

Reader not happy with Oleanda food preparation

Everyone views pictures from their own perspective and I would like to provide my perspective regarding the front page picture on the March 12 *Hourglass*. The picture is of the M.V. Oleanda's chef preparing food and my perspective is that of a food safety inspector. If I applied to this picture the food safety regulations that I utilize when inspecting such food establishments as the Cafe Pacific or Three Palms Snack Bar, I would find the following:

1. The chef is not wearing any type of hair restraint, such as a hat. This would be a non-critical violation.
2. There is a carton of eggs sitting out of

refrigeration that is not being worked. Eggs are a potentially hazardous food and must be kept under proper temperature control. Lack of proper temperature control for potentially hazardous foods is a critical violation. Based on the rating criteria we use for USAKA food establishments, one critical violation results in an unsatisfactory rating for that inspection.

3. The picture doesn't tell me if the foods that he is cutting will be used as a ready-to-eat food or not (appears that they may be for cooking). If the food is ready-to-eat, gloves would be required. Handling ready-to-eat foods without gloves can be cited as a critical violation.

They say that a picture is worth a thousand words. In this case, the picture could be worth an unsatisfactory food safety inspection rating.

Jobs moving, planes going, new KRS boss

Transportation, employment and quality of life were primary topics at Thursday night's Town Hall meeting chaired jointly by COL Beverly Stipe, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site commander, and Ike Richardson, Kwajalein Range Services president.

A recent visit by an independent assessment team determined, according to COL Stipe, "There's no way we can more efficiently operate with the money the Army has cut us." She said that Lt. Gen. Larry J. Dodgen, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/U.S. Army Forces Strategic Command commanding general, agreed with the findings of the independent assessment team.

"The team recommends taking easy efficiencies now," COL Stipe said. She defined easy efficiencies to include not filling vacancies, closing unused buildings and maximizing power generation by fully loading fewer generators." She added that fiber optics from Guam will be routed through here, connecting the Kwajalein professional community to the states making it easier to conduct business remotely from a stateside location.

Jobs will move

Richardson said that there will be job cuts here beginning later this summer. "Fifteen to 20 people will move this year," he said. Fiber optics should be in place in late 2006 or early 2007; over a three-year range, about 250 people will move, according to Richardson. Richardson and COL Stipe both assured the community that many of the positions would be moved as a part of natural attrition, when personnel completed their contracts those positions would not be refilled locally, but would be remotely located in CONUS.

Rumor control

In past Town Halls, Richardson identified and debunked rumors he had heard from around the island. Thursday night he started with the rumor that "everyone is going to lose their jobs."

He said that was not true and that KRS's contract with the Army has been extended through March 2009.

"The next rumor is that I'm leaving," he said. "That one is true."

Richardson will be departing at the end of April. He said that it is company policy that top-end leadership move about every two years, "to keep the blood flow moving." John Pickler, a U.S. Army retired lieutenant general is slated to be the next president of KRS. Richardson will tour Pickler through all of the companies and will overlap with Pickler for approximately a week and a half on island before departing. Richardson is going to Frederick, Md. (Bechtel corporate headquarter's on the East coast), and will be working with business development customers and new proposals.

COL Stipe said that in the next from 12 to 18 months the fixed wing, Metroliner, aircraft will be phased out of Kwajalein. She said the short-term strategic vision is to have high-speed hydrofoil catamarans that travel from

Kwajalein to Roi in approximately 45 - 50 minutes. She added that the change from aircraft to watercraft will eliminate the exorbitantly high cost of maintaining a fixed-wing fleet. She said that a couple of scenarios are being considered:

- Have one high-speed hydrofoil and make runs to Roi three to four times per week, with many commuters on overnight stays, or
- Have a couple of hydrofoils available to make runs everyday.

She said the options are being staffed, and the number is budget dependent.

Audience participation

• A worker who commutes to Meck Island asked the first audience question of the evening, "We don't get breakfast before the boat leaves to go to Meck and we used to have coffee privileges on the boat. Now we don't have either."

Richardson responded concerning the coffee saying "We had a problem with spilling coffee on the new catamarans, and the marine department was subsidizing the activity. He went on to say that if you guys would commit to cleanliness and open a coffee mess, the privileges would be re-instated." Richardson said that it was his understanding that boxed meals were available 45 minutes prior to departure. He referred the meal question to Kevin Finn, vice president/deputy program manager, Community Services, and recommended the audience member meet with Finn after the meeting to get the details.

• Due to KRS working in conjunction with Chugach, an Alaskan native corporation, funds are provided by the Department of Defense for quality of life improvements. The Quality of Life Integrated Process Team, with a board of 20 people, represents the community in finding ways to spend those funds to improve the community. A member of the audience said, "There's a group of us who feel that decisions are being made that the community is not aware of. We just feel that there's some lack of communication." COL Stipe responded, "That goes back to the IPT members. The members should be soliciting input from the community and then going back out and telling the community how the vote went."

The audience member said that he was new to the island but had talked to members of the community who had been here for four or five years and they had not heard of the Quality of Life IPT. Finn responded that the IPT has not existed for four or five years, but was initiated when KRS took over the contract. "There has been some effort in the past via the *Hourglass* to talk about some of the initiatives that this group has voted. One of these major initiatives was voted and announced in the *Hourglass* a couple of months ago. The mobile kitchen is a \$200,000 investment that compensates for the lack of a club. The objective was to find a dining alternative, to add dining options and to increase variety and services in the dining arena that were lost when the Yuk club was shut down," Finn said. The audience member said that it was his understanding that the community should vote on these issues, not the board. Richardson said, "We cannot

Survey results, staffing top SAC meeting

According to the Fall 2004 survey results reported at the School Advisory Council public meeting Wednesday, customer satisfaction with parent-teacher relations and school environment at the elementary school is high.

The surveys were given to parents at the November parent-teacher conferences according to Dan Frazier, Kwajalein Schools superintendent.

As a follow up on the lowest rated area, which concerned controlled substances, a second survey was administered at the spring conferences.

"The school conducted our second bi-annual survey targeting specifically our customers' feelings about how the school is addressing the issues of tobacco, alcohol and illegal drug use," Frazier stated in the meeting notes.

Results from high school parents indicate that the majority of parents

believe that tobacco and alcohol use by minors is a significant problem on the island with the strongest concerns indicated toward alcohol abuse, Frazier said.

However, he added that parents believe, nearly two to one, that illegal drugs present a significant problem to our island's young people.

"Overwhelmingly, most parents say that the most significant abuse problems take place after school hours and off school grounds," he stated.

Admittedly an island-wide issue, parents expressed via the survey a need for more community interventions.

"Overall, parents expressed support for the Kwajalein Police Department's D.A.R.E. program and the high school's curriculum in educating students on the dangers of substance abuse," Frazier reported.

Parents were against further interventions from the school, such as police presence or drug-sniffing dogs.

School staffing

Four elementary and two new junior/senior high school staff positions have been filled for the upcoming school year and their names were announced at the meeting. Brief background introductions for each were given by Frazier. All are still in the hiring process, with medical reviews pending.

Two new members of the Community and Youth Services staff are on their way to the island and should be here within the next couple of months, said Frazier. One position, that of CYS trainer, remains vacant.

Curriculum submitted

Submitted for approval by the School Advisory Council was revised curriculum for health and physical education, library and media, and computers and technology instruction. The topic will be voted on in April by the council.

Kwajalein Schools parent survey highlights

86 percent of parents say their child's teacher regularly communicates with them.

95 percent of parents say the teacher communication is available and responsive.

96 percent say their child's teacher will make time to meet if they request a conference.

91 percent believe the school provides sufficient opportunities for parental involvement.

87 percent feel comfortable discussing issues with the school administration.

96 percent say that their child feels safe from physical harm within this school.

97 percent feel the school provides a clean and pleasant environment for learning.

93 percent say that their child feels positive about coming to school.

In other business



No date has been set for the Iowa Test because they have not arrived. Ordering problems have delayed shipment and according to Frazier, the test is expected to be here in the next few weeks.



A decision on all-day kindergarten "is currently in the hands of Kwajalein Range Services management," Frazier said. "My understanding is that KRS management is considering options and formulating a response at this time." The topic is slated for the April 20 School Advisory Council meeting, to be held at 7 p.m. in the elementary school music room.

Range operation scheduled for Wednesday

A range operation is scheduled for Wednesday. Caution times are 7:01 p.m. through 3:01 a.m. Thursday. In conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll. The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the East Reef and Yabbernohr on the West Reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the East Reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the West Reef. Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas (see maps).



In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support

personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, KPD island clearance procedures will begin at approximately 7:30 a.m. Sunday and continue until evacuation is accomplished. Egress of all air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas are effect for the following days:

7:01 p.m. Thursday through 3:01 a.m. Friday
7:01 p.m. Friday through 3:01 a.m. Saturday

solicit 2,500 people to determine the best way to commit funds. We would never gain consensus that way. The 20 IPT members actually represent you all and they should be voting what you all tell them to vote, and Kevin [Finn] said he would work on that." IPT members will be identified in an upcoming KRS Newsline.

- A rumor from the audience was that by June the fixed-wing aircraft would no longer be legal to fly. COL Stipe said that was not true, but that the helicopters are reaching the end of their usability. She stated the USAKA and SMDC staffs are searching for alternatives now so that we can continue to perform mission and emergency functions.

- A question was asked concerning the use of the Army postal system for commercial vendors. The audience member was concerned that if a commercial, Marshallese scuba shop came to Kwajalein that they would have an unfair advantage over licensed vendors on USAKA as they have alternative ways to receive mail. The correct interpretation of Army Post Office rules, under DoD and U.S. Postal Service governance, dictate that the APO system will not be used to send or receive commercial goods for sale or profit. There is a misconception that Ebeye mail transits the APO system. It does not. Ebeye mail does arrive on Continental Airlines, a commercial transport carrier, and is processed to Ebeye without transiting the APO system. This process was agreed upon when the current Compact of Free Association was signed. Again, commercial vendors, U.S. or Marshallese, are not authorized to use the APO system for profit.

- An audience member said that she felt the turtles in the turtle pond weren't as happy as they once had been. She said that community members used to feed the turtles lettuce and other produce and that many of the turtles seemed to develop relationships with the community. She said that things had changed at the ponds since the community members were no longer allowed to feed the turtles. Ken Simms, USAKA environmental officer, said that the marine mammal veterinarian from Honolulu had completed physical examinations on the turtles and found that while they may have been happy with the community attention, that they weren't healthy

and needed a diet change. Simms added that many changes are planned for the turtle pond areas, including some experiments in tandem with the high school marine biology class. In the coming month, the turtle pond will be drained and cleaned to provide the turtles a healthier environment.

- A parent asked if it is possible to get a Reserve Officer Training Corps program instituted in the high school. According to 1st Sgt. Dennis Neal, USAKA, ROTC is established by regions, not locally, and the decision is made at the regional level. He offered to research the issue and get back to the parent. It is known that regional directives depend on a quota of students to become cadets. USAKA has not historically had a high number of students wanting to commit time for ROTC.

More questions

- Aetna prescriptions and direct billing is still in the works according to Richardson. An audience member asked why correct insurance billing information was not listed in the KRS Newsline. Mark Owens, KRS deputy site manager and chief information officer, said that it had been in the Newsline a few weeks ago but that he would make sure it was put out again right away.

- Another audience member said that in the last two years he had not had a steak at the Café Pacific. He asked why meal card holders did not get steaks at the dining facility. He also asked why he couldn't have a George Forman grill or electric skillet in his room so he could prepare his own steak. Another audience member said that she lived in the bachelor quarters and called the housing office about the electric grill policy and was told that the reason BQ residents could not have grills in their rooms was because the fumes from the grease were hazardous to the occupant's health. Finn answered that the grease buildup was dangerous and that grease fires were especially hazardous. In a separate interview, Charles Coffman from the fire prevention office said that the grease collects in the ventilation system that runs through the building and makes the fire hazard more significant. Finn said that catastrophic fires have occurred around the world as a result of grease buildup in the food services

industry.

Finn said that Café Pacific rotates the menu every seven weeks and that there is prime rib night. He added "I don't see why we can't rotate in steaks as well. I agree with you, I've got to have a steak every once in a while." The bottom line on grills, hot plates and toaster ovens is as follows: USAKA policy states that microwaves are the only authorized food preparation appliances in the BQ rooms. All other appliances used for food preparation are unauthorized and must be removed.

- An audience member asked if there is a curfew for young people on Kwajalein. Gerry Wolf, USAKA chief of community services, answered that there is a curfew and specific information can be found in the 2005 USAKA/RTS phone book. He also offered to send an electronic copy of the regulation to the individual.

- An audience member asked about unemployment benefits after leaving KRS. Bob Bills, KRS Human Resources manager said, "It is up to the particular state's unemployment office whether or not you will receive unemployment benefits. If you achieve contract completion and elect not to continue employment at KRS, and the Alabama Employment Office asks us if the individual was terminated or voluntarily separated, we provide the reason. If it is a voluntary termination, Alabama does not pay unemployment. Alaska, in some cases, does pay unemployment for a defined term."

- Richardson said that the television station is working on the pixelation problem, running an experiment to try to remedy the problem with new high-tech hardware.

- "For those of you worried about rats, I want to give you some rat stats," Richardson said. "We're up to 276 dead. We're now bating area two. It's going to take us a while to get rid of the rats and people are going to have to be patient."

- In accordance with a recent contracting officer memo "All babies are going to be delivered off the island now," said Richardson. Emergencies will be the only exceptions. "They will all be referred off the island."

Community Bank

A concern has been the \$500 limit for cashing payroll checks at the Community Bank. Allison Villarreal,

Community Bank manager, said that as of this week she has the authority to cash known payroll checks for K-badge and military identification card holders in amounts up to \$5,000. She added that the bank charges a fee of \$3 or one percent, whichever is more, for cashing non-account holder checks. Check cashing is free for account holders. "I strongly encourage direct deposit," she said.

Richardson stated that "some people are asking what the Community Bank is going to do on Roi." Villarreal said that the bank and DFAS are still working on the Roi issue, but that she will go to Roi to open accounts in the Kwajalein-based bank.

Commercial travel

"I was wondering about the airplane policy for commercial travel," asked one audience member. She said that there is now a 20-day wait for seats on the commercial airlines. She asked if KRS would subsidize the military flight seat costs so that contractors could use them. She said "It makes no sense having ATI fly out of here empty."

"The colonel has negotiated, starting in July, to get a third flight per week," Richardson said. Janet Burki, KRS vice president/deputy program manager Logistics, explained that in the past the commercial airlines had overbooked seats, often bumping passengers. They are no longer overbooking the seats. "People will have less of a probability of getting bumped," she said. COL Stipe said that she is working many options on improving the commercial flight situation including adding additional airline flights and finding a way to waiver the "government only" requirement on the ATI and the C-17s. An audience member asked if the price could be lowered on the military flights. The colonel replied "The fee is not mine. The fee is set by Air Mobility Command of the U.S. Air Force. I have asked the SMDC G-4 to pursue a solution to the cost disparity," she said.

Public internet

Richardson said he had received a question about the public internet. "We're actually making some more user IDs available. We'll designate your home computer; when you log on and you will have a user ID. The IT [information technology] department

will be able to look at your computer and see which of you has viruses you are putting on the net and will help you fix that problem. Those things are coming. We had a really bad problem in November and December of people putting viruses on the net, going all of the way back to the ISP provider. That problem has slowed down a lot. We will also have more banks of phones so you will have quicker access."

An audience member asked if the IT department will tell the user before they look at their computers remotely. Owens said, "Some people are sending literally hundreds and hundreds of e-mails daily (via viruses). There were days when the ISP provider was going to shut us down because we had 3,000 bogus messages from somebody's computer. And I'll guarantee that you didn't know your computer was sending them. We are going to monitor the traffic. We aren't going to read your e-mail. Let's not forget that it is the colonel who is providing your free internet access. She is paying tens of thousands of dollars a year so you don't have to pay seven cents a minute to get through to the states. We should remember that it is taxpayer dollars. So let's be courteous, and let's get virus protection and we'll help you. If we find that your machine is sending viruses, we'll give you 24 hours to get it fixed. If you don't get it fixed, we'll be forced to disconnect your computer from the network until you comply."

"When you're plugging in, you are plugging in to a government line. There are restrictions for using government lines. The obvious restrictions include downloading pornography or massive amounts of MP3 music/videos. We found indications of this illegal activity on the public server. We will police this one time, so if you have items on the server that you want to keep, send them to your personal hard drives. We know right now who the violators are, and if there is a continued pattern, those violators will be taken off the server permanently," COL Stipe said.

On Roi-Namur

In addition to covering many of the same issues that were raised at the Kwajalein Town Hall meeting, at the Friday night Town Hall meeting on Roi-Namur, COL Stipe came quickly to the point in responding to a rumor

she had heard. The rumor is that a recommendation to the commanding general has been approved to operate Roi the way we operate Meck. In other words, there will be significantly fewer residents on Roi, and a reduction in commuters. "This is the Roi-like-Meck plan that the independent assessment team took into the CG as a solution to cost reduction. We are studying two courses of action [Roi-like-Meck, and permanence without fixed-wing aircraft]," COL Stipe said. She stated that she has a short-term strategy that will phase in a Roi without fixed-wing option, but this required enablers such as high speed hydrofoil catamarans and fiber optics. The Army committed to the fiber optic program Friday. This paves the way for hydrofoil purchases, and a long-term strategy (from two to seven years from now) of operating Roi much like Meck is operated today...no permanent residents.

She added that the CG has given her the flexibility to do the short-term strategy. "Mr. Richardson and I have already had two or three discussions where we concur on a phased-in Roi permanent resident [plan], [where we] lose the fixed wing [aircraft], buy a hydrofoil or two, and provide rapid transit on the sea," she said. "We would send the commuters up on the high-speed transport."

This near-term plan will be executed in conjunction with the fiber construction plan and the reduced fixed-wing alternative. In two years, we will distribute operations first to Kwajalein and then to the United States," according to the colonel.

The soonest that the fiber optics would be on line would be about November 2006.

COL Stipe said that near term is defined as two to probably 24 months. "I guarantee that we will not execute a Roi-like-Meck option until the enablers are in place," she said.

Phasing in the hydrofoils will take some time, but the colonel did not have an exact time line.

The plan includes a testing period where the fixed-wing capability will overlap the hydrofoil capability.

Richardson added that more than likely there will be an increase in personnel on Roi-Namur.

It has not been determined how many hydrofoils will be used. The new catamarans may be used as back-up

Bridget Jones 2: The Edge of Reason (R), is a sequel to Bridget Jones's Diary. It picks up four weeks after the original film left off, with Bridget (Renee Zellweger) emotionally satisfied at long last with Mark Darcy (Colin Firth), her barrister boyfriend. Stability in Bridget's life, however, quickly becomes a contradiction in terms. Though Mark is openly supportive of Bridget's eccentricities — and there are many — she is nonetheless threatened by Mark's young, nubile intern, not to mention irked at finding out that he is, among other less desirable qualities in her eyes, a conservative voter. Complicating issues further is the reentrance of her ex-lover, Daniel Cleaver (Hugh Grant), whom Jones, perhaps mistakenly, thought she had finally gotten over. Before long, the situation escalates into another series of embarrassing circumstances for Bridget, who is faced once again with a crippling feeling of self-doubt and has only her diary and friends to combat it.

Spanglish (PG-13), A Hispanic woman and her young daughter are thrown into the middle of a well-to-do but remarkably dysfunctional family in this comedy drama. Flor (Paz Vega) is a single mother who has struggled to support her daughter Cristina (Shelbie Bruce) working as a domestic in Mexico. Hoping to give her daughter greater financial security, Flor packs up their belongings and moves the family to California, but Flor refuses to surrender her Latino identity and opts not to learn English; meanwhile, Cristina quickly learns to speak the language fluently. Flor lands a high-paying job working as a housekeeper for Deborah Clasky (Tea Leoni); Deborah doesn't speak a word of Spanish, but this is hardly the most curious thing about their working relationship. A deeply troubled neurotic who has spent time in a mental hospital, Deborah is at once obsessed with her duties as a wife and mother and utterly clueless to her family's needs, and when she learns that Flor has a daughter, she insists that the girl move in with the Claskys. Flor, however, isn't so sure she wants Deborah Americanizing Cristina, especially when Deborah begins doting on the girl at the expense of her relationship with her own daughter, Bernice (Sarah Steele). Deborah's husband, John (Adam Sandler), is an oasis of loving calm and understanding in the midst of his chaotic family.

The Passion of The Christ (R), is Mel Gibson's well-publicized production of the last 12 hours in the life of Jesus of Nazareth. The dialogue is spoken in ancient Aramaic language, along with Latin and Hebrew. Amid much controversy involving Gibson and various religious organizations, *The Passion of the Christ* received an international theatrical release in February 2004.

Petty Officer First Class Alec Mazur, 35, of Vernon, N.Y., died Mar. 9, in a non-combat related incident. Mazur was assigned to Underwater Construction Team One (UCT-1), under operational control of Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command.

Spc. Nicholas E. Wilson, 21, of Glendale, Ariz., died Mar. 11, in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, while conducting a roving patrol when his military vehicle rolled into a water-filled ditch after the shoulder of the road he was on collapsed. Wilson was assigned to 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Camp Casey, Korea.

Staff Sgt. Donald D. Griffith, Jr., 29, of Mechanicsville, Iowa, died Mar. 11 as a result of hostile action in, Tal Afar, Iraq. Griffith was assigned to 2nd Squadron, 14th Cavalry Regiment, Fort Lewis, Wash.

Lance Cpl. Joshua L. Torrence, 20,

of Lexington, S.C., died Monday of wounds received as a result of hostile action in Al Anbar Province, Iraq. He was assigned to 2nd Assault Amphibian Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Staff Sgt. Ricky A. Kieffer, 36, of Ovid, Mich., died Tuesday in Baghdad, Iraq, when enemy forces using small arms fire attacked his unit. Kieffer was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 182nd Field Artillery Regiment (Multiple Launch Rocket System), Detroit.

Spc. Paul M. Heltzel, 39, of Baton Rouge, La., died Tuesday in Baghdad, Iraq, while conducting a mounted patrol when a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device detonated. Heltzel was assigned to the Army National Guard's 2nd Battalion, 156th Infantry Regiment, 256th Brigade Combat Team, Eunice, La.

Staff Sgt. Shane M. Koele, 25, of Wayne, Neb., died Wednesday at Shindand Airfield, Afghanistan, from injuries sustained Tuesday in Shindand, when a land mine exploded near his HMMWV. Koele was assigned to the 212th Military Police Company, Kitzingen, Germany.

When asked by an audience member if Roi residents will be taken care of as much as anyone else on the other islands, the colonel responded, "you are no different than anyone on the other islands, and I treat you no differently. We are one very professional team."

The final Roi-specific issue discussed at the meeting pertained to meal cards.

Richardson announced that meal card holders who live in trailers on Roi will be losing their meal card privileges effective March 31. Kwajalein residents who had meal cards and lived in trailers lost those privileges March 1, 2004. He added that the meal ticket privileges should have been revoked March 1 for Roi residents but had been extended through the end of the month.






