Kwajalein 'family' pulls together when tragedy strikes

For all you people who are new to Kwaj, I'd like to share some valuable information from an "old timer." I want to give you an idea of what to expect from our community, when an emergency or tragedy strikes.

In Hawaiian, "Ohana," means family. But not necessarily just blood relatives. It can also involve any group of people with a spiritual/emotional bond sharing common goals. Kwajalein has such an ohana.

Many times I have described Kwaj as a "small town with big city people." "Big city" tends to carry an impersonal, uncaring negative connotation. And with different contractors and groups of people working here, it can seem like a big city. Whereas "small town", gives the opposite impression.

I have also called Kwaj a family business. There are many Kwaj Kids who are now back on island as adults with very important jobs. More importantly, they remember how close the community was back then and how everyone looked after one another in times of need. There



will come a day when tragedy will strike. And it never happens on a convenient day of the week.

As a former employee of Continental Travel, we were used to having someone come into the office frantic, trying to get off the island. They wouldn't have a clue of what to do, who to ask for or what paperwork to fill out. And then, who gets all this stuff and who pays for it? Now it was my turn to have a family medical emergency.

Recently, my wife discovered she had lumps in her breast and was sent to Hawaii for biopsy surgery. She was informed that she had breast cancer and was in need of immediate medical attention. I was here waiting to hear that everything was fine and she would be home next week. That didn't happen. Here's

what happened...

I knew I had to make a few phone calls: travel, medical, legal. The hospital already knew what was going on and everything that needed to be done, was. I called Continental Travel, they had me done in about five minutes. Sometimes, they know what's going on before you even call. Had to call legal at USAKA for power of attorney papers; my older son was going to stay with friends. That took about 20 minutes; no sweat. Then a call to KRS Travel for travel orders. Those were being done while I was at USAKA. Next was a call to the chapel, I needed all the help I could get. Within five minutes, half the island knew what was going on. Prayer and rosary groups were organized. A prayer quilt was set up and the calls from well-wishers of concern and support started to flood in. A food schedule and phone tree was being set up for our return. People from support groups began explaining what to expect and not to be afraid to ask for help. I was overwhelmed by just the amount of support and



Hospital technology upgrade proceeds

The second stage of teleradiology, the Picture Archival Communications System, is up and running at Kwajalein Hospital. The first stage, the Computed Radiography Unit, was installed last January and allowed for charged plate X-rays to be taken instead of film. However, with the final stage of the PACS now installed Radiology Associates in Honolulu receives the digital

X-rays in five to 30 minutes, can read the X-rays and get the results back to the Kwajalein doctors in about 48 hours. This new system speeds up the time factor for the X-rays to be read and the results to the physician on Kwaj, the old film method took around two weeks for the physicians to get the results back.

The new completed system also allows physicians on Kwajalein to access the images on the computers in their offices.

The system includes two high-resolution workstations, which allow for greater image detail. One is located in the Imaging Department and the other workstation is located in the physician's conference room.

The Computed Radiography unit allows the technician to choose which body part is being X-rayed, will read the charged plate, erase it and then recharge the plate for another use.

Nancy Barge, Imaging Department manager, said this will eliminate the paper files and

since everything can be stored electronically, it will be easier to access. If a patient needs to hand carry an X-ray with them, then they also have the capability to put the data on a compact disc or floppy disk. According to Barge, with electronic X-rays it speeds up the entire process, from actually taking the X-rays to reading them.

"We have been working on this for

three years," Barge said. "It is a huge improvement in patient care."

Barge said the new system covers standard X-rays and ultrasound but does not cover mammography.

Trailer resident Gary Metzger, systems operation and maintenance manager for instrumentation is among those headed for new quarters.

According to Jim Wiggins, KRS engineering and planning manager, the new homes, which will be built by Domes International, Inc., will start at the east end of North Point and work westerly. Under the current contract for seven units, five will be 1200-square-foot two-bedroom homes and two will be 1350-square-foot three-bedroom homes. A total of sixteen homes are planned.

"We received special congressional funding to build dome homes, which helps us in our efforts in replacing our current deteriorating housing assets for both unaccompanied personnel housing and unaccompanied personnel," said Kelly Busquets, USAKA Directorate of Public Works. "The near-term goal is to move all families out of trailers. The long-term goal is to eventually replace all trailers, not necessarily with domes, but with some type of more adequate housing," Busquets added.

Metzger said what he'll miss most about North Point is, "the quiet and the view."

USAKA document for environmental protection

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require that the operating parameters of USAKA activities, with the potential to affect the public health and environment, must be defined in a Document of Environmental Protection. The Standards further provide that regulatory agencies and the public be allowed to review and comment on the draft DEP.

A draft DEP was developed by USAKA for the Protection of Cultural Resources. This DEP provides guidelines for cultural resource protection during ongoing operations, maintenance, and mission activities at USAKA. This document also outlines the cultural resource consultation procedures.

The public is invited to review and comment on

this Draft DEP. Both the Draft DEP, and the USAKA Environmental Standards are available for review at the Grace Sherwood Library, the Roi-Namur Library, and the Alele Museum and Library. 


