

I'm not saying they were tasteless globs of paste that starving dogs wouldn't have, but they were close. I love you anyway, sweetheart.


Getting something to eat is a real challenge now. We can't just open a can of chili, nuke it and call it dinner. We

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School Advisory Council holds monthly meeting

The School Advisory Council met Tuesday and discussed issues including policy changes and the academic calendar.

The official representatives and 11 other people attended the monthly meeting.

A North Central Association team will visit Kwajalein schools March 1-3. Visiting team members are: Philip Gordon LeBeau, a retired school administrator from Savage, Minn.; William Russell Munsell, an adjunct professor at the University of Colorado, Denver and Nicole Pangelinan, a guidance counselor, Anderson Elementary School, Guam. Kwajalein schools are accredited through NCA.

Ebeye guest students and parents for the elementary school met with Vice Principal Teri King and teacher Cheryl DeLong, Noda Lojkar, Republic of the Marshall Islands representative and Alan Taylor, Host Nations representative on Nov. 28. According to Pam Duffy, Ebeye parent representative, "Vice Principal Teri King and Cheryl DeLong helped us with some policies and rules that have been implemented for our guest students and will help us parents and the schools in making sure that our children are accounted for after school hours." The policies covered the safety issue of students riding water taxis to and from Kwajalein and signing out guest student children for lunch and after school programs. Duffy said the sign-in, sign-out sheet has been helpful.

Dan Frazier, superintendent of Kwajalein Schools,

explained the importance of reviewing school policies on a regular basis. "In my opinion, the best way to do this would be on a rotational basis, reviewing a portion of the policies each meeting," he said. James Landgraff, SAC chairman agreed, "It's a good school board policy to review policies," he said.

Policies 2000.07, Line of Authority; 3000.01, School Calendar; 3000.08, Child Care Services and 3000.20 Testing Program received first readings at the two-hour meeting. Policy 2000.07, Line of Authority was renamed as 2000.07 Communication Channels, it was approved unanimously.

Policy 3000.01, School Calendar, originally stated 'the superintendent will recommend a school calendar consistent with the requirement established by U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll to the school advisory council during the month of January each year for the following school year.' It was amended to state: no later than January each year giving more flexibility for presenting the calendar. It was approved unanimously.

Policy 3000.08, Child Care Services, was amended to read the child development center, a nursery school, providing services to island resident children age 2 (versus 2.5) through 6 years. This change brings the written policy in line with the actual requirements of the program. It was approved unanimously.

Policy 3000.20, Testing Program, was discussed at length with varying viewpoints. Bonnie Compton, representing PTO, wanted assurance that after a written policy was approved, it

would be followed. Frazier said of Policy 3000.20, "In my opinion, current policy is outdated. Modern schools need the flexibility to target specific areas for school improvement and adapt their metrics toward measuring student growth in these areas. Our school needs a policy that outlines the parameters for our testing program in general terms. Then specifics can be adapted annually." The standing Policy 3000.20 identified specific tests to be administered. The recommended changes made the policy more general, leaving identifying the tests to local representatives including the superintendent and principal with input from teachers. It added verbiage prohibiting testing which would identify students, or their families, political affiliations, sex behavior and attitudes, income, as well as other indicators which might be embarrassing for the student. Frazier said, "Please note that this proposed policy is a mandatory policy of the U.S. Department of Education and reflects federal law. The policy was approved with a 6-3 vote.

Brian Brewster, teacher representative, presented three school-year calendars: early start, late start version one and late start version two. He provided an information sheet with input from Kwajalein teachers. Most

of the teachers support the late start version one calendar.

This is a quick breakdown of the calendars:

Early start

Most similar to current calendar.

- First day for students is Aug. 8.
- Christmas break starts later; first semester ends before break.
- Last day of school is May 25.

Late start version one

First day for students is Aug. 18.

- End of first semester is Jan. 20.
- Last day of school is June 8.

Later start version two

First day for students is Aug. 25.

- End of first semester is Jan. 27.
- Last day of school is June 15.

The 2006-2007 school calendar will be voted on at the first SAC meeting of 2006, on Jan. 18.

The SAC acts in an advisory capacity to the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander and the logistics contractor to help establish and promote standards of educational services for both dependent children and adults residing on Kwajalein.

Christmas Drops bring holiday fun, presents to outer island children

It has been said that it is better to give than receive. Some island residents believe it and have spent many hours preparing and dropping off gifts to some of the neighboring islands.

The Yokwe Yuk Women's club organized a Christmas drop for the islands of Majetto and Ebadon.

According to Sherri Davis, Outer Island Christmas Drop chair, the funds were raised through the annual YYWC silent basket auction; \$2,677 was raised for the drop and another \$2,000 plus in donations came from individuals and companies on island which included the fire department silent auction. "We also collected donated items from the community

through our 'Wish List' collection drive in November, and the student council at the elementary school organized a collection drive of school supplies, shampoo and soap," she said.

The club ordered enough items for 250 Children. "We have a loving group of teachers who each year hand-make their gift bags and purchase items for the 50 0-2 year old children. Their bags included items such as a washcloth, bowl, cup, lotion and clothing. The Grace Sherwood Library graciously donated over 200 tote bags that we used for the children 3 and up. We filled each bag with new flip-flops, T-shirt, package of underwear, ball, coloring and activity book, crayons or markers, hygiene kit and toys. All the boys got hats and the girls hair accessories," Davis said, "We also

took a lot of community shared items such as school and medical supplies, fishing and sewing items and sporting equipment. We took 25 20-pound bags of rice and 375 pounds of apples and oranges. We gave two casting nets to Majetto and one to Ebadon.”

According to Anne Greene, the longest standing member of the YYWC, the drop began in December, 1988. It is the longest standing drop. The goods were delivered Thursday by two helicopters, leaving limited space for members of the club. Only three members were able to experience the drop. The ladies were greeted with smiling faces and handicrafts from the women of the islands. At both islands the children were lined up and ready to receive their gifts.

After distributing gifts to the children of Majetto, the school and members of the community both performed a dance for their visitors. They also expressed their thanks with gifts. At Ebadon each child handed the ladies a gift as they received their gift.

Jennifer Aakre, one of the women who attended said, “My most memorable time was when the kids and adults sang for us on Majetto. They did such a great job and you could see the sincerity in their faces. Although, for me, the whole experience was memorable, from the planning to the drop off. There were many ladies who put a lot of time and effort into the Christmas drop. To watch it and see the passion that goes into it was remarkable. To be a part of the actual drop was so neat. It was fun to see the children waiting in line and excitedly waiting for their gift bags. Everyone should get to experience the Christmas drop.”

Davis said, “I would like to thank the Kwajalein community for their wonderful support. Without the monetary donations and items donated we wouldn't be able to continue to do this each year.”

For the 14th year the Kwajalein Junior-Senior High School students made a trip to the island of Carlos

to spread Christmas cheer. Friday's trip was a school-sponsored co-curricular activity.

Peter Barbella, one of the organizers and sponsors of the drop, said “We feel we have developed a relationship with the people there over the years.

“We conduct a fund drive strictly in school during the Thanksgiving to Christmas time frame,” Barbella said, explaining how the funds for the drop are raised. “We have not finished counting, but we anticipate we will raise approximately \$3,000 this year,” he added.

A few teachers, 41 students and two KHS graduates returning to Kwaj for the holidays ventured to Carlos for most of the day. “We bring 24 boxes of grocery items, approximately one for each household on Carlos. We also bring a variety of other amenities: flip-flops, goody-bags of treats, jump ropes, footballs, Frisbees, hand-held mirrors, hair accessories, etc.,” Barbella said.

The school planned a fun-packed day for all the residents of the small island. “Santa shows up, gives out treats and toys to the kids. The kids play with the items received from Santa. In addition we bring bean toss, ring toss games. This year we brought a limbo bar. Our band students bring instruments and entertain with Christmas

songs. We have a piñata,” Barbella said. He added the people of Carlos sometimes perform for them with song and dance, and the community always prepares food for them.

Barbella, who has been organizing the event with Ric Fullerton for 12 years, said he is involved with this drop because “it is a chance to give something back to the Marshallese living close to Kwajalein. It is a service opportunity for our students. We love doing it and consider ourselves fortunate to have the opportunity to experience Carlos every year.”

Range operation scheduled for Tuesday

A range operation is scheduled for Tuesday.

Caution times are from 6:01 a.m. through 2:01 p.m. in conjunction with this operation, a caution area will exist within the Kwajalein Atoll.

The caution area is bounded on the north by Boked Island on the east reef and Yabbernohr Island on the west reef. On the south, the area is bounded by a line drawn north of Bigej on the east reef to a point at latitude 08 54.2n, longitude 167 45.8e, then to a point at latitude 08 52.8n, longitude 167 45.8e, and then to a point north of the high tide mark on Ninni Island on the west reef. Bigej, includ-

ing the inner reef, is specifically excluded and is not a part of the mid-atoll corridor.

Omelek, Eniwetak and Gellinam are designated as evacuated islands. All mid-atoll corridor islands are designated as sheltered islands.

Additional areas specified outside the mid-atoll are designated as caution areas, see maps.

In order to ensure clearance of non-mission support personnel from the mid-atoll corridor by the window opening time, Kwajalein Police Department island-clearance procedures began at approximately 7:30 a.m. today and continue until evacuation has been accomplished. Egress of all


air and seacraft will be required when requested by authorized clearance personnel. Subsequent to lagoon clearance, the hazard area will be in effect until mission completion.

In the event of a mission slip, the caution times and areas will be in effect for the following days:

From 6:01 a.m. through 2:01 p.m. Wednesday


From 6:01 a.m. through 2:01 p.m. Thursday

Kwajalein Atoll: Mid-atoll corridor lagoon caution area

In accordance with U.S. Army Regulation 190-14, the mid-atoll corridor will be closed beginning at L-3 days (today) to allow ground surveillance of the mid-atoll corridor to be completed. When closed, no surface vessels shall be permitted in this area without prior approval from the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll/Reagan Test Site Command Safety Directorate (51910 or 53243 pager 112). The area closure is indicated by the 'red flag system.' The range safety officer will release the mid-atoll corridor closure when the area is clear of all hazards.

BOA and airspace areas are closed at L-1 hour mission day, 6 a.m. Tuesday until released by the range safety officer. No surface vessels shall be permitted in Kwajalein mid-atoll and the east reef areas within the red border lines on the map without prior approval from the Command Safety Directorate.

40 Year Old Virgin. One man nervously ventures forth into the final frontier in this comedy starring Daily Show regular Steve Carell. Andy Stitzer (Carell) is a cheerfully geeky guy who is settling into middle age with his large collection of comic books, action figures, and collectable models. Andy works in the billing department of a big-box electronics store, and seems reasonably happy with his life. However, one day his friends and co-workers David (Paul Rudd), Jay (Romany Malco), and Cal (Seth Rogen) discover that Andy has a secret — due to his rather severe jitters around women, Andy is still a virgin. Andy's pals are appalled at this state of affairs, and set out to find a woman who'd be willing to get horizontal with him. After a number of disastrous dates, everyone thinks Andy has finally struck gold when he meets Trish (Catherine Keener), an attractive single mother who takes an immediate liking to him.

Four Brothers. Four men come together to find out how and why the woman who raised them was killed in this hard-edged urban drama from director John Singleton. Short-tempered Bobby (Mark Wahlberg), struggling musician Jack (Garrett Hedlund), streetwise Angel (Tyrese Gibson), and hard-working Jeremiah (Andre Benjamin) are four guys who don't appear to have much in common, in terms of either race or temperament. However, these men have one very important bond — all four were adopted and raised by the same woman (Fionnula Flanagan), and they all love her as a son, and respect one another as brothers. When their mother is killed during a robbery at a grocery store, the four brothers come together for the funeral, but when they don't get straight answers about what happened to her, they begin looking into the crime themselves.

Global War on Terror

Honoring fallen heroes

The following 16 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Cpl. Joseph P. Bier, 22, of Centralia, Wash., died Dec. 7 from an improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Ar Ramadi, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Twentynine Palms, Calif. During Operation Iraqi Freedom, Bier's unit was attached to 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force (Forward).

Sgt. Michael C. Taylor, 23, of Hockley, Texas, died Dec. 7 in Balad, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Heavy Expanded Mobility Tactical Truck while his unit was conducting combat operations. Taylor was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 13th Field Artillery, 214th Field Artillery Brigade, III Corps Artillery, Fort Sill, Okla.

Sgt. Spencer C. Akers, 35, of Traverse City, Mich., died Dec. 8 at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Texas, of injuries sustained in Habbaniyah, Iraq, on Nov. 21, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Akers was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 125th Infantry Regiment, Saginaw, Mich.

1st Lt. Kevin J. Smith, 28, of Brandon, Fla., died Dec. 8 in Baghdad, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Smith was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 76th Field Artillery, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart, Ga.

Staff Sgt. Milton Rivera-Vargas, 55, of Boqueron, Puerto Rico, died Dec. 8 in Kalsu, Iraq, from a non-combat related cause while on guard duty. Rivera-Vargas was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 296th Infantry Regiment, Sabana Grande, Puerto Rico.

Sgt. Adrian N. Orosco, 26, of Corcoran, Calif., died Dec. 9 in Baghdad, when a vehicle-borne improvised explosive device detonated near his dismounted position during combat operations. Orosco was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Irwin, Calif.

Sgt. Clarence L. Floyd, Jr., 28, of Newark, N.J., died Dec. 10 in Taji, Iraq, when his unit was attacked by enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. Floyd was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 320th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell, Ky.

Sgt. Julia V. Atkins, 22, of Bossier City, La., died Dec. 10 in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near her HMMWV during patrol operations. Atkins was assigned to the 64th Military Police Company, 720th Military Police Battalion, 89th Military Police Brigade, Fort Hood, Texas.

Two Soldiers died Dec. 10 in Baghdad, as a result of enemy small arms fire. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell. Killed were: **Staff Sgt. Travis L. Nelson**, 41, of Anniston, Ala. and **Sgt. Kenith Casica**, 32, of Virginia Beach, Va.

Sgt. 1st Class James S. Moudy, 37, of Newark, Del., died Sunday in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Moudy was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 71st Cavalry, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Staff Sgt. Keith A. Bennett, 32, of Holtwood, Pa., died Sunday in Ar Ramadi, as the result of a suicide, vehicle-borne improvised explosive device. Bennett was assigned to the Army National Guard's 28th Military Police Company, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, Johnstown, Pa.

Spc. Lex S. Nelson, 21, of Salt Lake City, died Monday in Tikrit, when he fell from a guard tower. Nelson was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 41st Field Artillery, 1st Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart.

Spc. Jared W. Kubasak, 25, of Rocky Mount, Va., died Monday in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near his M2A2 Bradley Fighting Vehicle during patrol operations. Kubasak was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Carson, Colo.

Staff Sgt. Curtis A. Mitchell, 28, of Evansville, Ind., died Monday in Baghdad, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his M1A1 Abrams tank during combat operations. Mitchell was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 7th Cavalry, 2nd Brigade, 3rd Infantry Division, Fort Stewart.

Cpl. Michael B. Presley, 21, of Batesville, Miss., died Wednesday at Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany of wounds sustained from a suicide, vehicle-borne improvised explosive device while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Fallujah, Iraq, on Monday. He was assigned to 2nd Combat Engineer Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.




