
view, to grab the bike during inclement weather. It would have been quite the hoot to watch me trudge home in the rain.

# U.S. Army celebrates 230th birthday

After 230 years, the one thing a Soldier of 1775 and one today have had in common is the desire to fight and protect the United States.

Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld praised Soldiers Tuesday serving the United States and said the "Army's story is America's story."

Rumsfeld, Army Secretary Francis Harvey, Chief of Staff Gen. Peter Schoomaker and Sgt. Maj. Of the Army Kenneth O. Preston presided at a Pentagon ceremony marking the Army's birthday. On June 14, 1775, the Second Continental Congress approved legislation calling for the United States to raise 10 companies of infantry - about 1,000 Soldiers. Today the U.S. Army has more than 488,000 Soldiers on active duty, with 193,000 members of the Army Reserve and 330,000 National Guardsmen.

Today, one Soldier surpasses the

firepower of that first regiment. "Today, the Army stands as one of the greatest institutions in the world, the pre-eminent land power on Earth and the ultimate instrument of national resolve," Harvey said.

Throughout history "our Soldiers have displayed unmatched courage, commitment and willingness to sacrifice to achieve any mission," Schoomaker said. "They serve with incredible honor and distinction. They understood ... that our Constitution and the freedom it guarantees are worth fighting for."

The Army has changed with the times. Rumsfeld praised the service for efforts to make itself more flexible and more innovative as it tackles future challenges.

Rumsfeld said the Army has served nobly in the struggle against violent extremists. He noted Army Rangers parachuted into Kandahar early in Operation Enduring Freedom. The Army's 3rd Infantry Division made the famed Thunder Runs into Baghdad in April 2003.

And Soldiers who have "launched offensives against the violent extremists who killed 3,000 innocent men, women and children on Sept. 11, 2001."

Soldiers, though, are more than just warriors, the secretary said. Army personnel serve as "diplomats" and "peacekeepers" as well. "And with every new challenge, (Soldiers) have demonstrated their ability to rise to the occasion," he said.

Following the speeches, Schoomaker enlisted 28 recruits from the Baltimore Recruiting Battalion. The oldest and youngest Soldiers in the U.S. Army Military District of Washington cut a cake in honor of the birthday. And the assembled crowd together sang "Happy Birthday" to the U.S. Army.

Army figures show there are 256,000 Soldiers deployed overseas in a number of capacities. There are 114,000 Soldiers in Iraq, 15,000 in Afghanistan, 26,000 in Korea, 1,400 in Kosovo and 700 Soldiers in the Sinai.

# Bank of Marshall Islands coming to Kwaj

At 1 p.m. on June 25, the Bank of the Marshall Islands will hold a grand opening for their facility which will be in the trailer closest to the Dock Security Checkpoint.

According to Maj. David Coffey, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nation Office, USAKA has a long-term vision which involves becoming more economically integrated with the Marshallese community. "BOMI is an RMI business itself, but it also provides economic support that will enable other RMI businesses to come to USAKA," he said.

With the new banking facility, Kwajalein Range Services will discontinue RMI employee payroll check cashing in Building 900 on paydays.

Robert Burt, KRS Finance manager, said "With the departure of the Bank of Guam on Nov. 30, KRS finance assumed the responsibility to ensure that the

RMI workforce had the ability to cash their payroll checks. This was an interim measure that we provided until a permanent solution was developed. We feel that the opening of BOMI on Kwaj will bring additional services and options to the RMI workforce."

KRS cashes approximately 600 checks on Kwajalein and another 100 on Roi-Namur. "We will continue to provide the bi-weekly service on Roi. It is my understanding that BOMI will provide full banking services to the RMI workforce on Kwaj," Burt said.

Coffey said that BOMI is important because it will provide full banking services to include no-fee check cashing services to C-Badge employees.

"BOMI's presence will also allow C-Badge employees easier access to full banking services and will not require them to miss as much work time as they do when going to Ebeye to conduct banking business," Coffey said.

Coffey added that USAKA has just finished staffing the legal agreement which will bring a Marshallese-run scuba shop to USAKA in the near future.

# Environmentally speaking

## *Training, education ensures waterways remain clean*

On Wednesday morning an estimated half gallon of hydraulic oil leaked onto the asphalt near the Small Boat Marina ramp. No oil made it to the water.

All of the right steps were taken to prevent the oil from either being absorbed into the soil or getting into the water. The Kwajalein Fire Department was called, they responded promptly. The Kwajalein Range Services Environmental Department was notified. It was a minor spill and was cleaned up quickly.

The Department of Defense, Department of the Army, KRS and U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll take environmental issues seriously.

On Kwajalein, procedures are in place to ensure that any type of hazardous spill is contained.

“Fuel spills rarely occur and when they do they are usually small. USAKA averages three spills a month of various substances but out of these only one every other month or two is actual fuel. Spills to surface water, in general, rarely occur due to the diligence of our employees,” said Cathy Madore, Project Environmental lead with KRS Environment, Safety and Health office.

Though Wednesday’s spill was quickly controlled, Madore said there are procedures in place to handle bigger problems. “The Kwajalein Fire Department is the

first responder to all spill events. KRS Environmental is notified by the FD when spills occur. That is what happened in this case. The person that discovers the spill is responsible for calling 911 to report. Once the Fire Department is notified of a spill and is told that it has reached surface water, the Marine Department is notified. They will respond with appropriate containment equipment such as booms to keep the material from spreading and then skim the material off the surface of the water if possible,” Madore added.

Keeping our waterways clean is a top priority.

“All water should be capable of supporting marine life and suitable for recreation [no floating oil, scum or debris, doesn’t have objectionable odor, color, taste or turbidity, etc.] Any substance that degrades the environment to a point where it can’t meet these standards is considered harmful to some extent. Certain fuels or other substances can be more harmful than others, but it really depends more on the area in which it is spilled and the amount,” Madore said.

Beach-area water is sampled weekly for bacteria to ensure the water is safe for swimming.

According to Madore there are different standards for water that can be found in the USAKA Environmental Standards. The waters around USAKA are considered Class AA, Class A or Class B waters. Class AA waters should remain in as nearly the natural

pristine state as possible with an absolute minimum of pollution from any source. These waters are found in the open lagoon and approximately 2,000 feet from the ocean shoreline. Class A waters are suitable for recreation (swimming, fishing, etc.) and should be kept clean of trash, solid materials, and oil. Class A waters can be found at our public beaches, Kwajalein lagoon area, ocean side, etc. Class B waters are small boat harbors, shipping areas, bait fishing, etc. These are the areas around the small boat marina, Echo Pier, Fuel Pier, etc.

The water ways surrounding Kwajalein are an important part of life on the atoll. Motorized boats are used daily, with that is the possibility of spills. "It is impossible to know how much fuel gets into the water, but the obvious goal is zero. Fueling of B-Boats is done by the Small Boat Marina and they take care to ensure fuel is not spilled into the water. Fueling operations for the larger boats is done on the fuel pier and is overseen by Logistics and the Marine Department. Again, the goal is zero discharge to the lagoon and they take great care to ensure that is met," Madore said.

The USAKA Environmental Standards set the bar for how clean the lagoon water should be along with RMI law. KRS Environmental oversees activities at USAKA to ensure the standards are met. "Ultimately, it is everyone's responsibility to ensure that the water quality

remains stable or even improves during our stay here. While all personnel who work in or near the water have been trained on keeping the water environmentally safe, the average citizen can do their part too," Madore said.

According to Madore, all citizens are responsible for calling 911 if they spill anything into any surface water (lagoon or ocean), on the road or down a storm drain.

The small spill on Wednesday was cleaned up quickly. It was completed in less than an hour. Part of the reason for the quick response to the spill was education and a concern for the environment.

Madore added that spills from vehicles are the largest contributor of releases to the environment. The message we wish to put forward is for all users to inspect their vehicles prior to driving. Start the vehicles and look for leaks. If the vehicle is leaking, contact automotive for repairs. Also, if you notice a leak from any vehicles driving on island, please identify the vehicle and report it to KRS Environmental.

Madore said that parents can help educate their children in caring for the environment.

"It's really quite easy to teach young people to keep our water clean and it goes back to the fundamentals of taking responsibility for your actions. Clean up your trash, dispose of things properly and teach others to do the same," she said.

# ALL-day KINDERGARTEN

## gets green light, will be in place Aug. 12

When school starts back up on Aug. 12, an all-day kindergarten program will be in place.

According to Dan Frazier, Kwajalein School's superintendent, in prior years, students attended for three hours each day. During that time, students also received special classes in art, computers, library, music and physical education. Plus each half-day included recess. Therefore, the amount of time for actual classroom instruction was limited. The new all-day kindergarten will be academically-based in the morning with students working on pre-reading and pre-mathematics skills, among other things.

"As a school, we began last fall to look for ways to improve the academic achievement of our students. We considered full-day kindergarten as a means that many schools had used successfully," he said.

The all-day program is optional. Parents have the option to enroll their children for just a half-day in the morning. So there will be some students who will attend for only the morning and others who return after lunch for the full day. The afternoon will include more center-based learning. Learning centers will be set up around the rooms, and students will move from center to center, experiencing different things. "It will be very active and hands-on learning," Frazier said.

According to Frazier extra space is necessary because of the learning centers. "Therefore, kindergarten is moving into the newer building (351) on the north side of the elementary campus. Our largest classrooms are in this building," he said.

"Elementary schools are changing. Most kindergarten students in the U.S. are educated in all-day programs," Frazier said. The typical kindergarten student is already five-years-old prior to the start of school and turns six some time during his or her kindergarten year.

The school is anticipating two sections of 17 to 18 students in each section in the morning and approximately 15 students in each section in the afternoon. Attending the full-day kindergarten will also be five students from Ebeye, selected as part of the guest student program.

"Each year, more states adopt all-day kindergarten programs. Just this year, the state legislatures in Arizona and Nevada voted the programs in. The Department of Defense implemented all-day kindergarten in all DoDEA [Department of Defense Education Activity] schools a few years ago," Frazier said.

All-day kindergarten is being implemented at no additional cost to USAKA, according to Frazier. "The ele-

mentary reallocated its teachers internally. Therefore, the full-day service will be provided without charge to the parents," he said.

Frazier added that the Child Development Center is lowering its minimum age. "Currently, due to space limitations, the CDC does not accept students younger than two-and-a-half in age. Starting in the fall, the CDC will open its doors to children as young as two. This is something the community has been requesting for many years," Frazier said.

Teachers for the program are two veteran Kwajalein teachers: Angie Dampier and Susan Davis.

Both teachers are advocates of the all-day kindergarten approach. "I taught full-day kindergarten before coming to Kwajalein. The teacher and the students do not feel "rushed" to accomplish all that is required from the curriculum. I believe that the children attending full-day kindergarten will benefit through the less time restraints," Dampier, a five-year resident of Kwajalein, said.

"I think kindergarten has a significant influence on children. It sets the stage and develops the building blocks for their years in elementary school. I think all-day kindergarten along with an appropriate set up, gives students the time to learn in a developmentally appropriate setting. The curriculum may not change significantly, but having the extra time and space will help us deliver the instruction in a more developmentally appropriate way that is in line with current research on how young children learn. I am most excited about not having to "rush" five-year-olds through their academic learning and seeing them really get a chance to learn through center time as well," Davis said. "I went into teaching out of a desire to really understand what children need and how they learn. I stay in teaching for more selfish reasons. There is a lot of joy in a classroom full of kids. Who wouldn't want to be in a happy place and feel like they were helping someone learn?"

"I teach because I enjoy being part of helping children learn. It can be learning how to write their names, how to mix two colors to make another, to read or how to share a toy with a friend. Their capacity of learning is endless. Knowing that I have the opportunity to be a part of that learning is why I teach," Dampier said.

Enrollment packets are available at the elementary office. Frazier said that parents are encouraged to stop in at their earliest convenience.

"We are ready to fully implement this program. Our classroom have been selected, teachers assigned, and supplies ordered. Curriculum development for this new kindergarten program will take place throughout the coming year."

# Honoring fallen heroes

The following 28 U.S. servicemembers and civilians have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

**Linda J. Villar**, 41, of Franklinton, La., died June 3 in Baghdad, Iraq, from injuries sustained when a mortar struck her forward operating base. Villar worked for the U.S. Army Field Support Command, Fort Stewart, Ga.

**Lt. Col. Terrence K. Crowe**, 44, of New York died June 7 in Tal Afar, Iraq, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces using rocket-propelled grenades and small arms fire. Crowe was assigned to the Army Reserve's 10th Battalion, 98th Regiment, 4th Brigade, 98th Division, Lodi, N.J.

**1st Lt. Michael J. Fasnacht**, 25, of Columbus, Ga., died June 8 in Tikrit, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Bradley Fighting Vehicle. Fasnacht was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 15th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Benning, Ga.

**Lance Cpl. Marc L. Tucker**, 24, of Pontotoc, Miss., died June 8 as a result of a non-hostile vehicle accident in Asr Uranium, Iraq. He was assigned to 9th Engineer Support Battalion, 3rd Force Service Support Group, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Okinawa, Japan. During Operation Iraqi Freedom, his unit was attached to 2nd FSSG, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward).

**Capt. Phillip T. Esposito**, 30, of Suffern, N.Y. and **1st Lt. Louis E. Allen**, 34, of Milford, Pa. died on June 8 in Tikrit, of injuries sustained on June 7 in Tikrit, when an explosion of unknown origin occurred near their location. Both soldiers were assigned to the Army National Guard's Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 42nd Infantry Division, Troy, N.Y.

**Sgt. Michael J. Kelley**, 26, of Scituate, Mass., died June 8 in Shkin, Afghanistan, when his helicopter landing zone came under enemy fire. Kelley was assigned to the Army National Guard's 101st Field Artillery Battalion, Rehoboth, Mass.

**Pfc. Emmanuel Hernandez**, 22, of Yauco, Puerto Rico, died June 8 in Shkin, Afghanistan, when his helicopter-landing zone came under enemy fire. Hernandez was assigned to the Army's 319th Airborne Field Artillery Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade, Vicenza, Italy.

**Pfc. Douglas E. Kashmir**, 27, of Sharon, Pa., died June 8 in Nippur, Iraq, when the wrecker in which he was a passenger was involved in a non-combat related rollover. Kashmir was assigned to the Army's 70th Transportation Company, Mannheim, Germany.

**Sgt. Roberto Arizola, Jr.**, 31, of Laredo, Texas, died June 8 in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Arizola was assigned to the Army's 297th Military Intelligence Battalion, 513th Military Intelligence Brigade, Fort Gordon, Ga.

Five Marines, **Lance Cpl. Dustin V. Birch**, 22, of Saint Anthony, Idaho; **Lance Cpl. Daniel Chavez**, 20, of Seattle; **Lance Cpl. Thomas O. Keeling**, 23, of Strongsville, Ohio; **Lance Cpl. Devon P. Seymour**, 21, of St. Louisville, Ohio and **Cpl. Brad D. 


