

IN MEMORIAM



Following a five-year battle with Alzheimer's disease, former USAKA Commander Col. John 'Jack' MacNeill passed away on Nov. 7, at his home near Ft. Belvoir, Virginia. MacNeill served as USAKA Commander from 1990-1992. As Commander, MacNeill oversaw the extensive rebuilding efforts on Kwajalein following damage caused by Tropical Storm Zelda as well as Operation Provide Refuge which involved rescuing and providing safe haven to several hundred Chinese migrants diverted to USAKA. Col. MacNeill served as a company commander in Viet Nam with a land-clearing unit and received a Bronze Star with 'V' device. He was awarded many other decorations in his long and distinguished military career. Col. MacNeill also served two tours each in Germany and at the Pentagon. While Kwajalein was MacNeill's favorite assignment, he also enjoyed serving on the faculty at Notre Dame University in the Military Science Department. Col. MacNeill was an accomplished sailor and ice hockey player having played the sport in his youth growing up in Rhode Island.

Sadly, just two months prior to his death, Col. MacNeill's wife Judy passed away on Sept. 8 following a courageous 10-year battle with cancer. While at Kwajalein she enjoyed scuba diving, collecting shells and spending time with her numerous friends. Judy taught elementary education with DODS [Department of Defense Schools] in Germany and later special education in Virginia. She was born near Sanford, Fla., and remained a lifelong Gator football fan. She loved listening to classical music and attending plays as well as skiing and travel. Her good nature, kindness and generosity are remembered by all who knew her. The MacNeills will be laid to rest at Arlington National Cemetery.



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New dental assistant benefits from Marshallese Employment Program

When Kwajalein Dental Clinic was in need of a new dental assistant, Kwajalein Hospital was approached about hiring one.

With budget constraints, it would have been difficult to hire an off-island contract position.

It was decided by the hospital to seek a Marshallese employee through the Marshallese Training and Employment Program. The program is funded in part by Kwajalein Range Services and also by the Republic of the Marshall Islands National Training Council. The NTC pays for study materials and the cost of sending the employee off island for training if needed.

A proposal was put forth by the hospital for a Marshallese position at the Dental Clinic and given to Romeo Alfred, KRS Training Specialist.

Alfred took the proposal to Majuro for review and approval by the NTC Board and after it was approved, he did recruiting at the College of the Marshall Islands.

The result was that Cassidy Lanwi, a 26-year-old recent graduate of CMI's nursing program, came to the Dental Clinic to learn the job of dental assistant.

"The purpose of the program is to give Marshallese training, or enhance their current skills so they can take higher level jobs," said Beth Turnbaugh, Kwajalein Hospital Administrator.

An earlier test case of the program at the hospital was Jason Samson, who is now the pharmacy technician.

"We were lucky that at the time we were going to start the program at the hospital, Jason had just returned from the military and was living on Ebeye. Due to his being in the military, he had some medical-type training already," Turnbaugh said.

"Jason went through 18 months of online learning and on-the-job training. He was then able to sit for the pharmacy technician certification

exam," Turnbaugh said. "The National Training Council paid his way to Honolulu to take the exam."

The program has its limitations though, according to Turnbaugh.

"We could teach someone to be a nurse's assistant for example, but we couldn't take them all the way to being a registered nurse. That they would have to go away to school for. And the pharmacy technician is the highest we could go in the pharmacy and that is where Jason is at," she said.

Since Samson worked out so well, it seemed reasonable to seek a new Marshallese recruit for the dental assistant job.

Barbara Junker, Dental Office Lead, said, "This is all about helping Marshallese increase their marketable skills. As far as Cassidy, he may decide to stay here when his training is done or he may go back to Majuro to 'spread the wealth' of his knowledge."

She continued, "This is a good option to hiring an off-island person and it's doing a lot of good with the training he's receiving."

Lanwi started working at the Dental Clinic Nov. 1.

"It's a program in development here," Junker said. "We don't have any written course work and even though he has some medical and basic nursing skills, he doesn't have any dental experience. It's a whole new language for dentistry and a whole new anatomy for dentistry."

She continued that the U.S.-trained dental assistants at the clinic went through three months of classroom work and then three months in a lab environment before they had any actual patient contact.

"It is a little difficult for Cassidy because he's supposed to be working as well as getting this training,"

said Junker.


Right now, Lanwi is learning basic skills such as universal sterilization and how to polish teeth.

"After he learns the dental assistant position, we would like to start him on some administrative duties, Junker said. "We want him to get the full aspect of being a dental assistant."

Junker believes Lanwi would need anywhere from nine months to a year of training before he could seek employment outside of Kwajalein as a dental assistant.

"Of course, we hope he would stay here after all that training, but he does have a family on Majuro and we would certainly understand if he would take those skills somewhere else," she said. "In any event, he would be in a better position to market himself."

She continued, "It's just something we can do by sharing our knowledge and our training. We're guests in this country and we should do what we can to help the population in general."

A Dauntless nose down at '13 Planes.'

Dauntless dive bomber sealed its reputation as great naval plane at Battle of Midway

Designed in 1938, the SBD 'Dauntless' became one of the best known aircraft of the Pacific War.

Considered obsolete when America entered World War II in late 1941, the SBD ended up sinking more enemy ships in the Pacific than any other Allied plane. A total of 5,936 SBDs were built by the Douglas Aircraft Corporation before the end of World War II, and the Dauntless would become the standard by which all other carrier-borne dive bombers would be judged.

SBD stands for 'Scout, Bomber,' and 'D' was the letter assigned by the Navy to all aircraft built by Douglas Aircraft Corporation. In a play on the SBD designation, the Dauntless was sometimes called the 'Slow But Deadly.' The SBD carried two crewmen- a pilot and a radioman who doubled as the rear gunner. The SBD was armed with a pair of .50-caliber machine guns in the nose.

Early models of the Dauntless had a single .30-caliber gun for the rear gunner, and later models had twin .30s. The Dauntless could typically carry either a 500-pound or 1,000-pound bomb under the center of the fuselage, as well as a 250-pound bomb under each wing, although the underwing bomb load varied with improved versions of the SBD.

The most distinctive feature of the Dauntless was its perforated flaps which took up much of the trailing edge of the wing, with another section below the fuselage. They were split into two halves, and were deployed above and below the wing to act as brakes when the plane was in its attack dive.

For takeoff and landing, the lower halves were

dropped to act as conventional flaps. The perforations allowed enough air past the flaps and across the tail to keep the plane stable in its 276 mph, 70-degree attack dive and allowed the pilot to pull out of the dive after the bombs were dropped.

The action that would cement the SBD's place in history took place in early June of 1942.

On June 4, Dauntlesses from the *Enterprise*, *Hornet*, and *Yorktown* sank four of the largest and best aircraft carriers in the Japanese fleet, wiping out the cream of Japanese naval aviation at the Battle of Midway.

It was a blow from which the Japanese Navy would never recover and from that moment, the tide of the Pacific War was in favor of the Americans until the Japanese surrender in August 1945.

SBDs took part in several attacks on Kwajalein Atoll during the war. The first was on Feb. 1, 1942, when Dauntlesses from the *USS Enterprise* attacked the airbase at Roi and shipping in the anchorage at Kwajalein Island. The second was on Dec. 4, 1943, during softening-up attacks for the coming invasion by U.S. troops, and SBDs were responsible for sinking several of the Japanese ships that lie on the lagoon floor. The third occasion was during invasion operations the following month, and SBDs again sank a number of ships and smaller vessels in the lagoon.

After Kwajalein Atoll was seized by U.S. troops in early 1944, SBDs were assigned to the newly captured airfield on Roi.

The first of these squadrons was VMSB-151 which arrived on March 1, 1944. They were replaced by VS-52 after 151 was assigned to Eniwetok Atoll. The duties of the SBDs assigned to Roi included anti-submarine and anti-shipping patrol around Kwajalein Atoll, and attacking targets on several neighboring atolls and islands which had been bypassed by American forces.

The aircraft graveyard near Mellu Island contains numerous SBD wrecks, by far the most of any aircraft type I've seen in that area yet. Some SBDs are

missing their outer wings, while others are intact. All the SBDs I've seen are missing their engines, and several have propellers and engine cowling parts dumped inside the cockpit areas.

I've done close to twenty dives into various areas of the aircraft graveyard, and I can only think of maybe two or three dives where I didn't see at least one SBD while I was looking for other types of planes.

The area with the most

Know the difference between potable and non-potable water

While recycling is a term generally applied to aluminum cans, glass bottles, and paper, water can be recycled as well.

Water recycling is reusing treated wastewater for beneficial purposes such as agricultural and landscape irrigation, industrial processes, and toilet flushing. It is used to help conserve supplies of drinking water. A common type of recycled water is water that has been reclaimed from municipal wastewater, or sewage. Reclaimed water is locally called non-potable which means 'not for drinking'.

On Kwajalein Island, there are two separate water systems, one for drinking water and one for reclaimed water.

The drinking water system is used for interior plumbing such as sinks, showers, washing machines and drinking fountains. It is also used for making ice at the ice plant.

Drinking water on Kwajalein comes mainly from the rainfall captured on the runway. The reclaimed water system is used mainly outside buildings such as for lawn watering and vehicle, boat and airplane washing.

The reclaimed water is only used inside of buildings for toilet flushing. Reclaimed water is water from the many sinks, showers, washing machines and toilets on the island that has been treated in the wastewater plant to remove wastes from the water. Before it is pumped into the non-potable system, it is filtered and disinfected with chlorine to make it safe for use. It is not fit for drinking or cooking but it is safe for incidental contact.

The Utilities Department monitors the quality of the reclaimed water as closely as it monitors the quality of the drinking water.

SBDs in one place is called ‘13 Planes,’ and I’ve also heard it called ‘13 SBDs.’

The name says it all — in one dive you can see, well, thirteen SBDs.

This site, which I first dove

in November 2006 with ‘Rainy’ Preneouveu and Leslie Mead, also has two SBDs that are still standing upright on their noses, which is rather amazing considering that those planes were dumped into the lagoon in late 1945 or

early 1946.

With so many SBDs scattered on the lagoon floor near Mellu Island, you are almost guaranteed to see at least one of these famous airplanes wherever you dive in the aircraft graveyard.


UNEXPLODED ORDNANCE OPERATION



Lead levels are above drinking water action level on Meck Island

The Meck Island water tests performed during first quarter FY08 showed lead levels in the water above the limit, or "action level". This is not an emergency and the high levels of lead detected were due to the water in the building plumbing remaining stagnant because of decreased usage on Meck. The samples taken at some of the sample sites had water that had detention times of weeks or months. As a precautionary measure, run the water for 1-2 minutes prior to utilizing it for consumption. As a result, the environmental department increased monitoring of Lead and Copper from annually to every 6 months, investigated the need for a corrosion control treatment, and

performed additional source water and water quality parameter monitoring. The analytical results from the water samples taken during the third quarter of FY08 showed lead levels below the action levels. Lead and copper samples will be collected again this quarter and if the results are again below the action levels, the normally required annual sampling will resume.
