# It's our job to keep terrorists guessing

Sitting one row behind me next to the window, she blended in with the other travelers, casually dressed in jeans and a long-sleeved white shirt layered under a pink short-sleeved shirt.

We, and about 150 other airline passengers, were leaving Detroit for a long flight to Amsterdam. She carried a book, "My Greatest Mistake," and a diamond stud shimmered from the top of her left earlobe. She was obviously a 20-something-year-old American with a round face and long California-blond hair, but I would have never guessed she was military.

As it turned out, I didn't need to guess. Within minutes after takeoff, she was telling her neighbor, a blond man who spoke with a heavy accent, all about her destination -- Aviano Air Base, Italy.

Granted, her neighbor had asked where she was going. But instead of giving a safe, generic answer, she went into a great detail about her job, about her enlistment, about the base and local villages. She shared her feelings of being stationed overseas. The man seemed impressed by her excitement.

I doubt she ever had heard the name of Petty Officer Robert Dean Stethem, but she could learn from the incident to which his name is forever tied.



Terrorists hijacked TWA Flight 847 as it left Athens, Greece, for Rome June 14, 1985. Stethem was onboard. He was a 23-year-old U.S. Navy underwater construction diver returning from a diving school in Greece. He sat in the window seat in the last row on the left side of the plane, next to Clinton Suggs, one of his diving buddies.

A few minutes after takeoff, terrorists ran down the aisles, brandishing weapons and demanding all passports and identification. Unfortunately, Stethem and Suggs had only their military identification cards.

According to court documents, Stethem hesitated handing it over, but the terrorists demanded the cards. Stethem, Suggs and a few other military members were then rounded up and taken to first class.

What followed was a 15-hour ordeal as the airliner was flown to Beirut, Lebanon, then to Algiers, Algeria, then back to Beirut. During this time, Stethem was brutally tortured with pistols and an armrest. Kenneth Bowen, another diver held captive, later testified that Stethem received most of the torture.

Things took a turn for the worse during the second stop in Beirut.

When terrorists were unable to negotiate for a refueling truck, they dragged Stethem to the front of the plane and shot him. The terrorists then opened the door of the plane, and as media camer-

as focused on the open door, they shot Stethem again and dumped his body on the tarmac. Stethem remained alive for a few minutes after being shot and thrown, and then died from his wounds.

The image of the terrorists standing at the open door, with Stethem's blood smeared on the outside of the plane was published repeatedly on television and in newspapers. It became a symbol of the turbulent political relations between America and the Middle East during the 1980s. The terrorists were from the Middle East, and one of the many reasons they targeted Stethem was because he was U.S. military.

Though this specific incident happened nearly 20 years ago, consider the similarities. Tensions between the American military and the Middle East are high right now. As recently as last month, terrorist groups made threats against Italy and the Italian government.

What if the blond man with the heavy accent had been a terrorist supporter? Or what if, in an effort to save his own life during a hijacking, he pointed the young woman out as U.S. military? What if someone overheard her details about Aviano and took that information to a terrorist group? What if someone was trying to find out if the Amsterdam airport gets a lot of American military traffic? What if someone at the airport saw her Air Force bag and decided to make her a target?

We can't always predict a terrorist's action, but we can protect ourselves to the best of our abilities by not revealing information about our jobs, the military, reasons for travel or other information. We should always keep them guessing.



# Iraq prime minister looks toward future

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20, 2004 – Looking forward to nationwide elections slated in January, interim Iraqi Prime Minister Ayad Allawi cited in recent remarks the “large strides” his country has made since the April 9, 2003, fall of Saddam Hussein’s regime.

Iraqi government-sponsored programs to provide jobs, housing, electricity, water and more to citizens are all bearing fruit, Allawi noted during an Oct. 18 news conference in Baghdad.

“The government has ambitious plans to develop the economy and rebuild the country,” Allawi reported. But those plans, he said, depend “on the improvement of the security situation, which is still an obstacle to large progress in the Iraqi economy.”

Saddam’s “crimes and destruction,” the prime minister explained, “are still casting their shadow on our country in terms of violence, distain of the citizens’ rights, disrespect for the law, and spread of corruption.”

And current security, political and economic issues “undoubtedly” affect Iraq’s march toward a democratic government, Allawi acknowledged.

Iraq is now experiencing “three interlinked types of terrorism,” Allawi observed. These, he said, include kidnappings and corruption of officials; vandalism targeting infrastructure and attacks aimed at government entities like the police and National Guard; and foreign-

planned terrorist acts that seek to sow fear and unease throughout the country.

Yet, Allawi expressed his confidence that Iraq’s police and National Guard forces “will defeat the terrorists who are harming Iraq’s security and the safety of its citizens.”

The capabilities of Iraqi police and Guardsmen are being boosted, Allawi noted, while “providing them with the necessary combat equipment.” The prime minister said he also meets daily with other senior government officials to discuss methods “to expedite the training of these forces.”

The prime minister envisions the day when “Iraqi policemen maintain security in the streets instead of the multinational forces.” Allawi also extended his thanks to the more than 30 coalition members “for their contributions and commitments toward our country and the sacrifices they make toward this end.”

Allawi predicted: “The day will come, God willing, when the Iraqi Army will protect our borders while the National Guard will provide security for cities, and the police will maintain order and security and ensure the supremacy of law.”

But for now, the prime minister acknowledged, Iraq “will require the assistance of the multinational forces” to defeat the terrorists.

Allawi said he couldn’t say when multinational troops will leave Iraq, because “this is linked to the security situation and the threat the terrorists pose to the safety of our country and people.”

The interim government, Allawi declared, “remains committed” to

holding the general elections in January. Those elections, he emphasized, “will be an important step in the history of our country and in our ability to forge ahead with our democratic process and maintain the unity of Iraq.”

An initiative to coax Sadr City residents in Baghdad to turn in their weapons is off to “a good start,” Allawi reported, with thousands of weapons and explosives collected. The success of that operation in Sadr City, he said, caused its being extended to Oct. 21.

“I call on all the people of al-Sadr City to surrender the weapons they have before the deadline ends, because this is the last extension,” Allawi pointed out. Afterward, unlicensed weapons will be confiscated, he said, and their owners will be punished according to the law.

“This will also happen in other parts of Iraq,” Allawi reported, noting the weapons turn-in initiative will soon be offered in Basra and other Iraqi cities. Such disarmament programs, he noted, “are part of the preparations for the upcoming elections.”

After the January elections, a newly elected Iraqi government and National Assembly, Allawi explained, “will have the duty of drafting a permanent constitution for the country and reviewing laws.”

At that time “the mission of the interim government will then end, and an authority that is democratically elected will assume power in Iraq,” Allawi said.

“It will be a historic moment in which we can take pride, God willing,” the prime minister concluded.

# You've got mail

## Post Office strives to meet needs of island

In most U.S. post offices the busy season is from Nov. 15 or so until the New Year when friends and family members send off and receive holiday packages.

The time of postal frenzy on Kwajalein doesn't coincide with holiday gift giving, but with annual leave when people send packages back to the island from the vacation shopping sprees, according to Karla Long, postmaster. During summer months the post office is hit the hardest, receiving a higher percentage of packages than in other seasons.

But even during low periods, getting your mail is unpredictable and takes what seems to be an inordinate amount of time.

"We have no control over how long it takes," Long said talking about mail delivery to the atoll.

The mail can become bottlenecked in Hawaii where it is removed from commercial air service and awaits transport via the U.S. Air Force's Air Mobility Command aircraft.

"Everything else takes precedence [over the mail], passengers, cargo, medical supplies," Long said.

She said some aircraft are diverted to support Operation Iraqi Freedom. Another hold-up can be a plane grounded due to mechanical problems. Safety comes first and even if it is a simple malfunction the aircraft might be grounded.

"This is a military installation," she said. Mail is sent through the Army and Air Force Post Office which reduces rates for the customers but can extend

transport time.

Mail arriving from the mainland is sorted by the main Honolulu post office, by the airport, and mail destined for Kwajalein is transported by USPS personnel to the Hickam AMC Cargo terminal, according to Michelle Yamaguchi, Honolulu office manager for KRS.

"It is pretty amazing how quickly it is processed once it arrives in Honolulu, as the main post office handles about 3.5 million pieces of mail daily and ranks among the top districts nationally," Yamaguchi said.

She added that registered mail is sorted before delivery to Hickam and separated from the other mail and packages. There is also space available mail, which is a DoD transportation category for military mail transported to and from overseas bases by air on a space-available basis. SAM parcels are paid at surface postage rates and are airlifted to, from, or between overseas military post offices outside the 48 contiguous states. Per USPS, these parcels must be marked "SAM" above the addressee's name. A package mailed from an APO or FPO outside the 48 contiguous states uses "Package Services limits," which allow weight not more than 70 pounds and the combined length and girth of

a piece not exceeding 108 inches. The most current restrictions should be looked up on the USPS Website.

There is a secured area at Hickam for overseas mail, so KRS personnel do not handle it at all.

AMC personnel are responsible for it once it is delivered to the cargo terminal by USPS, and they load all mail onto standard pallets where it is then weighed and load-planned for airlift to Kwajalein. No mail is currently sent via Continental or Aloha commercial airlift from Hawaii. Mail takes priority over many other types of cargo due to morale issues. Usually several pallets a week move to Kwajalein, but when AMC experiences plane delays the backlog can grow very quickly.



According to Long if this post office didn't fall under the APO system, "we'd be paying international fees [when mailing packages and letters]." International fees for mailing packages are more expensive to the customer than APO fees.

The volume of mail received here is high for the size of the community. In September the post office received 37,458 pounds of mail while 12,947 pounds was mailed from Kwajalein. The reason for the high in-

coming volume is people shop via catalogs and the Internet to supplement the products available on island.

Long and her 13-member staff are dedicated to meeting the needs of their customers. Within two hours after a plane lands the mail pallets have cleared receiving and are at the post office. That's when the real work begins. The typical delivery is around 4,000 pounds and the staff distributes letters and notices to more than 1,300 active post office boxes.


## Helpful mailing hints

While most people send fairly typical items through the mail, that isn't necessarily all that has been received on Kwajalein. Postmaster Karla Long said the strangest thing that's come through since she's worked in the post office was a boat anchor. The anchor wasn't in a box, but had tape wrapped around it to hold the chain in place. The 'to and from' addresses were written on the tape.

### Did you know?

- You can't ship coconuts, aerosol cans, firearms or flammables.
- Can't ship any coral or giant clam shells, even fragments, unless they've been purchased from a store. If you pick them up on the beach you can mail them, but you need to be cautious. You could get a nasty letter or a fine from Customs. When you are gone for more than five days you must put a hold on your mail.
- You can't receive personal mail at a company mail box. It must say Such and Such company and then Attn: your name. It can't read to your name at Such and Such company.
- You must have your K-badge to pick up your boxes.
- If you're shipping a box make sure it is packed completely full. Use some kind of stuffing material if you need because if it isn't completely full it will probably get squished.

## Missionary, friend remembered

# Alice Buck honored at Sunday memorial

Alice Buck, a woman who spent much of her life in Micronesia and devoted many years to translating the Bible into Marshallese, was remembered at a memorial ceremony during Protestant services Sunday.

Buck died June 28. Her husband the Rev. Elden Buck, a retired chaplain and missionary, attended the ceremony and spoke about his wife's devotion to the Micronesian people.

"I am acutely aware of the reason I am here," the reverend said with a choked voice and fighting for control over his tears. "She is beside me and always will be."

He told the story of the trail that brought them to the Marshall Islands. "Alice and I came to Kwajalein because of a tidal wave," he said.

"Alice's father was a Navy chaplain here the first couple of years after the war [World War II]. He was fascinated by the Marshallese devotion."

"One day the Navy heard there was a tidal wave coming from the Aleutians. It should crest at 30 feet when it hit Kwajalein and was expected to clear the island. All of the Navy people evacuated the island to Navy ships. The Marshallese who lived on the island were moved into the second floor of the Quonset

huts. After the tidal wave passed bringing waves of only one to two feet – even then rumors on Kwaj were often exaggerated – the Navy personnel returned to the island. My father-in-law had a Marshallese friend named Daniel. After this event he asked Daniel if he had been afraid. Daniel replied 'I wasn't afraid. I went to my bunk, read my Bible, prayed, put on my swimming trunks and went to sleep.' This man's simple devotion changed my father-in-law's life. After he [his father-in-law] retired he returned to the Marshall Islands as a missionary. Alice was 14 at the time." Elden said he and Alice met in college and he became interested in the people of Micronesia as a result of Alice's passion for the people and area. They devoted their lives to missionary work and were assigned to the Marshall Islands.

Elden became the chaplain on Kwajalein in 1968 and remained here until 1991. He said that each morning Alice would get up, take the ferry to Ebeye and work on the translation of the Bible from English to Marshallese. It took her 18 years to complete the translation. Her translation is used not only as a religious scripture, but also as a reference guide on the written language of this country.

At the Sunday service the Rev. Richard Funk introduced Alice's work by saying Alice she truly served others, and that it was her joy to do so.

There was a memorial service for Alice on Saturday at the UCC church on Ebeye.

## Academic excellence is norm for Kwajalein students

There are 383 students in the Kwajalein schools, grades kindergarten through 12 this year.

Kwajalein schools use the standardized test of the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills, for grades two through eight and the Iowa Tests of Educational Development, for grades nine through 12 to evaluate the learning success of the students.

By federal law all public schools in the continental United States are required to report their student achievement for grades four, eight and 11. However, Kwajalein schools have traditionally not tested its 11th graders, testing the 10th graders instead.

According to a report published by the Kwajalein schools, the Iowa Tests are among the most rigorous

testing instruments in the nation. Several states across the nation, not just Iowa, have adopted these tests as their own state's assessment of schools and student achievement.

The Iowa tests assess students' progress in reading, language, math, social studies and science. Across the board Kwajalein students surpass their counterparts in the U.S. The average stateside scores are 50 percent, the overall average scores for students in the Kwajalein schools is 94 percent.

School superintendent Dan Frazier explains the success, "A combination of factors go into the success of the Kwajalein Schools. We couple small class size with strong parental support to help students succeed. Keeping class size low is expensive, but our parent company has always been willing to support

our schools in order to retain the quality of service we provide. However, one of the ultimate strengths of this system is its staff. Research indicates that the quality of the teacher and his or her classroom instruction is, by far, more important to students learning than are factors such as class size, curriculum or facilities."

Another standardized test students on Kwajalein take is the Scholastic Aptitude Test. Frazier said the results from that test substantiate the Iowa results.

High S.A.T. test scores increase the chances for students to be accepted by good colleges early in their senior year if they plan to attend a four-year college.

According to Frazier the tests can indicate the likelihood of post-sec-

# Youth Services offer kids many options

The Namo Weto Youth Center offers many opportunities for youth in grades 7-12 of Kwajalein. Youth Services consists of baseline programming from four Service Areas which are (1) sports, fitness and health options, (2) life skills, citizenship and leadership, (3) arts, recreation and leisure activities, and (4) mentoring, intervention and education support services.

The youth of Kwajalein have the chance to develop sport skills in golf and tennis. Also, they can participate in pick up games of basketball, softball and soccer.

The YS program assists in the development of life skills and leadership roles. The youth council is established and is working toward planning events and fun activities throughout the year. On Oct. 30 there is going to be a Halloween dance at the Youth Center. The youth council is the beginning of the process in which ideas are turned into actions. First, the youth council receives requests for events and activities from other 7-12 graders. Second, the council presents the requests to the YS staff at the once a month scheduled meeting. Third, the request is approved or not approved by the YS staff. Finally, if the request is an exception to policy the YS staff will present the request to the Youth Parent Advisory Council. The YPAC may vote to approve or not approve the request. In either case, on a yearly basis the items that were voted on will be revisited.

The Youth Center is a facility where 7-12 graders can participate in open recreation and leisure activities. The facility houses two pool tables, a ping-pong table, big screen television, computers, snack machines and more. Tournaments are scheduled periodically in pool, ping-pong and X-Box games.

The YS program also encourages youth to bring their homework into the Youth Center. There is going to be a computer lab established by the end of the year. Youth will have the opportunity to complete research and school work with the support of the YS staff. Along with the opportunity to complete their homework the youth will be introduced to technology activities that include GPS scavenger hunts and point plotting. The Pacific Army

Regional Office evaluation team has an annual inspection of all CYS programs and Kwajalein was inspected May 25 -28. The YS program was commended on improving the environment and establishing 4-H Clubs. Also, PARO commended the CYS team for ensuring timely corrective actions. There is qualified supervision, all equipment is in good repair, and youth utilize the facility correctly. The YS program provides baseline programming in four Service Areas during after school hours, evenings and weekends. All YS staff and volunteers have completed background checks in accordance with statutory/regulatory guidelines and within prescribed time frame. All CYS staff is continually trained in areas of safety and programming as well as completing an Individual Development Plan to enhance professional development. The hours of the Youth Center are Tuesday to Friday 3-9 p.m., Saturday 3-10 p.m., Sunday 2-10 p.m., and Monday 1-9 p.m. Remember, as an Army requirement, youth that are interested in participating in any CYS program must be registered.

ondary success. And when viewed as an entire class, the tests can show to some extent the ability of a school system to prepare students for success in a four-year college.

Traditionally, the Kwajalein students have performed very well on the S.A.T. compared to the nation or individual states. The seven-year average score for Kwajalein students is 1134, which is well above the national average of 1021.

"This year's senior class is one of our smallest ever—only 15 students. Comparatively, we graduated 30 last spring," Frazier said.

"The elementary has 233 students, K-6. The high school has 150 with 61 in grades 7 and 8 and 89 in grades 9-12," he said.

In comparing the schools on Kwajalein to other schools where he has worked, Frazier said, "Kwajalein Schools has a more narrow curriculum, particularly at the secondary level. We lack the variety of business and vocational courses which most schools in the States maintain. However, the long-term success of our students suggests that it's not the quantity of the courses offered as much as the quality of the instruction in the classrooms."

# SAC looks at day-long kindergarten

Extending kindergarten from half to full days in the coming year was one of the topics discussed at the School Advisory Council public meeting held Wednesday in the elementary school music room.

Concerns were voiced by several attendees that half day kindergarten does not allow for enough time to concentrate on reading skills and language. Others questioned the importance of reading as early as the kindergarten level.

Chairman Maj. Jud McCrary asked that the public contact their council representatives to weigh in on the matter, which will be addressed formally at a future meeting. McCrary said that analysis must be conducted and cost will be a major factor in the decision.

"We need your input so that we can access this. I don't want to go down this path unless that's what the public wants," McCrary said.

Also discussed at the public meeting were revisions to the special education/special needs policy and the new policy on interrogations of students by outside agencies.

The special education/special needs policy was voted in at the September meeting, but has since been revised for clarity. The policy now delineates that contractual limits specify services of any kind cannot exceed 35 percent of the regular school day. In addition, it outlines the composition of the admissions panel.

Past practice was put on paper in a new policy on interrogations of students by outside agencies. Generally, students may not be

interviewed during the school day by persons other than parents and school officials and employees.

Per the policy, requests from outside agencies must be made through the principal's office. Upon receiving and granting the request, the principal will make every effort to contact the parents to inform them of the request and ask them to be present.

According to Dan Frazier, Kwajalein school superintendent, a final vote will be taken on both policies at the next meeting. Feedback the policies is solicited from the public via council representatives or by contacting the superintendent's office.

### In other news:

The results of the Iowa test of basic skills showed outstanding achievement in grades four, eight, and 10 with scores in the mid 90th percentile.


School enrollment is down 24 percent from 1999, according to Frazier.

Accreditation was among the topics discussed. According to Frazier, tougher standards now exist under the No Child Left Behind federal law, as well as the North Central Association. "We are going to have to make some changes in order to remain accredited," Frazier said.

Curriculum committee meetings have commenced in the areas of library, physical education/health, and computer science. Both parents and teachers are involved in the process. Steve Howell, high school principal, said that all committees are on track and all are doing a very good job. He also proposed that committee chairs brief the School Advisory Council at a future meeting.
