Returning Iraq War veteran appreciates support

When I came home from Iraq a couple of months ago, I kept the promise I made while I was still there: I wouldn't watch the news, and I'd step away from the war, ignoring the events that had consumed my life 24 hours a day, seven days a week. It was time to catch up with my family and make them the focus of my life 24/7.

For about a month I was able to successfully ignore the constant horrid imagery and sensational reports filed from Iraq. But as a public affairs officer and self-proclaimed news junkie, I soon found myself scanning headlines on the Web and tuning into radio news programs, instead of my favorite jazz station.

I don't think the charred skeletal remains of a vehicle-borne explosive device are the watermark of this war. The images I see back here are not the same indelible images I saw in Iraq - those of a resilient country making its way back from decades of oppression - helped by the many friendly nations that liberated them.

But now I'm on the sidelines and instead of feeling and hearing the car bomb explode and seeing its eerie black plume of smoke rise nearby, I read about it. And rather than witness history as I did for a year, I find myself writing my comrades to get accurate accounts of what is happening in Iraq.

What I saw in Iraq was the boundless

bravery of a seemingly endless line of Iraqi recruits gathered to join the Iraqi army, the smiles and waves of Iraqis as we convoyed through the city of Sulaymaniyah, the first flight of the Iraqi air force, and the sound of Iraqi tank guns as they thundered for the first time in years in support of liberty, not tyranny.

I remember the jubilation of my Iraqi friends as they showed off their ink-stained fingers, a badge of honor on their fingertips, indicating they had voted in their country's first democratic election in decades. I remember the Iraqi female military police soldiers who became pioneers for women in that region by joining the Iraqi military, clearing not just personal hurdles, but cultural ones.

Mostly, I remember the thousands of Iraqi and coalition troops that each day hunted the enemy and kept me safe. I remember the drivers and gunners on convoy, the pilots and crew chiefs in the sky, the sentries and tankers at the gates, and all of the warriors who were out there trying to make Iraq a better and safer place.

Someday, probably decades from now, the actions of this generation and its brave men and women will grace history books. The lesson, I'm confident, will be that they left a peaceful and productive imprint on the region and its people, and forever changed the landscape of the Middle East.

Despite what is being reported and what

is reflected in media opinion polls, there is no doubt in my mind that the public is behind the troops in Iraq.

While I was in Iraq, I received hundreds of Christmas cards from students at an elementary school and from members of a church in Florida. A sorority from Indiana sent dozens of letters and cards of support, and Americans from all over the country sent me e-mails from places like Chicago, Sacramento, and Texas just to name a few.

Wool caps made by an Internet knitting club kept me warm during the cold winter months in Iraq and donated phone cards kept me in touch with my family who waited for me more than 6,000 miles away. Care packages stuffed with goodies and comfort items were never in short supply at our command. In fact, we had to appoint a "morale sergeant" to manage all of the goodwill pouring into our compound.

When I came home in uniform on rest and relaxation, strangers approached me at the airport and shook my hand, patted me on the back, and thanked me. Airline employees did what they could, offering passes to their VIP lounges and upgrades to first class, and those airlines who had nothing to offer did what they could—extra pillows, fistfuls of peanut or pretzel bags and free headsets. But their "thanks" alone was enough for me.

Housing residents are responsible for maintaining grounds, yard areas

Keeping our island beautiful is everyone's responsibility. If you live in family housing you have your own little piece of Kwaj to maintain, your yard.

According to U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Regulation 210-50 residents of family housing and trailers are responsible for maintaining the grounds surrounding their quarters. Yard mowing and trimming should be carried out at least 50 feet from the residence, to the road or fire lane, or to the midpoint between adjoining quarters whichever is closer. No improvements or modifications shall alter the yard drainage (contour or slope). Most yard areas on island are relatively small. Plant placements and quantities should be reasonable to allow for pest control management. Plant and yard accessories may not block fire lanes and roads.

"What we see a lot of is people doing landscaping which is totally illegal," said Flynn Gideon, Housing Services supervisor.

People are doing it with good intent; he said, "It is not that they can't do it, we just need to know what they want to do so they don't create drainage problems."

According to Gideon, if a resident wishes to do any improvements to their yard they must contact the housing office. "I need something in writing telling me what your plans are to make sure it will not cause drainage problems or cover up a sewer line or something like that," he said.

There is information in the Welcome Packet that defines some of the yard work requirements including that grass shall not be allowed to exceed 5 inches in height. After cutting, grass should have a uniform height throughout, free of grass clippings on walks, drives or otherwise finished surfaces. Trimming within the improved area shall be accomplished each time such areas are mowed.

Hedges and shrubs shall be trimmed or pruned prior to attaining a new growth of 8 inches or more. All clippings shall be bagged and/or neatly bundled and left at the curb for trash pickup.

Fallen leaves shall be removed from yard areas and shrubbery. Removal shall be done no less than once every two weeks. Leaves shall be bagged and left at the curb for trash pickup.

Potted plant placement and quantities should be reasonable to allow for pest control management, building maintenance and emergency access to quarters. Residents are not allowed to plant hedges, shrubbery, trees, or other plants without written authorization from the Logistics Housing Office.

Personal items such as storage lockers, bicycles, children's toys and other accessories stored in the front or back of the quarters shall be neatly kept; may not block fire lanes or roads; may not prohibit pest control management, building maintenance and emergency access to quarters.



Well-kept grounds and yards keep Kwajalein a clean and beautiful place to live. All housing residents are responsible for yard and grounds upkeep.

Building material such as lumber, brick, concrete block, pipes, etc. shall not be kept at quarters. Residents have 90 days from purchase and /or transfer to ownership of such items to make use of them or must remove them from the premise.

There are many items available at Self Help, free of charge that can be used in maintaining a resident's yard such as lawn mowers, weed eaters, grass seed and fertilizers.

"Lawn mowers can be delivered to your quarters, however, there have been times that I have called to reserve one and there is not one available for a few days so make sure that you don't wait until the last minute," Gideon advised.

He also explained that you can hire someone to do your yard maintenance for you if you wish. Marshallese workers must leave the island after work is completed so sometimes they will make it a two-day job.

According to the Welcome Packet housing residents who hire out their lawn care are responsible for calling to make arrangements for lawn mower and weed eater delivery. 'Hired help' are not authorized self-help customers.

Gideon reminds all residents that crushed rocks or gravel is not allowed to be used in yards.

"You are responsible for your yard if you or on-island or off. If you will be gone longer than 14 days you are required provide housing with a care taker," he said.

According to Gideon "if you do not abide by these rules a series of things could happen." The policy is that on the first offense a letter is sent to the occupant from the housing office saying that the yard need to me maintained. On the second offense a letter is sent from the occupants sire manager. The third offense a letter from USAKA legal is sent and could include intent to bar.

Summertime means CAMP ADVENTURE

Program keeps island youths entertained

Summer fun is here, Camp Adventure is in its third week. Camp Adventure is a weekly summer camp for children on Kwajalein, as well as U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Host Nation Office sponsored Republic of the Marshall Island children.

The program covers eight weeks, with the entire eight-week period open to Kwajalein children, including two-incremented periods for RMI children.

Approximately 100 children participate each week. And approximately 200 RMI children are expected to attend camp, according to Meghan McAndrew, assistant activities director.

The RMI children's attendance was limited to two-week increments to allow the maximum number of off-island young people the opportunity to experience the camp.

There are five counselors and one camp director who come from colleges in Iowa, Washington, Oregon and Hawaii.

During the eight weeks of camp children go to the pool and the library each week as well as a special field trip. This week's field trip was the fire department; other trips will include the Small Boat Marina, the golf course and the turtle pond.

Children also go to "tech time" each week with Jon Welchman, technology specialist. During this time they learn how to use global positioning systems, have digital photography scavenger hunts and work on computers.

According to McAndrew, another twist is that each counselor has a camp name such as Miss Twix, Miss Gummibear and Miss Popcorn. During the eight weeks of camp the children try to guess their counselor's name, on the last day of camp

each counselor will reveal their real name.

"Miss Twix," a camp counselor from University of Northern Iowa said she never even knew Kwajalein existed, but she was never going to forget her time here with the children.

"It is beautiful and relaxing here and the people are really nice," she said.

Gannon Bowman, 8-year-old camper, said his favorite part of camp is when they do clubs like cooking, drama and magic.

"My favorite part of camp is snack time and when we sing and play games outside," said Audrey Corbett, 7.

Week three of the camp is "Old Glory Week." Children sang patriotic songs and made flags. Next week will be "Space Week." Other themes for the remaining weeks will be "Zoo Week," "Around the World in 80 Days Week," "Pirates Week" and "All Star Sports Spectacular Week."

The morning session is from 8:30 to 11:30 a.m. and the afternoon session is from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m., children go home for lunch. Children can still be registered in the program. Registration may be done on a weekly basis. Payment is due no later than 11:30 a.m. on the Saturday prior to that week.

The cost of the program depends on the category in which each family falls. Prices range from \$18 to \$70 per week, per child.

Marshallese employee gains Six Sigma Yellow Belt status

Juliet Jelke has received her Yellow Belt certification through the Six Sigma Program.

While many members of the Kwajalein Range Services team have been training in this program, learning how to do their jobs more efficiently and sharing this knowledge with co-workers, Jelke is the first Republic of the Marshall Islands' employee to receive the Yellow Belt certification according to Krystal Peterson, a Master Yellow Belt.

Jelke is an Inventory Supply specialist with KRS and has worked on Kwajalein for 24 years.

Jelke said that she worked on her certification for five months. For her Process Improvement Project she developed a way to improve the cycle times for ordering and receiving fresh fruit, vegetables and dairy products. "The legacy process took 30-40 days from order input to physical receipt

on Kwajalein," she said.

"Cycle times will be reduced to approximately 7 days, enabling Retail Food Services and Food Services to more accurately match supply and demand," she added.

Jelke said that the Six Sigma training helped her keep an open mind, as well as "learn to be strong, to speak out, not holding back and be able to communicate and interact with people in the class – same as on the job."

She added that the training will improve her daily work by "knowing and understanding the importance of the Six Sigma tools and then using them to ensure our customers' needs and expectations are met."

Jelke said that having good people to work with that are willing to help, especially having a good champion, makes the training worth it.

Six Sigma, at many organizations, simply means a measure of quality that strives for near-perfections. Six Sigma is a disciplined, data-driven

approach and methodology for eliminating defects in any process – from manufacturing to transactional and from product to service.

The fundamental objective of Six Sigma methodology is the implementation of a measurement-based strategy that focuses on process improvement and variation reduction through the application of Six Sigma improvement projects.

According to the Six Sigma Academy, General Electric, one of the most successful companies implementing Six Sigma, has estimated benefits on the order of \$10 billion during the first five years of implementation.

Ask any returning war veteran and I'm sure you'll find their experience was similar. At one point I was so overwhelmed by the outpouring that I found myself in an airport restroom trying to keep my composure after a mother walked passed me with her two sons and one of them said aloud, "Thank you, Soldier," his brother waving anxiously at me.

On my return to the war after rest and relaxation, a few other Soldiers and I were dining on one last restaurant-cooked meal in the airport when the waitress approached us and told us that another patron had paid for our meal.

We thanked the man but said we couldn't accept his offer. He replied that it was "the least I can do for you guys," adding, "We're all proud of you."

In my town when I came home after the war, I passed homes displaying yellow ribbons and flying U.S. flags. At my welcome home party, a restaurant donated food for more than 100 guests and people all over the city made it a point to express their support and gratitude.

The support I received bordered on immense. Never had I expected such support, and never had I received so much for merely doing my job.

My memories of Iraq will forever be engrained in my mind alongside of the memories of the incredible outpouring I received when I came home. They are one.

Last weekend, keeping true to the promise I made to make my family the 24/7 focal point I attended a baseball game on Father's Day and during the seventh inning stretch there was a salute to U.S. military personnel serving the War on Terror.

A singer proudly sang "God Bless America" and all around me, people joined in and sang along.

My personal opinion poll has found, plus or minus a few percentage points, that the American people unconditionally support the Soldiers in Iraq. I arrive at this conclusion having experienced their support firsthand, and having been held in their warm embrace upon my return from the war.

And the support continues today. When I recently learned about the opinion poll results I e-mailed one of my stateside supporters who befriended me during the war. I wrote him to say hello, and to restate my appreciation for his support during my deployment.

I asked him if he had heard about the media opinion polls and he replied as I had when I learned of the poll.

Constantine. An ordinary man with an extraordinary gift must save the planet from evil in this action-packed fantasy. Unknown to most people, the world is crowded with spirits both good and evil who walk among us in human guise. One of the few who can see these spirits is John Constantine (Keanu Reeves), but the responsibility of his vision is more than he can stand, and he tries to kill himself. Saved from death, Constantine must now atone for his actions by acting as a guardian in the middle ground between Paradise and Hell.

Robots. For this follow-up to their mega-hit *Ice Age*, directors Carlos Saldanha and Chris Wedge team with the screenwriting duo behind *Parenthood* and *City Slickers*, Lowell Ganz and Babaloo Mandel. *Robots* stars Ewan McGregor as the voice of Rodney Copperbottom, an idealistic robot who wants to convince his electronic brethren to come together and work toward making the world a better place. As the story unfolds, Rodney faces opposition from an evil corporation headed by Big Weld (Mel Brooks) and finds some unlikely allies in the form of a ragtag group of misfit robots called the Rusties and voiced by the likes of Drew Carey and Amanda Bynes. Stanley Tucci and Dianne Wiest provide the voices of Rodney's parents, and Halle Berry portrays his love interest, Cappy.

The Pacifier. The toughest man in the American military faces a new kind of challenge — looking after four kids in soccer-mom suburbia — in this family-friendly comedy from Walt Disney Pictures. Shane Wolf (Vin Diesel) is a former Navy SEAL who was assigned to protect a scientist working on a top-secret defense project for the government. Despite Wolf's efforts, however, an assassin slipped past him and murdered the man he was guarding. The inventor's project is still being stored in his home, so Wolf has now been assigned to protect Julie (Faith Ford), the scientist's widow, as well as her four children, Zoe (Brittany Snow), Seth (Max Thieriot), Lulu (Morgan York), and baby Peter (Kegan Hoover and Logan Hoover). Wolf has had years of military experience in some of the most dangerous places on Earth, but he doesn't know much about raising kids, and he soon discovers his new job demands he be a nanny as much as a bodyguard. *The Pacifier* also co-stars Brad Garrett, Lauren Graham, and Carol Kane.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 15 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism. **Spc. Nicholas R. Idalski**, 23, of Crown Point, Ind., died June 21 in Ramadi, Iraq, where his unit was conducting combat operations and were attacked by enemy forces using small arms fire. Idalski was assigned to the Army's 1st Battalion, 9th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo.

Sgt. Arnold Duplantier II, 26, of Sacramento, Calif., died June 22 in Baghdad, Iraq, where he was providing cordon security, and was attacked by enemy forces using small arms fire. Duplantier was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 184th Infantry Regiment, Auburn, Calif.

Sgt. Joseph M. Tackett, 22, of Whitehouse, Ky., died June 23 in Baghdad, of a non-combat related injury. Tackett was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 76th Field Artillery, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart, Ga.

Lance Cpl. Holly A. Charette, 21, from Cranston, R.I., died June 23 from wounds sustained when a suicide, vehicle-borne, improvised explosive device struck her vehicle in Fallujah, Iraq.
