We've heard how terrorist suspects have been 'subjected' to the sounds of the *Red Hot Chili Peppers* being blasted into their cells day and night.


Man, that's a walk in the park. I mean, they've never heard my wife 'sing.'

The school staff and the students who are part of our Ebeye Guest Student program would like to express appreciation to the Kwajalein Community for helping with the school lunches.


The program has been fully funded and is going strong. The students who come from Ebeye cannot go home for

An El Nino increases chances of severe weather in Kwajalein area

Kwajalein residents are urged to prepare for possibility of storms

You may have noticed that it has been quite hot and sticky over the Kwajalein Atoll. Both temperature and humidity have been running above normal as a direct result of unusually warm ocean water in our area. The warm water has not extended far enough east to be called an El Nino, but for all intents and purposes that is what it is.

During an El Nino there is an increased chance of seeing a tropical storm or typhoon in the

Marshall Islands, particularly late in the year. In general, October through December is by far the most active period for tropical cyclone activity in our area.

The last two significant El Ninos produced Typhoon Paka, 80 miles south in December 1997, and Tropical Storm Talas, 10 miles south in December 2004.

This year, Super Typhoon Ioke struck to the north, and there have been several other tropical disturbances that developed east of Kwajalein that have not managed to hold together. This genesis area will shift southward through the next

few months, putting us at even greater risk.

The point of this is not to frighten anyone, but rather to call for preparedness. The time to prepare for a tropical storm or typhoon is before there is one out there. Have you assembled your personal survival kit as directed on page 5-12 of the new Kwajalein phone book?

By the time the first storm warning is issued, it may be too late to get supplies together. If the fully-stocked shelves in a stateside store can empty out in a matter of hours, imagine how fast local supplies will go in the face of a natural disaster.

Please take the time to prepare. Put together the kits. Read pages 5-11 through 5-20 in the 2006 phone book so you know what to do. It cannot hurt. Better to be safe than sorry.

Chili Cook-off draws record 31 competitors, event raises \$20,000

Thirty-one shot glass-size cups full of chili, a set of numb lips and singed tongue marked the end of the Seventh Annual Chili Cook-off on Roi-Namur Sunday. The event, the major fundraiser for the Enniburr Children's Christmas Fund, raised approximately \$20,000.

"Each year the event gets better and better. Everyone is able to come to Roi and enjoy a fun-filled day with activities for both adults and kids," said Shawn Elander, ECCF vice president and Chili Cook-off chairperson. "I think it's also that they know that so much money is raised for

a great cause.” Kwajalein residents arrived by plane and catamaran toting crock pots bubbling with chili to set alongside entrants from Roi-Namur, making this year’s event the largest with a record 31 contestants.

Entry 17, “Southpacked” by John Tompkins, a three-time finisher in the top three standings, won first place over entry three, “Fire Engine Red” by Steve Scruton, and third place winner Matt Winkler, “Roi Ratatouille,” entry 20.

Teens from Boy Scout Troop 314 and Kwajalein High School National Honor Society helped support the event by assisting in the chili tent, manning the dunking booth and supervising the Slip ‘n Slide and inflatable jousting pit.

New additions to the Chili Cook-off were a 3.5K fun run and a tour of Enniburr.

Justin DeCoster, the race winner, was a last minute entrant to the race kicking off his flip-flops to run the

race barefooted. He admitted the scorching asphalt under his feet might have helped spur him to victory. Tying for second place were Renee Hirniak and Ed Hillman, feet clad in running shoes.

The tour of Enniburr, led by Enniburr Resident Shubi Langidrik, helped to illuminate the ECCF cause. Langidrik took participants throughout the island, showing them the newly repaired school, churches, a water house and the water tank filled five times a day when the ferry makes its scheduled trips carrying fresh water from Roi-Namur.

Enniburr is an island the size of four football fields without electricity, plumbing and running water, and a population close to 2,300 adults and children, according to a census taken last year, said Langidrik. It is home for many U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll

Taking Care

Men face one in six chance of having prostate cancer

September is Prostate Cancer Awareness Month. The prostate is a gland in the male reproductive system located below the bladder and in front of the rectum. The prostate surrounds a tube called the urethra that carries urine out from the bladder.

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed non-skin cancer in American men. One in every six men will get prostate cancer sometime in his life. And it is the second-leading cause of male cancer-related deaths in the United States, after lung cancer. If diagnosed early, almost 100 percent of men diagnosed with prostate cancer are still alive in five years. In cases where the cancer has spread to other parts of the body, only 34 percent of men with the disease have a five-year survival rate.

Men with a close relative, such as a father or brother, with prostate cancer have a 1 in 3 chance of getting the disease. The risk increases to 83 percent with two close relatives and 98 percent with three close relatives. Other high risk factors include obesity with a body mass index over 32.5, high cholesterol, African American men and men exposed to Agent Orange.

In the early stages there are no symptoms of prostate cancer, so screening is crucial. The two tests commonly used to screen are the Prostate Specific Antigen, which is a blood test, and the Digital Rectal Exam, a physical exam. Men should start yearly screenings at age 50. Men with one or more high risk factors should start yearly testing at age 45 or earlier, and some men should choose to take a PSA test at age 40 to get a baseline level for future comparison.



In more advanced stages, symptoms may include difficult or frequent urination, blood in the urine or bone pain. In order to detect prostate cancer in its most treatable form, it must be caught before symptoms appear.

Men can lower their risk by following a low fat diet with lots of fruits and vegetables. Studies indicate a strong connection between consumption of saturated fat and red meat, and increased rates of prostate cancer diagnosis and death. Large studies are underway to confirm evidence that Soy, Vitamin E, tomatoes and other foods may lower your risk.

Many treatment options are available. Some men choose to wait and watch for signs of disease progression. Some men choose surgery, radiation, hormone therapy or a combination of methods.

Kwajalein Hospital offers both PSA blood tests and physical screening. Speak with your healthcare provider to discuss which screening and treatment options are right for you.


