

# Parents are best teachers of character

This past weekend I was in the bakery and saw an act of good character shown to a member of our military by a father who lives on Kwaj. I know both the father and the son through my job as a teacher at the Child Development Center.

In all of the Child and Youth Services programs on island, including the CDC, we teach children about having good character. We do this through the Character Counts! program, which includes six pillars of good character — trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship. We start this program with the very youngest in our program, the 2 year olds, and continue Character Counts! based activities through the Youth Center, which reaches the older children. This past month the highlighted pillar was citizenship. The children had lessons, discus-

sions and activities that were centered on being a good citizen. Character building can be taught by teachers and community members, but is best taught when shown by parents in everyday life.

I witnessed one of these acts of good character at the bakery while getting a latte on Sunday morning. This past weekend we had many military personnel on island. A U.S. Marine Corps C-130 crew member came into the bakery to get a few things before they flew off to their next assignment. While standing in line next to him he asked me if they take debit cards at the bakery. I responded "no"; he proceeded to ask where a cash machine was located. # A failure to communicate

## *Transmitters on two released turtles have stopped sending data, many possible circumstances cited*

Can you speak turtle? Just because humans and turtles don't use the same communication methods doesn't mean the turtles released by U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and Kwajalein Range Services environmental personnel in April aren't keeping in touch.

The turtles were released near Nell and had transmitters attached to their backs. "The transmitters began to send data to the satellites immediately," Cathy Madore, from the KRS Environmental, Safety and Health office said.

USAKA's Ken Sims explained

why the turtles were released. "The purpose of the release was twofold: To reduce the number of turtles in the turtle pond and to gather movement data on sea turtles released back into the wild after being in captivity for a long time. We released four sea turtles, but we installed satellite tracking devices on two of the turtles."

Sims added, "We were able to track the turtles for 1 to 2 months before the satellite tracking devices stopped working. It is not uncommon for tracking devices to fall off, become damaged, or malfunction. We took every precaution; some things just happen."

There are several reasons that could explain why the data has

stopped. Sims identified battery failure, antenna failure, a detached transmitter device, transmitter package damaged during normal activities by the turtle, predation of the turtle by sharks, etc., and human predation as the primary factors. "It is not unusual in large studies for all of these to happen. Our sample size is very small with only two transmitters in play and when combined with normal probabilities, it improves the chances of equipment failure for both turtles. We knew this going in, but I still believe it was worth the risk and

# Cold weather, driving, communications are tough adjustments for Kwaj Kids

A few months into Marcy Peterson's freshman year, the balmy Georgia weather turned nippy. Peterson realized the two long-sleeved shirts and flip-flops she brought with her from Kwajalein were not going to cut it around campus anymore. It was then that Kwajalein seemed a million miles away.

Every year a handful of Kwajalein high school students, having grown up on this tiny, three-mile island, graduate and leave for new and unique experiences in the United


States.

Right from the get-go there are encounters that make these young adults realize that their stateside peers cannot relate to life on Kwajalein. At some point in a conversation they end up fielding dumb questions such as "are there koalas where you live?", "do you live in banana leaf huts?" or "do you wear grass skirts?"

Answering the trite question, "So, where are you from?" is always tricky for these young people. Give an honest answer and these teens are greeted with the quizzical head tilt followed by a lengthy conversation and a geography lesson. "When explaining where I was from, people seemed



shocked to know that this part of the world even existed," said Anja Pierre-Mike.

Only once did Peterson try a conversation-ending answer when asked the dreaded question, "I said that I was from Hawaii, and that person was from Hawaii. That didn't work out very well!"

The change in weather is the most noticeable difference these teens first experience. "My first winter back [in college] was horrible, but the worst part about it was the lack of sunlight. Living here my whole life, I was

so used to being able to go outside whenever I wanted to and having mostly beautiful, sunny weather. It was tough to be confined inside all the time because it was just too cold to go outside," said Pierre-Mike.

For Peterson, the change in Georgia weather signaled the needed to buy a winter coat, something she never thought about as a teenager living on Kwajalein.

Essential to living in the United States is the ability to drive. Most Kwajalein teens do not hold a U.S. driver's license. If they do drive it is at

the top speed of 25 miles per hour, and most have never even pumped gas.

That was Sara Alves' experience when her boyfriend first asked her to pump gas. She fumbled with the gas tank cap until her boyfriend opened it for her and then stuck the nozzle in the tank bewildered when the gas would not come out. "What am I supposed to do?" and he said you have to lift up the thing on the gas pump itself," she laughed. "I didn't know

how to work any of the buttons. I was so embarrassed.”

“Transportation was particularly problematic. Since I do not have a driver’s license, I always had to ask friends for rides to the mall, Wal-Mart... after a year of favors, I felt bad asking for another one,” said Peterson. “It was hard to feel like an independent young adult in college who couldn’t get around on her own; it was especially hard after being able to do so on a bike for the previous five years.”

Sports participation is another arena where the difference between Kwajalein and the states really stands out. “Out here you can play any sport you want; in the states you have to be really good,” said William Peters. “You have to focus on one sport; you can’t really branch out, and the level of competition is very different.”

“The kids out here who are good at sports wouldn’t cut it, most of the time, in a varsity sport,” he continued. “Out here everyone comes out to have fun, everyone plays, it doesn’t matter how good you play.”

These young people did not grow up with a cell phone permanently implanted to the ear, but all have come to realize that a cell phone is a way of life in the states and each now owns

one. Although they would concur not living with cell phones contributes to the laid back attitude of Kwajalein.

“I wasn’t looking forward to having to join that trend,” Peterson confided. “You can walk around here all day long and not have to have your purse ringing, if you even carry a purse.”

For most of the girls, the experience of having to carry around a purse chock-full of money, credit cards, keys and a cell phone is brand new. As Peterson pointed out, life on Kwajalein is simple; all you need is \$10, your ID card and “you can last for a week!”

Hands down these young people agree that the connections they have with people in Kwajalein in comparison to the way people are connected in the states is the most significant difference and one that afflicts them with a touch of homesickness.

“The biggest difference to me is that this place functions like one big family; it’s hard sometimes and there are things that we don’t like...but they’re always here for you — never far away,” said Lindsay Davis

“I was so used to the friendliness of people here that it was hard to adjust to living in a place where generally people aren’t as warm as they are here” admitted Pierre-Mike.

“Out here I spend every waking

minute with my friends,” said Alves. “I found this doesn’t happen in the states, there has to be some major event to bring everyone together...and you don’t get to really know one another as well as you do out here.”

Many of these young people did not head over to the states clueless. They left armed to the teeth with advice from family, teachers, friends who have been there and done that. But as Davis pointed out, they have to walk through these experiences for themselves. She said, “The best advice was something my brother said to me. He said, ‘Call me.’”

Pierre-Mike “felt like the advice was very helpful. Living here my whole life, I really had no idea what to expect about living in the states, so it was very helpful to talk to other people.”

There is no doubt these young people always win the who-came-the-longest-distance-to-be-here contest. Behind that winning-raised hand there is a smile because they really loved growing up on Kwajalein. “I like traveling and living in different places, but of all the places I’ve been, this is the one I’m proud to call home,” said Davis, summing up the sentiments of these young people. “This is where my heart is!”

# Bunn-O-Matic Corp. expands recall of coffeemakers

## U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission Release

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the firm named below, announced an extension of a voluntary recall of the following product, initially commenced in June 2005, to include the additional date codes specified below. Consumers should stop using recalled products immediately unless otherwise instructed.

Name of product: Bunn® home coffeemakers (Note: This recall is an expansion of an earlier recall announced in June 2005.) Units: About 561,000 Manufacturer: Bunn-O-Matic Corp., of Springfield, Ill.

Hazard: The coffeemaker’s plastic pour-in bowl and lid can melt or ignite due to an electrical failure, posing burn and fire hazards to consumers.

Please note the information below and circulate to your employees. Also, please inspect your workplace to see if these appliances exist and, if so, remove from service.

Incidents/injuries: Bunn-O-Matic has received 16 additional incident reports involving the bowl or lid melting or igniting in these units, including seven reports of minor property damage. No injuries have been reported.

Description: The recall involves Bunn® home coffee-makers with model numbers GR-10B, GR-10W, B-10B,

B-10W, and BT-10B (including any of those same model numbers ending in the additional letter D) with six-digit date codes (1) ending in “04” with the two middle digits between “21” and “52” or (2) ending in “05” with the two middle digits between “01” and “40”. (If the date code has a seventh digit, consumers should ignore the last digit and use the first six digits.) The model number and date code are stamped on a small white or silver sticker on the bottom of the coffeemaker. The 10-cup Bunn® coffeemakers have either a black or white plastic base and top, and measure 14.25 inches high by 7 inches wide by 13.75 inches deep. The word “BUNN®” is printed on the front of the machine in chrome.

Sold at: Department and hardware stores nationwide between May 2004 and January for about \$100. Manufactured In: United States

Remedy: Consumers should unplug the coffeemaker and allow it to cool (for at least three hours) before checking if they have one of the recalled units. Consumers can contact the firm to obtain a free factory repair, a free in-home repair kit, or purchase a new unit at a discount.

effort,” Sims said.

“We began receiving data from the turtles almost immediately, but data gaps could be caused by bad timing. The transmitter has to be at the surface of the water for a set period of time and transmitting at the same time one or more of the satellites are passing over. The satellite coverage over the equator is slim so that makes our data gathering efforts even more difficult because our window of opportunity is smaller,” Madore added.

Another explanation for lack of data transmission is that the transmitters could have been dislodged from the turtles’ shells. “While application procedures are available, and were followed in our case, there are other factors involved. If the turtle sheds the top layer of its shell the transmitter will be dislodged. If a turtle has a habit of running up under coral outcroppings or hiding in tight spaces, that can also dislodge the transmitter,” Madore said. “Fouling of the transmitter from algal growth is also a possibility. Our turtle release was a one-time event, and we consider ourselves lucky to have received the data that we have.”

This type of turtle tracking is not new. Turtle tracking has been accomplished all over the world using this type of transmitter. “The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association releases turtles in Hawaii on a regular basis, and the data made available from these efforts is extremely valuable. We used resources from NOAA in deciding what type of transmitter to use, its application and the set up with Argos. They are very interested

in Marshall Island turtles since data from this area is so sparse,” Madore said.

Sims concurred with Madore, “We were hoping to show the movements of formerly captive sea turtles in the Kwajalein Atoll RMI area. No released sea turtles in the RMI or this part of the Pacific Ocean have ever been tracked.”

Data received from the transmitters indicated the turtles had not traveled outside the Kwajalein Atoll. “The female green turtle traveled from Nell

to the shoreline off of the DCCB. The Hawksbill has not ventured out of his release area as far as we can tell,” Madore said.

Green sea turtles and Hawksbill turtles are native to this area and actively nest in the Marshall Islands, Madore said. “Greens eat ‘green stuff’ like algae and sea grasses as well as jellyfish while Hawksbills eat sponges, squid, fish, etc. All of these food types are available here,” she added.

The turtles’ data could show up again, “Satellite technology means that there is no true “range” for the transmitters. Wherever they are they send a signal to multiple satellites in space and those satellites send the information to a data gathering system called Argos. The same transmitter, if recovered, could be used on a different animal, thousands of miles away with no problems,” Madore said.

## Turtle tale

**Failure to Launch**, A overgrown mama's boy who hasn't found the courage to take flight from the nest gets a little help from the girl of his dreams in the one comedy that proves it's never too late to strike out on your own. Tripp (Matthew McConaughey) may have hit 30, but that doesn't mean that he's ready to give up the many benefits of living at home with mom (Kathy Bates) and dad (Terry Bradshaw). His desperate parents have had enough, though, and after years of gentle nudging they soon realize that it's going to take a concerted effort to get Tripp out and enjoy their twilight years in peace. Realizing that their only hope for ridding themselves of their reluctant-to-leave offspring rides on the off-chance of his meeting the ideal female companion, mom and dad enlist the help of a beautiful and talented woman (Sarah Jessica Parker) in providing the romantic incentive needed to finally get their son out of the family home.

**Final Destination 3**, Death once again shows he's determined to get what he wants in this teen-centric thriller. Wendy (Mary Elizabeth Winstead) is a high school student hanging out with her friends at an amusement park one night when they decide to ride on the roller coaster. Wendy, however, has a premonition that something horrible will happen, and finds a way to save herself shortly before the ride goes off the rails, killing most of its passengers, including her boyfriend, Jason (Jesse Moss), and best friend, Carrie (Gina Holden). However, while Wendy may have survived the night at the park, she soon discovers that a malevolent spirit is following her and her classmates as they begin dying in strange and horrible ways.

**The Sentinel**, A man who has devoted himself to serving the leader of the free world is accused of plotting against him in this thriller. Pete Garrison (Michael Douglas) is a veteran Secret Service agent who has had a long and distinguished career helping protect the president of the United States. # Global War on Terror Honoring fallen heroes

The following 15 U.S. servicemembers have died in the Global War on Terrorism.

**Staff Sgt Eric Caban**, 28, of Fort Worth, Texas, died on July 19 in southern Afghanistan of injuries sustained when his combat reconnaissance patrol came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations on July 18. Caban was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne), Fort Bragg, N.C.

**Pfc. Derek J. Plowman**, 20, of Everton, Ark., died on July 20 in Baghdad, Iraq, from a gun shot wound. Plowman was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 142nd Fires Brigade, Rogers, Ark.

**Cpl. Julian A. Ramon**, 22, of Flushington, N.Y., died July 20 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province, Iraq. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

**Cpl. Matthew P. Wallace**, 22, of Lexington Park, Md., died on July 21, in Landstuhl Regional Medical Center, Landstuhl, Germany, of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his Bradley Fighting Vehicle during combat operations in Baghdad, on July 16. Wallace was assigned to the Army's 10th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

**Capt. Christopher T. Pate**, 29, of Hampstead, N.C., died July 21 while conducting combat operations in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 2nd Air Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, Command Element, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune.

**1st Sgt. Christopher C. Rafferty**, 37, of Brownsville, Pa., died on July 21 in Sharana, Afghanistan of injuries sustained on July 20, when his unit encountered small arms fire during combat operations. Rafferty was assigned to 37th Engineer Battalion, Fort Bragg.

**Capt. Blake H. Russell**, 35, of Forth Worth, Texas died on July 22 of injuries sustained from enemy forces munitions while investigating a possible mortar cache during combat operations in Baghdad. Russell was assigned to the Army's 1st Battalion, 502nd Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team,

101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.

**Cpl. Adam J. Fargo**, 22, of Ruckersville, Va., died on July 22 in Baghdad, of injuries sustained when his convoy encountered enemy forces small arms fire. Fargo was assigned to the 4th Brigade Troop Battalion, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell.

**Staff Sgt. Christopher W. Swanson**, 25, of Rose Haven, Md., died on July 22 in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, of injuries sustained when his patrol encountered enemy forces small arms fire. Swanson was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 6th Infantry Regiment, 1st Armored Division, Baumholder, Germany.

**Spc. Stephen W. Castner**, 27, of Cedarburg, Wis., died on Monday, of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his HMMV during combat operations in Tallil, Iraq. Castner was assigned to the Army National Guard's 1st Battalion, 121st Field Artillery, Milwaukee.

**Sgt. David M. Hierholzer**, 27, of Lewisburg, Tenn., died on Monday in Pesch, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained when his platoon encountered enemy forces small arms fire. Hierholzer was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

**Capt. Jason M. West**, 28, of Pittsburg, died on Monday in Ar Ramadi, when he encountered enemy forces using small arms fire. West was assigned to the 1st Brigade, 1st Armored Division, Friedberg, Germany.

**Spc. Dennis K. Samson, Jr.**, 24, of Hesperia, Mich., died on Monday in Taqadum, Iraq, of injuries sustained by enemy small arms fire. Samson was assigned to 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment, 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell.

**Spc. Joseph A. Graves**, 21, of Discovery Bay, Calif., was killed on Tuesday in Baghdad, when his convoy encountered enemy fire. Graves was assigned to the 110th Military Police Company, 720th Military Police Battalion, 89th Military Police Brigade, Fort Hood.

**Spc. Andrew Velez**, 22, of Lubbock, Texas, died on Tuesday in Sharana, Afghanistan, from a non-combat related injury. Velez was assigned to the Corps Support Battalion, Theater Support Command, Fort Irwin, Calif.



# Note prohibits business with North Korean vessels

Republic of the Marshall Islands  
News Release

President Kessai H. Note on Monday signed an Executive Order prohibiting “citizens, nationals, resident entities, nonresident and domestic qualified entities” in the Marshall Islands “from owning, leasing, operating, or insuring any vessel flagged” by North Korea.

The Executive Order comes at the heels of the recent escalating tension in the Northeast Asia Region by North Korea. “The RMI does not endorse North Korea’s stance on its nuclear ambitions,” said the president

after signing the order.

“This prudent measure is without question to safeguard our people,” said the president. “As a responsible registry nation and one of the largest in the world, the Marshall Islands continues to hold safety and security issues as paramount.”

With the recommendation from the RMI Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Cabinet passed Cabinet Minute 082(2006) approving the issuance of the Executive Order.

The Marshall Islands is a member of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons.
