Congress denies use of money from Kwajalein budget


Last week in my column I talked about our latest budget challenge and about the prudent measures we need to take to get us through the next couple of months. I just received word from higher authority that Congress has denied the use of the \$50M it was reprogramming from our budget and has now returned that money back to U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll.

While this is good news, it doesn't preclude us from continuing with prudent measures to curb spending. We are still supporting a war effort, and

we need to be ready to make some sacrifices to support our fighting men and women.

That said, we will still take a close look at all travel requests, authorizing only those that are truly mission-essential. We still need to limit overtime to only that necessary to carry out the mission. We will not, however, cut back on any family support programs or any summer hire programs we have in place.

As the commander of this fine Army installation, it is my duty to minimize



impacts on our programs and on your lives. I very much appreciate your continued support and cooperation.

Reaching out to someone in pain can do wonders

Tuesday morning I woke up, eager to start a new week. As I walked to the kitchen to make a cup of coffee, I glanced at the TV and saw a breaking news story. I was shocked to see that while I was soundly sleeping, a man in his twenties shot and killed 32 students at Virginia Tech and injured at least 28.

The young man reportedly walked into a dormitory first, shooting two innocent students and two whole hours later walked into an engineering building, shooting even more.

While I had forgotten about my coffee and was sitting on



my couch in disbelief, wondering and praying for the parents of the victims, I started to notice that the news about this incident was moving to the backburner. A stepfather, who lost a child in the Columbine shooting, started venting about law enforcement corruption and how they are still fighting in court to get all the information for the victim's lawsuit.

Now, I know when it comes to 24-hour news stations and breaking news stories where you don't have all the information up front, you have to find things to talk about in the meantime. Somewhere in

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Updated science curriculum unanimously approved

The updated science curriculum was unanimously approved by the School Advisory Council on Wednesday evening at the monthly, public meeting.

The proposed changes in the science curriculum will provide for a more seamless transition from elementary school to middle school to high school, according to the Science Curriculum Committee co-chairs Greg Moore and Brian Brewster.

"Before, the students were used to taking all the sciences [life, physical and earth sciences] every year," Brewster said. "What we wanted to do was start to focus that a little earlier on so that teachers could cover the material with a little more depth.

"Now 6th grade is going to focus on life [science] and that cycles right in to a natural progression, because then earth [science] follows the 7th grade, physical [science] is in 8th grade, 9th grade is biology," continued Brewster. "So there's a more natural cycle there where the kids will spiral through the curriculum a little more effectively."

The proposed science curriculum was presented to the SAC last month for review. Copies of the updated curriculum were placed in faculty lounges and presented to the community for comment at a public meeting at the high school library on March 1, and made available by request from school

administrative offices.

The adopted curriculum will be presented to U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. Stevenson Reed for final approval. The SAC acts in an advisory capacity to the USAKA commander. Votes to accept or deny school policies by the board become a recommendation to the commander.

The science curriculum will be up for review again in 2013. Math (K-12), reading (K-7) and consumer science will undergo the review process next year.

At the public meeting High School Counselor Jaime Bowers offered an

"However, if we find—because this is the first year we are doing the COGAT—when we get this information back that it's not as useful as we thought it would be, we do want to reserve the right [with] this group to adjust that before we dive into it next year," continued Kwajalein Schools Superintendent Al Robinson. "There's no sense doing that a second time if we find that the data is not of any use to us."

Also on the SAC agenda was a report by Robinson on spring 2007 survey results for Kwajalein schools and Community Education.

Survey results showed parents are supportive of the elementary and high school, giving both schools high marks in a majority of areas. Areas that parents indicated a satisfaction include an emphasis on academic learning, high standards set by Kwajalein teachers, and student discipline by school administration.

One area that remains a concern for parents in both the elementary school and high school is a dissatisfaction with the media center/library

offerings.

"We plan to move forward with the improvement plan for the media/ information centers at both schools, specifically the libraries," Robinson said. "We already made commitments to spend about \$11,000 this next year between the two buildings to beef up those collections, [and] make sure we're in good shape there."

Survey results will be sent to the school evaluator and used as part of the dialog of the ongoing school improvement plan, Robinson said.

The SAC members also welcomed Chris Womack as a Kwajalein Range Services representative to the SAC board, replacing the outgoing Ragnar Opiniano. Opiniano served two years on the council.

The next public SAC forum will be 7 p.m., May 16, in the George Seitz Elementary School music room.

informal report to the SAC regarding the Academic Testing Program, School Policy 3000.20.

"A month ago I came to the executive meeting and suggested there be no changes to the K-12 testing program, with the exception of a review by the superintendent, of the Cognitive Abilities Test in grades 3, 6, and 9," explained Bowers, "and I understand that that review was done, and the recommendation was to keep as is."

Bowers added that data from current testing programs meet school accreditation goals and he sees no need for any changes or additions to next year's testing plan.

Worthy supports U.S. Navy air defense test

The KMRSS *Worthy* has been missing from Kwajalein's dock since mid-February, but will return at approximately 7 a.m. Tuesday.

The *Worthy* and its crew have been in Hawaii supporting the U.S. Navy's Pacific Missile Range Facility.

"The *Worthy* left Kwajalein on February 12 to support the Pacific Missile Range Facility in Kauai, Hawaii with the execution of the RDC-1c and FTT-07 missions," Mark Thimsen, Kwajalein Range Services deputy project lead for the *Worthy* upgrade project said. "These missions are part of the Missile Defense

Agency and Deputy for Test Resources' Terminal High Altitude Air Defense test program. The *Worthy* was the primary missile flight safety asset supporting the target launches." The RDC-1c launch was March 5, and the FTT-07 launch was April 5.

The *Worthy* is a 224-foot T-AGOS class vessel, designed for the U.S. Navy's ocean surveillance mission during the cold war. In 1995 U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll and Reagan Test Site began the conversion of the *Worthy* for use as a missile defense instrumentation ship, and it has supported 24 missions, all successfully, since the first TCMP-2B mission in 1996, according to Thimsen.

The *Worthy's* mission is to serve as a mobile, ship-based, real-time instrumentation asset deployable to remote locations supporting rocket launches, according to Joe Theriault, Massachusetts Institute for Technology, Lincoln Labs project technical lead for the KMRSS *Worthy* upgrade.

He added that the *Worthy* has three primary mission capabilities:

- Missile flight safety
- Telemetry reception, processing and recording
- Communications

The missile flight safety mission is to maintain control of the flight termination system on a rocket booster during powered flight. "In the event that a rocket devi-

ates from a nominal trajectory to the point of threatening a protected area, the fully redundant flight safety system responds to an operator action by sending self-destruct commands to the rocket booster," Theriault said.

"Telemetry collection, processing and recording is a vital mission area that the *Worthy* performs well. The ship boasts three sea-stabilized tracking antenna systems and can receive signals in both the L- and S-band frequency ranges. Multiple telemetry links can be received, processed, and recorded in real-time," he added.

"The *Worthy* plays a critical communications role in supporting launch

program at Pacific Missile Range Facility

operations in remote areas by providing mission voice communications with other ships and aircraft in the area, as well as to uprange and downrange control centers. The *Worthy* also hosts several satellite communications terminals and offers voice, data, and video transmission services," he said.

The *Worthy* has been berthed at USAKA since 1995. "Significant upgrades were required to support THAAD tests," Theriault said. MDA/DTR funded a two-year, \$14 million *Worthy* upgrade program. "The program began in October 2004 and was completed in December 2006. Requirements were defined jointly by MDA, PMRF and

RTS. The ship was sent to an Australian shipyard in October 2005 for structural modifications. In parallel, at RTS, subsystem upgrades were performed and tested. The ship returned to RTS in December 2005. Installation and integration of upgraded telemetry, communications, networks, range safety, and ship subsystems was completed in August 2006. Validation was performed through November with successful completion of the upgrade program in December 2006," he said.

The modifications are going to be put to good use. "MDA/DTR is committed to having the *Worthy* support future THAAD tests," Theriault said. "There are eight additional tests scheduled

through the end of 2009 requiring *Worthy* support."

The marine department operates the vessel with 15 crew members according to Thimsen. "The technical crew size varies depending on the mission requirements but typically ranges from 12 to 16 personnel," he added.

The *Worthy* is vital to the USAKA/RTS mission. "The upgraded *Worthy* supports current RTS customer requirements with enhanced capabilities for future customers and the important role of supporting tests with other ranges in the Pan-Pacific area," Theriault said.

"The *Worthy* is a valuable test asset, and the recent upgrade was accomplished by a dedicated and diverse

team," Thimsen said. "It is especially noteworthy that the ship came out of this major upgrade activity and transitioned to mission planning and operations within just a few weeks. Both the RDC-1c and FTT-07 missions were quite successful and the ship's crew and equipment performed exceptionally well." He added that MDA/DTR provides significant funding of the operation and maintenance of the *Worthy*, supplemented by direct cost reimbursables from the mission customers.

"The success of the *Worthy* Upgrade Program would not have been possible without the collaborative efforts of USAKA, MIT/LL and KRS," Theriault said.

Many activities planned for Earth Day

Clean-up, displays, Marshallese exhibits part of event at Emon Beach

The Earth Day celebration is just around the corner. This year's theme is "Protection of Natural and Cultural Resources."

There was a beach and underwater cleanup on Roi-Namur today, kicking off the 2007 Earth Day event.

On Kwajalein, the Earth Day event will be from 9 a.m. to noon, April 30, at Emon Beach

"This year's Earth Day will have more activities focused on protecting natural and cultural resources," explained Cathy Madore of Kwajalein Range Services Environmental, Safety and Health. There will be displays and information on indigenous plants and wildlife as well as a Marshallese storyteller, weavers and demonstrations of Marshallese net fishing.

Madore added that the standard favorites for Earth Day will also be at the event, including edible dirt and the archeological dig.

"There are only three or four indigenous plants [in the Marshall Islands]," Madore said. It's not like Hawaii where there are many more.

"Almost everything was introduced." Many of the nonindigenous plants are invasive. "We're doing a whole display on invasive plants." One plant in particular is considered a significant problem. It is the dodder vine and is known by descriptive nicknames such as Strangleweed, Devils' Guts, and Witches' Shoelaces. "It is like a vampire vine that can smell other plants; it sticks its fangs into other plants and drinks its fluids. It is steadily increasing across Kwajalein," Madore said.

Information on the marine mammal monitoring program will be on display. "You can hear things that were recorded during the last deployment," Madore said. Another ES&H program is marine mammal observation. "After Earth Day, people will be offered observation training; you could become a trained marine mammal observer," she said.

Some of the planned events include an art contest using recycled goods; an island and underwater clean-up and a barbecue lunch.

There will be an archeological exhibit on Roi next weekend.

Madore said there will be activities for all ages.

Blacksburg, Va., a mother and father had just been told that their child was brutally shot. On the TV, the focus was on how corrupt law enforcement can be; the same law enforcement that was at Virginia Tech then and will be for weeks to come, trying to find out what's going on and why it happened, while keeping the surviving students safe.

I am in no way saying that it is not important that the Center for Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms investigate how this young man got the guns or that FBI profilers and Blacksburg police detectives try to eventually figure out the motive. In a few days, when the shock has died down, and people are starting to focus on something else going on in the world, a psychiatrist will weigh in on this shooting. He or she will probably say something about the shooter's state of mind at the time, and students at the school will start to be more vocal about signs they saw and ignored; and to me, that's what we need to be focusing on right now.

Doesn't it really start there? Before he bought the gun, and before his professor made him angry, or he had an argument with his girlfriend, he was probably a very unhappy man, and it probably showed. When the shock from Columbine died down and law enforcement started to take its beating for what it didn't do better, there were some smaller news stories where school officials and students started to talk about how Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold, were part of a "Trench Coat Mafia" group that stood out and talked about murdering people all the time. They drew pictures and had journals of writings promoting hatred, but they were just overlooked, because people simply didn't care. They were regarded as outcasts and treated as such. Do you think that might have encouraged their behavior on April 20, 1999?

I don't believe we will ever have a set solution for any one problem. As long as people have free will and a choice

between doing what's right and what's wrong, we will have those who will choose to do the wrong thing. But I do believe people who feel they are loved and cared about are less prone to violence than those who don't receive love and compassion. When was the last time you chose to offer help to someone in pain instead of sitting around and criticizing a person who you interpret to have a bad attitude or a grouchy mentality? Yes, there is a direct relation between a person in pain and a person with a bad attitude. A person who is mad at the world is usually a person who feels he is hurt by the world in some way.

I think it's easier for us to blame the powers that be, than to look at a situation, specifically a tragedy, and how it relates to us. Could I have stopped this? Could my son or daughter have been angry enough to do something like this? Could this event have happened at my child's college instead of Virginia Tech? How hard is it to ask someone if you can help them, or if they're ok? Yeah, most times you will get a "leave me alone" look, or the infamous, "I'm fine," but if just one person says "yes, I need help," and you can make a difference for that one person, isn't it worth it if that person was contemplating suicide or something equally heinous? Depression is a very real problem and can affect an individual's mentality on a lot of levels. In our small community, I know it's easy to lose sight of the kind of violence that is going on in the United States and the world, but pain is pain, and anyone can feel it, and anyone can act on it at anytime, anywhere. Tuesday, a young man took his pain out on others. Was there anything you could have done to stop it? Of course not. But events like these ought to make you want to take some kind of action, even if it's something small. Reaching out to an individual in pain can do wonders, because you never know how much help you can really do and how much pain you can really heal.

Children of Men Y Tu Mamá También and Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban director Alfonso Cuarón returns to the helm to tell this futuristic tale in which society is without hope since humankind lost its ability to procreate. The year is 2027, and women can no longer give birth. The youngest inhabitant of the planet has just died at the age of 18, and all hope for humanity has been lost. As civilization descends into chaos, a dying world finds one last chance for survival in the form of a woman who has become inexplicably pregnant.

The Prestige Obsession, jealousy, and deceit define the tense relationship shared between two turn-of-the-century magicians in Memento and Batman Begins director Christopher Nolan's dizzying tale of sleight of hand. Rupert Angier (Hugh Jackman) and Alfred Borden (Christian Bale) are London-based magicians of the highest order, both blessed with spectacular powers of deception and both cursed with unrelenting envy for one another's skills. When Alfred performs an awe-inspiring trick for which there seems no logical explanation, the friendly competition shared between the pair turns to deadly rivalry as the enraged Rupert determines to uncover his rival's deepest secrets. In the world of illusion, however, nothing is ever quite as it seems, and the rules of the physical world simply don't apply. Now, as bitter competition quickly begins to consume the souls of both performers, the firestorm birthed by their anger threatens to consume all who surround them.

Rocky Balboa The movie begins with Rocky (Stallone) still mourning the death of his loyal and beloved wife, Adrian, who died three years previously after losing a battle against cancer. Rocky owns an Italian restaurant and spends his days living in his working-class Philadelphia neighborhood, visiting with his customers, and telling stories about his past. His grown son has a job as a business professional, but the relationship between the two is strained. When the current heavyweight champion, Mason "The Line" Dixon (Antonio Tarver), needs to rehabilitate his image as a pretty boy who has never shown any real heart in the ring, his manager offers Rocky an exhibition match.

Three Soldiers died Apr. 9 in Baghdad when an improvised explosive device detonated near their vehicle. They were assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 17th Field Artillery Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, Fort Carson, Colo. Killed were: **Spc. Ismael G. Solorio**, 21, of San Luis, Ariz.; **Pfc. Brian L. Holden**, 20, of Claremont, N.C. and **Pvt. Brett A. Walton**, 37, of Hillsboro, Ore.

Sgt. Raymond S. Sevaetasi, 29, of Pago Pago, American Samoa, died April 11 in Baghdad of wounds suffered when his vehicle struck an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 15th Brigade Support Battalion, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Sgt. Edelman L. Hernandez, 23, of Hyattsville, Md., died April 11 in Korengal Valley, Afghanistan while on combat patrol. The incident is under investigation. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division (Light Infantry), Fort Drum, N.Y.

Cpl. Jason J. Beadles, 22, of La Porte, Ind., died April 12 in Baghdad of a non-combat related injury. The incident is under investigation. He was assigned to the 887th Engineer Company, 326th Engineer Battalion, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.

Spc. James T. Lindsey, 20, of Florence, Ala., died April 12 in Baghdad of wounds sustained when his vehicle struck an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 509th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division, Fort Richardson, Alaska.

Two Soldiers died April 12 in Miri, Afghanistan when their vehicle was struck by an improvised explosive device during combat operations. They were assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 508th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C. Killed were: **Staff Sgt. Casey D. Combs**, 28, of Auburn, Wash. and **Sgt. David A. Stephens**, 28, of Tullahoma, Tenn.

Two Soldiers died April 12 in Baghdad when their patrol encountered an improvised explosive device. They were assigned to the 1st Squadron, 40th Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division, Fort Richardson, Alaska. Killed were: **Cpl. Cody A. Putnam**, 22, of Lafayette, Ind. and **Pfc. John G. Borbonus**, 19, of Boise, Idaho.

Sgt. Larry R. Bowman, 29, of Granite Falls, N.C., died April 13 in Baghdad of wounds suffered when his vehicle struck an improvised explosive device. Bowman was assigned to the 513th Transportation Company, 57th Transportation Battalion, 593rd Corps Support Group, Fort Lewis, Wash.
