USS LAKE ERIE GRACES

Close quarters aren't the only thing the *USS Lake Erie* and Kwajalein have in common. The Navy ship's ballistic missile defense capabilities make her a fellow warrior in the fight to protect the skies against America's enemies.

The 567-foot-long *USS Lake Erie* docked on Monday in Kwajalein, offering its 370-plus crew the opportunity for rest, relaxation and cultural exchange. The ship also refueled and offered tours to residents.

One purpose for the visit was "so that

the ballistic missile workers can see the finished product here," said Ensign Jared Samuelson, anti-submarine warfare officer.

Coming ashore was a much-anticipated event for the crew, according to Samuelson.

"The crew loves liberty. Some had good memories from two years ago. And coming from Hawaii, there are a lot of avid divers," Samuelson said.

Kwajalein is the ship's first port visit after heading out from its home at Pearl Harbor approximately a week ago. Typically, the ship spends seven to eight months of the year at sea.

The *USS Lake Erie's* last deployment was to the Middle East in 1999. Since that time, the ship has been conducting testing with stops in East Asia, Japan, Korea, Mexico, San Diego and Portland.

The ship's capabilities include surveillance and long-range tracking of ballistic missiles. She is the only ship that carries the SM3 experimental missile, built by Raytheon, and the only one that can fire a interceptor missile to destroy a hostile ballistic missile.

According to Samuelson, the SM3 has a rocket booster, which significantly extends its range, and it is kinetic, meaning that it doesn't explode on impact.


"It's like trying to hit a bullet with a

bullet,” Samuelson said.

The *Lake Erie* features an Aegis weapons system, enabling all weapons systems on the ship to be tied together. The most powerful ship-mounted radar in the world, called the Spy radar, also calls the *Lake Erie* its home.

Anti-air, -surface and -submarine warfare are all specialties, though air defense is the ship's primary role. Two helicopters rest onboard the *Lake Erie*, and eight of the nearly 40 officers onboard are pilots.

The helicopters are used to fly ahead and send pictures back to the ship using their radar, according to LTJG Jen Hardman, helicopter pilot, who is on her first port visit of her first cruise.

“We help fight against any type of surface threat,” Hardman said.

Hardman's impression of Kwajalein is positive. “I like it because it's laid back,” Hardman said. “It's military – the buildings are square – but there are palm trees. I would love to get a billet here.”

Being one of only eight female officers onboard the *Lake Erie*

doesn't faze Hardman. “I've been in a guy's world for the last three years – I'm one of the guys.” Her free time is spent keeping up with studying as she strives to become an aircraft commander.

Lake Erie's crew members found an outlet from their everyday stresses in the form of activities organized by Community Services such as beach volleyball, basketball and flag football. There was also a snorkeling excursion to the *Prinz Eugen*, and a barbecue that rounded out the day.


“Talking to the MWR officer of the *Lake Erie*, the sailors thoroughly enjoyed their short stay on Kwajalein,” Torrey Landers, manager of Recreation Activities said. “There were 200 plus that attended the barbecue so the rainy evening didn't dampen the festivities.”

While in port, the ship's crew stocked up on Kwajalein Yacht Club and Kwajalein Scuba Club merchandise and the Wrecks of Kwajalein Atoll DVDs. According to Paul Divinski, retail manager, Merchandising and Provisioning, the sailors also bought snacks, snorkeling gear and loosed clothing and accessories.

Denice Robertson, port agent for the Port of Kwajalein, served as liaison between the *Lake Erie* and organizations on Kwajalein.

According to Robertson, the captain relayed that the crew enjoyed the friendliness of the residents of Kwajalein and offered positive comments about the crew's experience here.

“They went away wishing they could have stayed longer to learn and see more,” Robertson said.

NASA/EQUIS launch second phase of

NASA prepares to launch another round of scientific packages that will contain some similar science sky-dye experiments that measure the ionosphere, but this time it will be in the “E” region of space.

NASA Goddard Space Flight Center’s principal investigator, Dr. Robert Pfaff’s experiment is designed to measure the density of the ionosphere. His experiment is deployed from the nose of the rocket.

The scientific experiments conducted by Pfaff, along with Dr. Lynette Gelinias, a research associate from Cornell University, consist of a chemical release payload or sky-dye similar to the Hysell experiments, which were launched in August.

Pfaff’s experiments deploy when the launch vehicle reaches the correct altitude, the nose cone falls away and four booms are released, similar to umbrella spokes.

The Gelinias experiment-payload, when released into the atmosphere, will produce a milky-white glowing cloud and will be visible for about 10-30 minutes.

The glowing cloud is from a substance similar to kerosene, which burns slowly and produces a milky-white cloud as it burns and breaks down into harmless components of aluminum oxide, carbon dioxide and water vapor.

According to Pfaff, all they need is clear nighttime skies and ALTAIR.

The missions will be night launches and the chemical release will track the winds in the ionosphere storms. The launch window opens on Sept. 3 and will remain open until the end of September.

Pfaff said the reason for multiple payloads that gather the same data is “to gain confidence in our interpretation.”

The next round of NASA Wallop payloads will release

lower than the Hysell mission payloads, which released in the “F” region of the ionosphere, about 160 miles in space. The Pfaff/Gelinias payloads release at around 78-miles in space.

The scientists will be looking at the elements that make up the ionosphere such as the composition, electronic field, pressure and winds using both the Pfaff and Gelinias experiments.

Pfaff said they will be looking at the “complex picture of the unstable ionosphere” and the turbulence.

Dr. Rebecca Bishop of Aerospace Corporation said they also want to look at “how it changes.”

Pfaff added, “[and] why this happens.”

Dr. Miguel Larson professor at Clemson University Department of Physics, chief scientist for the cam-

campaign, said they want to know “what it is that creates [ionosphere storms].”

Larson said the ionosphere currents are more focused at the magnetic equator and the physical equator and Kwajalein Atoll is close to both.

Larson said that is what makes Kwajalein Atoll, “a unique location.”

He added there is only one other place that has all the same

elements as the Kwajalein Atoll and that is Peru.

Larson added that ALTAIR is a big advantage. It can slice through the ionosphere.

“ALTAIR helps to locate and see what the rocket is launched into,” Larson said.

He explained the ionosphere is made up of layers and each layer has different density and electrical ranges.

Storms in the ionosphere disrupt communications and part of the EQUatorial Ionospheric Study mission is to find out how to prevent the communication disruptions by determining just what the storms are made of and how they act. The experiments also will improve the ability to track objects in space because ionospheric storms can cause incorrect readings on objects traveling through space.

The experiments help to find out a “means for dealing

with it," Larson said. "What causes the disturbance and how to deal with it?"

He added radars only give part of the picture, as to what is happening in space, but by sending data-collecting instruments to space they can get the other part of the picture.

According to Betty Flowers, public affairs specialist, NASA Wallops Flight Facility, Wallops Island, Va., the EQUIS II campaign was originally scheduled for Peru but due to security and safety issues, it was postponed for a year and brought to Kwajalein Atoll. In 1998, similar science packet experiments were launched from Peru and even though the project was a success and a tremendous amount of data was collected, it left some questions unanswered.

Larson said the scientists from Clemson University, Cornell University, Penn State and Utah State wrote

a proposal to NASA, built the payloads, tested them at the Wallops facility and then shipped them to the location from which they will be deployed.

The packages were then reassembled and put on the launch vehicle supplied by NASA.

Larson said, "It answered one question, but created more."

The EQUIS II project is being conducted under the Sounding Rocket Program, which is managed at Wallops for NASA's Office of Science, Washington, D.C. Approximately 125 people from the NASA Wal-

lops Flight Facility and the scientific community will be involved in the campaign.

There will also be volunteers on Roi-Namur, Likiep, Rongelap and Bikini photographing the sky-dye results. The data analysis will begin immediately and a workshop will be held in March to discuss findings.



Worthy crew learns firefighting first-hand

On Monday at the south end of the island, the Marine department joined the Fire department for first-of-its-kind shipboard firefighting training. Teams of two instructors and two crew members watched fires develop from the inside as trailer structures were set ablaze.

Trainees then employed methods learned Saturday in the classroom to control heat, ventilate and extinguish the fires. In total, two trailers were burnt in the course of eight evolutions.

Training in this area allows the *Worthy's* eight-member crew to maintain their competency in firefighting skills, according to Mitch Stanaland, assistant chief of the Fire department. For training, structure fires take the place of shipboard fires, which are not feasible.

"This was an absolute success," Stanaland, said. "These guys showed enthusiasm and zeal. They were superb. They train well and work well together as a team. They meshed with our crews as if they'd done this before."

There was no cost associated

"The training was what I expected and more," said Jeff Rogers, Wor-

thy captain. "There's a big difference between training and training with a live fire. Now the crew knows what to expect. We can only hope for more training in the future. I thank the Fire department for all their excellent support."
