# Kwajalein kids collectively read 2,400 books during the 2010 summer reading program

Another successful Reading Program came to an end Wednesday when Kim Yarnes, Manager of Community Activities, invited the young participants to the Grace Sherwood Library for one final group reading and to congratulate the top readers of the summer.

A total of 78 children participated in the two-month long “Rev up to Start Reading” summer program.

Once each child had read 200 pages, or six books, they received tickets to redeem for prizes and moved their “reading racecar” further down along the “racetrack” on the library wall.

At the end of the summer, 428 reading records were sub-

mitted and over 70,000 pages, approximately 2,400 books, were read!

There were five top readers for the summer who received special recognition for their summer reading spirit.

- Melody Makua: 55 reading records, 330 books read
- Ashley Homuth: 54 reading records, 324 books read
- Alyssa England: 48 reading records, 288 books read

The top Chapter Book readers were:

- Jillian Decoster: 7,199 pages
- Zoe Martindale: 5,255 pages

The success of this program is owed to many folks including the library volunteers, our librarians Chris Hadley and Francis Dye, and those who helped with the fundraising efforts of the Spring Break Music Festival.

# Two Kwajalein volunteers show that giving back really does have its rewards

Anyone that has lived on Kwajalein for any number of years knows it takes a special group of people to keep some of our programs running - volunteers.

Some programs on Kwajalein are kept alive only by the selfless efforts of community volunteers. So when Steve Gauthier, USAKA Director of Community Activities, arrived on island this summer, he did what he could to get these hard-working individuals recognized.

According to Gauthier, there's a set of awards given each year by the Armed Forces Recreation Society at the National Recreation and Parks Conference held in October. AFRS is a joint services organization that includes all the services Morale, Welfare and Recreation. There are multiple awards presented in each category and ultimately five residents were submitted in various categories. In the end, Robert Carter and Don Swanby were accepted in the special citation category for their volunteer work.

"Mr. Movie Man," Don Swanby, has been volunteering his time over the last two years to enhance the recreation program at USAKA. He is resourceful, always looking for ways to improve the show quality at our theaters, with found or fixed items. Swanby has taken the lead in not only maintaining and rehabbing the theaters, but also in training other projectionists in how to troubleshoot issues and keep things running smoothly. In addition to the mechanical side of things, Don is constantly offering new programming suggestions like double features and special showings.

During his first tour at Kwajalein in 1999, Robert Carter brought with him the unique skill set of a bowling alley mechanic, though that was not his job. He took the time to train the Host Nation employees and did minor and major repairs to the pinsetters and lane machine. When he returned in 2008, the bowling center was barely operational, only open for private parties and in a state of disrepair. Over the last two years, Carter has brought the bowling alley back to life, fixing the machines, developing bowling leagues and supporting special programs.

Gauthier plans to attend the NRPA conference in November and will accept the awards on their behalf.

## *Why I volunteer - Don Swanby*

"When we first came to Kwajalein in 2004 the movie theaters were (and still are) one of the great "free" benefits available to Kwaj residents. My family as well as many others enjoy the weekend getaway to the movies (and they are free); the movies looked and sounded great. However, due to the harsh environment of Kwajalein and having both the movie theaters being exposed to the environment it took its toll on

the equipment. I watched as the equipment slowly deteriorated (due to the environment). In the past, others volunteered their time to maintain and service the equipment. Several years ago when those people PCS-ed I realized that if someone did not obtain the working knowledge of the theaters then that valuable information may be lost. So I volunteered to learn how the movie systems operate. As time went by and some of the movie theater equipment started to fail, I took it upon myself to troubleshoot the system and perform repairs. This turned out to be more of a task than I first realized, however, I was determined to make the movie-going experience for Kwaj residents as best as I could.

To me, volunteering is more about the "haves" helping out the "have not's." I have the motivation and knowledge to help out where others may not have the time or specific knowledge. It is also self rewarding to be thanked and appreciated by the public for volunteering to make the movie-going experience a pleasure. There are many other volunteers out there that should be recognized as well for all of their hard work, I am just fortunate to be nominated and selected. I could not have done it without the support from Kim Yarnes, Manager, KRS Community Activities."

"I came back to Kwajalein in November 2008 to find the bowling center only open for reservations. There were two machines that were in disrepair and the lane machine was no longer working as it should. It also was evident that there were not any bowling leagues, so I coerced Amy Hansen (Manager of Community Services at that time) to allow me to repair the machines and attempt to put together a couple of bowling leagues.

In April 2009, we formed the Tuesday and Wednesday leagues. I felt that bowling for eight weeks would be long enough to keep people attentive, excited and entertained. It allowed individuals that would be PCS-ing to participate, and were just long enough to determine which teams had their championship form. Since the original leagues, we have had several eight and 10 week leagues. It has been my pleasure to share this love with the many friends that I have on Kwajalein. ## Meck lead levels above drinking water action levels

### Hourglass Reports

The Meck Island water tests performed during first quarter FY08 showed lead levels in the water above the limit, or "action level". This is not an emergency and the high levels of lead detected were either due to the water in the building plumbing remaining stagnant because of decreased usage on Meck and/or water plumbing containing lead components. As a precautionary measure, run the water for 1-2 minutes prior to utilizing it for consumption. As a result, the environmental department increased monitoring of Lead and Copper from annually to every six months, investigated the need for a corrosion control treatment, and performed additional source water and water quality parameter monitoring. The analytical

results from the water samples taken during the third quarter of FY08 showed lead levels below the action levels, however, lead levels were detected above the action level in first and third quarters FY09. Lead and copper samples will continue to be collected at Meck on a semi-annual basis until two consecutive six month monitoring periods demonstrate lead levels below the lead AL.

# Bugle calls honor American flag, our military traditions

The following information is offered to explain the traditions and courtesies affiliated with the bugle calls played daily on Kwajalein.

- **REVEILLE:** Is traditionally played at dawn on military installations to coincide with the raising of the national colors. In deference to the community, *Reveille* will be played at 7 a.m. Formal courtesies are rendered for *Reveille*. For the community, this means stop what you are doing (dismount your bicycle or vehicle) if you are within range of the music, face the music or the flag and stand silently until the music is finished (about 30 seconds.)

- **CALL TO MESS:** Is played to signal mealtime. *Call To Mess* will be played at noon, and does not require formal courtesies. *Call To Mess* lasts about 20 seconds.

- **TO THE COLORS:** Is played at 5 p.m. to signal the end of the official duty day. The community will notice uniformed military members saluting toward the music or flag. The Kwajalein community should regard *To the Colors* in the same manner as *Reveille*, which includes dismounting your bicycle and stand facing the music or flag with your hand over your heart. *To the Colors* plays for approximately 30 seconds.


- **RETREAT:** On the first note of *To The Colors*, the community will notice military members assuming the position and rendering a hand salute. *Retreat* will be played immediately following *To the Colors* as the flag is lowered. *Retreat* should be regarded

with the same civilian courtesies as the national anthem, and lasts about 90 seconds.

- **TATTOO:** Signifies that it is time for loud talking and other disturbances to be discontinued. This will be played at 9 p.m. and will take approximately two minutes. No formal courtesies are required.

- **TAPS:** *Taps* is the last bugle call of the day. On most military installations *Taps* is played at 11 p.m., however, on Kwajalein it is played immediately following *Tattoo*.

When *Reveille*, *Retreat*, and *To The Colors* are played the community can actively participate by removing their hats and standing silently.





# Off the beaten path

## Byodo-In Temple a well-kept secret of Hawaii

For most that live on Kwajalein or Roi-Namur, Hawaii can start to feel like your second home. You know all the greatest hole-in-the-wall restaurants in Waikiki, you know which hotels are the cheapest but still offer great amenities, and you could probably run the tours at Pearl Harbor and Diamond Head. But there is still one well-kept secret in Hawaii that is well worth renting a car for the day to go check out.

The Byodo-In Temple is located in the Valley of the Temples Memorial Park in Kaneohe, Hawaii, a beautiful drive about 30 minutes outside Waikiki.

The Byodo-In Temple was established on June 7, 1968 to commemorate the first Japanese immigrants to Hawaii. It is a scale replica of a temple at Uji, Japan that was constructed over 900 years ago. If you can believe it, the temple was built entirely without the use of nails.

The Magnificent Byodo-In Temple translates as “Temple of equal-

ity – not to discriminate” and is home to Amida, a golden Buddha unique to the entire world.

The Buddha is thought to be the largest figure carved since ancient times. Towering more than 18 feet, the immense figure is an original work of art carved by the famous Japanese sculptor Masuzo Inui. When the carving was completed, it was covered with cloth and painted with three applications of gold lacquer. Gold leaf was later applied over the lacquer finish. The hall and all the artistry it reflects are regarded as representing the essence of the culture of the Fujiwara aristocracy.

The Byodo-In was built to represent the mythical phoenix, its wings upheld by pillars of stone. Folklore tells of the phoenix arising from the ashes to reflect the promises of hope and renewal. The hall is popularly known as Goo-do, or the Phoenix Hall, because a pair of the legendary birds of good omen and of Chinese origin can be seen perched on both ends of the roof with their wings spread and ready to fly away. The hall containing two

wings reflects stability as well as artistic beauty.

The Bell House, called kanetsuki-do, contains a five-foot high, three ton brass bell, called bon-sho (sacred bell), cast in Osaka, Japan from a mixture of bronze and tin. It closely resembles the bell hanging in an identical Bell House at the Uji Byodo-In. The original is said to be more than 900 years old and to have come from India. It is revered for its distinctive shape and the tone of the bell, which sounds a message of deep calm and peace, cleansing the mind of evil and temptation. The resonant sound of the bon-sho creates an atmosphere of tranquility for meditation that travels for some distance. A soft wooden log called the “shu-moku” is used to strike the bell. The bell is customarily rung before one enters the temple to spread the eternal teachings of Buddha.

The environment at the temple is one of peace and tranquility. The site itself is truly ‘off the beaten path,’ so if you are tired of the thick crowds and bustle of Waikiki, take half a day to enjoy the serenity the Byodo-In Temple has to offer.

# Sea turtle lays nest in Kwaj residents' yard

Two Kwajalein residents were pleasantly surprised last weekend when Terry Gimple notified them that a large female sea turtle had chosen the backyard of their ocean-side home as a nesting site.

The couple immediately called Environmental, Safety and Health, who came to the site to inspect it. ES&H personnel put caution tape around the area where the nest is located. The area will be off-limits for around two months, or until the eggs have safely hatched and the nest can be excavated to search for stragglers.

ES&H representatives were unable to determine what species of sea turtle it was from the tracks alone, but there is a chance it was a critically endangered hawksbill sea turtle. All species of sea turtle are protected under the Endangered Species Act, so this nest will give the species a slightly greater chance of avoiding extinction.

# Five servicemembers die in War on Terror

**Master Sgt. Jared N. Van Aalst**, 34, of Laconia, N.H., died Aug. 4 in Kunduz province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered while his unit was conducting combat operations. He was assigned to the U.S. Army Special Operations Command, Fort Bragg, N.C.

**Spc. Faith R. Hinkley**, 23, of Colorado Springs, Colo., died Aug. 7 in Baghdad, of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked her unit in Iskandariya, Iraq. She was assigned to the 502nd Military Intelligence Battalion, 201st Battlefield Surveillance Brigade, Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Wash.

**Sgt. Andrew C. Nicol**, 23, of Kensington, N.H., and **Pfc. Bradley D. Rappuhn**, 24, of Grand Ledge, Mich., died while supporting Operation Enduring Freedom. They died Aug. 8 at Zhari Kandahar, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when insurgents attacked their unit using an

improvised explosive device. They were assigned to the 3rd Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment, Fort Benning, Ga.

**Pfc. Paul O. Cuzzupe**, 23, of Plant City, Fla., died Aug. 8 in Akhtar-Mohammad-Khan, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 2nd Stryker Cavalry Regiment, Vilseck, Germany.

## Reminder: register to vote in general elections

### Hourglass Reports

All states, three territories and the District of Columbia will hold general elections on Nov. 2. Puerto Rico will not be holding an election this cycle. All members of the U.S. Uniformed Services, their Family members and citizens residing outside the U.S. who have not registered or requested an absentee ballot this year should do so as soon as possible.

To register or request an absentee ballot use the Federal Post Card Application. It's quick and easy. Go to [www.fvap.gov](http://www.fvap.gov) and get started. Follow the prompts to register and request an absentee ballot for the Nov. 2 election. Some states allow submitting the FPCA by E-mail or fax in addition to regular mail. The instructions will tell you how to fax or E-mail the form. FVAP recommends you use these options. If you don't have access to the internet to fill out the FPCA online, get a copy from your military unit or Installation Voting Assistance Officer, or from your nearest U.S. Embassy or Consulate.

Send your FPCA to your elec-

tion office now to ensure you have enough time to receive, vote and return the ballot.

The Federal Voting Assistance Program opened its 24-hours a day, seven days a week call center on July 15. The call center makes voting information accessible to voters living in other time zones and ensures that all issues are addressed.

Voters can call 1-800-438-VOTE, E-mail [vote@fvap.gov](mailto:vote@fvap.gov) or choose the online chat option at [www.fvap.gov](http://www.fvap.gov) to accommodate an easy flow of absentee voting assistance and information. FVAP enhanced its existing service by teaming with the Navy's Global Distance 24-hour Support Center to respond immediately to E-mails, calls, faxes and online chat from military members, their families and overseas voters worldwide. Toll-free numbers from 67 countries to reach the call center are available on the FVAP website.



As always, FVAP subject matter experts are available during regular business hours to handle issues of greater complexity.


