Band of brothers, company of heroes


On Dec. 21, 1861, a bill creating the Medal of Honor was signed by President Abraham Lincoln.

There were 1,502 recipients during the Civil War, 426 in the Indian Wars, 110 in the Spanish-American War, 86 during actions in the Philippines, 59 in China for the Boxer War and other engagements, 119 in World War I, 464 in World War II, 131 in the Korean War, 245 in Vietnam, two for actions in Somalia in 1993 and various other actions for a total of 3,459 since the medal was created.

How many of the recipient's names do we know? How many of their deeds do we remember?

So far, there has been one Medal of Honor recipient in Iraq. I'll do my best to remember his name and what he did.

On April 4, 2003, Sgt. First Class Paul Ray Smith and his 16 men were attacked by 50-100 Iraqis near Baghdad Airport. The Iraqis fired RPGs and mortar rounds, which wounded several of the Americans.



Smith could have ordered his men to withdraw. If he had, medics and wounded at a nearby aid station could have been overrun.

Smith disregarded his own safety and climbed on top of an unoccupied armored personnel carrier in front of his men and opened fire with a 50-caliber machine gun. Pvt. Michael Seaman fed ammunition to Smith who killed 20-50 Iraqis and covered his men who were being pushed back.

As the battle was ending, Smith was shot in the head. Medics worked to save his life for 30 minutes but he died. He was 33 years old. He leaves a wife and two

children. He was from Tampa, Fla.

His men said that if not for Smith's actions, they would have been killed.

Smith will be the first servicemember to receive the Medal of Honor since 1993.

Sometimes men wonder what they would do in certain situations. Would they be out front yelling, "Let's give them hell," or would they be in back yelling, "Let's get the hell out of here."

Paul Ray Smith was the kind of man who was out in front.

We should remember that he was and try our best to honor Sgt. First Class Smith and all the military men and women in harm's way. They are out in front everyday.

Editor's note: President George W. Bush will present the Medal to Smith's widow sometime in March.



Keller named U.S. Army military tester of the year

Maj. Winfield Keller, Range executive officer, has been named the U.S. Army Military Tester of the Year by the National Defense Industrial Association.

“As a test director, I am responsible for our cost, performance and schedule in support of a test. The RTS [Reagan Test Site] team must conduct missions, safely and on time; collect all required data and provide the data to our customer; and do all this within budget,” Keller said.

Tests can be categorized as, developmental (verifying the system design meets desired capability), operational (evaluating operational effectiveness and suitability of a system under realistic operational conditions) or live fire testing (assessment of the vulnerability/lethality of a system prior to production). In general, a tester could be anyone involved in testing a new system such as the test coordinator, data collector, evaluator or test subject. “I am fortunate to have been able to conduct both developmental and operational testing in previous assignments and here at RTS,” Keller said.

NDIA is a non-profit organization whose mission is to provide a legal and ethical forum for the interchange of ideas between the government and industry to resolve industrial problems of joint concern.

“Maj. Win Keller possesses and continually demonstrates outstanding leadership, management and problem solving skills. Win is adept at understanding complex and interdependent test requirements, pulling together the right group of people to address those requirements, empowering the team to take action to meet requirements, and then following up to ensure all issues have been addressed prior to mission execution. Win is constantly looking to see what issues could arise, and takes early action to resolve or eliminate the potential for such issues to impact a test,” said Lt. Col. Anne Daugherty, Range commander.

Keller identified building a qualified, motivated team as most critical to being a successful tester.

“RTS has created Integrated Product Teams supporting each mission area. Our ability to conduct tests would not be possible without people like Doug Peters and Merrie Beth Schad in KRS [Kwajalein Range Ser-

vices] Plans and Operations, Claire Wittschiede in KRS Logistics, and other critical government, contractor, customer team members,” Keller said.

Daugherty agreed with Keller, “Tests are team events, not executed by any one person or group. Win successfully coordinates with many diverse organizations, both internal and external to the command, in order to ensure timely test support. Staying coordinated is a critical task, with the number of players involved in the kinds of tests we support here at RTS. Win enables communication within the team to ensure that when requirements change – and they always do – all test team members are aware and adjust their support and mission execution plans accordingly,” she said.

Recognizing the importance of the mission tests, Keller said, “From the USAKA [U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll] commander down, regardless of you particular job, ultimately we are all here to conduct or support the conduct of tests.”

Keller’s Army career has spanned more than 18 years, and he advises junior officers that the secret to a successful career is “You have to enjoy what you are doing. Get challenging jobs you want and will be happy in. It’s a lot easier to do well if you are having fun.”

Daugherty described the USAKA mission, “The Army is obviously a part of the Department of Defense,

and here at Reagan Test Site we have the opportunity to serve not only the Army directly, but the DoD as well through ballistic missile test support we provide other Services and DoD agencies. It is very important work. Some tests at RTS support improved capabilities for systems the Army either does or will operate, including the Patriot and Ground-based MidCourse Defense systems. Other tests support performance assessment of ballistic missile systems the Air Force or Navy operate. Since we fight as a joint force, those Navy and Air Force systems ultimately serve to protect or defend all warfighters, our soldiers included. Test Directors at Reagan Test Site, through the conduct of their duties, help make the Department of Defense’s ballistic missile systems the best they can be, and as such it is truly an honor to serve here,” she said.

Keller has been on Kwajalein for two years and plans to be here through the summer of 2006. He has been selected for promotion to lieutenant colonel and is expected to pin on his new rank in early April.

“The mission caused a little stress but graciously slipped for us,” Carol Shattuck, event co-chair, said.



"I was really impressed with the decorations," Steve said. "I think they did a great job."


Typical of the girls, Rebecca admitted to spending more time with her friends than her dad. "I think almost the whole sixth grade showed up," she said.

60th anniversary of lost bomber observed


U.S. Embassy, Federated States of Micronesia Release

The United States Embassy in the Federated States of Micronesia, the FSM government and local veterans joined to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the loss in combat of a U.S. Marine Corps bomber. On Feb. 6, 1945, a flight of six PBJ-1 bombers from U.S. Marine Bombing Squadron 613 struck the newly completed Japanese airfield at Palikir on the island of Pohnpei in the Caroline Islands. Although the target suffered heavy damage, one aircraft was shot down with the loss of all on board. For this year's commemorative anniversary, at 11:15 a.m. on Feb. 6, the same time that Japanese anti-aircraft fire brought down the aircraft, the names of the crew members who made the supreme sacrifice during the raid were read, Taps was sounded and U.S. Ambassador Suzanne Hale and Speaker of the FSM Congress Peter Christian placed a wreath on the aircraft's engine and propeller, which still rest at the crash site.

More than 30 people took part in the ceremony, held in a jungle clearing on a hillside above the old airfield site at Palikir in northern Pohnpei. Attendees included Department of Foreign

Affairs Assistant Secretary for American and European Affairs Jane Chigiyal, World War II veteran Harvey Segal, now a professor at the College of Micronesia and Vietnam Veteran Frank Semens, U.S. Army, retired, as well as Marine Corps veterans Anthony Mix and Petericko Jacob.

VMB-613 was the only Marine Corps squadron to fly the PBJ-1H in combat. This aircraft was notable for carrying a 75 mm cannon in addition to bombs and machine guns. The six aircraft involved in the raid flew from the squadron's forward operating base on Eniwetok Atoll. Defying bad weather and intense anti-aircraft fire, the flight cratered the runway and demolished a large building adjacent to the field with a 75 mm round. However, the last aircraft in the formation, piloted by Lt. William J. Love, was hit as it leveled out for its bombing run. The plane's right wing collapsed and the bomber crashed and exploded. The crew's remains were recovered after the war and returned to the U.S. for burial. The navigator on another aircraft in the formation was also killed during the attack. The abandoned Japanese air base was transformed into the site of the FSM national capital during the late 1980s.

post office.


People who need help with their taxes will be seen on an appointment basis.

"We'll be available pretty much anytime," McCrary said. "It's really different from the states."

The number-one question the tax assistants get asked is about qualification for the Foreign Income Exclusion. In order to qualify for this, in most cases, you can't work for the government or military and you must be out of the United States for 330 days in a one-year period.


