





Post office receives satisfactory rating in all categories

United States Army Pacific Postal inspectors gave the Kwajalein Post Office high marks on its recent annual Department of Defense inspection.

The inspectors "only give a satisfactory or unsatisfactory. We received a satisfactory in every category with kudos in several," said Karla Long, postmaster.

The annual inspection is a DoD requirement and covers everything from processing mail to customer service, recordkeeping, dispatching, forwarding methods, finance, supply, claims, box maintenance and even lobby appearance.

The two inspectors, one from Honolulu and one from Japan, performed the inspection by going through all paper records, asking questions of the employees, interviewing customers, and checking mail boxes.

The inspectors come at the invitation of, and have their flight to Kwajalein paid for by, the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll.

"It is a constant learning curve. We learned several new and helpful things as far as recordkeeping that will make next year's [inspection] even better! If we have the same team of inspectors next year, it is highly possible we could get an 'excellent' which is very rare," said Long. "But considering we've already fixed the things they pointed out, who knows."

"We were given great kudos in customer service. Courteous, friendly, helpful and knowledgeable staff goes a long way," said Long.

"This reflects the superb service they provide to our community and the many compliments that I receive on their work and their ability to satisfy their customer," John Pickler, Kwajalein Range Services president, said.

Going green

Striving for better life, opportunities

Marshallese recruits receive training to ease into Army life

Mental health professionals have identified changing a career as one of the primary stressors in a person's life.

Imagine what it must be like to not only change your career, from a civilian to a Soldier, but also change cultures at the same time.

Four Marshallese members of the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll community are trying to lessen the shock of becoming Soldiers by easing into the demands of military life.

Daniel Harris, Giordan Harris, Benny deBrum and William Boutu all see the U.S. Army as their future, and Master Sgt. Frank Cota is working with them to

learn the ins and outs of the military before they sign on the dotted line.

"It had been my understanding that the relationship between the citizens of Ebeye and the Army wasn't what it could be," Cota said, explaining why he was so eager to help prepare the four young men for military service.

Cota is preparing these men for the rest of their lives. "I want to help them find a better life. They can move on [after being trained in the Army], or bring it back to the island," Cota said.

Cota is teaching the Soldiers-to-be basic drill, customs and courtesies, Army rank structures as well as preparing them for the physical challenges of basic training.

"Master Sergeant Cota loves what he does and wants everyone to be as passionate about the Army as he, his optimism, intelligence and support has really made the boys feel as if they can accomplish anything, he has been tireless in his efforts to train. And the fact that he takes the time out for these boys

thing,” he added.

All four agree that the physical training is challenging. Cota puts them through an exercise regime that is similar to what they will face in the Army. Though he’s tough on them, they appreciate the work. “He’s one of the coolest guys I’ve ever known,” Daniel said. “He’s really down to earth.”

Boutu knows that the physical training is important and admitted that he’s passed the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery more than once, but wasn’t able to pass the physical requirements. “This is the only way for me to get it off,” he said, indicating the weight he wants to lose.

should not be overlooked because it makes the boys feel as if their goals are important and worth spending the time to train them,” Mary Boutu Harris-Wiehe, mother of Giordan, sister to Daniel and cousin of Boutu said. Harris-Wiehe contacted Cota and told him about the four who wanted to become Soldiers.

deBrum will swear-in this month and leave for basic training in November. He has been working as a mechanic at Kwajalein Range Services Automotive Department for two years. He said he is entering the Army so he can improve his education and added, “There’s not enough money [in his community].” He wants a better life and better opportunities. He added that he knows he’ll be homesick, but “I’ll get used to it.”

The youngest of the group, Giordan, begins the 8th Grade this year. He attends school on Kwajalein as a part of the guest student program. He said that his grandfather was in the Army and that he has cousins and uncles who serve. His goal is lofty; he wants to attend the U.S. Military Academy. Cota said he encouraged Giordan to prepare for the academy. “He told me he was interested in enlisting,” Cota said. But he saw a future officer in the young man.

Cota meets with the four every other day at 5 p.m. and puts them through their paces. He said the training is similar to what is offered through a junior ROTC program available at many high schools in the United States.

Daniel and Boutu want to enter the Army through the Buddy Program according to Harris-Wiehe.

“I’m getting fit and preparing for the future,” Boutu said. Daniel said he wants to get a college education and the benefits available through the armed forces. He added that he’s not really concerned about the possibility of deploying to the Middle East and that his intention is to make the Army a career.

The Army affords a better life and better opportunities according to Boutu. “I grew up thinking I was an American kid,” he said and explained that he was raised in the United States. “I feel like I owe some-

“Basic Training consists of nine weeks of intense training designed to hone your skills, teach you new skills, optimize your physical and mental performance. It will prepare you mentally, physically, and emotionally to be the best that you can be,” according to the Army.com Web site.

Cota thinks the four will make great Soldiers. As far as cultural assimilation, he isn’t concerned. “The Army is made up of every color under the rainbow; they melt together into Army green,” he said.

Doing what's right

Herrington believes in getting job done

Lt. Michael Herrington lives by the simple code of doing the right thing. It is a code that he wears proudly whether he is doing his job patrolling the harbor or donating a kidney to a family member.

"It is old country philosophy that you just do the right thing and you don't have to worry about the rest of it," maintained Herrington, a police officer with the Kwajalein Police Department Marine division, about the core value he learned as a little boy growing up in West Texas.

Two months ago Herrington took a step toward putting his code of doing the right thing in action when he donated a kidney to his cousin.

Having traveled through Europe on motorcycles together as young men, Herrington and his cousin were very close. "He was the most active young man I ever knew," said Herrington. "I mean we went down to Italy and walked out on the beach and he said, 'Let's just run!' I said 'Why?,' and he said 'Because we can,' and he just took off running. That's his life, let's just do it because we can."

When the father of three needed a kidney after years of dialysis, Herrington and his brothers rallied around their cousin.

"All of my brothers tested; it just so happened that I came out the better match, and I had a wonderful kidney to give him," said Herrington. "Everybody kept saying here's what you need to understand. I didn't need to understand any of that. If it's going to save his life then it's going to happen; you don't need to explain to me the ramifications or side-effects. It's just whatever it takes to get the job done."

It is this philosophy that motivated Herrington and the five-man crew of the Marine Police Search and Rescue boat to push for an amendment to the U. S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Water Safety Regulation 385-9. "We are very fortunate that we have not had a Marshallese boat go down loaded with all the people that they haul," said Herrington.

Concerned with the safety of all who use the water taxi services, the KPD SR-001 crew was able to spotlight dangerous boating activities and get Appendix L added to the 385-9 regulation. It covers the water safety regulation for all commercial water taxis using the harbor.

"Up until this time it [Regulation 385-9] only covered USAKA residents. If you have a K-badge, you have to abide by these regs. The majority of people who come

and go out of this harbor are not USAKA K-badge holders," commented Herrington.

"I feel for these people on the water taxis. You put 25 people on a boat and they get the adverse sea conditions and they're overloaded and they take on water and you're holding a baby in your arms, what's going to happen when you try to swim? There is no floatation device," said Herrington. "See, I worry about the worse case scenario. They don't even think about it, so someone needs to think for them. Someone needs to be compassionate and say look I'm really trying to look for your best interest."

Herrington and his crew are diligently enforcing the new safety guidelines, inspecting vessels and working to educate water taxi operators. Herrington teaches an informal, hour-long class using an interpreter to inform taxi operators about the safety equipment required on the boat, the responsibilities of the operator, the rules of the road and the rules of good seamanship.

"So they are working to police themselves," said Herrington. "Now we are trying to get the private boats, which we have nothing to do with. That is our next step."

"I'm not doing things because I need to be the center of attention," said Herrington. "I'm doing them because they need to be done." For Herrington it is just a matter of doing the right thing.

You have to accept the fact that sometimes, in order to do good, you have to do bad.

The terrorists we face know we are reluctant to do that. They use our sense of humanity against us. They have no such qualms or restraints when they fire hundreds of rockets into Israel every day or send suicide bombers to all parts of the world. Everyone and everything is a target, even their own Muslim people.

That is why they use the tactics in Lebanon. They place their rocket launchers and other arms in populated areas. They know that Israel, the United States and all people who have any sense of humanity will be reluctant to attack such places. And if attacks are made, as in the case of the Israeli air strikes in which civilians, including many children, are being killed or the collateral damage that U.S. forces have caused in Iraq, the terrorists see it as a victory because it might bring more recruits to their side. The more death there is, the better they like it. The world sees the TV images of crying women and dead children and is horrified.

But to fight a war, it's either go all the way or don't go at all.

What are we prepared to do?

The way wars are won is to make it so painful and costly to the other side that they quit. And not only to make them quit, but to defeat them so badly, they never dare to do it again.

The allies were prepared to bomb German and Japanese cities to rubble and kill hundreds of thousands of civil-

ians during World War II because they knew it was necessary to win.

They didn't concern themselves with 'winning hearts and minds.'

The enemy we face today doesn't care about 'sending messages,' economic sanctions, diplomacy or useless United Nation resolutions. They only care about killing the infidels and Jews.

They understand only one message and that's the message of force. If killing them is the only way to stop them, then that's what has to be done no matter what it takes.

Is it better to kill terrorists even if innocent people are killed along with them or is it better not to kill terrorists if it means innocent people won't be killed either?

What are we prepared to do?

I don't like our being in Iraq. I've always thought it was a mistake to go there. I'd very much like our troops to come home.

There is talk in the world's diplomatic circles now of a 'sustainable' cease-fire between Hezbollah and Israel. Such talk is fantasy and useless. There will

never be such a thing as a 'sustainable' cease-fire as long as Hezbollah or any other Islamic terrorist organization exists.

And as we all know, it's not just Israel that is in mortal danger. The enemy vows to destroy all of us in the non-Muslim world.

Who cares why they do it? Who cares what drives them to kill themselves and other innocent people. Who knows what drives such an incredible hatred that it borders on hatred of life itself?

Nobody wondered why Adolph Hitler did what he did. They just knew he had to be destroyed at any price for the survival of the world.
