



Kwajalein schools are back in session

What are you looking forward to this year? Turkey Bowl! I heard all about it from my older sister.





F1M2 'Pete,' was designed and manufactured by Mitsubishi between 1939 and 1944. 'Pete' was the last biplane type of the Imperial Japanese Navy.

Mitsubishi-made F1M2 'Pete' was unique Japanese Navy combat aircraft in WWII

In 1934, the Japanese Navy issued a specification calling for a catapult-launched, short-range observation seaplane that was to replace the E8N1 observation biplane already in service. Aichi, Mitsubishi and Kawanishi were given the specification, and in the end Mitsubishi won the design contest.

The aircraft designed by Mitsubishi was the F1M1. It was a biplane and it had a central float with two outboard stabilizing floats. It carried a crew of two seated in tandem, consisting of a pilot and a rear gunner. It was armed with two 7.7mm machine guns in the nose, and one 7.7mm machine gun on a flexible mount in the rear cockpit. In addition, it could also carry a 132-pound bomb under each of the lower wings. It had a length of just over 31 feet, and a wingspan of 36 feet. The maximum speed was 230 miles per hour and it had a range of 460 miles. It was powered by

a 14-cylinder, 875 horsepower Zuisai radial engine.

The first flight of the F1M1 was in June 1936. But testing revealed that the plane had a strong tendency to porpoise while taxiing on the water, and in flight the directional stability was poor. After building four F1M1 prototypes, Mitsubishi redesigned the plane to solve the problems encountered in the flight testing program. In 1939, the improved design was ordered into production by the Japanese Navy as the F1M2.

In the official designation system used by the Imperial Japanese Navy, 'F' was the project letter given to observation seaplanes. The '1' stood for the first such design accepted into service with the Japanese Navy, and the 'M' stood for Mitsubishi. The number following the 'M' signified the major production version of the plane, such as the F1M1 and later the F1M2. Because the F1M was classified as a reconnaissance seaplane by the Americans, it was given a male name, and the name chosen for the F1M series was 'Pete.'

While most Japanese seaplanes served the Navy's mission as long-range reconnaissance aircraft, the F1M2 was in a class by itself. It was the

only short-range observation seaplane accepted into service by the Japanese Navy. It was the last biplane type of the Imperial Japanese Navy, with 1,118 built between 1936 and 1944. It was also one of the few combat biplanes in production, world wide, of any country during World War II. It was standard equipment on all carriers and battleships of the Japanese Navy, and was assigned to several island bases throughout the Pacific.

The F1M2 was originally built as a catapult-launched reconnaissance float plane, specializing in gunnery spotting. But because of its exceptional maneuverability the F1M2 took on a number of local roles including area-defense fighter, convoy escort, bomber, anti-submarine patrol, maritime patrol, rescue and transport. The F1M2 fought dogfights in the Aleutians, the Solomons and several other theaters of operations. It provided the Japanese Navy with a very versatile operations platform, and it earned itself a very commendable war record.

One example of a F1M2 has been located at Kwajalein Atoll and it lies next to the Shohei Maru, a Japanese World War II cargo ship known to Kwajalein divers as the 'O-buoy wreck.' The ship was attacked on Dec. 19, 1943, when it was the target of a lone U.S. Navy PBY 'Catalina' that performed a glide-bombing attack on it at about midnight. The ship was left burning, and according to captured documents, the Shohei Maru sank a few

YYWC more than just a social club

Women enrich education throughout the RMI, FSM with grants that aid education of students

Members of the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club are gearing up for another exciting year and inviting all women on Kwajalein to join them for their fall kick-off.

The event, which will be at 7 p.m., Wednesday, at the large pavilion at Emon Beach, promises to be 'An Evening among the Stars' and is a chance for the stars of YYWC, its volunteers, to introduce themselves and their work on Kwajalein. Dinner and drinks will be provided.

The primary mission of the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club is to enrich education in USAKA's host country, the Marshall Islands. Each year schools on Ebeye, Majuro and the outer islands submit grants to the club's Education Assistance Committee. These grant proposals are for specific items each school believes will directly aid the education of its students.

Grants have been awarded for things such as copy machines, textbooks and even a classroom addition. In April 2010 the Education Assistance Committee was able to award more than \$71,000 to these schools. This is in addition to the \$7,000 in scholarships award-

ed to high school seniors on Kwajalein.

These grants are made possible through the profits earned at the Micronesian Handicraft Shop downtown and the Bargain Bazaar near Dock Security. Each store plays a specific role in the functioning of YYWC and its ability to raise money for Marshallese education.

Among all of our freshman and sophomores, the Marshallese District had the highest percentage of students make ‘honors’ here at Xavier. And a good number of them are from Ebeye - which goes to show what a well-structured school can do for serious students.

The Mic Shop purchases handmade goods from artisans throughout the Marshall Islands and Micronesia and sells them to the Kwajalein community and its visitors. The benefit from this is two-fold.

“By purchasing goods from small craftsmen and women, the Mic Shop is able to provide a source of income and hopefully enable these traditional crafts to continue,” said Paula Eggert, Mic Shop chair. “The money raised through the sale of these goods is then funneled back to the EAC to assist the education of Marshallese and Micronesian children,” she continued.

The Bargain Bazaar’s profits also go to benefit Marshallese education. This thrift store accepts donations from the Kwajalein community, but its main customers are Ebeye residents. All profits from these sales along with those from the Mic Shop are then moved to the Education Assistance Committee and distributed through the grant program.

Recently, the fence at the dock was moved to accommodate a new laundry facility and the Bargain Bazaar is now inside the gate at Dock Security. This change has been a challenge, but YYWC sees it as a positive move. Customers from Ebeye have gained easier access to the Bargain Bazaar and the volunteers are ramping up for increased sales. Kwaj residents can still

make donations by going through Dock Security with their K-badges and are encouraged to do so as they clean out their closets or PCS.

But members of the Women’s Club aren’t just about studying grant proposals and thrift stores. What starts as a connection as volunteers eventually blossoms into lasting friendships.

“Some of my strongest friendships here on Kwaj began at YYWC events,” said former president Jenny Norwood.

The women of the YYWC are eager to start their new year and are extending an invitation to all women on Kwaj to join an exceptional group of volunteers for their kick-off celebration Wednesday.

hours later between 2-2:30 a.m.

The F1M2 lies on its left side, about 50 feet from the shipwreck. All that is left of the plane is the fuselage and inner wing sections. The outer main wing, tail wings and floats are missing. A search of the area over several visits to the wreck has not revealed any evidence of those parts of the plane.

Shortly after I first dived on the plane back in April of 2007, I was talking about it with Will Timmons, an aircraft mechanic here at Kwajalein and a good friend of mine. Timmons had the idea that the plane may have been sitting on the Shoei Maru's deck as cargo, which would explain why the wings and floats are missing. I learned later that documents captured after the war confirm Timmons' suspicions – the Shoei Maru had anchored only a few hours prior to being attacked, and never had a chance to off-load its cargo. The 'Pete' was likely destined to become a part of the 952nd Ku, a detachment of which was stationed on Ebeye at that time.

Despite being a biplane, which was a design considered obsolete by the time WWII broke out, the F1M2 still made a name for itself, and was not a plane to be taken lightly when encountered in combat. Japan was ultimately defeated in WWII, yet the F1M2 remains one of the more unique combat aircraft of the war.

Nineteen servicemembers die in Iraq, Afghanistan

Staff Sgt. Derek J. Farley, 24, of Nassau, N.Y., died Aug. 17 at Bala Boluk, Farah, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated as he attempted to disarm it. He was assigned to the 18th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, 16th Sustainment Brigade, 21st Theater Sustainment Command, Grafenwoehr, Germany.

Two soldiers died who were supporting Operation Enduring Freedom. They died Aug. 17 in Kunar province, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when an improvised explosive device caused a military vehicle roll-over. Killed were **Pfc. Benjamin G. Chisholm**, 24, of Fort Worth, Texas, and **Pvt. Charles M. High**, IV, 21, of Albuquerque, N.M. They were assigned to the 1st Battalion, 327th Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade Combat Team, 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault), Fort Campbell, Ky.

Lance Cpl. Kevin E. Oratowski, 23, of Wheaton, Ill., died Aug. 18 while supporting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. He was assigned to 1st Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Sgt. 1st Class Edgar N. Roberts, 39, of Hinesville, Ga., died Aug. 17 at the National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Md., of wounds sustained June 26 at Sayed Abad, Afghanistan, when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to 810th Engineer Company (SAPPER), Swainsboro, Ga.

Sgt. Martin A. Lugo, 24, of Tucson, Ariz., died Aug. 19 in Puli Alam, Afghanistan, of wounds sustained when insurgents attacked his unit with small arms fire. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 75th Ranger Regiment, Hunter Army Air Field, Ga.


