


Nikky Ansley and Kendall Westhoff are the first place solo finishers in the 2011 Rusty Family Mini-Triathlon. For more, see page 6.

TIP OF THE WEEK

Caretaker form important when leaving island

If you plan to leave the island for any reason there is an important form that you need to complete at the Central Police Station before you leave. The Designation of Caretaker form is an often-forgotten necessity. This form allows you the opportunity to designate someone to live in your quarters, enter your quarters, make periodic checks of the interior and exterior of your quarters, and make special requests for emergency work to be completed during your absence. If you choose, you can indicate that you do not want anyone to enter or care for your home while you are away.

Last month, two incidents were reported where a resident left Kwajalein and did not complete the caretaker form. Both incidents involved a pet being left behind. In one incident, the pet got loose and was turned in to the veterinarian's office. Since no one was given authorization to be in the quarters, the pet had to remain at the vet's office. In the other incident, a work crew finished doing repair work in a BQ room. The workman locked the door when they finished their repairs. The individual that was staying in the room returned and found the room secure with his key inside of the locked room. The individual called the Central Police Station and requested we grant him access to the room. We were not able to grant him access as no caretaker form had been completed and filed with the police department.



With a caretaker form on file, the police department can allow your guest entry into your room or quarters in case of lockout. The caretaker can also call and request repairs be made to the residence. In the event anyone should question the right of your designee to access the abode, the caretaker form immediately resolves this concern. The caretaker form is fast and easy to complete, and simply requires your signature and the signature of your designated caretaker.

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USCG Academy graduation is first for RMI citizen

Commencement ceremonies are gearing up around the United States, and eager students are anticipating a major step in their lives. Graduation from college marks more than one single accomplishment; graduates are marking their achievements of their lives both academically and personally. Diplomas from institutes of higher learning illustrate to the world that goals were set and accomplished, hurdles

were bounded over and dreams came to fruition.

Jefferson Bobo, a citizen of the Republic of the Marshall Islands, graduated from Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School. He was one of five children from Ebeye to participate in the Ri-Katak program that year. Bobo didn't just attend school; he jumped in with both feet and participated in every way possible. He was a member of the National Honor Society and the choir, played trombone in the concert and jazz bands, was a writer for the school newspaper and played on the volleyball and basketball teams. He did all this and maintained an honor roll grade point average throughout his high school career, graduating in 2007 with high honors.

Upon his high school graduation, Bobo was accepted into the International Cadet Program with the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, Conn. Throughout his time at the academy, Bobo averaged 17 credits per semester and was a member of the International Council, serving as president for his last year. He was also on the academy's boxing team, becoming co-captain in his senior year. In 2010 and 2011, he represented the academy at the National Collegiate Boxing Association Championships in the 125-pound weight class.

When asked about his time at the academy, Bobo fondly describes working with the fleet. "I will say that summers are really fun. Every cadet only gets three weeks of leave during the summer. The rest is spent either at a Coast Guard unit, or at the academy doing military training. I got to travel a lot during the summers and do amazing things that the operational Coast Guard does out in the fleet," he said.

Bobo continued, "This past summer I was assigned for 12 weeks to a cutter called the *USCGC Resolute*, home-ported in St. Petersburg, Fla. We went underway for seven weeks in the Gulf of Mexico. For four weeks, we were the on-scene commander at the BP Oil Spill at the Deep Water Horizon site, so I got to see that event up close and help out. The other two weeks we did alien migrant interdiction operations and drug patrols in the Straits of Florida. We actually interdicted some migrants from Cuba fleeing to Florida. It was something I will never forget."

Throughout his four years, Bobo has worked hard, studied hard and stayed engaged with all aspects of the academy experience. He notes that without the cama-

raderie of his fellow cadets, it would have been difficult. "Making good friends is by far the best thing at the academy. I would not have made it through without friends I made," he points out.

On May 18, Bobo will graduate with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, and will be the first person from the RMI to receive a degree from a U.S. military academy. A highlight of the 130th U.S. Coast Guard Academy graduation ceremony will be keynote speaker President Barack Obama, scheduled to give the commencement address. A delegation from the RMI has been invited to attend the event, consisting of the RMI President Jurrelang Zedkaia and First Lady Hannah Zedkaia; Philip Muller, Ambassador to the United Nations; Charles Paul, Charge d' affaires from the RMI Embassy; Martha Campbell, U.S. Ambassador to the RMI; and John Silk, Minister of Foreign Affairs of the RMI. President Zedkaia will take part in the ceremony as well, having time at the podium to speak to Cadet Bobo directly.


After graduation, Bobo will have some time off before starting work for the RMI government. "My government has offered me several jobs and is letting me choose where I want to work. Each job that has been offered reflects what I have learned at the Academy, either with my military officer training background or my background as a civil engineer undergraduate."

Although Bobo's future is bright, he hasn't forgotten his past. The only thing more impressive than Bobo's accomplishments is his sincerity when he states, "I would like to thank the community, including my teachers, Ri-Katak lunch program donors, bus drivers, etc., for their help while I was going through the Ri-Katak program."

Palepa Smith is said to be the “Matriarch of Kwajalein Softball” by her Good Times teammates, and at 70 years old, the name is well-deserved. Smith began playing softball long before some of her teammates were even born. Smith plays on the same team as her daughter, Masina, and she hopes to be playing long enough for three generations of Smiths to share a team – maybe when her granddaughter, Maliana, is old enough to play.

Smith has been said to be an inspiration to many Kwajalein residents when it comes to fitness and activity. Teammate and friend Bess Buchanan said, “She is very much what we all strive to be as we get older.” At 70 years old, she is active not only in softball, but plays in a bowling league, has coached volleyball, volunteers at the local schools, offers hula classes with her daughter, performs hula and plays in the *Pure Polynesia* band that often entertains the island. This is all when she is not babysitting her triplet 4-year-old grandchildren.

Smith was born and raised in American Samoa; this is where she learned her discipline regarding physical activity. She grew up playing cricket and learned to play softball when she came to Kwajalein. In school in Samoa she learned to dance hula, play guitar and sing in the choir. She also learned music and dance from her parents; Smith’s father was a musician and her mother was a dancer. Smith believes it is important to pass everything down to her children and hopes in turn they will continue to pass down to the next generation of their

family, including the idea that getting up and moving around is the best thing you can do for yourself.

“I still move around for my age,” Smith commented. “If I join something, I don’t quit. I need to finish up what I did.” Smith still tells her grown children, “You’re still young. Keep moving around, it’s good for you.”

Smith and her husband, Hal, came to Kwajalein in 1968 and have had three tours here. Smith has three children, nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Spc. Preston J. Dennis, 23, of Redding, Calif., died April 28 in Kandahar province, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 32nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort Drum, N.Y.

Pfc. Robert M. Friese, 21, of Chesterfield, Mich., died April 29 in Al Qadisiyah province, Iraq, of injuries sustained when enemy forces attacked his unit with a rocket propelled grenade. He was assigned to the 3rd Squadron, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment, Fort Hood, Texas.

Sgt. Adam D. Craig, 23, of Cherokee, Iowa, died March 4 at the National Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Md., of a non-combat related illness. He was assigned to the 1st Squadron, 113th Cavalry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 34th Infantry Division, Sioux City, Iowa.

Sgt. Kevin W. White, 22, of Westfield, N.Y., died May 2 in Kunar province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 35th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 25th Infantry Division, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

Spc. Riley S. Spaulding, 21, of Sheridan, Texas, died May 4 in Kandahar province, Afghanistan, of injuries sustained in a non-combat incident. He was assigned to the 2nd Squadron, 2nd Stryker Cavalry Regiment, Vilseck, Germany.

Kwajalein Running Club and KRS Community Activities together sponsored the 2011 'Rusty Family' Mini-Triathlon on Monday. The three segments were 500-yard lagoon swim, 10-mile bike and 2-mile run.

There were 45 solo finishers and 87 more participants on 30 teams. Most teams were three members, some two and some family teams were as large as five.

First across the line was 13-year-old Kendall Westhoff, breaking the hour barrier in 59 minutes, 39 seconds. First for the girls was Nikky Ansley in 1:07:36. Nikky is only a fifth grader! Nikky's mother Lisa won the women's section of the longer RustMan Triathlon two weeks prior. No jumping to conclusions; it still could be Lt. Col. Steve Ansley's genes. Second for the boys was seventh grader Sam Jahnke in 1:05:23, and for the girls it was 12-year-old Hannah DeLange in 1:14:26.

In the team section, runner Thomas Greene screamed up behind his friend Dash Alfred in the last 50 yards, to come neck and neck as they crossed the finish. The officials recorded it a tie, as too close to call. Dash's team included sister Pania in the swim and father Helbert on the bike. Thomas' team included swimmer Ian Goldsmith and biker Eric Murillo.

Bikes were of all sorts: old and newer Kwaj bikes, 20-inch wheels, 24, 26 and a few higher quality racing bikes.

The novelty participation for 2011 went hands down to Jarem Erekson, who solo'd middle of the pack in 1:34:04; however, Jarem rode a unicycle over the bike course that included two laps of Kwajalein airfield! This has never been done before. One cannot coast on a unicycle - constant pedaling.

The youngest solo finisher was Luc Burnley, only six years old. Luc's dad Victor went with him side-by-side.

The Emon BBQ was fired up, serving 200 hamburgers and 150 hot dogs to participants, staff and supporters. Special thanks go to Jim Willman and Henry McElreath for cooking. Ben Bartyzel worked a 12-hour day, preparing the bike course, the finish area and then cleaning up! Rotary Club provides dental care in Kwajalein Atoll

From April 9-22, the Rotary Club of Wahiawa-Waialua, Hawaii, sponsored and conducted a humanitarian dental mission to Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands. The Rotary Club has come to Kwajalein annually since 2005, providing free dental care and teaching efforts to an area of the RMI severely lacking in adequate dental care. The mission team consisted of four personnel including Dr. Nora K. Harmsen, Dr. Kerry Ishihara, dental hygienist Debra Mapel, and Rotary volunteer, retired U.S. Army Gen. David Bramlett.

Besides the great support provided by U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll, Kwajalein Atoll Local Government, Ebeye Hospital and the RMI Ministry of Health, the dental mission also received outstanding support from the Wahiawa-Waialua, Waianae Coast, Kapolei, Mililani Sunrise and Lahaina Sunrise Rotary Clubs; Continental Airlines and Continental Micronesia; dentists who donated dental supplies and equipment; State of Hawaii Department of Health; and Ultradent, Hu-Friedy, Crest, G.U.M. and Oral B dental supply companies.

The team traveled by barge, small boat, fixed-wing aircraft and vehicle while traveling throughout the atoll. They concentrated on Ebeye but also treated patients on Carlos, Enniburr and Gugeegue. The team focused on elementary school-age children and also treated numerous walk-in patients at the various sites. Virtually all children also received instruction in basic dental hygiene. The schools that received treatment were all sections of the third grade at Ebeye Public Elementary School, Seven Day Adventist School, Queen of Peace Elementary School, Ebeye Public High School, JABRO School, Ri-Katak students from Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School, Kwajalein High School on Gugeegue, Father Hacker High School, Carlos School and Enniburr School.



The dental team recorded all their work and provided a cost estimate of services provided based on the fee schedule for general practice in Honolulu. There were 393 patients seen. Hundreds of dental services were performed including sealants, fillings and extractions, totaling over \$129,400 in free dental care provided.

The Rotary Dental team record of achievement over the past seven years has been outstanding and has contributed to the growth in productivity of dental care in the Kwajalein Atoll area; much of it is attributable to Harmsen and her team's dedication and skill. The Rotary Dental team's increased familiarity with the local population and culture, enhanced personnel efforts, mission preparation, and overall organization optimized the team's abilities and available in-country support to conduct a successful and beneficial humanitarian effort for all involved.
