Faith is important to military members

It's amazing how many people I have met in my lifetime that just don't get what it means to be a member of the Armed Forces. Let's put aside the hordes of uninformed that think military members are illiterate criminals and who couldn't find a job anywhere else so they opted for the service. Let's ignore those who stereotype military members of being either inner-city hoodlums or hick trailer trash.

Today I want to talk about the group who think people who are in the military are Godless baby-killing, prostitute-paying heathens roaming the earth wearing a uniform and looking for the next bar to belly up to.

For me, one of the most consistent comforts of military service was knowing that no matter where I was, no matter how remote, war torn, or unusual my duty station, I could go to church and feel right at home.



As a young person back in Idaho going to church was a big deal. For most of the ranchers and farmers in the congregation I attended, keeping the Sabbath, was the one day of the week when they cleaned up spick and span, put on their best clothes and rested. Certainly there were animals to feed and water, chores that absolutely had to be done, but other than that it was a day of rest, an opportunity to reflect on the good things in their lives, the simple pleasures and practice their religion.

While in uniform, whether I was in downtown Washington, D.C. or a

mountain top in Korea, a remote location in Turkey or along the Rhine River in Germany, the constancy of my ability to practice my faith made me feel whole and at home.

I have stumbled into a church service after long hours in an airplane, with my internal clock not knowing what day or time it was only to sit down on a pew, open my hymnal and be immediately transported to a peaceful setting. No matter the location or the cultural difference of the community outside the walls of church, I knew I was home.

If anything, being in the military helped me keep my faith, for no matter where I was the members of the community welcomed me, led me into the chapel and reminded me of who I was, and the importance of those few hours on Sunday.

In-between banking explained

On Nov. 30, the Bank of Guam will no longer operate on island. In February, Bank of America's Community Bank is scheduled to begin providing banking services.

Getting there from here is a challenge being met head-on by USAKA officials and Kwajalein Range Services.

As a stop-gap during the bank change-over, KRS will provide what Bob Burt, controller, calls interim cash services.

Interim cash services

The purpose of the services provided by the KRS facility, formerly referred to as "Bank of Bob" at KRS President Ike Richardson's forum, is twofold.

First, it will enable everyone who lives and/or works here to cash their payroll check for the two-month window, in addition to the current check-cashing services offered.

Secondly, the interim services will assume deposit and cash replenishment services for all retail facilities operated by KRS.

Burt responded to some frequently asked questions on the interim services to be offered by the KRS Finance department:

Q. When does the interim service start?

A. *Beginning with the first payroll in December, we will cash payroll checks for all employees on the island. It is anticipated that the Military Banking Facility, the Community Bank, will be available Feb. 1.*

Q. When does it end?

A. *Current plans are to terminate payroll check cashing services for all island employees on Jan. 31. For this reason, we strongly encourage every employee who receives a paycheck to consider direct deposit. Contact your respective company's Finance office for information on direct deposit. Regarding the Marshallese workforce, KRS is currently testing the ability to direct deposit into the Bank of the Marshall Islands. Results of that test should be available next week.*

Q. Where and when can I cash my payroll check?

A. *This service will be conducted at yet-to-be-determined locations on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. We will designate hours of operation and will publish this information in the Hourglass, on the Roller, and in the KRS Newslines during the first week of December.*

Q. Can I cash all types of checks using the interim cash services?

A. *Other than payroll checks, KRS will not cash any third-party checks.*

Q. What's happening with the credit card services?

A. *The current merchant card service is provided by the Bank of Guam and will cease on Nov. 30. KRS is currently working with Bank of America to provide merchant card (credit card) services by Dec. 1 in order to provide a seamless transition without disruption of service.*

Related challenges

With the departure of the Bank of Guam, Burt anticipates there will be a temporary coin shortage on island.

"We will be asking the community to voluntarily return all of their excess coins," he said, in exchange for cash.

Coins will be collected on Roi-Namur at Gimbel's, Nov. 20 from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 2:30 to 4 p.m. and on Kwajalein at Ten-Ten, Nov. 22 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Coins need not be rolled and a coin counter will be available.

New bank

The change of banks is not related to the budget cuts, according to Chief Warrant Officer Mike Posey, Community Services/DOLCA. The reason for the change has to do with subcontract renewal with the Bank of Guam.

Posey said according to the Bank of Guam, which operated as a subcontract to the KRS contract, the situation here was no longer financially viable for them.

The new Military Banking Facility is a separate DoD-contracted activity. As such, it operates un-

der government regulations and brings with it a new set of rules.

According to Posey, the biggest impact to the community is in the service provided by the new bank.

"Community Bank won't be able to serve all of the same customers as Bank of Guam," Posey said. "They won't be able to serve all workers."

Posey said the reason behind this is the new bank is a DoD initiative executed by the Defense, Finance, and Accounting Service, a department within DoD that provides banking services overseas using government agreements.

"A banking institution, the Bank of the Marshall Islands, already exists on Ebeye," Posey said. "If there wasn't a bank there, we'd be able to provide service. We can't compete with them."

Posey said he thinks the main issue is that it's change and change is very tough at Kwajalein.

"The command wants to support the entire community and all workers the best we can," Posey said. "This has a high priority and short timeline. We'll do our best to keep the community informed."

Looking down the road, Posey said the new bank is going to have a different look and feel, "like the bank at home." He added that the bank brings with them the latest technology including online banking.

Along with the new bank, two new Automatic Teller Machines are expected to arrive by February, according to Posey. One will serve as a replacement for the broken ATM. Considered inside machines, the new machines will be located at Ten-Ten and the Kwaj Lodge, because it is open 24 hours a day and for convenience.

According to Posey, Bank of America will begin hiring all positions. By December they expected to start mailing information to prospective customers.

Kwaj high students

Getting the facts, forming an opinion, registering to vote, casting a ballot – it's a right and a privilege. Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School students did just that, making their voices heard by taking part in the National Student/Parent Mock Election.

As part of the election activities, a political rally was held for the student body Thursday in the Multi-Purpose Room, which featured speeches by juniors Win Keller and Barry Childers posing at Senator John Kerry and President George W. Bush, respectively.

Students dressed as Secret Service agents escorted the candidates to the stage following introductions by master of ceremonies, Beka Ladd, senior, and rap entertainment by Demetrius Kelly, freshman.

Speeches by the presidential candidates proved a study in persuasion as they outlined platforms and pleaded their cases, impersonations complete with body language and inflections rivaling that of the real candidates.


"I was surprised at how attentive the kids were during the speeches," faculty organizer Ric Fullerton said. "You could hear a pin drop."

Fullerton was pleased with the outcome of the political rally and said of participants, "they worked hard and prepared. They were nervous but they did an outstanding job."

The main goal of the Election 2004 activities was to assist students in becoming more politically aware and informed regarding the central issues associated with the upcoming presidential election, according to literature distributed by Fullerton.

Since Oct. 9, information on the election process and this year's candidates has been presented to the student body by way of intercom announcements, posters and an election bulletin board.

In addition to voting for the presidential candidates, students were asked to vote on five issues of importance selected by the National Student/Parent Mock

Committee. Those issues included: what is the most important issue facing the nation, what is your stance on the homeland security versus civil liberties debate, preference for either Republican or Democratic economic policies, whether educational policy should be set by the federal government or individual states, and the role of the federal government in providing healthcare to Americans.

"It helps educate the student body on candidates and issues," Ian Taylor, senior, said of the elections. "It helps us have a say in how we feel about the political issues and helps young people understand how to vote and that first you have to register."

Teaching students how to seek out reliable information on the candidates and the issues was a primary goal of the mock elections. For that reason, a special Election 2004 section was set up in the high school library to provide access to magazine and newspaper articles, internet sites and videos regarding the upcoming election.

Senior Stephanie Berlind said that she liked one particular site on the Web.

"It allows you to see which side of an issue you'd fall on and then tells you which candidate agrees," Berlind said. "That's how I found out who I tend to side with."

Today, results of Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School elections were reported live via telephone to the National Mock Election Convention. Of 150 students, 128 voted. Bush won by 37 votes.

The National Student/Parent Mock Election is a non-profit, non-partisan organization. According to their website, in the last two presidential election years alone, over 10 million students, parents and teachers participated in all 50 states, Washington, D.C., and 14 countries/territories around the world where Americans are based. Over 40 million have participated since the project began in 1980.

Keeping faith

Religion, community in a place far from home

A church on every corner is a scene worlds away from Kwajalein. Remote locations such as our island in the Pacific sometimes present obstacles for practicing a religion.

According to the Rev. Rick Funk, Protestant chaplain, a lack of options is one obstacle people face.

“There’s one official Protestant and Catholic church,” Funk said, “and a small Baptist fellowship and Mormon [Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints] church. For that reason, there is little choice of priests, or music, or buildings, or children’s programs.”

“If you came from a Lutheran background, there’s no Lutheran church here – so some people might give up too easily thinking, ‘It’s not like back home, so I’m not going to go,’” Funk said.

He added that even the Protestant community is different here than in the states.

“We do not have a strong denominational tie,” Funk said. “We’re a chapel and in a chapel, you throw people together, figure it out, and get along.”

The biggest obstacle, according to Funk, is the perception of being away from accountability, which can cut both ways.

“Out here, people can choose to live differently than they do with friends and family,” Funk said, adding, “Eventually people realize that you can’t be anonymous.”

Another obstacle is time. Calendars tend to fill up quickly on Kwajalein, according to Funk, and with all the fun activities; people may or may not choose to spend time practicing their religion.

“If the routine changes and [religion] doesn’t fit – it’s not likely to fit unless you connect with someone or a group of people,” Funk said. “People who connect spiritually are the people who typically connect spiritually.”

The practice of faith is as individual a choice as the people themselves. According to Funk, some people are going to be at church, no matter what.

“Families with school-age kids may feel responsibility. People who have a long-standing relationship with the church are going to come,” Funk said.

He added that people in crisis may or may not respond by attending church.

“Sometimes people turn to the church for hope or help – sometimes they turn away,” Funk said.

The Rev. John Sheehan, Catholic chaplain, said that because God is everywhere, keeping faith/religious practices should not be an issue.

“I don’t see it as an issue – it’s inconsequential where you are,” Sheehan said, adding that religion is founded on personal contact with God, or prayer. “Remoteness



brings fewer distractions.”

According to Sheehan, Kwajalein offers a sense of security that you don’t have in the U.S., which in turn, produces a sense of community.

“In isolated places, you can’t go out for resources, so you go in,” Sheehan said. “You’re more dependant on yourself and neighbors. You get to know and trust each other and God.”

Sheehan said, “if church is important to you, you’ll find it.” He added that there are a fair number of people who have faith in varying degrees and aren’t church-going.

“Some people have deep faith and their own relationship with God who don’t go to either church,” he said.

Overcoming real or perceived obstacles necessary to keep faith alive requires, at the very least, connecting.

“We as human beings must connect,” Funk said. He recommends trying lots of different connections such

as music, sports, hobbies and neighborhoods. "If one doesn't work, keep trying through clubs, activities and groups."

He added that the chaplains are available "anytime for anybody in any setting."



"It's a misconception that we are busy and unavailable," Funk said. "That's not true. We are available. Stop us on the street, in the store, or call us on the phone. We do our best work outside the church."

Funk also suggests talking to friends, and said that people are more willing to talk about religion than one might think.

"I think that it's healthy for people to periodically give themselves a spiritual checkup, like you do with your health," Funk said. He suggests to ask yourself, 'How am I doing spiritually and how might I want to progress?'

Funk suggests finding unique ways to do so, and offers Theology on Tap starting up again in March. Meetings are held at the Yokwe Yuk club on Friday nights, and the topic will be "Church...why bother?"

The Kwajalein Baptist Fellowship uses the elementary school music room as its house of worship on Sunday mornings. Minister Ernie Long said the group numbers approxi-

mately 20 people and began meeting eight years ago.

He views Christianity as more of a relationship than a religion, a comparison he admits is not original with him, but is described in the New Testament.

"If someone is a Christian who moves to Kwajalein, that in itself should not change the nature of his or her relationship with God," said Long. "This is because Christ has not been left back at home. He is just as surely present here on Kwaj as in any other location. Therefore if a Christian experiences feelings of estrangement from Christ here, it is not because the Lord has become unavailable. More likely it is because the Christian is having trouble maintaining his or her faith or spiritual focus in the unique context that exists here."

Long said that those who need a network of friends, which includes most people, can have times when they feel isolated here, which can lead some to pay too high a price to fit in.

"If in order to be accepted, I participate in things that I have an uneasy feeling about, then I may be violating my conscience. When I violate my conscience, it is inevitable that my relationship with Christ suffers. That in turn tends to make me uncomfortable participating in worship. The old fashioned term for this is 'backsliding.'"

Of course, moving to Kwajalein does not affect everyone in that way, said Long.

"I am convinced that there are many who maintain a close walk with the Lord during their time here. Conversely, many who never leave the states become backslidden."

Long encourages people to make the choice to regularly attend worship services, calling them "critical."

"There are people here who were actively involved in churches back home, but have decided to 'take a break' while they live on Kwaj," Long said. "That is high-risk behavior and a definite mistake."

The lack of emphasis on denomination here can have both good and bad consequences, according to Long. He said that it can lead us to base our Christianity on the Bible instead of traditions, but can also lead to a lack of clarity as to "what we believe and why we believe it."

David Hamill, with the church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, believes that the biggest obstacle in being remote is not being able to make available all of the church programs people are used to, which he sees as affecting youth and children most.

The group, which holds church services Sundays at the Corlett Recreation Center, welcomes newcomers and those on TDY regularly, which is part of both church policy and doctrine.

"When TDY people visit our meetings or when a newcomer joins us, they have often commented how they feel the same spirit and acceptance here that they felt in their home wards," Hamill said.

Finding a community with whom to connect and worship is as close as the chapel office, which can provide information on the various religious groups on island and when and where they gather.


