One of those things happened Wednesday when news came from Iraq that two Soldiers, PFC. Thomas L. Tucker and PFC. Kristian Menchaca, who had been captured by insurgents, were found brutally killed and their bodies desecrated. God knows what they went through before they died. It's one thing to die, but to be 'barbarically tortured' as an Iraqi official said they were, is another. A third Soldier, Spc. David J. Babineau, was killed during the attack in which the two were taken prisoner.

I don't know what the animals who did it think they're going to achieve. Obviously, it was one more attempt to show us what subhuman vermin they are. By doing so, I can only surmise they hoped to put another dent in public support for the war.

But it would seem they don't know Americans well.

Every time they remind us of what murdering filth and scum they really are, they succeed in making it easy to hate them and fill us with a determination for revenge.

Even those Americans who don't support this war and want to get out of Iraq support the troops and are enraged by such an act of brutality, and want to see those responsible tracked down and killed.

anyone blame them if they did?

Those who sit in their safe, air-conditioned offices in that dreamworld called Washington, D.C., who are so damn quick to judge

and yell accusations of murder and atrocity at our troops should stand at those checkpoints, do foot patrols or go on deadly convoys in a place where anyone could be the enemy, and death or maiming could be around any corner, before they have any right to say anything about the people who fight and bleed for them. Otherwise, I say shut the hell up.

I also say with just as much fervor to those who have been cheerleading this war from the safety of plush TV studios while they sit on their fat wallets and wear their expensive suits — it's easy to cheer for a war when it ain't you or yours who's doing the fighting and dying. I've heard these 'chickenhawks,' most of whom have never worn their country's uniform. I say to them, why should anyone listen to you if you've never had enough courage or conviction to serve your country yourselves? I say words are cheap, and your words are cheapest of all. They're the words of hypocrites.


Where is all the outrage and indignation from the media over this butchery that there was about the Haditha 'massacre' and Abu Ghraib prison?

Citizen donates \$150,000 to Walter Reed Society

Civil servant Ronald A. Rosenfeld demonstrated his heartfelt commitment to helping wounded troops in dramatic fashion -- he donated \$150,000, the equivalent of his annual salary, to the Walter Reed Society.

About two years ago, a Catholic Monsignor told Rosenfeld and his wife, Patty, that war-wounded servicemembers from Iraq and Afghanistan were receiving outstanding medical treatment at Washington's Walter Reed Army Medical Center, but that money was in short supply for certain quality-of-life items.

Without hesitation, the Rosenfelds decided to help.

"Through such generosity of donors like yourself, the Walter Reed Society has been able to assist many, many deserving wounded warriors and their families while they are receiving

care at Walter Reed Army Medical Center," retired Col. Janet R. Southby, the Walter Reed Society's president, wrote in a letter to Rosenfeld. Southby is a retired former chief nurse at Walter Reed.

The society helps families of wounded servicemembers with expenses while loved ones recover in this high-cost area. Founded in 1996, the society has soared from nine to more than 560 members.

Rosenfeld became chairman of the Federal Housing Finance Board, an independent agency in the executive branch that oversees the safety, soundness and mission of the 12 regional Federal Home Loan Banks, in December 2004. Before that, he was president of Ginnie Mae, a government corporation that promotes nationwide access to mortgage credit. The organization is part of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

A couple of years ago around Christmas time, Rosenfeld said, he

and his wife, Patty, were having dinner with a clergyman who told them about his frequent visits to Walter Reed and the wounded war veterans he met there.

"He told us that while they get outstanding medical treatment, there really isn't adequate resources for other things that are important to them, like family visits, education and other things to enhance their quality of life," Rosenfeld said. "That gave me the opportunity of saying, 'Well, we'd like to help out in those areas.' The vehicle that we subsequently discovered was the Walter Reed Society.

"Those young men and women are incredibly brave, and our country owes them at great debt of gratitude to make what is obviously going to be a very difficult life a little bit better," Rosenfeld said. "I'm fortunate from my other prior life experiences to be able to afford to do it, and I'm just very happy to do it."

New guys in neighborhood

Incoming managers ready for challenge

Summer on Kwajalein always brings new faces to the island. The past month saw the addition of three newcomers to top-level management positions

at Kwajalein Range Services. These new kids on the block are Steve Beuby, deputy program manager for Community Services; Walter Erb, chief information officer/information technology manager; and Tony Veirup, deputy site manager/prime contract manager. All three are longtime employees of Bechtel.

Steve Beuby, deputy project manager, Community Services from sands of Iraq to sands of Kwajalein

Beuby has only been on Kwajalein two weeks and already he is in the process of joining the golf club, the sailing club and completing his water safety certification class to get his B-boat license. For the new DPM for Community Services life on Kwajalein is a complete departure from his last posting - Iraq.

An employee with Bechtel for the last ten years, Beuby was part of the first wave of the Bechtel team to head into Iraq after the company was awarded a contract to restore the infrastructure of Iraq.

"My first project was to restore the 12 telephone exchanges that serviced the greater Baghdad area," explained Beuby. That project took 14 months, followed by a move to Basra, where Beuby was the project manager for the development, design and construction of a state-of-the-art children's hospital.

Initially Beuby's team experienced no threat, often driving themselves around Baghdad in unprotected vehicles with no security. Thirty-two months later Beuby has a different story

to tell.

"Toward the end the only travel we could do was with armored vehicles," he commented. "We were in bulletproof sedans with a minimum of three cars per caravan and two shooters per vehicle. You needed days in advance to schedule a movement."

Cut to Beuby's new position on Kwajalein, and the contrast between this assignment and his last is very stark.

"This is fun," noted Beuby, "problems here have different dimensions from the problems there."


Beuby is enthusiastic about his top-level management team on Kwajalein. "I'm the proud owner, I guess it would be a way to put it, of some very, very good management talent," said Beuby. "All these people are very strong. They've got years in their positions, they know their business and they've got everything organized so well; I just sit up here and listen to the music - I don't even have to lead the band!"

Determined to see the completion of some management improvements put into motion by his predecessor, Kevin Finn, Beuby is working hard to implement an inventory control system for both the retail and food

services. This system would improve the tracking of sales versus the cost of merchandise and the cost of labor.

"The more people buy in our stores the more the recreation fund gets rewarded, and it's all returned back to the community," explained Beuby. "That's part of the reason we enjoy such great recreation facilities"- facilities that Beuby is eager to share with his wife, Faye, when she and their cat, Max, arrive on Kwajalein in two weeks.

"I've been in a number of remote island assignments in my past, because I retired from the Navy a long time ago," explained Beuby. "I've seen and experienced locations like this, but never with the quality of infrastructure this place has, and never with the recreational facilities this place has."



Tournament play began June 16 with Real Deals squeaking past All Out 5-4 and Good Times stomping Butter Balls 12-0. Binnebs and 2nd Pitch sat on the sidelines with byes.

Real Deals continued its winning streak over 2nd Pitch, 8-5 and Good Times stopped Binnebs 5-4.

The batting order was set as alternating between men and women hitters, with men having to substitute for other men and women having to substitute for other women.


The playing positions were divided evenly between male and female players, according to Coley. Players were distributed between infield and outfield



evenly by sex.

One pitch can be won or lost by the batters. Each batter has one pitch from their own pitcher. If the batter doesn't hit the ball into the playing area, it is an out; meaning that a swing and miss or even a foul ball is a strike. Innings moved quickly, sometimes it was three pitches and three outs.

"Other scheduled specialty tournaments are held in conjunction with Summer Fun," Coley said. Typically there are beach volleyball tournaments in conjunction with Memorial Day; July 4th and Labor Day, "plus a potential 'King of the Beach' tournament in August," Coley added.



A two-day kickball tournament is in the planning stages for the weekend of July 20 and dodgeball starts July 11. "The duration and format will be determined by number of teams," Coley said. Coley added that a five-on-five basketball tournament is scheduled from July 25 to Aug. 5, and there are plans for a late-August racquetball tournament.

Ice Age: The Meltdown, Manny (Ray Romano), Sid (John Leguizamo), and Diego (Denis Leary) may have made it through the big freeze, but when the ice begins to melt, the heroic trio must warn the other inhabitants of their peaceful valley of the coming flood in directors Chris Wedge and Carlos Saldanha's sequel to the computer-animated 2002 hit *Ice Age*. As the ice age winds to an end, the animals of the Earth have taken warmly to the melting paradise that surrounds them. Despite the false comfort of a lush valley teeming with vegetation, however, great danger looms just over the horizon. When Manny, Sid, and Diego realize that the miles of liquefying ice overlooking their valley will soon turn from a gentle trickle to a violent force of nature capable of destroying anything and everything unfortunate enough to be in its path, they quickly set out to spread the word and get their endangered friends out of harm's way.

Lord of War, One man demonstrates how to get rich selling warring nations the tools of their deadly trade in this dark comedy drama. Yuri Orlov (Nicolas Cage) is an opportunistic businessman who stumbled into a gold mine after the end of the Cold War and the collapse of the Soviet Union. Huge caches of Soviet weapons became available at bargain prices (and even for free if one wasn't above stealing), and as literally billions of dollars' worth of Soviet military technology disappeared, it began finding its way into the hands of weapons dealers eager to sell it to the highest bidder. Orlov was one such dealer who found plenty of buyers for guns and military gear in unstable Third World nations, who paid cash and didn't appreciate too many questions. Orlov's exploits in the arms business quickly made him a very rich man, but they've also led to some unwanted attention from Jack Valentine (Ethan Hawke), an Interpol agent who is convinced Orlov isn't playing by the rules. Inspired by a true story, *Lord of War* also features Jared Leto, Ian Holm, Bridget Moynahan, and Donald Sutherland.

Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 17 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

Sgt. Russell M. Durgin, 23, of Henniker, N.H., died on June 13, in Korengel, Afghanistan, when his unit took small arms fire. Durgin was assigned to the 32nd Infantry Battalion, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Sgt. Roger P. Pena Jr., 29, of San Antonio died June 14 in Musa Qulah, Afghanistan when his convoy came under enemy small arms fire during combat operations. Pena was assigned to the 10th Sustainment Brigade, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum.

Cpl. Michael A. Estrella, 20, of Hemet, Calif., died June 14 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Marine Corps Base Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.

Capt. Patrick D. Damon, 41, of Falmouth, Maine, died June 15 in Bagram, Afghanistan from a non-combat related cause. Damon was assigned to the Army National Guard's 240th Engineer Group, Augusta, Maine.

Spc. Jeremiah S. Santos, 21, of Minot, N.D., died June 15 in Baghdad, Iraq of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV during combat operations. Santos was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 8th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.


Spc. Brent W. Koch, 22, of Morton, Minn., died on June 16, in Ad Diwaniyah, Iraq, when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMWV. Koch was assigned to Company E, 2nd Battalion, 136th Infantry Combined Arms Battalion, Hutchinson, Minn.

Three Soldiers died June 16, in Baghdad, the Soldiers were manning a checkpoint when they came under enemy small arms fire. All three Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky. Killed were: **Spc. David J. Babineau**, 25, of Springfield, Mass.; **Pfc. Thomas L. Tucker**, 25, of Madras, Ore. and **Pfc. Kristian Menchaca**, 23, of San Marcos, Texas.

Two Soldiers died June 16 in Pech River Valley, Afghanistan when their all terrain vehicle struck an improvised explosive device during combat operations. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum. Killed were: **1st Lt. Forrest P. Ewens**, 25, of Washington state and **Sgt. Ian T. Sanchez**, 26, of Staten Island, N.Y.

Two Soldiers died June 17 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq when an improvised explosive device detonated near their HMMWV during combat operations. Both Soldiers were assigned to the 40th Engineer Battalion, Baumholder, Germany. Killed were: **Sgt. Reyes Ramirez**, 23, of Willis, Texas and **Spc. Robert L. Jones**, 22, of Milwaukie, Ore.

Four Marines, **Cpl. Christopher D. Leon**, 20, of Lancaster, Calif.; **Lance Cpl. Brandon J. Webb**, 20, of Swartz Creek, Mich.; **Pfc. Christopher N. White**, 23, of Southport, N.C. and **Staff Sgt. Benjamin D. Williams**, 30, of Orange, Texas. They died Tuesday from wounds received while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 5th Air Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Okinawa, Japan. Webb, White, and Williams were assigned to 1st Battalion, 1st Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.





The Micronesian Games are organized for the small islands and territories of the Northern Pacific such as Guam, Northern Marianas, Marshall Islands, Nauru, Palau, Pohnpei, Chuuk and Kosrae. The games feature traditional events like track and field, swimming and basketball, but also some of the more unique events in sports including a spearfishing contest, coconut tree climbing and coconut throwing.
