

Community involvement needed for Integrated Project team to succeed

At the March 17 Town Hall on Kwajalein, an audience member voiced his concerns about the Quality of Life program, where the funds are spent and who determines which projects are supported.

One of his primary concerns was that he felt the charter for the Integrated Product Team was not being followed and that the community did not have enough input in the decision process.

Kevin Finn, vice president/deputy program manager, Community Services, heads the Quality of Life IPT.

On Saturday, Finn explained that the Quality of Life program evolved from the proposal first made by the Kwajalein Range Services joint venture of Bechtel National and Lockheed Martin when they developed a plan to compete for the contract on Kwajalein.

In the proposal they stated that they would team with Chugach, an Alaskan native corporation, if their bid was successful.

The Department of Defense gives

financial bonuses to companies that pair with native corporations.

When KRS was successful in winning the contract bid for U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll, Chugach was part of the team.

The pieces fell into place, KRS has the contract, DoD pays an additional fee to KRS from the Office of the Secretary of Defense Indian Fund and, in turn, KRS puts a percentage of the money back into the community via the Quality of Life program. Indian Fund money is over and above normal operating funds from USAKA.

"We proposed to do it [determine use of the funds] using an integrated product team approach," Finn said.

The first Quality of Life IPT meeting was in August, 2003. The initial charter for the team read, "The mission of the QOL IPT is to provide recommendations to senior management for the improvement of the quality of life for all residents of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. The QOL IPT will also provide recommendations for improving the quality of life for our Marshallese employees."

The first charter and meetings

did not include community input. KRS leadership input and opinions were used as basis for initial spending recommendations, according to Finn.

In the beginning, the team worked with ideas, as funding was not available. They looked into ways to improve life in USAKA for employees and family members.

Beginning in 2004, the money started to trickle in, according to Finn. To date KRS has allocated more than a half a million dollars to Quality of Life projects.

Joe Marshall, Finn's predecessor at Community Services, wondered "How can we empower this IPT?" He realized that more community involvement would help the program.


"It is a positive thing [community involvement.] The representatives need to get out and talk to people," Finn said.

The updated charter for the IPT, under development since the fall of 2004, says, "To gather input from all demographics of the USAKA/RTS in order to develop recommendations



Skatepark re-opens for island skate fans

Skating fans have a place to roll around. The skate park located across from Café Pacific has been reopened as an unstaffed facility. The park was first opened in October, 2000 after a group of children signed a petition to the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander asking that the park be constructed.

“When the park was originally opened it was as a staffed facility. However, once the initial popularity of the park wore off the usage drastically declined,” said Kaya Landers, pools and beaches coordinator.

“During the last three months of operation as a supervised facility, in May, June and July of 2004, there were only about six visits total to the park. Due to the lack of usage, the park was closed,” said Landers.

According to Landers, Community Activities was tasked to look into reopening the park as an unstaffed facility available to the public as long as the park users abided by the regulations that pertain to required safety equipment and safe usage procedures.

After coordination with the safety departments for USAKA and Kwajalein Range Services, the park was reopened as an unstaffed facility last month. The park

has a half-pipe, a grind rail, a fun box and two quarter pipes.

Users are required to wear a helmet, elbow pads, wrist pads and knee pads. Skaters are also required to use the “buddy system” while utilizing the park. Other regulations are posted at the park.

Since the park was first opened, there have been a variety of different hours of operation, the park is now open 24 hours a day with lights for night use. There is no age limit on using the park. However, minors must abide by the curfew laws.

According to Landers the Skate Park is especially popular with school-age boys. She said that the skaters are a small, niche population.

There is no attendant on duty to watch the skaters. There is a phone located inside the park that can be used by the visitors.

“We intend to keep the park open in this manner as long as the users abide by all the rules. Since the reopening there has been increased usage and we hope this continues. The best way for that to happen is for all the skaters to police themselves and make sure they skate safely and with the appropriate gear,” said Landers.

to senior management that facilitate the use of Indian Fund expenditures for items that improve the morale and living conditions on the USAKA/RTS community. This committee evaluates and recommends usage of KRS team donations to the USAKA/RTS community.”

Determining which programs get funding is an evolving process. The committee is far seeing. Finn said the committee considers who benefits, ensuring that all groups’ needs are reviewed and slates projects to support the entire community. Project recommendations that will be funded by other sources are often rejected by the IPT. Finn said that the committee looks at projects that might otherwise not happen.

Funding is exact. Committee members research the cost of doing a project and must allocate the funds for it. “There is a finite amount of money,” Finn said.

Most members of the committee are volunteers, according to Finn.

The committee members represent a cross section of the community. Finn said that members understand that they need to find out what’s going on in the community so they can represent their groups in accord with the new IPT charter.

Some projects that have been funded were put in place prior to the new charter and as the committee evolved. These projects were initiated by the original committee members.

After the last Town Hall, some members of the community initiated a petition asking that the community have individual input in Quality of Life spending decisions and that some past decision(s) be reversed in favor of newer proposals. The petition was signed by about 80 community members. Finn said he thinks the petition helped the committee members understand how important it is for them to be accessible to the community. He added that there


won’t be community-wide votes on Quality of Life issues but that community members are encouraged to contact him, or a representative of the committee, with their suggestion on how to spend the funds – all suggestions will be forwarded to the entire IPT for consideration.

Some ongoing projects for the community include:

- Mobile kitchen arrived on the most recent barge.
- Golf course lockers will be replaced using Quality of Life funds.
- An ice machine will be put in the Adult Recreation Center as it was determined that many residents of the bachelor quarters have inadequate freezers.
- Emon Beach revitalization is in the design phase.
- Scholarships for high school seniors with parent(s) working at employees in USAKA/RTS. Students do not have to reside on Kwajalein, and Ebeye guest students at Kwajalein Jr./Sr. H.S. are eligible as well.



The new mobile kitchen arrived on the most recent barge. The kitchen will be used to provide on-site dining for the community and will enhance current dining services.



One of the projects funded through the Quality of Life IPT will be improvements to Emon Beach. Plans include an 800 square foot deck.
