

Like lots of people on island, we wonder what will happen in the coming year(s) to Kwajalein.

With budget cuts and the looming prospect of jobs either being remoted or lost, secure is not the feeling that a lot of folks have right now.

My wife has a philosophy that everyone stumbles through life and all anyone can do is pick themselves up when they fall and just keep going. Worrying won't help anything. What's going to happen is going to happen.

I guess that's true for the most part. What was it John Lennon said? Life is what happens to you while you're making plans.

Maybe plans don't always direct the way life will go, but some decisions sure do.

For instance, besides the decision to say 'I do' 35 years ago (which, by the way, is the best one I've ever made), the choice to come to Kwaj has been the most life altering.

We were living in Alabama 13 years ago. We had suffered through a terrible personal loss. I had a job that I made good money at but hated every minute of.

I was in my 40s and I didn't have a good outlook on life and wasn't optimistic about the future.

I figured that pretty much, my days were going to be the same (get up, go to work, come home, watch TV, go to bed) for the rest of my life. Interesting and exciting were just words in the dictionary.

Then one day, my wife came home from work and asked me if I'd like to go live on a Pacific island.

I told her that whatever she was smoking, she should stop immediately.

When it dawned on me she wasn't joking, I really thought she'd gone over the edge and slipped her trolley.

She explained to me what Kwajalein was and where it was and said she'd been offered a job there.

Weeks of discussion followed during which I was adamantly against moving, but she kept insisting we go.

Then, after a particularly horrible day at work, the thought of living on a tropical island paradise suddenly appealed to me.

After a night of laying awake and thinking, I told my wife in the morning that if she really wanted to go, we would.


Now, I had never been a risk taker. The biggest risk I'd even taken was crossing a street without a cross walk.

So here I was, about to give up my job (hated though it was), my property (my wife wanted to sell it) and leave everything I knew behind me.

My friends and family thought I was crazy. I couldn't disagree with them.

But my wife and I took that risk, made a decision to stumble through life and here we are 13 years later.

Because we made that choice, we've saved more money than we ever dreamed possible. We've traveled to Ireland, Scotland, Switzerland, Italy and Sicily.



Our lives went from mundane to interesting and even exciting sometimes.

I'll never forget the first time I stepped off the plane in Honolulu and could not bring myself to believe I was actually in Hawaii. That's a place I never thought I'd see except in movies or television.

Life actually became good again.


Of course, it's not all peaches and cream. There have been times when I thought I couldn't stand it for another minute.

YEAR THAT WAS

2005

JANUARY

- The Christian Women's Fellowship held its Carlson Christmas drop on Jan. 10 despite bad weather. The approximately 50 residents of Carlson Island received clothing, food, bedding, toys and school supplies.
- Word was received that Bank of America's Community Bank would open in mid-February replacing the Bank of Guam.
- Island Internet users were warned that the Public Internet provider was threatening to cease service if anti-virus software was not updated and more care was taken with e-mails which might contain viruses. Kwajalein Range Services Information Technology department was making anti-virus equipment available to island residents.
- Construction began on 16 additional dome homes on North Point to replace trailers and increase housing space on island.
- Japanese visitors from the Japan War Bereaved Families Association arrived to honor family members killed on Kwajalein during World War II. They performed ceremonies of remembrance at the Japanese Cemetery.


Dr. Jill Horner of Kwajalein Hospital received a degree of Fellow from the American Academy of Family Physicians for her service to family medicine and ongoing professional development. Horner has also practiced medicine on Majuro and Ebeye.



Despite damp weather, the Kwajalein Remote Control Modeling Club's Kwajalein International Speedway opened with the roaring action of 14 cars and trucks.

FEBRUARY

- In an effort to reduce the rodent population, a rat baiting project started with 60 bait boxes being placed in the new housing area. Although lethal to rodents, the bait boxes posed little threat to children or domestic animals.
- Retail Manager David Fearon and Lisa Shier of Mission Operations achieved the Six Sigma Yellow Belts for cost-cutting solutions. The Six Sigma program is an ongoing Kwajalein Range Services training project.
- Teachers Sonya Sava and Teri King initiated a project, A Wave of Relief, for victims of the December tsunami in Thailand and other countries. Students in Grades Two thru Six participated in a clean-up day and collected money from island residents.
- Residents of Ebeye and Kwajalein celebrated Kwajalein Atoll Memorial Day with parades, floats, music and speeches. The event remembers the liberation of Kwajalein from the Japanese in February, 1944. The event was attended by U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Commander, COL Beverly Stipe.
- Community Bank opened its doors for Kwajalein residents. The new bank replaced the Bank of Guam. Three ATMs were installed for customer convenience.
- Maj. Winfield Keller was named U.S. Army tester of the year by the National Defense Industrial Association.



A beached spinner dolphin was rescued by island residents as it struggled in the water near Bargain Bazaar. It was moved to the adult pool where members of the high school marine science class kept watch during the night. The dolphin was eventually released into the ocean near Carlson and when last seen was swimming away.

MARCH

- High school students and teachers hammed it up for a good cause and raised \$2,023 for tsunami relief. The students performed skits, sang and danced in the high school multi-purpose room. Proceeds were donated to CARE for tsunami victims.

- Residents found it easier to get around the island as community bus service commenced. The service runs seven days per week from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. The service was started in an effort to alleviate the shortage of automotive assets. Route maps were posted at each bus stop.

- Island teenagers were warned at a town hall meeting with the USAKA commander that bad behavior could result in being barred from the island. The meeting resulted from several instances of teen drinking and some vandalism.

- The U.S. Coast Guard cutter Sequoia visited Kwajalein to repair and maintain buoys and navigation aids.

- The President's Day photo exhibit gave island photographers a chance to show their talent. There were six categories.



Lindsay Davis sang as more music was enjoyed by Kwajalein residents as the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club Kaleidoscope of Music raised \$3,500 for the high school scholarship fund. Volunteer performers gave their time and talent to the worthy cause. All high school seniors were eligible to make application for scholarship funds.



A fire on Ebeye destroyed from three to four residential dwellings, an apartment that was used to house nurses, as well as the Republic of the Marshall Island's Finance Building and food services building. Though there were no injuries, approximately 60 Marshallese were displaced. Six firefighters from USAKA responded to a request from officials on Ebeye, loaded a fire truck onto the barge and crossed the lagoon to render aid.

APRIL

- Twenty-one National Honor Society students went to Ebeye and Gugeegue to deliver approximately \$1,600 worth of supplies to four private schools. The schools were chosen based on need.

- A project led by the KRS Environmental department and other groups cleaned 10 years' worth of sludge from the turtle pond. While the pond was being cleaned, second graders helped clean the turtles' shells. It was said that the clean up created a "nice ecosystem and breeding ground for the turtles and giant clams."

- Canvasback Missions, a California-based organization, provided cataract surgery and other vision care free of charge at the Ebeye Hospital. A two-person team sponsored by Hawaii's Wahiawa/Waisleia Rotary and the Waianae Rotary clubs provided Ebeye's children with free dental care. Out of more than 100 patients treated, the team had seen only one without cavities.

- KRS said farewell to company President Ike Richardson and welcomed current President John Pickler. "We've got a very important mission here in support of USAKA/RTS and at the same time take care of the people that live and work here. What I want to do is make a positive difference here," Pickler said.

The skate park was reopened as an unmanned facility. When the park was first opened it was a staffed facility, however, as the popularity wore off it was no longer practical to staff it. After having the park closed for a number of months, it was reopened. This gave island residents the opportunity to use the park at any time with a 'buddy' and the use of proper safety equipment.



Rain showers couldn't dampen spirits at the Spring Break Music Festival held on Emon Beach. Local bands, the American Forces Entertainment Vicki Nova Band and vendors entertained residents during the day and evening. The event raised \$2,000 for the Kwajalein Shrine Club. Ariana Johnson, Leightyn Cossey and Bruce Johnson were among the performers.

MAY

- Twenty-seven dancers and chanters who made up the Jobwa Stick Dancers performed in celebration of Asian Pacific Month. The performance was deemed special because the group can only perform with the permission of their Iroj.

- Kwajalein swimmers Ian Taylor, Michael Taylor and Jared Heine went to Montreal. The three represented the Republic of the Marshall Islands in the XI FINA World Championships. Selection criteria for the competition began with native Marshallese swimmers, followed by those who met the criteria for speed, experience, availability and RMI residency. Sarah Stepchew served as the coach for the swimmers.

Because of a delayed shipment from Mobil Oil, Ebeye's only power generation plant did not receive oil needed to maintain the island's power. In response to the situation, USAKA Host Nation representatives located two drums of oil, no longer used on the installation, which was then sold and transported to the neighboring island to avert an outage.

- A portion of Omelek was transformed into a launch site for SpaceX for its proposed orbital booster vehicles. The site was used for a launch in December.
- The annual Kwajalypics games were held. The day-long event was designed to build fun with participation for all organizations supporting USAKA/RTS to increase teaming and communication. Games from tennis to ultimate Frisbee and activities from water balloon tossing to three-legged races put seven teams competing for the win. Public Works came out on top with Mission Ops and Community Activities rounding out the top three.

- USAKA Regulation 190-10 changed. The regulation limited boat access to Kwajalein after dark. Stipe amended the policy to allow licensed water taxis to continue to have access until 9:30 p.m.

In an effort to test the island's emergency response capabilities, a mass causality exercise was preformed. The mock plane crash prompted activation of the Emergency Operations Center as well as other departments island wide.

JUNE

- New Host Nations Chief Maj. Jeff Klein arrived. Klein replaced Maj. David Coffey. "Ensuring positive host nation relations is a team effort. We, as a community, will succeed or fail together," Klein said of his new assignment.


- The Bank of the Marshall Islands opened on Kwajalein. BOMI was also the first privately-owned enterprise to open on Kwaj. The bank is used by C-Badge workers and supplies a wide range of financial services.

- Approximately 20 members of the Kwaj Kids Club delivered books and school supplies to Ebeye schools. Funds used to purchase the items were raised through the year-long collection of box tops, donated to the club by the community.

- All-day kindergarten was given the green light. The new all-day kindergarten was designed to be optional. Parents could still opt to enroll their children for just the morning session.

- The EOD team and an explosive K9 handler were alerted because of a suspicious device near the Shell Bachelor Quarters. An investigation revealed the device was a ticking alarm clock, cellophane taped to a yellow plastic box. It was determined there was no explosive components within the debris after EOD disabled it.

- As part of the AFE tour, Chris Gray and the Gray Wolf Band preformed two shows on Kwajalein, at the Yuk Club and the Richardson Theater.



For the first time in 10 years, a RMI championship women's softball team from Majuro traveled to Kwajalein for a tournament to strengthen ties between the two communities, as well as Ebeye. Called the Kwajalein/Majuro Softball Challenge, the Majuro team swept the Kwajalein Scrubs with scores of 25-5, 11-7 and 4-1.

Light up Lagoon

JULY

- The Child Development Center and the School Age Services program were both reaccredited.
- An ATM was approved for the installation on Roi-Namur. The ATM will be installed at the Roi-Namur terminal. The installation date is yet to be determined. It is to be built and circuits acquired prior to installation.
- The mobile kitchen was used for its first official function at the Moonrise Grill for Italian Night.

Lt. Col. Ann T. Daugherty relinquished command of the RTS to Lt. Col. Justin A. Hirniak. "I feel like I already know the community and I look forward to working and living here," Hirniak said at the change of command ceremony.



AUGUST

- New teachers Allison Kickhofel, Mark and Kris Wayland, Julie Atkinson, Casey Schuh and Deanna Cain arrived to help educate Kwajalein children.
- Four World War II barrage rockets and more than 20 155 mm howitzer shells were assessed in the waters off of Carlson Island by UASKA safety personnel and Explosive Ordnance Disposal professionals. The rockets were found in waist-high water on the northwest end of the island. The shells were found off-shore about 300 meters toward Carlos Island.

• EOD and Launch Ordnance conducted a demolition operation on Illeginni Island. The purpose of the operation was to dispose of unexploded ordnance that had been collected on Kwajalein. More than 130 pounds of ordnance was disposed of including things such as firecrackers, rounds of ammunition and expired flares.



• A radar called ASR-11 or Digital Airport Surveillance Radar was built between the fixed-wing hangar and Building 900 as the result of an effort by the National Airspace System to upgrade Federal Aviation Administration and Department of Defense airfields worldwide. Kwajalein's system is one of 238 being installed by the DoD and FAA.

• Two memorials were built to honor Kwajalein's military men and women, including those who died in a 1950 plane crash, and those who have lived and served on Kwaj since 1944. Both projects were undertaken by Beverly Vencill, acting secretary for the USAKA Administration office.

• A break-in at the American Legion Post 44 Veteran's Hall resulted in what officials said was the most extensive damage at the facility to date. Among the damage was a large plate-glass window thought to be broken by a concrete block to gain entrance, damage to the bar surface, office manager's door smashed, hardware broken and major damage to a locked file cabinet.



The Kwajalein Atoll Pro Angler's Fishing Tournament was held with 24 boats and \$4,800 in prize money. Fishing started at 7 a.m. and finished at 6 p.m. Fishermen could win money in a number of categories including largest billfish, ahi, ono and other tuna as well as aggregate weight. *Sparetime*, a Kwajalein private boat with Capt. Terry Yeary and crew took the aggregate weight category with 261.6 pounds of fish caught during the tournament.



In response to a growing interest in golf among children, a junior golf clinic was put on at Holmberg Fairways with instruction by Bob Butz. The clinic was held three days a week for three weeks. The basics of the sport were taught to 38 participants.

SEPTEMBER

- KRS Project Manager Norm Black joined a 200-member Bechtel disaster recovery management team in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. The team performed for the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Black deployed to satellite project areas within the three states that sustained significant damage and served as a senior manager on the Environment Safety and Health team.

- A sand castle building contest was a big hit at the Labor Day Beach Blast on Emon Beach. The beach was lined with children young and old building sand creations. Many had to try to fight the tide so the judges could see their art before it was washed away. Shaun Brady and Tyler Decorder won the contest with a sand race car.

- The 14th annual Chili Cook-Off was held on Roi-Namur to raise money for the Enniburr Children's Christmas Fund. The event raised an estimated \$11,000. Attractions included a dunking booth, chip and putt golf, radio controlled car racing, swimming, pie-in-the-face toss and judging of 26 chilis. Conrad Nakasone took first place in the contest with his "Hoochie Mama Chili."

- The Women, Infants and Children overseas program became available in a limited fashion. Because there are no authorized facilities on Kwaj, items such as formula, crackers, cereal and canned goods can be shipped to program participants.

- New 1st Sgt. Gwen Lewis arrived. Lewis said she sees her job on Kwaj as "building a team, but also enforcing the standards. These are the standards we have to live by."



Manit Day, or Customs Day, was celebrated at Emon Beach. The celebration featured displays on traditional foods, medicine, fishing and navigation. Residents were also treated to live demonstrations of weaving, coconut husking, fire making, tree climbing and making coconut rope. Manit Day was also celebrated at the elementary school and on Ebeye.



The Kwajalein Scuba Club sponsored Light Up the Lagoon, a tribute to victims and heroes of Sept. 11, 2001. Eighty-one divers with flashlights formed the shape of the twin towers. Once in place, divers one-by-one turned their lights out, symbolic of the towers falling. Three rings of a bell, three times each, signaled a moment of silence.

OCTOBER

- Rain, shine and everything in between were experienced by the 102 golfers that participated in the 35th Annual Kwaj Open Golf Tournament at Holmberg Fairways. PGA golfer Mark Koepeke said, "This tournament, as fun as it was, is a very respected tournament. Everyone takes it seriously and puts pressure on themselves to perform. They enjoy it to the fullest."

- The Kwajalein Running Club's 28th Annual Columbus Day Runabout was held with a total of 46 participants. The race consisted of either 6.52 or 13.04 miles depending on the division. Audrey Corbett, 7, took first place in the female youth division.

- The KRS travel policy, SPI-0122 changed. On completion of 12 months of service, KRS team employees now earn travel off the island in the form of cash instead of airline tickets. The policy revision was in response to the change in the BMAC fare from fully-refundable to non-refundable tickets.

- Members of the YYWC traveled to Ebeye and Gugegue to present grant applications to educational leaders. While there they handed out more than 100 dozen home-made cookies. Club members delivered approximately 180 goody bags to the teachers, principals and school administrators of eight schools.

- Halloween was celebrated with an underwater pumpkin carving contest sponsored by the Kwajalein Scuba Club; a costume carnival, a costume parade and a Halloween party at the Yuk Club. Scariest pumpkin in the carving contest went to Jayne Cavender.

The annual Shaving Cream Social invited school-age children to 'fight' with each other in the ravine between Richardson Theater and Brandon Field. Participation was by age and each child was provided with one can of shaving cream to let loose.

2005

NOVEMBER

- The Quality of Life Integrated Product Team donated \$12,500 worth of school supplies to Ebeye public schools and \$2,500 worth of supplies were shipped to Roi-Namur to be given to Enniburr in an effort to enhance the lives of children of Kwajalein's workforce living on Ebeye and Enniburr.

- KRS achieved 4,000,000 hours continually worked, almost a year, without a lost-time injury. Occupational injuries requiring medical treatment greater than first aid were down 84 percent. KRS injury rates were 88 percent below industry averages.

- Stephen Johnson, a former computer operator at Information Technology on Kwaj, was charged with hacking into a U.S. government computer to disable the antivirus software so he could play games and watch pirated videos.

- Former 'Kwaj Kid' Capt. Michael D. Martina was killed near Ar Ramadi, Iraq when his AH-1W Super Cobra helicopter crashed while flying in support of security and stabilization operations.



SpaceX attempted Kwajalein's first ground-based orbital launch. The company's goal is to prove a rocket can be delivered and launched within 10 days, 11 shorter than what is typically required, with a launch crew of less than 25. The mission was unsuccessful but rescheduled for sometime this year.

DECEMBER

- The month started with the 38th Annual Tree-Lighting Ceremony in front of the Yuk Club. The event included performances by the Junior/Senior High School band, the Brady Dance Troupe, Girl Scouts and Job Corps. Santa's arrival and parade was also the same day. Stipe



and Mr. and Mrs. Claus did the honors of lighting the tree.

- Roi-Namur residents put on the annual Enniburr Children's Christmas Party. Approximately 380 children traveled from Enniburr to Roi to take part in the festivities. The children were treated to a day of fun including Santa's arrival, gift bags, lunch and games.



- Members of the YYWC organized a Christmas drop for the islands of Majetto and Ebadon. The club delivered items for 250 children via helicopter. Gifts such

as new flip-flops, crayons and hats were given to children on the two islands. The club also brought items such as rice and fishing nets to the communities.

- For the 14th year the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School made a trip to Carlos to spread Christmas cheer. A few teachers and 41 students spent the majority of the day with the residents handing out gifts, playing games and socializing.

- The holidays were celebrated in a number of ways island wide. The annual event, Christmas in the Marshall Islands, brought many residents to the Corlett Recreation Center to watch the United Church of Christ and the USAKA jebta perform. The Kwajalein Yacht Club hosted the annual Parade of Lights with four boats. The boats were decorated with lights and circled the ski boat area. Santa made a second appearance when he and his elves came out of the lagoon in an event sponsored by the Kwajalein Scuba Club.

- Three residents completed a 26.2-mile course at the Paupers' Marathon. The Kwajalein marathon is named in recognition of the marathon held in Honolulu the same day. Six teams also competed in the race. John Fraser was the winner with a time of 3:49:47.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT THE RECLAIMED WATER SYSTEM AND DRINKING WATER SYSTEM (SOUTHWESTERN TIP, INDUSTRIAL END OF KWAJALEIN ISLAND)

The Kwajalein Island reclaimed (non-potable) water system and drinking water (potable) recently exceeded a chlorine residual standard (chlorine residual below the compliance level) at one of the sampling points within both the potable and non-potable water distribution system(s). Although this situation does not require you to take any precautions, public notification is required under these circumstances.

The United States Army Environmental Standards requires that water entering, and within the water distribution systems meet certain residual chlorine levels to reduce the potential for bacteriological growth. Recently, one of the sampling points at the southwestern portion of Kwajalein was changed to better reflect the extremities of the distribution systems. This new sampling point shows residual chlorine levels which are less than the minimum compliance standard. The low chlorine residual is associated with user locations north of Building 1500, Reutilization and Disposal, on the industrial end of the island. For reference, this includes Building 1517, Liquid Nitrogen Plant and Building 1499, Ground-Based Radar. It is important to note that the water entering the distribution systems is acceptable and all other sampling points meet compliance standards.

What does this mean?

As a precaution, samples will continue to be collected and analyzed for coliform bacteria to ensure the water is protective of human health. Samples taken thus far have been negative for the presence of bacteria.

What is being done to correct the problem?

In the future the distribution line will be modified at the southwestern end of Kwajalein to help increase the flow and decrease stagnation of the water. Currently no health-based restrictions on drinking water use or the normal use of reclaimed water (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc.) are necessary.
