Rivera begins tenure as KRS president

Cynthia Rivera arrived to Kwajalein with her husband Marc and daughter Danielle in June 2009. Rivera had been working in Frederick, Md., for Bechtel National, and had known a lot of people that had come through Kwajalein. Initially, she came to Kwajalein as Kwajalein Range Services Deputy Site Manager, and in March of this year was named president upon the departure of her predecessor, Dave Norwood.

Rivera attended the Brooks Institute in Santa Barbara, Calif., and received her bachelor's in professional photography. She went on to the University of Nevada, Las Vegas, where she earned her master's degree in communications studies. After a few years working in the photography industry, she joined the company that operated the Nevada Test Site's Remote Sensing Laboratory. She remained with that contract for 17 years, eventually achieving the role of Deputy General Manager for the entire Nevada Test Site.

Rivera is the first female KRS president, but states, "I don't really view myself as approaching things differently, but I don't think I would be the one to see that. I have typically worked in a male-dominated environment where I am often the only female in the room. That has been true throughout my entire career." Rivera continued, "I am pleased to have the opportunity, and I recognize that culturally, it can be a little different for some folks, and I hope I can continue to prove that the company's decision was a good one."

She expounded on her opportunity offered from her company, Bechtel, saying, "I think people earn trust, and work hard to get where they are. I have been fortunate that my company has given me this opportunity. I have other female counterparts at the same senior program manager levels as I am. So I feel good about the company I work for, I have great support."

As far as her leadership style, Rivera's priority is teamwork. "I seek

input before I make a decision; and I like to make decisions that are soundly based. I don't tend to make a decision off-the-cuff," she said.

Top priorities for Rivera and KRS are to maintain safe, secure operations in support of the USAKA mission. She believes that KRS brings "dedication to the mission, experienced individuals that can help make USAKA succeed and the creative solutions to try and get through the difficult budget times."

Trying to make the ends meet is one of the biggest challenges for the future of KRS. Rivera does remark that, "...exciting missions are on the books, we have a great team in place but overall, the U.S. government is facing challenges that trickle down to us. We have to find ways to accomplish goals in a fiscally constrained manner."

To accomplish this, Rivera and her team of managers on Kwajalein approach task evaluation by looking very specifically at risk, "What risks do we incur if we do or don't do something? How will it affect our ability to perform our mission?"

"We have to consider all of those things in context with what kind of flexibility we have in order to still meet the objectives of performing our mission," she says. Rivera continued, "So what we are doing right now is looking at the relative rank order of those impacts, the probability of those occurring through our risk assessment and analysis; we are going to propose how we could continue to operate for the government, and then we will have on-going discussions over the next month to come up with the best solutions."

It's too soon to give specific answers about the solutions KRS will offer. "We are still in the process, and we are spending lots of hours every week getting input from the various managers and consolidating that and ranking it all against each other in context to see what we can live with in terms of reductions and still meet the range needs," stated Rivera. "It tells us our process, which is very detailed."

When asked about the Installation Management Command transition, Rivera remarked, "It's too

soon to know what the impacts of IMCOM will be on KRS. I have been told that we are still to perform to our current contract through February 2013. While there may be changes to potential funding sources, I don't anticipate any significant scope changes at this point," she said.

Rivera stressed that while there are challenges living here, the people are what make Kwaj. "People live here because there is a certain sense of adventure. Of course, there are other reasons too, economical, for instance; but you wouldn't stay if you didn't have a certain sense of adventure. Everyone knows there are great individuals on Kwajalein that make up the community; people all contribute here. They are here for a purpose. That flows over into the community, and the number of people involved in so many different things is extraordinary, and that's great to be a part of. People are so willing to share because 'we are all in this together.' It is a great place to live, I really enjoy it."

Teen town hall addresses concerns from youth

A teen town hall meeting was held at the High School with Col. Joseph Gaines, USAKA commander, March 31. The teens had many questions for the colonel.

Gaines began by thanking all the teen performers, stage crew and helpers that participated in the Kaleidoscope. He then addressed questions submitted anonymously to a question box at the school. The first question was about high speed internet. Gaines reported that monies still need to be allocated before a contract could be made with a company. While he did not want to make any false promises about when high speed internet would be in place, he did assure the teens the project was moving forward.

The next question addressed why it was necessary to provide a social security number when trying to rent movies at AAFES. While AAFES is a tenant and not under direct authority of Gaines, he reported that he will gladly look into the issue and talk with management.

Next, an inquiry to whether it was illegal for 18-year-olds to purchase cigarettes from AAFES. Gaines checked the policy, and it is not illegal; however, Gaines also notified the group that he intends to make all of downtown a no-smoking area, and does not agree with the decision to smoke.

The colonel then opened the floor for questions from the crowd. One question regarded the issue of housing. Gaines explained a long term plan was in place to slowly move people out of new housing, which isn't in acceptable condition. Also, no one will be moved into new housing that is already vacant. The first row to be demolished is the abandoned row next to the domes.

A senior asked what the regulations were for the fam-



ily members visiting seniors for graduation. There is an eight person limit for each house, and lodging is limited, but seniors can always request a one-time exception if it is going to be an issue, Gaines explained.

The tsunami warning was also a hot topic at the meeting. Some students commented the alarms were not sufficient, and most people were not sure what to do in the event of an evacuation. Gaines mentioned the rules could be found in the phonebook, additional warnings were broadcast on the Roller and police had knocked on doors during the event. Everyone should have been warned in some way.

Addison Cossey invited the colonel to participate in a spelling bee the Girl Scouts planned to raise money to aid Japan. While Gaines was willing to accept the invitation, he will be off-island during the event.

Band alumni have gone on to play in university jazz groups, and former band member and recording artist Andrea Lindborg returned often to rehearse with the band and perform for the Kwajalein community. Current members often "double" on various instruments to cover the instrumentation needs of the many ensembles in which they perform. The student soloists study improvisation to give authentic interpretations to the jazz classics by such greats as Miles Davis, Charlie Parker, Glenn Miller and Count Basie.

As more people have learned of the dance, ballroom dance classes have enjoyed an enlarged enrollment. The band performs musical styles for swing, fox trot, cha cha, rumba, salsa, and even a couple of waltzes. During the dinner dance, Cheryl Shields often finds herself

reviewing dance steps for guests who have taken classes earlier in the year. Even the idea of a "dress up" event takes on a very local appearance, with dancers in tuxes and fancy dresses along side others in "island formal" attire.

On April 12, the sun will be overhead and slightly south at 12:49 p.m. On April 13, the sun will be overhead and slightly north at 12:49 p.m.

Between 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. on those days, place a can or some other object on the ground. Watch the shadow of the object and you'll see it vanish, then reappear.

As I enter the home stretch of a three-year tour on Kwaj, I look back at how I filled my time. The Kwajalein community has so much to offer and I tried to make the most of it by joining several clubs and participating in many events. As I reminisce about my time here, one club stands out as the most influential in the lives of my family: the Kwajalein Running Club. Now, I realize that running isn't for everyone, but if you are between the ages of 0 and 100 and even enjoy walking around on this beautiful island, then I believe KRC has something to offer you.

The Kwajalein Running Club, in its current form, has been around since 1977. The KRC President, Bob Sholar, has been involved in the club in some manner for over 30 years, and has been the chief organizer since 1994. Even with a shrinking population, under Bob's dedicated leadership, the KRC has drawn record numbers of participants at many of its events during my tenure here. Again, I believe this is because it is such an inclusive club and so much fun for all ages.

Events are offered throughout the school year, usually consisting of one Monday evening Fun Run and one "other event" per month. The Fun Runs offer the option of a

half-mile, two-mile or four to six mile run. As someone who has participated in various triathlons in various locations, I can tell you that you won't find better organized or more fun triathlons anywhere! Honestly, the only thing missing are the crowds of spectators.



Recently, the Police Department received two reports of unknown
