six brownies (and these were being avidly hunted by two nice ladies on a 'hunt for cowries').

The solution to our naked reef is obvious – education about the fragile nature of our environment and a conscientious effort by residents to 'look, but don't touch'. Show your kids or yourselves the wonders of our back yard, but leave them for others to appreciate.

You can still collect shells. The Micronesian Handicraft Shop

offers a larger selection than you'll ever find on the reef today. But they all used to be here – the strawberry cowries, the finger shells, the cone shells.... Maybe with a little restraint we can bring them all back.

“To protect and defend”

A record number of Marshallese citizens were inducted into the United States Army last Friday in Majuro.

In the *Nitijela* Chamber, surrounded by family, friends and dignitaries, 21 young Marshallese raised their right hand and were sworn into the U.S. Army.

Also witness to the induction ceremony was acting Republic of the Marshall Islands President, Minister Witten Philippo and *Nitijela* Speaker, Litokwa Tomeing.

Thomas Praster, United States Embassy Charge'd Affaires spoke at the induction ceremony about the close ties between the U.S.

and the RMI.

He said, “Today, these young people will do a lot more than just talk about the importance of this relationship. They will raise their right hands and swear to a solemn oath to their god, in front of their families and other loved ones that they will protect and defend the Constitution of the United States. This takes the relationship beyond friends, beyond allies. Their action unites our peoples at a fundamental level, for nothing is more intrinsic to a sovereign nation than its defense.”

The 45-minute ceremony was broadcast throughout the Marshall Islands and taped for future broadcast on Majuro and Ebeye according to Thomas R. Maus, U.S. Embassy Majuro Military/Public Affairs assistant.

Pacific Island nations

Nurture, regenerate and celebrate, were the themes for the Pacific Arts Festival held in Palau, July 22-31.

Almost 30 Pacific Island nations from Micronesia, Polynesia and Melanesia participated in this event, which is held every four years.

The Marshall Islands sent a group of approximately 71 delegates, which included two dance groups, a canoe building crew, a band, handicraft demonstrators, traditional leaders and government representatives.

Yap and Saipan canoes sailed more than 500 miles from their respective countries. Other participants shipped their traditional canoes to participate in the magnificent opening ceremony. The sparkling blue Palauan waters were dressed with colorful traditional vessels reminiscent of a scene from the past.

During the 10 days of the festival, five countries participated in building their own traditional canoes with Kosrae, Tuvalu, Cook Islands, Marshall Islands and Samoa finishing their canoes in time for the final ceremonies.

At the closing ceremony the canoes were presented

to the leaders of the different states of Palau. The Marshallese canoe was chosen to be in the permanent exhibit at the *Belau* Museum.

Inspired by the diversity of art and cultures, groups gathered in the form of symposiums to discuss how to protect traditional knowledge, roles and responsibilities of traditional and elected leadership, education and the future of the nations, social change and impact, sailing and navigation and many more relevant topics. Participating in these discussions made it evident that the Pacific countries face similar issues and that there is much to be gained by sharing ideas and joining efforts to meet the challenges posed by globalization.

The central festival area was organized with booths built specially for each participating country showcasing crafts, books, food and demonstrations.

Visitors gathered day and night sharing stories, skills, purchasing handicrafts, eating or dancing to the lively music performed in the nearby "Jam House."

Showers were usually a welcome respite, which provided an opportunity to slow down and visit. It was obvious that Marshallese

craftsmanship was well regarded. The RMI booth was one of the busiest and their handicrafts were extremely popular.

The Marshall Islands participated in the weaving demonstrations, canoe building, country exhibit and photo exhibit, cooking demonstrations, dance

performances by the *Jobwa* Dancers from Ujae and the *Jebo* Dance group from Utirik. They also were part of the philatelic exhibit, the fashion show, the literary arts exhibit, and singing performances. The rhythmic sounds of the Ladrik Jerata Band from Majuro drew dancing crowds to the floor. Meanwhile, Mon la Mike's band from Ebeye became a popular feature at one of the local gathering places, the Penthouse.

The RMI also left her imprint in the Mat Peace quilt with a beautiful piece of lokwe weaving, and the Peace storyboard sports a *Wabebe* design or stick chart, representing the prowess of their navigators.

The Marshallese Cultural Center also participated in the arts festival with a photographic exhibit and

a presentation of the deBrum images currently being digitized and catalogued here on Kwajalein.


The Pacific Ocean, which connects all of these nations, is the common ground for an amazing variety of cultures and traditions.

There were many similar approaches and methods, but also there was variety in the use of materials and resources, as well as the interpretation of nature and the spiritual world.

This kind of gathering makes it possible to share, compare and learn from each other; in doing so many new friendships were woven across the Pacific. The festival was a great forum to reinforce the richness and uniqueness of island cultures.

Wallops NASA has completed the six Hysell missions from Roi-Namur.

There were two launches of three rockets per launch. The first launch was on Aug. 7 and the second was Aug. 15.

The Hysell mission was a sky-dye mission where the rockets traveled approximately 160 miles into space to take measurements of storms in space.

On some of the rockets, the experiment-payload produced a green glowing cloud northeast and/or northwest of the atoll and was visible for about 10-15 minutes, according to John Hickman, EQUIS II campaign manager.

The next mission will be the Lehmacher mission with a launch window from Aug. 26-29, according to Dennis Simpson, EQUIS test director.

“The Lehmacher mission will launch during the daytime and will be two rockets,” Simpson said. “One will be launched in the morning and the other in the afternoon.”

Jackson returns *Mali* to water after 14 years

After 14 years on land, the *Mali* finally touched water Monday, as she was lifted from her scaffolding and placed gently in the Kwajalein lagoon.

Mali holds special meaning with the name derived from three areas of Nate Jackson's life.

Jackson explains *Mali* is the phonetic spelling of his mother's maiden name. *Mali* is also a region in Africa and in the Polynesian language; *malia* means calm, smooth waters. Therefore, according to Jackson the name *Mali* is multifaceted.

Jackson has been working on his boat, the *Mali*, for the past 14 years.

In 1984, Jackson left Bainbridge Island, Wash. on a 35-foot, Jason 35 boat, the *Mali*, and sailed down the California coast with only the bare essentials and a plywood and fiberglass interior. Jackson housed the *Mali* in Bodega Bay for the next two years.

In 1986, Jackson said he "took off and went cruising" on the *Mali* traveling to San Diego where he stopped long enough to become a journeyman carpenter, which would come in handy later when he started to finish the wood interior of the *Mali*.

Jackson sailed up and down the California coast for two years and in 1988, he set sail for Hawaii.

"I was essentially camping out," Jackson said. He left the boat in Hawaii and returned to Kwajalein for his fourth tour, while some sailing-friends of Jackson's sailed the boat to Kwaj.

In 1990, Jackson took the boat out of the water to finish the interior and work on the exterior.

Over the next 14 years, Jackson completely finished the interior working every weekend and holidays, when he wasn't working at his other job, Captain of the Great Bridge.

The interior, now completed with some of Jackson's own designs, is teak, Australian lace wood, alder, bird's eye maple and mahogany.

"All you look at now is beautiful wood," Jackson said. "It was a good project. It wasn't a chore. It was my thing to do."

Jackson said now that his boat is back in the water he plans his first trip to Bigej, with his wife.

"Gonna sell it after I play with it a little bit," Jackson said. He admitted that he has been at sea most of his life and he is looking forward to putting his wood-working skills to use in his home in Hawaii.

"I've done my time at sea," Jackson said.





Radio Club bounces signal off the moon back to Earth

Sunday morning at around 6 a.m. a 100-foot rope antenna strung between two coconut trees made it possible for a small group of Kwajalein amateur radio enthusiasts to make history.

"Thank you very much for the contact. Best wishes," was the reply from an Earth-Moon-Earth contact made, said Jeffery Parker, Kwajalein Amateur Radio Club president.

The club successfully completed an EME that made Marshall Island history.

Transmitting a signal at 144 MHz, the club was able to communicate with another amateur radio station in Wisconsin by reflecting a signal off the moon.

Several months ago, Kwajalein resident and amateur radio operator, Dave Fortin was approached by Dave Schmocker, an amateur radio operator in the United States, about the possibility of trying EME communication from Kwajalein.

Fortin assembled a team of KARC members and began the process of crafting the antenna and assembling the required radio equipment.

In order to bounce a signal off the moon and communicate with Wisconsin, conditions must be just right, Parker said.

"Our first window was last Sunday morning and the next is not until mid-September," Parker said.

The KARC members met at the Ham Shack at around 4:30 a.m. Sunday, in the pouring rain, and began their quest to transmit a radio signal to other ham radio opera-

tors by bouncing the signal off the moon. A transmission that takes around two seconds to complete.

They strung the homemade or 'home-brew' antenna, as Ivy Springer, KARC member, referred to it, between two palm trees and waited for the new moon to rise.

At around 5:50 a.m., the moon rose and the ham radio crew began their first transmission.

Parker sat at the console and transmitted Morse spelling out Schmocker's call sign, KJ9I, followed by the KARC's club call sign, V73AX. Then he and other club members gathered around the speakers waiting for a reply.

Transmissions from Kwajalein were sent for one minute on every odd minute and club members listened for Schmocker's transmissions during every even minute.

At approximately 6 a.m., KJ9I could be heard through the noise and the contact was quickly acknowledged and completed.

"I heard his call sign and sent back a string of the letter OOOs," Parker said. "Dave Schmocher responded with a string of ROROs and I acknowledged with a string of RRRs to complete the contact."

Following the contact with Schmocker, contact was made with two other amateur radio operators; Gary Crabtree, KB8RQ, in Ohio and David Blaschke, W5UN, in Texas during the 15-minute window.

"The contact with Gary was quite loud during which he responded 'thank you and best wishes,'" Parker

said. "It was amazing and very exciting hearing his signal from the moon."

Springer said, "It was fantastic, a truly magical moment in our Ham Shack. It was a great club effort."

Parker added, "We used the moon to reflect the signal back to Earth. The moon was a target. The antenna worked very well."

According to Parker, the EME amateur radio community is very excited about last weekend's success and a number of U.S. and European stations are hoping for a chance to contact Kwajalein during September's two windows of opportunity.

The KARC also has many other events such as hidden transmitter hunts and provided amateur TV for the Rustman and Rusty Family events on Kwaj.

Springer encouraged anyone interested in joining the club to contact her, Parker, Richard Perry or Jack Carey.
