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It's baaaaack!

Café Pacific back in full service, meals available for all users starting Monday

After almost 10 weeks of work, the Café Pacific is ready to get back to business as normal.

"We now have a new drainage system reducing hundreds of emergency plumbing calls for the future," Steve Cummings, Kwajalein Range Services Dining Services manager said. "We now have a new tile floor that is TBMED530 compliant. We have fixed the chronic boiler issues for the area, providing constant hot water, maintaining the critical temperatures for the main dishwashing operation. We have new self-heating buffet lines. We have dramatically upgraded the employee restrooms."

The Café Pacific provided a scaled-down food service during the repair period and limited service to mealcard holders and temporary duty personnel.

"After a huge effort from many people, we were able to pass all applicable inspections and restart regular service on Thursday," Cummings said. Regular service included using glass and silverware instead of picnic-like plastic and paperware. All authorized users, including non-mealcard holders can eat at Café Pacific beginning on Monday.

Cummings recognized the inconveniences foisted on mealcard holders during the repair period. He said to those diners, "Thank you, thank you, thank you for

your patience and understanding."

He added his appreciation to those who did the work, "Thanks to everyone! Special thanks to our KRS Dining Services employees for doing their best while they were forced to change their schedules and work routines, ensuring that we continued to serve our customers a safe meal. Also, thanks to all the shops that participated in the project. Every challenge was successfully addressed and everyone put extra effort into the details. Thank you."

In July, mealcard holders were offered the option of eating steak at the beach while Café Pacific was closed as a part of the Pacific Bachelor Quarters building reduction project. On Sunday this event will be repeated. Mealcard holders can eat steak and fresh corn on the cob at Emon beach from 5 to 7 p.m. The main dining room will also be open for regular dinner hours.

"This event was scheduled many weeks ago as a response to the very positive input Dining Services received from the first steak cookout we served in July. We received 87 surveys from our residential customers and the comments were that they enjoyed the evening and wanted to see more similar events. So, it's really just a coincidence that it fell on this weekend," Cummings said. He added that more events of this type are planned for the future, "As we receive input from the newly-created Dining Services Committee, we will do our best to accommodate our customers' wishes."

High winds, tides force temporary closure of Small Boat Marina; only one pier usable

The Small Boat Marina is back on line, but down to one pier, after Mother Nature shut down operations over the Columbus Day holiday.

Tropical disturbances in the area, with winds gusting up to 30 miles an hour, according to Tom Wright, 3D chief meteorologist, and powerful swells thrashing into the piers contributed to the shut down of the SBM.

The middle pier at the marina was taken out of the water for repairs by the Kwajalein Range Services Public Works Department. The steel on the pier is old, rusted and has separated from the concrete resulting from normal

wear and tear, but hastened by the high winds and high tides over the weekend.

The welded joint in the ramp showed signs of stress cracks, the result of large waves forcing the dock underneath the ramp to exert pressure on the ramp in a direction it is not intended to bend.

"With high, high tides and west/northwest winds, this place rocks and rolls," said Paul McGrew, SBM supervisor. "We're down to one pier and will be for a while, and people will need to be patient. We have only eight pier spaces for the 12 boats available for rental. Some boats will be on moorings until spaces become available. If the boat someone is renting is on a mooring, they will need to wait patiently until we are able to bring

it in to the pier."

The SBM was closed on Monday after KRS Safety staff examined "the pier, ramp and all associated parts and determined that it was unsafe to have them open," said Simone Smead, KRS Community Activities manager.

The newly-repaired ramp joint and the recently-repaired fuel pier are back in the water allowing the marina to return to business as usual on Friday morning.

"Community Activities would like to reassure the community that collectively with Kwaj Ops we continue to do everything possible to keep the SB Marina operational," continued Smead. "We understand how important boating and all the associated activities are to everyone's quality of life on Kwaj."

"I give my congratulations to all players, in particular the winners, because everyone played under difficult [weather] conditions," said Bob Butz, Golf Course supervisor.


"The stories I takes back from Kwajalein are price-

Koepeke was invited to help run the tournament by the KGA. This was Koepeke's third invitation by the KGA to help run the tournament on Kwajalein. Koepeke's role during the tournament was to act as an independent third party, uphold the rules of golf and provide lessons.

"Believe you can do it, and you probably can" is his advice to all golfers.

"Despite the weather, people turned in some very good golf," said Butz. "In the first round Gerry Wolf and Lloyd Jordan played exceptionally well. In the second round, Fred Cunningham and Bob Nast both played great

games. And for combined rounds, Fred Cunningham, John Jahnke and Selentina Beniamina played really well."

Columbus Day Run draws 91 participants

Stores breaks female open record by a five minute margin

There was multiple lightning at Kwajalein Running Club's 29th Annual Columbus Day Run on Monday morning. The first lightning was pre-race and estimated by the weather fore-caster on duty to be 30 miles out to sea and moving away, so KRC's officers proceeded with the 6 a.m. start at Namo Weto Youth Center. The second was human lightning, right on the course, in the form of Cathy Stores. Stores broke the Women's Open record for the 13.04-mile distance set back in 2001 by a walloping 5-minutes and 40 seconds, to finish in 1:31:44. After 28 annual events, these records usually inch down, so this was the remarkable performance achievement of the day.


Stores' husband Abe was second overall across the line in the 13.04 mile distance, winning the Men's Masters Division in 1:35:42. This event has two distance options: 6.52 miles and 13.04 miles (~1/4 and ~1/2 Marathon). These correspond to either one or two loops of the Island. Whether running one or two laps, they all start at 6 a.m. and in optimum years get to witness the sunrise when passing through the golf course area. This year there was cloud cover, but the distant lightning was dramatic. Ironically, the Stores were first in the field to finish lap one, even though only halfway done at that point.

Doug Hepler continued his 6-year long metamorphosis to "distance runner" and ran his

first half marathon distance ever in 2:34:19. Hepler was accompanied by training buddy and fellow high school teacher AnnElise Peterson.

The total field was diverse in age, ability and intensity. The youngest participants were in jog strollers. The

youngest self-propelled participant was 6-year-old Grace Everts, whose entire family of parents and three children finished. At the other end of the age spectrum were a few SSE contestants (Social Security Eligible . . . 62-and-over). This event has a long history of heavy participation by groups of casual walkers out to jump start their Columbus Day holiday. Event organizers were pleased to see the return of many walkers this year, running the participant count up to 91 compared to 46 last year. With some prodding by Spartans I soccer coach Paul McGrew, high school boys participated in larger numbers than usual. There was a relaxing barbeque with presentation of certificates and custom T-shirts at Emon Main Pavilion following the event. Now . . . go ahead and pencil in "Columbus Day Run" for that empty 6 a.m., Oct. 9, 2007 slot on your calendar.

Cars A pedal-to-the-metal race car determined to prove his worth on the tracks discovers that life isn't always about crossing the finish line first in Toy Story director John Lasseter's mechanically minded tale of friendship and loyalty. Lightning McQueen (voice of Owen Wilson) may be just a rookie, but he's convinced that he can realize his dream of zooming by the checkered flag if he can only make it to California in time to compete in the upcoming Piston Cup Championship. When Lightning takes a detour into the slow-moving, Route 66 town of Radiator Springs, however, it begins to appear as if his shot at the big time has effectively stalled out. Of course, Lightning's exciting cross-country trek wasn't all for naught, and after befriendng such quirky Radiator Springs residents as Sally the Porsche (voice of Bonnie Hunt), Doc Hudson (voice of Paul Newman), and Mater the Tow Truck (voice of Larry the Cable Guy), the eager young racer learns that sometimes life is more about the voyage than the outcome of the race.

You, Me and Dupree A man is being driven crazy by his shiftless best friend, just as the layabout starts making nice with his wife and neighbors in this comedy. Carl and Molly (Matt Dillon and Kate Hudson) are a thirtysomething couple who have just gotten married and are settling down into a cozy new home in a quiet neighborhood. While Carl and Molly are happy with their new digs, Carl's best friend, Randy Dupree (Owen Wilson), is not content with his living arrangements. Dupree has all but made a career out of avoiding work, responsibility, and commitment, and while his charm usually manages to keep him afloat, when he loses his job, his apartment, and his car. Carl can't bear to see Dupree in such dire circumstances, and tells Dupree he can stay on their couch until he can get things straightened out. But while Carl was expecting Dupree to stay for a few days, it soon becomes obvious to both him and Molly that their guest has no intention of moving out anytime soon, and while the likable freeloader starts working his charm on Molly, their neighbors, and their friends, Carl soon finds himself at the end of his rope with his best man and childhood buddy.

Spc. Fernando D. Robinson, 21, of Hawthorne, Calif., died Oct. 2 in Korengal, Afghanistan, from injuries sustained when his patrol came under attack by enemy forces using small arms fire and rocket propelled grenades. Robinson was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, N.Y.

Staff Sgt. James D. Ellis, 25, of Valdosta, Ga., **Spc. Raymond S. Armijo**, 22, of Phoenix, **Spc. Justin R. Jarrett**, 21, of Jonesboro, Ga., and **Spc. Kristofer C. Walker**, 20, of Creve Coeur, Ill. died Oct. 2, in Taji, Iraq, of injuries sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle. All four Soldiers were assigned to the 7th Squadron, 10th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Lance Cpl. John E. Hale, 20, of Shreveport, La., and **Cpl. Bradford H. Payne**, 24, of Montgomery, Ala., died Oct. 6 from wounds received while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province, Iraq. Both Hale and Payne were assigned to 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

Sgt. Lawrence L. Parrish, 36, of Lebanon, Mo., and **Spec. John E. Wood**, 37, of Humboldt, Kan., died Oct. 7 in Baghdad, Iraq, from injuries suffered when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle during combat operations. Parrish was assigned to the 110th Engineer Battalion, Kansas City, Mo. Wood was assigned to the 891st Engineer Battalion, Garnett, Kan.

Sgt. Brandon S. Asbury, 21, of Tazewell, Va., who died Oct. 7 in Baghdad, from injuries suffered when his unit came in contact with enemy forces using small arms fire during combat operations. Asbury was assigned to the 4th Support Battalion, 1st Brigade, 4th Infantry Division, Fort Hood.

Spec. Timothy A. Fulkerson, 20, of Utica, Ky., who died Sunday in Tikrit, Iraq, when a landmine detonated near

his vehicle during combat operations. Fulkerson was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 82nd Aviation Reconnaissance Battalion, 82nd Combat Aviation Brigade, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Lance Cpl. Derek W. Jones, 21, of Salem, Ore., and **Lance Cpl. Jeremy S. Sandvick Monroe**, 20, of Chinook, Mont., died Sunday from wounds received while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. Jones and Monroe were assigned to 2nd Battalion, 3rd Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii.

Capt. Robert M. Secher, 33, of Germantown, Tenn., died Sunday from wounds received while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 12th Marine Regiment, 3rd Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, Okinawa, Japan.

Lance Cpl. Stephen F. Johnson, 20, of Marietta, Ga., died Sunday while conducting combat operations against enemy forces in Al Anbar province. He was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune.

Pfc. Phillip B. Williams, 21, of Gardnerville, Nev., died Monday in Baghdad, from injuries suffered from enemy contact during combat operations. Williams was assigned to the 4th Brigade Troop Battalion, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.





Kwaj Hospital imaging department reminds island women to have mammograms done

Hourglass reports

In honor of Breast Cancer Awareness Month and the eve of the Relay For Life, Virginia Mack and Susan Zehr, imaging mammographers at Kwajalein Hospital are reaching out to all the ladies of the island who are 40 and older. They want to know: Have you had your annual mammogram yet? Those of you who said yes – you should be applauded.

“We are passionate about our jobs and care about the health of women on Kwajalein,” Mack said. “For those of you who are not coming forward to have your mammogram due to fear of radiation, compression, or a bad experience in the past, please let us help you,” she added. They encourage every woman to take charge of

her breast health.

“We welcome all of you to come in anytime and let us give you a tour of the department,” said Mack. “Allow us to show you the equipment, explain the process, and answer any questions you may have. Hopefully, all this will reduce your fears.”

Anyone interested in a tour of the facility or wanting to ask a question of Mack and Zehr regarding mammography, can reach them at 53522.

The American Cancer Society recommends three important things. First, you should perform monthly self breast exams. Become familiar with your breasts so you know if something feels abnormal to you. Second, have an annual clinical breast examination by a health

care professional. Thirdly, have an annual screening mammogram.

It is this screening mammogram which is going to detect minute calcifications which are one of the most important signs of early breast cancer. Microcalcifications are so small they cannot be felt during a breast exam. Early detection of breast cancer increases survival rates and treatment options. “Please do not wait until you feel a lump to come in for a mammogram. Commit yourself to these three important steps recommended by the American Cancer Society,” Mack said.

“One out of seven of us will have breast cancer in our lifetime,” according to Mack. “Take charge of your breast health. Early detection saves lives.”
