Procedures, rules for Space Available on Metroliner clarified

Space available travel can be confusing to figure out – just look at the many AFN commercials governing the worldwide Space A program. Even the document detailing space available practices for the Metroliner flights between Kwajalein and Roi-Namur is 19 pages, plus as many again in appendices.

During last month's town hall meetings, several residents and employees asked questions regarding these procedures. USAKA Commander Col. Joseph Gaines did his best to explain the procedures and emphasized that the Space A categories are always considered a lower priority than duty status passengers, or those flying in support of any portion of the mission.

"Space available opportunities are plentifully if the travel uses the reverse flow of mission traffic," Chief Warrant Officer 5 Charlie Dodd said recently.

Dodd explained this may be inconvenient and result in an overnight stay for some, but the Metroliner's purpose is to transport duty passengers first. Space available travel is a privilege made available to USAKA residents, workers and host-country nationals, but will never supersede mission requirements.

Aside from the general demarcation between space required and space available, there are nine categories for Metroliner passengers, and each category has a priority – CAT 1 is the highest and CAT 9 is the lowest. This means that when manifesting and loading passengers, airport employees will fill the planes with higher category (or priority) passengers first, according to Dodd.

The first five categories listed in the SPI are for space required passengers. One term that Dodd sees misused is "hard-seat." Category 3 covers this and is for "U.S. contract workers whose primary duty location is on an island other than their residence," according to SPI 1031. Dodd explained that there

is a tendency for passengers to use the term "hard-seated" when they mean one of the other space required categories.

"Hard seats are only authorized after communication occurs between all affected parties," Dodd said. The matrix for CAT 3 seats is routinely reviewed by airport operations staff with input from range/community leadership, he explained.

Another common confusion regarding Metroliner travel, according to Dodd, concerns the last four categories – the ones designated for space available passengers. He cited a common scenario that he and other airport employees encounter regularly.

"A C-badge, Roi-Namur worker travels to Ebeye for the weekend on a space available basis to spend time with his family on Ebeye. On Tuesday morning the C-badge worker arrives at the Kwajalein Atoll terminal expecting transportation to Roi so that he may begin a shift that morning or later that day.

"In this common scenario, the C-badge employee does not make the flight because the flight is full of hard seat and duty passengers. The C-badge employee's supervisor then questions airport operations as to why his employee is not offered a seat so that he can get to work. The answer is, because the employee traveled on a space available basis to Kwajalein, the employee shall return on a space available basis," said Dodd.

He explained that this is the same principle governing space available travel on the ATI to and from Hickam Air Force Base in Honolulu.

Those who want to sign up on the roster for space available categories 7 and 8 may do so up to seven days in advance. Passengers are then processed first by category, then by the time they were entered on the roster, according to SPI 1031. To sign up for space available travel (CAT 7 or CAT 8,) e-mail flyroi@smdck.smdc.army.mil or call 5-6FLY(56359) and give the FlyRoi agent your full name and desired date of travel.

Passenger Priority for Metroliner seats

- ➔ **CAT 1:** Emergency or urgent medical patients and medical attendants.
- ➔ **CAT 2:** Range Operations support or USAKA/RTS designated passengers. Examples are detailed in the SPI.
- ➔ **CAT 3:** U.S. Contract worker, whose primary duty location is on an island other than their residence. These passengers are considered "hard-seated."
- ➔ **CAT 4:** U.S. Contract worker resident on Roi-Namur traveling for non-emergency medical appointments at Kwajalein, or continuing off-atoll for medical referral. (This category also applies for return trip to Roi.)
- ➔ **CAT 5:** U.S. Contract worker whose primary duty location is Kwajalein, but has official government business on Roi-Namur or vice versa.

Space available categories

Note: Duty passenger categories always take precedence and must be satisfied prior to space available.

- ➔ **CAT 6:** RMI on official government business (must get approval from USAKA Host Nation Office prior to travel)
- ➔ **CAT 7:** K-Badge holders. This category also includes visitors authorized under the 480 program and command-sponsored TDY personnel traveling for personal and recreational reasons.
- ➔ **CAT 8:** Non-Resident contract affiliated employees – C-Badge holders.
- ➔ **CAT 9:** Other RMI citizens utilizing the FlyOut program who possess the appropriate FlyOut badge or other documentation from the dock security checkpoint either on Roi-Namur or Kwajalein.

Hospital construction requires major moves

Just as death and taxes are a certainty for humanity, so too are corrosion and dilapidation for buildings. In the corrosive environment of the Marshall Islands, it is a perpetual job to stay ahead of the deterioration. The hospital is the latest facility to undergo a major face lift, and the upcoming result will be a more structurally sound and safe building.

At the end of March, Hospital Administrator Beth Turnbaugh, the administration office and Marion Ruffing, employee assistance program counselor, moved into housing unit 424-B on Lagoon Road, next to the physical

therapy office. The KRS worker's compensation office, business office and the periodic medical evaluation coordinator moved to 424-C. This allows hospital staff to have the room to move around internally. Right now, construction is happening in the south end of the building, on the 1st and 2nd floors. When those areas are done, people in the next offices will occupy those completed offices, and construction will begin the new phase. "Work will be done in 3 to 4 phases, so there will be a lot of moves internally, but no one else is expected to move outside of the hospital," said Jacqueline Jones, director of nursing.

By April 5, the nighttime and weekend emergency room moved

to building 566, the previous KRS worker's compensation office location. Because the majority of the patients are seen through the clinic on weekdays, there is very little weekday emergency room traffic. "If we kept the weekend ER open as the only ER, we would have two sets of staff, one in building 566, and one here at the hospital. So we chose to keep the staff in the hospital during the week. At nighttime and weekends, we don't have any outpatient work, so it makes sense," said Jones.

The temporary emergency room will be open nightly from 6 p.m. to 7 a.m., and all day on Sundays and Mondays. There is an inpatient room set up in the unit as well, and it could house a patient for a couple of days. If a patient needs a more extensive stay, due to surgery or some other problem, then the second floor of the hospital could be reopened to accommodate the needs of the patient.

The renovations are "...not affecting any of our services, though the timing of some services could be affected," said Jones. San Juan construction has agreed to do much of the project at night inside the hospital. There will be a safety walk-through in the mornings before any hospital staff will be able to come inside. So things such as

First Stop, which now starts at 6:30 a.m., could be altered. "We are looking at the possibility of changing the hours to 7-11:00 a.m. or 11:30," Jones added.

"The main goal is we want to get community awareness out about the construction and how it will affect patient traffic or patient care," said Jones. The concern is patients needing assistance may not be aware of the move. "We do have signage posted outside of the building, directing people to the temporary ER. We did have two separate occasions where people have come to the ER at night and could not get in—they were not taking note of the signs posted on the doors. There is also an ER phone, outside of the main ER hospital, and we will direct them to the new building," said Jones.

Construction on the hospital is expected to be completed by the end of September.

The dedication also featured entertainment provided by the women's dance group of Ebeye and Mon La Mike's Band. A dinner reception followed to conclude a festive evening as Hotel Ebeye readies itself to welcome visitors to its 18 rooms.

Along with the accommodations, Hotel Ebeye also features a restaurant and a bar. Room rates range from \$80 for a single room, \$90 for deluxe room with a kitchen to \$150 for a suite with a kitchen and balcony. Restaurant opens daily from 10 a.m.-1 p.m., and the bar opens Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays from 6 p.m.-2 a.m.




