Throw, glaze, bake

Two new kilns now ready for use in Hobby Shop

There are now two new kilns in the Pottery Shop, making the production of ceramic and pottery more efficient.

Andee Cristie, Hobby Shop coordinator, said the new kilns are ready for use.

"The other [replaced] kilns were getting old, the new ones are more efficient," she said. While the new kilns won't bake any more pottery during a cycle, they will require less manpower.

"We had to come in and check on the other kilns," Cristie said. Someone had to come to the shop and physically put the kilns on hold during the cycle. The new kilns are programmed to be push button, once the cycle has begun it continues automatically with intervention.

According to Cristie

there are close to ten people who use the Pottery Shop regularly, but she is hopeful that new kilns will attract more pottery enthusiasts.

Making hand-thrown pottery takes more than artistic talent; it also requires patience. After the object is thrown, it must dry in the dry box for seven days.

Next step is to glaze the product and then fire it. The firing time, at temperatures of 2,000 degrees or more, is approximately 18 hours.

The shop is open from 12:30 to 5 p.m., Wednesdays through Fridays; from 9 a.m. to noon and then 12:30 to 5:30 p.m. on Saturdays and from 12:30 to 6 p.m. on Sundays, Mondays and holidays.

There are a variety of classes available through community activities or community education.

Saddle up

Kids learn rules of road at KPD's bike rodeo

Figure eights and u-turns were a few of the challenges presented to a posse of young riders Monday on 7th street as approximately 50 participants mounted bicycles to test their safety skills at the bike rodeo.

The rodeo's main attraction was a skills course featuring seven obstacles including yielding, braking and weaving in and out of cones. At designated points along the course, left turn, right turn and stop arm signals were required.

"Some kids went through five or six times," Lt. Jeff Mullin, KPD operations and event chair said.

One section of the course challenged riders to maintain balance within straight lines, while others tested control. Throughout the course, officers strode alongside participants to encourage and instruct when and where to look for possible oncoming traffic.

"With all the bikes in the community, there are near misses and small collisions on a daily basis," Mullin said. Adding to the problem, he said, is the fact that kids don't always signal, cut across the road and cut corners and generally don't look before they act.

"If we catch them young, maybe we can influence them," Mullin said.

All who completed the course were invited to select both large and small prizes donated by Macy's and the KRS Environmental Safety

and Health department. Prizes included bike helmets, flashlights, water jugs, t-shirts, and bike horns as well as pencils and rulers.

Bicycle safety inspections were also conducted at the rodeo to check brakes, frame and fit, air and wheels, chain and handle bars. Boy Scout Troop 135 assisted with inspections and taught basic tire repair as they worked toward their bicycling belt loops.

More than 15 volunteers helped to make the KPD-sponsored event possible, with fire department representatives on hand to provide first aid and teach safety.

Hot dogs, chips, doughnuts and refreshments were enjoyed by families under tents made available by Community Services, who also provided a

grill and chalk roller used to outline the course.

"Everyone asked came through," Mullin said of organizations asked to donate their time, services and prizes.

The morning's activities concluded with a bike raffle. Winner of a new bicycle was 8-year-old Ethan Frazier. Gift certificates redeemable at Macy's West for new bicycles were won by 5-year-old Cecile Coffey and 8-year-old John Sholar. Bike donations and gift certificates were courtesy of KPD, Sgt. Tony Blackman, KPD trainer and KRS.

"Kwaj is a relaxed environment. A lot of people are aware of bike safety, it's just something that needs to be reinforced," Blackman, who helped organize the event, said.

According to Blackman, KPD intends to build off of this event and improve it for the next time around. Blackman said he feels the kids had a good time and gained a heightened awareness of safety.

"KPD is here and helping - we want kids to see us and not being afraid," Blackman said. "It's also a good way for us to interact with parents - it's a community effort."

You are what you eat

Vending machines carrying healthy snacks now

When you think about putting a couple of quarters and a dime into a vending machine it might be to feed a craving for something yummy. Packaged and displayed in neat little rows behind the clear plastic front are mouth-watering selections filled with chocolate, caramel, nuts and lots of sugar. In the past those foods were considered ideal for snacks, but in today's age of healthy eating and diet consciousness some people are leaning toward snack food that's good to eat and good for you.

Paul Fritz, Retail Services manager for KRS, has responded to the requests from health-conscious customers by adding healthy snacks and drinks to the list of products available in the more than 100 vending machines [both snack and drink] on Kwajalein, Roi-Namur, Meck and Third Island.

"Finding healthy food that people want to buy is a challenge," he said. He added that there has been a small request from the community to have healthy alternatives in the vending machines and that at some locations they sell better than at other locations.

He puts the healthy foods in vending machines where the demand is, such as near the bowling alley and the high school.

Adding healthy foods to vending machines here mirrors action taken across the United States.

Fritz has added several healthy options to the vending machines; the most popular are nutrition and energy bars and tuna/cracker lunch

kits. "We're in the snack business," he said. Packaging is important to vending machine sales; most people buy items that are attractive. "People buy on looks. Packaging makes a big difference," he said. Coming on the next barge will be Crystal Light health drinks joining the already stocked Powerades and C2 coke selections.

Foot care important in hot, humid climate

Lurking in cracks and crevices at the swimming pool, the beach and sometimes even the bathtub are bacteria just waiting for the opportunity to hitch a ride.

Though fungus is among a number of foot ailments experienced by residents, it presents a year-round problem in our tropical environment and is the most common on the island, according to Dr. Lance Ray, M.D.

"We live in a humid, tropical environment and we're in and out of the water often – it's easier for fungus to grow here," said Ray. "Fungal infections can produce cracks in the skin, giving staph and strep an opportunity to get in."

According to Ray, a sign of fungal infection is a red, scaly rash between the toes, or on the soles of feet.

This type of foot problem can be treated with topical creams and if necessary, oral medication. Over-the-counter remedies, such as Tinactin, may be used when needed.

Ray said that the creams must be used for 28 days because it takes that long for the basal layer of the epidermis, home to the fungus, to slough off.

Prevention of fungus is easy and involves common sense. Ray advises wearing flip flops in public areas, such as around the swimming pool. He also recommends keeping feet clean and dry by changing wet socks when necessary, and opting for open-toed shoes whenever possible.

Another preventive measure is to clean the bath tub with diluted bleach, one part bleach to ten parts water. Ray suggests wiping down the shower with a water/bleach solution frequently to prevent the fungus from growing there, especially if someone in the family has an infection.

"Be aware that old shoes could harbor germs," Ray added. "If you have a fungal infection and it gets into the shoe, even if you use cream on your feet, you could get [the infection] back from your shoes." But he explained, "If you don't have an infection, it's probably not a problem."

If left untreated, fungal infection can spread to toe nails, which is a more difficult ailment to treat and has a 50 to 70 percent rate of recurrence even with medication. Signs include thickened, discolored nails. Topical liquid

and oral medications are treatments often used for this condition, according to Ray.

Puncture wounds are also common on Kwajalein, according to Ray, who advises the use of aqua socks while swimming at Emon Beach. Bare feet are at risk of puncture wounds from glass, nails, sticks, rocks and coral. Several people have even stepped on stone fish at Emon, which disguise themselves as rocks.

"Puncture wounds are hard to clean. Bacteria gets pushed in easily," Ray said. "Clean the wound well and watch it closely for at least two days."

At that time, if the wound is tender, red, and draining, it is likely infected and medical treatment should be sought, Ray explained. If no such symptoms occur, the wound may be treated at home.

Corns, plantar warts, and plantar fasciitis are also common foot problems on Kwajalein.


Corns are painful calluses that cause thickened skin and house a hardened piece of dead skin in the center. They can be filed down with an Emory board or treated using corn pads containing salicylic acid.

Plantar warts also cause thickened skin, but with little black dots visible in the center. If the plantar wart is small, topical wart medication may be used. If large, warts may be removed through cryosurgery, in which liquid nitrogen is used to freeze the wart. According to

Ray, cryosurgery is a speedier way to get rid of warts, but usually requires several treatments.

Plantar fasciitis is foot pain often caused by an increase in activity, such as starting a new jogging program, training for a PT test or starting to referee a sport's program without proper stretching. Pain is often experienced on the sole of the foot toward the heel, according to Ray, who calls it an "overuse" condition. Treatment involves reduction in activity and stretching. Anti-inflammatory medication may also be prescribed. Prevention includes simple stretching and warming up prior to activity.

Our environment, and subsequent susceptibility to foot ailments, makes awareness the key to prevention.

Environmental Assessment for Minuteman III modification

The US Air Force (USAF) is proposing modifications to the Minuteman (MM) III Intercontinental Ballistic Missile system to help ensure its long-term safety and reliability. A Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) of these modifications has been prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969 and implementing regulations. The EA analyzes the environmental impacts of (1) MM III missile flight tests using modified Reentry System (RS) hardware/software, in addition to continuing ongoing flight tests; (2) deployment of new and modified RS hardware/software on fielded MM III missiles; and (3) deployment of new command and control console equipment at MM III Launch Control Centers (LCCs). All MM III missile flight tests would be conducted at Vandenberg Air Force Base (AFB), CA, using existing launch facilities. The MM boosters used in the tests would come from operational Launch Facilities (LFs) at the MM Wings (i.e., FE Warren AFB, WY; Malmstrom AFB, MT; and Minot AFB, ND). Replacement rocket motors would be supplied by the depot facility at Hill AFB, UT. In addition to the ongoing three to four MM III flight tests conducted every year at Vandenberg, two additional flight tests per year would occur in Fiscal Years 2005 and 2006. At the terminal end of each missile flight, the Reentry Vehicle (RV) simulators would impact near the US Army Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands, in either the open ocean, the atoll lagoon, or the vicinity of

Illeginni Island. Beginning in 2006, RS modification kits would be installed on the MM III missiles at each LF within the three Wings. During this process, existing Mark 21 RVs would be deployed on select missiles, in addition to removal of the older Mark 12 RVs. Related personnel trainer/support equipment would also be deployed at the Wing support bases and at other locations. Lastly, at all of the MM III LCCs within the three Wings and at other trainer/support locations, new command and control console equipment would replace older equipment. Based on this analysis, the USAF has determined that the proposed activities are not expected to result in any significant impacts to the environment. Beginning on October 15, 2004, the Draft EA and Draft Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) will be available to the public for a 15-day review period. Both documents are available over the Internet at <http://ax.losangeles.af.mil/axf> (under "announcements"), and at the following locations: Alele Museum, Library, and National Archives; Grace Sherwood Library; and the Roi-Namur Library. 

Thinking of them

Kwajalein residents serving in Iraq War

Bob Tucker and Maj. Robert Magnuson are among those who left the comforts of home on Kwajalein to fight the war on terror in the dusty terrain of Iraq where temperatures can soar to over 100 degrees.

In June, Tucker transferred to the Defense Contract Management Agency – International. With duty station in Springfield, Virginia, he now travels to Iraq several times a year as a property administrator with DCMA-I supporting the Logistics Civilian Augmentation Program, for which Kellogg Brown and Root is the contractor.

Tucker, former USAKA property administrator, was instrumental in obtaining items for Kwajalein from Johnston Island when it closed.

“Lois and I miss our friends in Kwaj,” Tucker said. “It was good to see that many of the items that we brought from Johnston Island are being used at Kwaj [such as] the Laser sailboats, pontoon boats and twin vees. These are things that we did not have the money to buy and should be put to good use at USAKA.”

Magnuson was activated on Jan. 9 by his reserve unit, the 2d Legal Support Organization, 90th Regional Readiness Command and was cross-leveled into the III Corps Office of the Staff Judge Advocate (Forward), named Multi National Corps - Iraq.


He is currently based at Camp Victory in Baghdad and is expected to return to his position on Kwajalein in January as deputy command counsel after his tour in Iraq.

When asked how he feels about serving right now, Magnuson said, “It is a great honor to serve our country during this time of crisis.”

According to Magnuson, Iraq is a country in flux from a political viewpoint, but there are good things happening there that the media rarely publicizes.

“The news organizations focus on the atrocities, car bombings, beheadings, and hostage taking committed by the anti-Iraqi forces, and the combat operations in the cities where larger numbers of anti-Iraqi forces hide and try and intimidate the local populace. These do happen and deserve to be publicized,” Magnuson said. “However, there are also many positive developments. Most areas of Iraq are calm. Electricity and other basic services and infrastructure are at their pre-war or higher levels. The Iraqi economy is slowly growing, and people are able to return to work or find work.”

Magnuson carries with him a vivid picture of Kwajalein and said he

thinks daily of this place and cannot wait to get back to the normal quietness of our great island.

“I look forward to trading Iraqi dust for Kwaj coral dust, Iraqi date palm trees for Kwaj coconut palms, Iraqi brown haze and cloudless skies for Kwaj blue skies and white fluffy clouds and Iraqi brown dirty water for the beautiful navy of the Pacific and the multi-hue green of the lagoon at Kwaj,” Magnuson said.
