People, it is that time of year again. Those of you who have been here for a while still need to remind your little ones that traffic is traffic and it's usually really big stuff with round wheels that can



“Vote or Die” is not just a thought of mine, it’s the motto for a pro-active ad campaign for registering young people to vote. Aimed at young adults and older teens, it is a campaign crafted by rap media mogul P. Diddy and is an attempt to make voting sexier for the youth of my generation. [See *mtvnews.com*’s “P. Now, what is the problem with this picture? Well, before you say “Uh-Oh” and assume I’m another anarchist youth ranting and raving against the system, let me remind you that voting is a choice by an individual, not a product. Designing T-shirts with the slogan “Vote or Die” is not going to make voting any sexier at all. So why does P. Diddy even bother? *Note to the uninformed: Sean “Puffy” Combs/P. Diddy is the owner of rap label Bad Boy Entertainment and is a successful musician, actor, and clothing designer. Think, the black Donald Trump.* P. # Host Nation interns seek a path to college

Over the next year, Joemi Keju and Timothy Samuel will share an experience designed to serve as a springboard toward their education and career. As Host Nation interns, they are earning money while learning what makes a government office tick.

According to Maryanne Lane, USAKA Host Nation Officer, Keju and Samuel do whatever is needed to assist USAKA's Protocol, Public Affairs and Host Nation offices.

"The program was created to give RMI young people graduating from high school an idea of what we do here in these three areas," Lane said. "The objective is to teach life and job skills necessary for them to succeed in a business environment."

In the course of a typical day, the interns work to revise a Marshallese phrase book, update RMI Cultural Exchange/Title Ten, and USAKA/RMI Initiatives scrapbooks, assist with island orientation and help domestic workers with their contracts. When not busy, they man the phones and answer questions for the Host Nation office.

The internship program is a joint effort by USAKA and the Workforce Investment Act.

WIA provides a \$200-a-week stipend, of which \$50 is given to participants for living expenses. The remaining \$150 goes into a scholarship fund they receive when the program is completed. Their living quarters and meal cards are provided by USAKA.

Former Guest Student Program participants Keju and Samuel eat together, work together and share a trailer

on Kwajalein for the duration of the program.

"I was raised in a family-oriented community. College is a life of independence," said nineteen-year-old Samuel, whose father works at Kwaj Lodge and mother is a teacher on Ebeye. "This is another stepping stone to ease the process of going to college. And the financial assistance helps. We're also getting to know a lot of new people, especially in the higher ranks of the Army."

help them apply."

Internship participants are encouraged to obtain their degree and then return to their country to work. This is USAKA's second wave of such interns.

"This program is exactly what I needed and will help me in the future with money for school," Keju said. "It's just what I was looking for."

Twenty-two-year-old Keju has already had a taste of college by way of a distance learning program. He is near completion of his second year studying law, but is required to attend classes on campus during the remaining two years.

"I knew I would need this experience for my future," Keju said. "I want to go on campus and this helps financially." Keju, whose father is a prosecutor and mother teaches Kindergarten on Ebeye, says he sees himself in a career working with government down the road.

According to Noda Lojkar, USAKA Ombudsman, during the internship, mentors such as himself will help steer the interns toward furthering their education.

"Along the way, we help them identify possible colleges," Lojkar said. "They choose their college and field and we

# AFN to offer more channels and more variety

Though the Olympics are coming to an end, the excitement is just beginning for Kwajalein residents.

On Sept. 4, AFN will kick off new services adding 375 hours of shows and movies each week. At the heart of the additions, are AFN Family and AFN Movie channels.

Also, included is an expansion of AFN Spectrum, which allows 24-hour programming to replace repetition of shows at 8-hour intervals.

According to AFN Kwajalein operations manager, Rich Feagler, this upgrade really rounds out the AFN lineup.

"Kwajalein will be seeing a lot of additional programming that they have not seen on AFN before," Feagler said. Examples are, The Daily Show with John Stewart, Blind Date, and Conan O'Brien.

AFN Family will provide programming for preschoolers through teens as the day progresses, with family-oriented shows in the evening. The AFN Movie channel will offer a variety of movies and behind-the-scenes

type shows.

AFN Spectrum's new daytime schedule includes programs from the Food, HGTV, E!, Style, and Fine Living networks, according to an AFN press release.

The change affects approximately 800,000 DoD military and civilian employees and their families stationed overseas in 177 countries and U.S. territories, as well as those aboard more than 180 U.S. Navy ships at sea.

"We're about as overseas as you can get," Feagler said. "The stations back home aren't available to an overseas audience. AFN has done a wonderful job of bringing us as many shows from these stations as possible."

Because Kwajalein uses the European feed, digital delay systems will be employed to delay programming for 14 hours, allowing it to come on at the time of day intended. Until now, Channel 9 was the

only station on delay.

"More channels now is great, and gives us more variety," Feagler said. "People would almost have to go out of their way now to find something they don't like."



### **Bank of Guam to cease banking operations on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur**

On Aug. 25, the Bank of Guam formally notified KRS that they will terminate banking services facility operations on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur effective Dec. 1, 2004. The Bank of Guam is required to notify both the public and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) and the Federal Reserve Clearing System (FRCS) 90 days before termination of banking services.

For account holders at the Bank of Guam, cessation of physical banking services operations on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur will not affect the status of your accounts with the Bank of Guam. Indeed, these accounts will remain open until they are closed under normal arrangements as prescribed in the terms and conditions of your agreements with the Bank of Guam.

Currently, KRS is supporting USAKA in acquiring banking services via the DOD Military Banking Facility (MBF) contract vehicle. Representatives from the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) and the Bank of America will visit Kwajalein in September to conduct an in-briefing with USAKA and assess our community environment. The site visit is required before deciding formally to proceed with providing banking services operations on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur using the MBF contract vehicle. In the event of a temporary lapse of banking services, KRS will provide check cashing services to all Island residents. Credit card usage will not be available during this time period. He added it is accurate to the times


in which Christ lived.

The movie will also be shown again on Monday, Sept 6 at 7:30 at the Yuk Theatre.




