
High school production is a hit

Quest to understand

Sixth graders learn Marshallese culture

How well we know our neighbors has a lot to do with the amount of effort we put forth. For sixth graders at George Seitz Elementary School, the quest for knowledge about the Marshallese has introduced them in a whole new way to a fascinating people and taken them places they have never been.

According to Tarah Yurovchak, sixth-grade teacher, the students are participating in the Marshallese Cultural Experience, which is a "school-wide project where all students will experience and learn about Marshallese culture and traditions. Different grades and classes do different things."

The sixth graders' experience, said Yurovchak, includes choosing a topic, "Life on Gugeegue and Ebeye," writing a research paper and giving a PowerPoint Presentation to the school and community on the evening of the Marshallese Cultural Experience, May 7.

As part of the project, designed to enlighten students about Marshallese culture and way of life, a distinguished panel visited the sixth-grade classes on March 12 and shared their knowledge with the class by answering a wide range of questions.

Interviewees included Leiroij Segul Kabua James, queen of Ebeye, Kirong Sam, principal of Jabro School, Drile Kabu, son of James, and Jack Akeang, legal services counsel, translator of the Marshall Islands constitution and former councilman.

Questions were compiled by each student based on their focus area. Among the topics were land ownership, birthrights, cost of housing, holidays, schooling and government.

When asked about Ebeye's exports, Akeang answered that there are admittedly few, but said,

"We export our peace and love to the rest of the world."

As another component of the project, Yurovchak said students separately interviewed a high school student who lives on Gugeegue and goes to school on Kwajalein to explain life from a student and youth perspective.

On Friday, the class took a field trip to Ebeye and Gugeegue with assistance from U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nation staff, Noda Lojkar, ombudsman, and Alan Taylor, Republic of the Marshall Islands relations specialist.

Stops on Ebeye included the RMI Nation Police Station, hospital, Ebeye Public Elementary School and Queen of Peace Elementary School. On Gugeegue, the students visited Queen of Peace High School.

For sixth grader Julie Alves, half of her questions on education, medicine and land were answered by in-class visitors and the remainder during the field trip.

"The people here are welcoming. It was cool when the pastor welcomed us and they all clapped for us," Alves said about the stop at Queen of Peace. "This is a cool project because I like writing, it's fun to come here, and I'm glad we get to do a PowerPoint presentation because I like making them."

Alves said that though she'd been on Gugeegue before, she never knew that the students going to school there were required to commute via the causeway.

The busload of students experienced first hand both the causeway's hazards and beauty.

Said sixth-grader Michael Welch of Queen of Peace school, "it's a pretty good school, but would take a long time to get there."

For most students, including Amanda Gaare, uniforms worn by students on Ebeye and Gugeegue would not be a welcome addition to their wardrobe, though she enjoyed asking about that topic as well as others.

"I interviewed May, a Marshallese girl, and asked 'Do you like the dress code?' 'Is school hard or easy?' and it was fun to be like a TV news reporter!"

Gaare said.

"I think [the trip] was a positive experience for everyone," Yurovchak said. "The Marshallese residents who saw us on Ebeye and Gugeegue praised our efforts to be there to learn about Marshallese culture first hand. It is always rewarding to watch students from both cultures find common goals in education and life."

This is the second year Yurovchak has organized the cultural experience for the sixth-grade classes.



"The students had such a great experience [last year] that the upcoming fifth graders were already planning their trip for this year," Yurovchak said. "In fact, on the first day of school, many questions were asked by students about the sixth-grade Marshallese Experience and [they] wanted to expand it

to go to Carlson, Gugeegue or Shell."

According to Lojkar, the project is important because it gets the kids interested in the Marshallese culture and gives them a better understanding of "what other cultures have and don't have."

He suggests that students and/or community members interested in learning more visit the outer islands, which still boast a true Marshallese way of living.

"I think it is a goal of most newcomers to understand and be respectful of Marshallese culture and way of life," Yurovchak said. "Helping us to educate students here in the Kwajalein Schools is a great start to help us educate the community."

Kwajalein superintendent of schools speaks to Marshallese educators at Jabro school

Meeting the challenges of the next quarter century lies not only in the hands of the youth who will inherit the future, but also with the teachers who must adequately prepare them to meet it.

Speaking with students and teachers for Marshall Islands National Education Week at Jabro Private School on Ebeye, Kwajalein Schools Superintendent Dan Frazier explained how the world would likely look by the year 2025.

In 2006, the desktop computer will read voice mail and e-mail aloud, Frazier said. In 2009, personal computers will connect to telephones and translate foreign language conversations. In 2019, keyboarding skills will be obsolete since personal computers will no longer have keyboards, Frazier explained.

"Some of you will be working in or for companies from China or Japan, or Indonesia, because those countries are three of the six largest economies in 2025," Frazier explained to the Jabro High School students.

Jabro, established in 1982, is one of six schools serving children on the neighboring island of Ebeye. Attendance sits roughly at 350 students from pre-school through grade 12. The school is the only privately operated Ebeye school, which is not affiliated with a church, and runs on the tuition it collects and various

grant monies, when available.

"So where does education fall in all of this," Frazier asked the students?

"Fundamentally, education supports the democracy of the Republic of the Marshall Islands, helping the nation remain strong," Frazier said. Education also helps the nation's economy.

Bringing the issue closer to home, Frazier explained to the students an education would give them the chance to earn more money to support their families.

Moreover, "...earning an education gives you personal self respect," he added, "knowing you made the most of God's gift to you of life."

"Be willing to take risks, and never give up," Frazier stressed.

"...And don't forget about the importance of helping other people in your career plans. Remember that the light of a candle is never diminished when it lights another candle," Frazier explained of service careers including child- and health-care workers, ministers and priests, teachers and others who serve members of their community.

Jabro School Principal Kiorong Sam said she deeply appreciated the words of encouragement Frazier offered.

"We seldom have this kind of educational opportunity," she said of Frazier's visit, "...to give us important remarks that our students need as well as our faculty. Komol Tata."



On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej Island on the East Reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2N, longitude 167 45.8E, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8N, longitude 167 45.8E, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the West Reef. Bigej Island, including the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands. Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas (see maps).



In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window
