
I left to go get some things at Ten-Ten, which took 30 minutes or so, and when I returned, he said he was done.

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Extreme makeover

PBQ final demolition to begin in July

The Pacific Bachelor Quarters will be nothing but a memory by the end of the summer.

Kwajalein Range Services Public Works has been taking it apart bit by bit for several months and a deployed unit of Soldiers from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will begin the final tear down in July according to Lloyd Jordan, KRS Logistics manager of program support.

"Public Works is tasked with the interior demolition including walls, ceilings, duct work, plumbing, windows and fixtures; removal of the built up roof system, and relocation of utilities. Basically we will turnover a concrete structure to the troops," Jordan said.

The 76, 210-square foot building was built in 1952.

A team of between 25 and 30 laborers are getting the building

ready for the Soldiers to take over.

Jordan estimated the take down of the remaining concrete structure will be 45 days.

There is a process when taking down a building and a plan for what to do with everything from wood to windows. "Normal construction debris goes to the land fill. Hazardous material is properly contained and prepared for off island shipment. Glass removed is processed in the glass crusher to be used later. Concrete from the final disposal will be transported to a designated area near the landfill," Jordan said.

Many of the interior items aren't going to the dump, but are headed to other projects.

"Some interior items will be reused such as ceiling tiles, doors, door handles and locks. Glass will be crushed for use later and all wood will be turned into mulch," Jordan said.

Safety and environmental issues are important with this project. Jordan said, "Special personal protective equipment and training

is required when removing the hazardous materials; fall protection is a critical safety precaution while working on the roof removal portion. Other PPE for dust and other hazards is used as needed. Approved job hazard analyses are prepared for each specific activity or task taking place." He added, "The removal of ACM [asbestos floor tiles and mastic] and transite walls are the hazardous material being removed."

The final demolition method is undecided. "There has been discussion about using explosives on a small scale to weaken the columns before taking them down, but this has not been formally approved," Jordan said.

When funding is available the ocean-view area will be used for a U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll headquarters building and additional facilities.

The troop deployment team is scheduled to send a recon group to make a final review.



Going home

Stayin' alive

Los Angeles deputy sheriff teaches Kwaj first responders defensive art techniques

One step forward, two steps back, right hand forward, left hand up. It could have been a modern jazz dance class, but the instructor, a compact man with a buzz haircut, didn't look as if he was preparing the two rows of students for a recital.

He looked dead serious. From his erect posture to his steady gaze, Jim Grady exuded confidence and ability.

Grady, a deputy sheriff from Los Angeles, Calif., spent Wednesday, Thursday and Friday introducing knife defense, tactical swimming and high risk entry training to members of the Kwajalein Police and Fire Departments. The participants from the fire department are training to be tactical medics who will support KPD's Special Response Team.

Grady has more than 22 years in law enforcement and is equally deadly with his hands, knives or a gun.

"There were 11 people undergoing training. It's intended to supplement new capabilities and dimensions of the SRT," Capt. Jeff Mullin, KPD deputy chief said. He added that KPD is required to maintain an SRT.


Mullin added that the members of the fire department in the program were there to become familiar with police tactics, but wouldn't be expected to carry weapons or function as police officers in an emergency situation.

In Wednesday's knife defense course, students learned to identify and demonstrate 12 angles of attack with an edged weapon, three different ways of gripping an edged weapon, several ways of defending against an attack with an edged weapon and how to use an edged weapon in a defensive manner.

"In real-life situations EMTs [emergency medical



Sergeants Brandon Ridens and Jason Ellison, KPD, team up during training Wednesday.




Access Control officer Joseph Joseph listens as instructor Jim Grady explains how to exit water in a stealthy manner.

technicians] and firefighters help extricate injured persons,” Molly Frazier, a tactical medic in training, said. “We are the first responders; we have no backup,” she added, identifying the need for the training. She said the three-day course offered a “whole new perspective.”

Police Officer Brandon Ridens said the training helped him build his confidence, not only in himself but in his SRT partners. He added that in the knife training he learned something new, to defend against an attack of that type.

Lt. Corey Wiley is a firefighter, but for a few days he had a peek into the life of a policeman. “The two departments have been trying to become more unified,” he said and added that he’d always had an underlying interest in police work.

Thursday’s training took place in a classroom, the adult pool and the lagoon. SRT members, wearing fatigues and equipment, learned how to set up an operational plan using surface swimming techniques to effectively reach an intended target, enter the water as

a team from a moving boat, using high and low speed casting techniques, make appropriate selections for a maritime environment and waterproof that equipment,

Use it or lose it

Lack of use jeopardizes mammography

It's possible the Kwajalein Hospital could lose Federal Drug Administration certification of the mammography program in June.

And it's not because the hospital staff isn't doing its part, but because too few Kwajalein residents are getting mammograms.

Kwajalein Imaging has two certified mammography technologists; each must perform 200 exams in a two year period to maintain FDA certification according to Susan Zehr, lead mammography technologist at Kwajalein Hospital.

"We performed only 235 last year and do not appear to be able to reach 200 this year. Approximately 30 percent of those are DOE patients. Decertification of our program by FDA during June inspection appears likely due to decrease support from community," she said.

It's not as if mammograms aren't important.


In the United States, a woman who lives to be 90 has a 1 in 8 risk of being diagnosed with breast cancer. The National Cancer Institute predicts with 212,920 cases expected, breast cancer will be the most frequently diagnosed non-skin malignancy in U.S. women this year. The American Cancer Society reports in the same year, breast cancer will kill approximately 40,970 women, second only to lung cancer as a cause of cancer mortality in women. Men have breast tissue and can develop breast cancer too. Approximately 460 new cases will be diagnosed in 2006. The men at highest risk are over 65, African-American, exposed to radiation therapy, and have a family history of breast cancer.

Women should have annual mammograms conducted after they reach 40 or at the request of their physician if there is a family history according to Zehr. She said men should have them when there is

a suspicion of nodule or cyst.

"Every woman is at some risk for breast cancer—this is merely the risk of living as a woman. But there are many risk factors that can make one woman's picture differ substantially from another's," Zehr said. "Major risk factors that increase the chance of developing breast cancer above baseline include age, family history of breast cancer (mother or father), first pregnancy after age 30, and nulliparity (never given birth). Minor risk factors include obesity, early menstruation (before age 12), and late menopause (women who stop having periods later than age 50)."

When it comes to breast cancer, in most instances, a breast lump, a localized thickening in the breast or a dimple, are the only physical signs of breast cancer. "A mammogram is the most effective way to detect breast lumps too small to be felt or seen. It usually consists of four low-dose x-rays – one taken from the top of the breast and one from the side of each breast. Mammograms are slightly uncomfortable because the breast needs to be compressed for a few moments to ensure a high quality image and to reduce the radiation dose to breast tissue," Zehr said.

She added, "Generally, the earlier breast cancer is diagnosed, the higher the survival rate, but many women fail to get recommended annual mammograms to detect breast cancer. A busy life or procrastination may be to blame. For other women, misconceptions about mammograms may be holding them back. The June issue of Mayo Clinic Women's HealthSource addressed some of these common myths and facts about mammograms."

Myth: Mammograms do more harm than good.

Fact: Mammograms, along with a breast exam by your health care provider, are the best ways to detect breast cancer at an early stage. Mammograms often find cancer before a lump can be felt. But they do have limitations. Mammograms miss from 10 to 15 percent of breast cancers. Another limitation: Mammograms can result in false-positives.

Myth: Mammograms are useless if

Myth: Using antiperspirants causes breast cancer.

Fact: There is no evidence that the active ingredient in antiperspirants or reducing perspiration from the underarm area influences breast cancer risk. The supposed link between breast cancer and antiperspirants is based on misinformation about anatomy and a misunderstanding of breast cancer

Myth: Birth control pills cause breast cancer.

Fact: Modern day birth control pills contain a low dose of the hormones estrogen and progesterone. They have not been associated with an increased risk of breast cancer. The higher-dose contraceptive pills used in the past were associated with a small increased risk, in only a few studies. Today's birth control pills can provide some protection against ovarian cancer.

tion, stop smoking, exercise regularly, medication (tamoxifen, also called Nolvadex); and in cases of very high risk, surgery may be offered (prophylactic mastectomies, and for some women, prophylactic ovary removal). Be sure that you have consulted with a physician or genetic counselor before you make assumptions about your level of risk.

Myth: A breast cancer diagnosis is an automatic death sentence.

Fact: Fully 80 percent of women diagnosed with breast cancer have no signs of metastases (no cancer has spread beyond the breast and nearby lymph nodes). Furthermore, 80 percent of these women live at least five years, most longer, and many live much longer. Even women with signs of cancer metastases can live a long time. Plus promising treatment breakthroughs are becoming available each day.

you have dense breast tissue.

Fact: Spotting breast cancer can be more difficult when breasts contain a lot of glandular tissues. A mammogram, however, is not useless. If something looks suspicious, but is hard to see with standard mammography, other imaging tests can help determine if cancer is present.

Myth: Radiation from a mammogram can give you cancer.

Fact: Radiation exposure from mammography is small. You receive about the same amount of radiation during a jet trip from New York to California.

Myth: If you don't have a family history of breast cancer, you don't need to have mammogram.

Fact: The majority of breast cancers occur in women who have no known risk factors for the disease.

What you don't know CAN hurt you. Misinformation can keep you from recognizing and minimizing your own risk of breast cancer or getting the very best possible care. Other myths and facts about breast cancer were

Myth: A monthly breast self-exam is the best way to diagnose breast cancer.

Fact: High quality, film-screen mammography is the most reliable way to find breast cancer as early as possible, when it is most curable. By the time a breast cancer can be felt, it is usually bigger than the average size of a cancer first found on mammography. Breast examination by you or your healthcare provider is still very important. About 25 percent of breast cancers are found only on breast examination (not on the mammogram), about 35 percent are found on mammography alone, and 40 percent are found by both physical exam and mammography. Keep both bases covered.

Myth: I'm at high risk for breast cancer and there's nothing I can do about it.

Fact: There are several effective ways to reduce—but not eliminate—the risk of breast cancer in women at high risk. Options include lifestyle changes (minimize alcohol consump-

Kwajalein Hospital was awarded a 3-year term of accreditation in mammography in November from the American College of Radiology. The ACR awards accreditation to facilities for the achievement of high practice standards after a peer-review evaluation of the practice. Evaluations are conducted by board-certified physicians and medical physicists who are experts in the field. They assess the qualifications of the personnel and the adequacy of facility equipment. A facility must be accredited by the ACR in order to comply with FDA regulations. For the past 4 years, the Kwajalein Hospital mammography program has received the highest rating of 'no findings' during its annual FDA inspection. The FDA inspection evaluates the facilities equipment, personnel, quality assurance program, record keeping and other aspects of the mammography program.

Nanny McPhee, A nanny reveals ways of making children behave that are much more effective than a time-out in this fantasy comedy based on the "Nurse Matilda" books for children by Christianna Brand. Near the dawn of the twentieth century, Mr. Brown (Colin Firth) is a widower who must tend to his business as an undertaker while looking after his brood of seven children. Brown's offspring are a singularly ill-mannered lot who have managed to drive away 17 different nannies when their father arranges for one Nanny McPhee (Emma Thompson) to help out with the children. McPhee is a strange looking woman with a large nose, protruding teeth, and pock-marked skin, but it isn't long before the children realize she has magical powers and isn't afraid to use them to help keep them in line.

Annapolis, A poor but ambitious young man strives to make good in one of the most competitive institutions on Earth in this military drama. Jake Huard (James Franco) is a young man from a small Maryland town who grew up in a blue-collar family with few opportunities. Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following ten U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Lance Cpl. Michael L. Ford, 19, of New Bedford, Mass., died April 26 while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to the 1st Tank Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Twentynine Palms, Calif.

Sgt. Matthew A. Webber, 23, of Kalamazoo, Mich., died on April 27, in the Brooke Army Medical Center, San Antonio, of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations in Habbaniyah, Iraq, on Nov. 21. Webber was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 125th Infantry Regiment (Mechanized), Saginaw, Mich.

1st Sgt. Bobby Mendez, 38, of Brooklyn, N.Y., died April 27 of injuries sustained in Baghdad, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Mendez was assigned to the 2nd Special Troops Battalion, 2nd Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Staff Sgt. Mark A. Wall, 27, of Alden, Iowa, died April 27 in Mosul, Iraq, from a non-combat related cause. Wall was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 1st Infantry Regiment, 172nd Stryker Brigade Combat Team, Fort Wainwright, Alaska. The incident is under investigation.

Two Marines, died April 28 while conducting combat operations against enemy

forces in Al Anbar province. Killed were: **Cpl. Brandon M. Hardy**, 25, of Cochranville, Pa. and **Sgt. Lea R. Mills**, 21, of Brooksville, Fla. They were both assigned to 3rd Assault Amphibian Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Two Soldiers died April 28 in Baghdad, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV during combat operations. The soldiers were assigned to the 10th Cavalry, 4th Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood. Killed were: **Staff Sgt. Bryant A. Herlem**, 37, of Copperas Cove, Texas and **Sgt. Jose Gomez**, 23, of Corona, N.Y.

Sgt. Edward G. Davis III, 31, of Antioch, Ill., died April 28 while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 3rd Assault Amphibian Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton.

Cpl. Robbie G. Light, 21, of Kingsport, Tenn., died Monday of injuries sustained in Baghdad, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated near his M1A2 Abrams tank during combat operations. Light was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 67th Armored Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

Lance Cpl. Robert L. Mosillo, 21, of Salem, N.H., died Monday while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to the 1st Combat Engineer Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton.







exit the water in a stealthy manner, via shore, dock and complete a 1 mile surface swim to a target location.

Frazier said the lagoon training complimented the firefighters' search and rescue program.

By Friday most of the trainees were nicked and bruised. Grady

had them in the former Job Corps building honing their high-risk entry skills. He taught them how to conduct surveillance of a location to aid in the planning phase of a high-risk entry, set up an operational plan for conducting a high-risk entry and effectively enter and secure a location. Stacked up in groups of five, the

trainees entered rooms brandishing weapons while carefully checking for criminal elements. And then they did it again, and again. Grady was a tough task master, but by the end of the course police officers and firefighters were working side-by-side, intuitively trusting the skills of one another.

The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command has completed an Environmental Assessment, prepared in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 and the Council on Environmental Quality regulations implementing NEPA. Based on this assessment, SMDC determined that the proposed activities would not result in a significant impact to the environment and prepared a Draft Finding of No Significant Impact. Therefore, further NEPA analysis in the form of an Environment Impact Statement is not required.

The EA analyzes the environmental consequences of installing a submerged, powered fiber-optic cable, integrated repeaters, and attendant cable landing infrastructure, connecting Guam to the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll with branching segments to Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia and Majuro, Republic of the Marshall Islands.

The purpose of the proposed action is to establish a reliable, reduced cost bandwidth, high performance, submarine fiber-optic cable system for meeting current communication needs; provide a cost-effective growth path for future bandwidth requirements; and provide superior and advanced

service to consumers on Kwajalein and throughout the FSM and RMI. The MCS is needed to provide more data with faster delivery; real time data exchange; higher availability and reliability; and reduced reliance on satellite communication.
