

The following letter is a response from Maj. David Coffey, Chief, Host Nation office.

I do not disagree with Helmer at all. Helmer is a great employee and I regret any inconvenience to him because of the new access changes. Unfortunately USAKA has to follow the same regulations as the rest of the Army and USAKA needs to address the epidemic of alcohol abuse that is now occurring. I have a letter of termination on my desk that I must deliver to a long-time RMI employee. By all accounts he has performed admirably on the job, but his after-work activities have resulted in a one-year bar and his office cannot wait that long for him to come back. I have delivered too many of these letters recently and I am concerned about the economic impact to USAKA and the social and economic impact to the families on Ebeye. Alcohol abuse has steadily increased since the one-hour pad was increased to three hours in 2001 and we are hoping that reverting to the one-hour pad and the other policies we are implementing will arrest the problem and send the message that we care about our RMI employees.

Concern over firefighter readiness

I have noticed the firemen no longer drive their fire truck to the Café Pacific. The firemen are our first responders to serious problems. Having their truck close by has given me assurance that their response time in an emergency situation is minimal. Does the van they drive now in place of the fire truck carry all the required personal protective equipment required so they can respond effectively to help the community and our temporary duty guests? Do they have emergency care equipment onboard? How about blood pressure cuff, oxygen equipment and masks, and a portable defibrillator? I asked and they don't. People are very critical of response time. When they find out the firemen were on a meal break and they had to go back to the station before

they could respond, it exposes the company to further liability. It is not too late to fix this problem before someone pays the consequence. The unfortunate reality is that many people die from a heart attack before ever reaching the hospital. Think about it, lives and liability or is it fuel that we are really worried about?

The following letter is a response from Les Jones, USAKA/RTS deputy commander.

COL Beverly Stipe, USAKA/RTS commander, directed KRS to implement a policy in which on-duty firefighters leave their mobile fire-fighting apparatus and ambulance at the fire station when going to the dining facility. As a result, a schedule was designed that ensures the highest possible levels of service are maintained within that mandate.

The plan actually results in minimizing the number of firefighters away from the fire station at any one time during meal periods.

By limiting the number of firefighters at the dining facility to only one crew at a time, a full crew is always available to respond directly from the station, for both structural fire and aircraft emergencies.

With more firefighters in the firehouse, response times from the station are kept more consistent.

By rotating crews, someone is assigned to the ambulance in the station at all times. Therefore, in the event of a medical emergency, the ambulance will respond from the firehouse; much like it does during most of the day.

The policy does not stop KRS from meeting its contractual obligations as required by Army Regulations or Department of Defense instructions.

No infringement of emergency response times allowable within standards will occur as a result of this policy.

The USAKA community can rest assured that we'll continue to benefit from emergency response capabilities that are maintained above those available at other Army installations or similar stateside communities.

Polynesian entertainers light up Emon Beach with energy

Fenua ote Ora, a professional company of Polynesian entertainers, opened with a bang Sunday night at Emon Beach performing a Tahitian otea, or drum number for a crowd of more than 800.

Dancers and musicians wowed the crowd with a taste of Tahitian, Hawaiian and Samoan cultures through hula, slap, warrior and fire knife dances. New Zealand was also represented through poi ball dances called maori.

Though new to the audience as a group, three of Fenua ote Ora's 10 members were part of Tamariki Porinetia, a group that visited Kwajalein for the 2002 New Year's Eve celebration.

"We've grown," said Kaipolani Barros, director, who explained that the group's former Tahitian name meant "children of

Polynesia" and current name means "life of the land."

According to their literature, the group's goal is to perpetuate the spirit of their ancestors through the sharing of their cultures and dances.

"We jump at any opportunity to dance," Lama Kihoi, entertainer, said. Kihoi is one of two flight attendants in the group. Other members include a full-time musician, secretary, retail worker and student.

"We love Polynesian dance and want to bring that to others - that's what makes it worthwhile for us," Barros said. She explained that all have been dancing since they were young and simply grew up with it. Kihoi is actually one of Barros' former students.

Based out of Honolulu, the group is on a 17-day Armed Forces Entertainment tour that will take them from Kwajalein to Guam, Singapore and on to Diego Garcia.

Let's get cooking! Twenty-one contestants vie for cook-off crown

The sun wasn't the only thing providing heat on Roi-Namur Sunday. There were 21 containers of bubbling, spicy chili that upped the temperatures a notch or two for the 55 judges in the 5th Annual Roi-Namur Chili Cook-Off.

The cook-off and activities brought in \$9,689 for the Ennubirr Children's Christmas Fund.

John Tompkins, a two-time cook-off entrant took top honors in the heated chefs' battle. Floyd Corder came in second and Bob DeJoie was third.

Joe Coleman, Ennubirr Children's Christmas Fund president, was the man in charge on Sunday. He said the proceeds will buy presents for children. He said they mainly buy food stuffs, clothing and essentials for the children on Ennubirr and this money will help 310 young people age 12 and under. The organization will begin researching and purchasing items in the next week and hope to have everything bought by the end of the month.

While chili was the theme for the day, there were also booths with artwork, T-shirts and souvenirs for sale as well as a booth where temporary Henna tattoos were artfully drawn on customers' skin. The Boy Scout Troop 314 spent the weekend on Roi and assisted in the cook-off by dishing up the chili. The Scouts go camping about once a month, according to Capt. Mike Russell, assistant troop leader.

Big money was brought in by the pie-in-the-face raffle. Would-be throwers combined financial resources to up the ante. In the past individuals bid against one another, but this year it wasn't so much of a raffle as a put-money-in-a-pot. People liked the idea and were quickly emptying their wallets and pockets to raise the totals skyward. Eleven people got pies in their faces, raising \$5,492. Jeff DeLong was top candidate with \$1,500 collected by a group who each got a tin of whipped cream to smear in his face and on his head.

Mmm, mmm good - it's chili time

It takes more than a big pot and patience to make award-winning chili. Chili is a personal dish, and there isn't a set way to make a good pot. Making chili is serious business to a bunch of people; there's even an International Chili Society and a World Championship Chili Cook-off.

John Tompkins, this year's king of chili at the Roi-Namur cook-off, may not be a globe-trotting contestant, but he does take great pride in the chili he serves.

"I like the taste of salsa," he said, explaining the base ingredient in his chili. "I like to make my chili so it tastes like salsa."

He said he doesn't use beef in the mix, but prefers pork. "I use ground pork," he said. Chili connoisseurs will admit that the right chili peppers make the difference. Tompkins said he searches for

good Jalapeños at Surfway, often grabbing up the choice produce and leaving little behind for others. He roasts his chilies and freezes them, along with the garlic he uses. "Freezing the garlic crystallizes it," he said.

The heat in his chili comes from the Jalapeños, fresh ground pepper from Pohnpei and chili powder. He also uses cumin and cheddar cheese.

Tompkins stresses the importance of fresh, quality ingredients. The last factor in good chili is patience; you have to cook it for days to get the right flavor. Tompkins' chili cooks down and in all, the process takes about five days.

He admits that many people taste his chili and say it's good, but he's not convinced he's hit the right combination until his toughest judge, his wife, Annie likes it. "It doesn't matter what anyone else says about my chili, when she says it's good then I am satisfied," he said.

Students learn sea turtle care at turtle pond

When the classroom meets the outside world, learning takes on a whole new meaning. Just ask students in Eric Nelson's marine biology class, who recently began working with the endangered species at the turtle pond.

Nelson, Kwajalein junior/senior high school science teacher, is working with USAKA and KRS Environmental Safety and Health on a multi-year-long effort in which high school students assist with the care and maintenance of the turtle pond.

Students' efforts at the pond are geared toward identifying what's in the water, monitoring the health of the pond's seven turtles and taking measurements, removing parasites and keeping a database of information. According to Nelson, the high school's advanced-placement statistics class will 'crunch the numbers' for the database.

"This is a teacher's dream to have hands-on with turtles and give the kids an opportunity to work with an endangered species," Nelson said, adding that this type of experience is something unique that they can put on a resume.

According to Norm Black, Environmental, Safety and Health manager, the turtles at the pond are there for educational purposes and this project is part of an effort by KRS to get the kids involved.

"Kids schooled here need to understand the area and help take care of the environment we live in," Black said. "We need ways to train people what the flora and fauna of this part of the world is about."

On Wednesday, Dr. Bob Morris, a veterinarian, made his annual visit to the pond to evaluate the health of the turtles. Morris works with turtles in Honolulu for the National Marine Fishery Service.

With the help of Nelson's thirteen students

and ES&H staff, Morris weighed, measured and cleaned the turtles, using the microchips implanted last year into their ears to identify them. Margaret Morrison of Kwajalein's veterinary clinic assisted Morris in taking the turtles' blood.

"It's kinda nice to know you're making a difference," Ashley DeLong, high school junior said. She added that her interest is in the project as a whole and that she has never done anything like this.

Nelson said that innovative ways of weighing the turtles are being looked at so that the class could safely do so, possibly using a hammock and spring scale.

Projects in the works by students in Nelson's other classes include a plant guide to

Kwajalein, which is now being written by his biology class. Nelson is also talking with ES&H about the possibility of harvesting (raising giant) clams, which are another endangered species.

"Kwajalein is such a neat place to live - I came here because of the environment," Nelson said. "Every kid leaving this island should leave knowing the plants and animals around the Marshall Islands," Nelson said. "In teaching them, maybe we create a scientist."

Domestic worker access explained

The C-Badge, K-Badge, escorted and unescorted questions are still buzzing around the island. One issue of special concern is how do the Phase I and Phase II changes to the Access Badge Program affect domestic workers.

Maj. David Coffey, chief U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nations, defined how the Monday midnight Phase I implementation affects domestic workers.

"All domestic work is supposed to be done under the umbrella of a Domestic Contract," he said.


This is a simple form that can be obtained at the Host Nation Office on the second floor of Building 901.

"Filling out this contract allows the hours of the contract to be entered into the electronic badging

system database and the worker will then have one hour after that contract time expires to get to the DSC [dock security checkpoint]," he explained.

"Domestic contracts have always been required, but many people neglected to fill out the forms while the three hour after work pad was in place. Those who contract for domestic work should not pad their time on the contract. They will be held responsible for the actions of the domestic worker on the contract whether that person is actually doing yard work or not," Coffey said. "Contracts should cover only the amount of time the employee is actually going to do work for you."

Data collection on sub-orbital rocket launch is successful

Payload included reentry vehicle, missile defense related experiments

The Missile Defense Agency and the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command announced the successful launch of a sub-orbital rocket with extensive data collection as part of the Critical Measurements Program, or CMP. The flight test took place Wednesday, over the mid-Pacific

Ocean.

The missile, powered by a Castor IVB rocket motor produced by ATK/ Thiokol, was launched from Wake Island into the U.S. Army Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site, or RTS.

The payload included a reentry vehicle, a number of missile defense related experiments, and a Fly Away Sensor Package, as part of a mission designed to collect radar and optical data addressing critical system level issues for missile defense elements.

This data will be used in the

design of missile defense interceptor and sensor systems.

Previous CMP campaigns have provided data immediately useful to Ballistic Missile Defense Elements, including THAAD, Patriot, and Aegis.

During the mission, from lift-off through atmospheric reentry, extensive optical and radar data were collected on the missile and payloads.

In addition to the RTS radars and the FASP, numerous surface and airborne sensors also collected data.

DoD identifies Army casualty

The Department of Defense announced today the death of a soldier who was supporting Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Sgt. Skipper Soram, 23, of Kolonia Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia, died Sept. 22 in Baghdad, Iraq, when a vehicle-based improvised explosive device detonated near his security post. Soram was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 82nd Field Artillery Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

The incident is under investigation.

Mission scheduled Thursday





Injury reports vital

Safety is every resident's responsibility

Reporting of safety concerns, potential accident situations, accidents, illness or property damage is the responsibility of all Kwajalein Atoll residents.

According to Norm Black, Environmental Safety and Health manager, "we report and investigate accidents so we know who does what by when so the accident is not repeated." The purpose of SPI 1394 is to establish policies and requirements with respect to reporting and investigating occupational injuries, illnesses and non-occupational injuries involving KRS employees, KRS teaming subcontractor employees, other subcontractor employees, KRS vendor or supplier employees and personnel and/or members of the general public. It also covers government vehicles, equipment and facility property damage, near-miss events that could have resulted in

personal injury or illness and/or property damage.

An important part of the SPI is the "0-60" minute notification of an accident or injury.

"This is an issue that must be followed so the proper notifications are made and corrective actions are established," Black said.

The SPI states KRS is committed to instituting an effective and efficient accident prevention program that includes immediate notification of incidents and complete incident investigations that drive corrective measures. This will ensure incidents are not likely to be repeated. Notification to the supervisor that an accident has occurred is mandatory and SPI 0112, Employee Conduct and Corrective/Disciplinary Actions, dictates this responsibility.

Accident/incident investigation is a crucial part of establishing continuous improvement in safety performance and helping reach KRS's goal of "Zero Accidents." The pur-

pose of any accident investigation is to determine the root causes of the accident. This information can then be used to prevent similar accidents from occurring. Accident investigation is concerned with establishing facts not determining fault.

Black added another area of concern is completion of the incident investigation by the immediate supervisor within five days of the incident.

The SPI includes requirements that each supervisor must conduct an incident/injury investigation and forward the findings and corrective actions to Environmental Safety and Health Department and Risk Management within five days.

There are also very specific requirements a manager, supervisor or lead must follow in regards to an accident, injury or illness. They are required to go to the hospital with, or immediately follow the employee to assist medical personnel with information what may have contributed to the injury or illness.
