Budget decrease drives decisions





Distribution of operations to Huntsville, housing changes part of transition strategy

U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll

On a broad and general scale, the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll transition plan is one that relies on identified savings, and takes all necessary measures to operate within project budget guidance. Transformation of Kwajalein operations is set to expand mission capabilities within projected funding levels for FY 09-13. Huntsville, Ala. will become the center of operations with the Reagan Test Site commander located at U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command's facility in the continental United States. Facilitating the transition plan will be the installation of a fiber optic cable system allowing the RTS to distribute operations to Huntsville. This calls for a reduced island footprint that necessitates a reduction in accompanied status with the USAKA commander remaining on island to maintain coherent operations with Huntsville.

What does this mean specifically for Kwajalein residents? Within the next 30 days, the process will begin

for unaccompanied Kwajalein Range Service personnel in shared trailers to move into bachelor quarter rooms. KRS Public Works is providing the specifics of this first-round move in a letter sent to affected trailer residents. Residents will be provided BQ rooms adhering to standards and procedures already established by the KRS housing office.

Married, dual contract holders on unaccompanied status will be moved at a later date into converted BQ suites. USAKA has provided funds for the conversion of the suites and upon completion dual contract holders will be moved in to the modified rooms in FY 08 as available.

Dogs aren't allowed in the BQs; trailer residents will need to find new homes for their canine pets.

Additional personnel moves from trailers will be addressed in future Hourglass articles.

Building energy managers will be appointed. KRS will peruse and execute alternate work schedules for selected facilities to support energy reductions. Private users of electricity, such as private clubs and boat lot

occupants, will soon see the implementation of fees for non residential power consumption. As part of the planned facility reduction, the Yuk Club is set to close on Oct. 31 and the existing bar will be relocated to the Ocean View Club.

USAKA and RTS are actively working on the power reduction plan for Roi Namur.

Starting this week, there will be an update and timeline every week in the Kwajalein Hourglass. Please refer to this week's timeline on Page 2. Every effort will be made to inform the Kwajalein public of changes due to transformation.

Residents are encouraged to send their questions to *The Hourglass*. Col. Stevenson Reed, USAKA commander, will be on the AFN morning radio program broadcast, at 7 a.m., Friday on 1224 AM, 101.1 FM and Channel 9 discussing transformation. Community members can call 53740 or 53741 with questions they'd like to address to him. He will also hold town hall meetings the first week of December on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur.

Yokwe Yuk Club faces final month

The article, "Plan reduces energy use," in the Sept. 1, *Hourglass*, described a series of power reduction initiatives that will be implemented by the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll in order to help reduce the cost of operations on Kwajalein.

One initiative on the list calls for "consolidation of functions and shutdown of targeted facilities." A specific example cited was the closure of the Yokwe Yuk Club. The current plan is to have closed this facility by Oct. 31.

Although it has been quite some time since the Yokwe Yuk Club kitchen was closed, the club has continued to be a popular venue for catered dining events, live band shows, seasonal parties and other special events. With its pending closure, there is a need to identify some alternative venues within the community where these events and activities can be held. The following is a list of possible sites with information on allowable capacity, comments, and points of contact for reservations.

French class students put language skills to work during visit to France

A group of young people and adults traveled a long way over the summer to experience first-hand what they had learned in school.

Five current and seven former Kwajalein students, along with three adults went to France in July.

Why? Well, why not. But also, “To give the students a chance to put their language skills into practice,” explained French Teacher Barbara Bicanich. “They also got a chance to see things first-hand instead of just looking at pictures in a book.”

The group traveled, for nine days, from the United States, where they convened in Boston, to Paris, Nimes and Nice.

“The students had an opportunity to stretch their comfort zone and they had to rely on each other and themselves more than usual,” Bicanich said. “They were able to build memories that will last for years. They also have a sense of being members of a world community and representing the U.S.”

Former Kwajalein student Ben Ouderkirk was on the trip, “I was surprised by how easy it was to get by with my knowledge of the French language. I was also surprised by how helpful and friendly the French people were if you were respectful of their culture.” He added, “I learned how immersing yourself in a different culture can help you learn their ways and their language.”

Shelley Childers, a senior on Kwajalein grew from her experiences in Europe, “I learned how important it is to try to connect with the people in a different country.” But she didn’t feel out of place in France, “I was surprised by how many people spoke English.”

This was both of these young peoples first trip to France. Other first-time visitors were Leah Simpson, Livy Hoskins and Tessa Thimsen, who graduated from Kwajalein in June.

“I was very surprised by how


friendly the people were.” Tessa said. “I had always heard that the French people are rude, but when you actually visit, it’s the other way around. I watched American tourists and saw how rude some of them were towards the French. The tourists who were friendly received wonderful service. As long as you are respectful to the people and their culture, they are friendly and nice.”

Leah agreed with Tessa’s assessment. “The most important thing I learned from the trip is that the French culture is so different than Americans stereotypically think,” she said. I realized that although they have some cultural habits that we might find a little strange, their culture is an amazingly rich one with tons of history. I also learned so much about the history of France that we had touched on class but never studied in immense detail. “

Livy chimed in, “I was surprised how different our culture was from the French culture – they don’t have many fast food restaurants, mostly cafes. It was really nice.”

Cassia Griswold, Monica Peters, Chris Horner and Michael Hillman, all 11th graders, were also on the trip. They felt their level of French language comprehension had them prepared. “We really only needed to know the basics but I felt like I knew more than that,” Corinne said. Monica added, “I knew more French than I realized.” Michael said, “I tried to speak as much French as possible and I was able to communicate.” He added, “I learned how to order food in French.”

Cassia commented on how her language skills helped her make new friends, “I was able to communicate well and ask for help finding my way around the metro. I even had a conversation with an artist in southern France about his paintings.”

Chris said he learned how to navigate the subway system and, “I was surprised by how much French history I learned.”

Most of the students are eager to return to Europe someday.

“I would love to go back to France. I had never considered doing a study abroad program but now it is a very real possibility for me,” Tessa said.

Leah added, “I will definitely go back to France. There was so much that we didn’t get to see. Hopefully, I will be able to do a study abroad semester while I’m in college.”

“I plan to go back, maybe during a study abroad program when I go to college,” Cassia said.

Emily and Sandy Hillman traveled with the young people as ‘adult participants.’

“I learned that the French people are helpful, friendly and kind. I did not experience any anti-American feelings at all,” Emily said. “I really enjoyed this trip. I think our group got along great. I was very proud of our young adults.”

Indonesian tall ship stops at Kwajalein on return from sea training celebration

Mid-morning on Tuesday, the *KRI Dewaruci*, a barquentine tall ship from Indonesian, docked at Echo Pier.

Crewed by Indonesian Naval officers and cadets, the ship is on its return voyage after participating in an international celebration of sail training and sea education around the Newport and Fort Adams, Rhode Island waterfronts June 27 - July 1. The *Dewaruci* departs on Sunday morning at approximately 10 a.m.

The *KRI Dewaruci* is a Class A tall ship owned and operated by the Indonesian Navy. She is used as a sail training vessel for naval cadets and is the largest tall ship in the Indonesian fleet. The *Dewaruci* also serves as a goodwill ambassador for the country of Indonesia to the rest of the world.

The name *Dewaruci* is derived from the name of a sea god in Indonesian folklore symbolizing honesty and bravery.

The figurehead of the ship is a representation of the god. Destined for the Indonesian Naval Academy, construction of the 191-foot, three-masted ship was started in 1952 by H.C. Stulcken in Hamburg, Germany, and she was launched in 1953. Ever since then the barquentine has been based in Surabaya and used as the Indonesian Navy's sail-training ship.

The crew of the *Dewaruci* offered open house tours each evening while in port.

On Wednesday evening two soccer teams from the ship competed in a round-robin tournament against local teams. The Indonesians

fielded teams representing their cadets and crew. The teams from Kwajalein were Spartans I, Locals, One Talk and Fish.

The results were: game 1, *Dewaruci* Cadets defeated Spartans I, 1-0 (shootout); game 2, *Dewaruci* Crew defeated Fish, 1-0; game 3, *Dewaruci* Cadets defeated Locals, 4-0; game 4, Spartans 1 defeated Locals, 1-0 (shootout); game 5, Fish defeated One Talk, 1-0 (shootout); game 6, One Talk defeated *Dewaruci* Crew, 1-0; game 7, Fish defeated *Dewaruci* Cadets, 3-2 and game 8, Spartans 1 defeated *Dewaruci* Crew, 2-0.

The crew and cadets from the Indonesian tall ship provided a parade to the community on Thursday evening. The parade began at

the Dock Security Check Point, continuing East on 6th to Lagoon, then north on Lagoon to the high school and then across the field to Emon Beach.

The parade led the community to Emon Beach where the Armed Force Entertainment band *Trip-Davon* performed at 6:30 p.m.

The officers of the *Dewaruci* held an invitation-only party on board the ship on Friday evening. The festivities included traditional Indonesian music, dancing and food.

The *Dewaruci's* next visit may be in 2011.

Mandatory hazardous waste training for all employees to be shown on AFN Kwajalein

The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require each employee to undergo annual refresher training in hazardous waste awareness, hazardous waste operations and hazardous waste safe handling.

To maintain compliance with this requirement, Kwajalein Range Services Environmental, in conjunction with AFN Kwajalein, will be airing the required training on AFN

Channel 32 on the following days and times: 8 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7 p.m., Tuesday, Thursday and Oct. 13, 16, 18 and 20.

Supervisors are responsible for: (1) ensuring that each of their employees view one of the offered sessions in its entirety during normal work hours (2) ensuring each employee signs the class roster (available at <https://usakaweb.sm.dck.sm.dck.army.mil/biz/esh/envir/envtr>) after viewing the training session and (3) sending the com-

pleted roster to Cathy Madore at Environmental, Safety and Health in Building 357 by Oct. 31.

Initial training on these topics is offered as part of new employee safety orientation.

Therefore, employees who have completed new employee safety orientation within the past six months are exempt from this requirement.

Ten servicemembers die in Global War on Terror

Pfc. Christopher F. Pfeifer, 21, of Spalding, Neb., died Sept. 25 in San Antonio of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using small arms fire Aug. 17 near Kamu, Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 91st Cavalry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, Schweinfurt, Germany.

Pfc. Mathew D. Taylor, 21, of Cameron Park, Calif., died Sept. 26 in San Antonio of wounds sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle July 23 in Sarobi District, Afghanistan. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion (Airborne), 503rd Infantry Regiment, 173rd Airborne Brigade Combat Team, Vicenza, Italy.

Spc. Ciara M. Durkin, 30, of Quincy, Mass., died Sept. 28 at Bagram Airfield, Afghanistan of injuries suffered from a non-combat related incident. She was assigned to the 726th Finance Battalion, Massachusetts Army National Guard, West Newton, Mass.

Sgt. 1st Class James D. Doster, 37, of Pine Bluff, Ark., died Sept. 29 in Baghdad, Iraq of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device and small arms fire. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 16th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Fort Riley, Kan.

Staff Sgt. Donnie D. Dixon, 37, of Miami, died Sept. 29 in Baloor, Iraq of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his

unit using small arms fire. He was assigned to Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Sgt. Zachary D. Tellier, 31, of Charlotte, N.C., died Sept. 29 at Firebase Wilderness, Afghanistan of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using small arms fire. He was assigned to the 4th Squadron, 73rd Cavalry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Sgt. Randell Olguin, 24, of Ralls, Texas, died Sunday in Baghdad of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using small arms fire. He was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 2nd Stryker Cavalry Regiment, Vilseck.
