

What you thought you knew about lightning

National Lightning Safety Week is June 20-26. June is also the beginning of the rainy season as the Inter-tropical Convergence Zone moves northward over the central Republic of the Marshall Islands and Kwajalein Atoll. Deep convection and thunderstorms often accompany the ITCZ, so it is imperative to be prepared when thunder and lightning do occur.

In the United States, 66 people are killed and more than 300 injured by lightning strikes each year. Studies have shown that most people are struck by lightning before or after a thunderstorm has passed overhead because many people are unaware of how far lightning can strike from a parent thunderstorm. Lightning bolts can travel up to 30 miles horizontally, which results in a continued threat for lightning long after the storm has passed. As a rule of thumb, if you hear thunder, you are within lightning's striking distance.

In the event of thunder and lightning, you should move into a large, enclosed building. After the last clap of thunder is heard, you should remain indoors for 30 minutes. Strictly speaking, if you are outside during a thunderstorm, you are not safe, no matter the location. This applies for taking shelter in a softball field dugout, under a pavilion at the beach or on a B-boat in the lagoon. Outdoor sports have the fastest rising lightning casualty rate, so coaches and players need to be vigilant and have a lightning safety plan.

If you are caught outside and your skin tingles or your hair stands on end, a lightning strike may be imminent. In that event, you should crouch down on the balls of your feet with your feet close together. Keep your hands on your knees or covering your ears and lower your head. Get as low as possible without touching your hands or knees on the ground. Do not lie down.

The vast majority of lightning injuries and deaths on boats occur on small boats with no fully enclosed cabin. If you are out on the water in a B-boat and a lightning warning is issued, get back to land immediately and find a safe building. If you are caught in the thunderstorm, drop anchor and crouch down underneath the canopy as described above, remembering not to touch any metal.

Reagan Test Site weather meteorologists will give advanced warning for thunderstorms over the B-boat areas, if possible. This will give boats an opportunity to return to the marina before the lightning threat is

Lightning Myths

Myth: Lightning never strikes the same place twice.

Fact: Lightning often strikes the same place repeatedly, especially when it comes to a tall, isolated object. The Empire State Building is struck nearly 100 times per year; a sailboat on the open ocean will act in the same manner to attract a lightning strike.

Myth: Rubber tires on a car and rubber-soled shoes, protect you from lightning by insulating you from the ground.

Fact: Most cars are safe from lightning, but it is the metal roof and sides that protect you, not the rubber tires. This does not apply to golf carts, nor does it apply to tennis shoes, as current from a nearby lightning strike can still travel through the ground and into your legs and body.

Myth: If you are in a house, you are safe from lightning.

Fact: A house is a safe place to be during a thunderstorm as long as you avoid touching anything that conducts electricity. This means staying away from corded phones, electrical appliances, TV cables, video games, computers, plumbing, metal doors and even windows with attached A/C units. It is also advised to not lean directly on BQ or old housing walls, as brick and concrete have the ability to conduct electricity.

Myth: Structures with metal or metal on the body (i.e. jewelry) attract lightning.

Fact: Height, pointy shape and isolation are the dominant factors controlling where a lightning bolt will strike. The presence of metal makes no difference on where lightning strikes, so there is no need to waste time removing metal objects when lightning is close. Your time will be better spent seeking immediate shelter.

present in the B-boat area. However, there are occasionally cases when thunderstorms develop over the B-boat areas. In all lightning cases, boaters should contact the Small Boat Marina for advice on what actions are required.


Plan ahead and check the latest weather conditions. They can be found on channel 13 of your television, on the Internet at rtswx.com or by calling 54700 for a recording of the current forecast. When outside, look for tall, vertically developing clouds with a 'cauliflower' appearance located towards the east. Trade winds generally flow from east to west, and threatening weather to the east will likely head towards Kwajalein, bringing with it the possibility to adversely affect daily life and outdoor activities. During doldrums, thunderstorms may cycle up and down off-shore and lightning can be a continuous threat without the thunderstorms ever reaching an island.

As the National Weather Service states, "When thunder roars, go indoors." Hearing thunder indicates it is time to seek shelter. Do not wait for lightning to strike nearby before taking cover, as the first strike can be your last.

Roi employees hard at work to improve operations, structures

When coconuts threatened to take over the area where visitors congregate just a few months ago, Officer Daniel Gooch called Robbie Amador and cleared the way for people to be safe again around the Roi Small Boat Marina and laundry facility.

"We just get things done and keep things safe here on Roi," Amador explained. "The pier is really looking great."

Lt. Chris Ramsey and Gooch led the charge for the Roi Namur Police Detachment revamping the Dock Security Checkpoint and Yokohama Pier Operations during the first quarter of 2011. Today we see resulting changes to the entire area including a high degree of security, safety and compliance with USAKA regulations.

The Roi-Namur DSC and Yokohama Pier operate differently than Kwajalein as many services are offered here such as laundry, the 3rd Island Retail Store, the 3rd Island Ferry and the Small Boat Marina. The challenges facing the RNPd were many and varied as the DSC also acts as Harbor Control and provides a variety of services to the community.

"I like the changes because there is more safety here now," said Shirley Simon, Access Control Officer. "I am in charge of getting people in and out, [as well as] safety on the pier and in the laundry area. We control the area and make sure Enniburr people are doing okay."

Simon recently provided emergency dispatch services for Harbor Control during a fire on Yokohama Pier, where she kept everything under control and facilitated the smooth flow of emergency services without a hitch.

"I cannot say enough about the entire KPD team here on Roi-Namur," said Brad Walker, Kwajalein Police Department Chief of Police. "The RNPd team and the great work that has been done is a result of leadership at all levels,

ownership of responsibility and most importantly, teamwork. The Roi community has also embraced the changes and assisted greatly in the work at the pier, all of which has increased safety and security."

"We took control of the pier and secured it, then began to educate the public on policies and procedures," explained Gooch. "We are fortunate to have the full backing of the command in this process."

Results include improvements to LCM access and loading operations, Small Boat Marina procedures, RMI laundry facility changes, base access procedures and general pier safety concerns.

"Without help from other departments and people like Paul Haislip teaching us about safety regulations, and Robbie Amador, whose help with painting and construction is invaluable, there is no way we could make this happen," said Gooch.

"The pier is much safer now," Tomasi Rokobili, supervising ACO, explained. "I don't worry about people and our people understand the procedures now."

Rokobili has been trained as a supervisor for running the DSC operations

at Roi-Namur and was hand-selected along with Meliana Batongtong to move from Kwajalein to Roi-Namur. They join Access Control Officers Simon, Alti Kinjang, Jemty Peter and Marine Patrol Police and Pier Master Johnny Mejbon in facilitating the Roi-Namur DSC operations.

"I'm proud of how both day and night shift have stepped it up," Gooch said about the entire team of ACOs and RNPd officers contributing to the efforts at the DSC and pier.

Peter explained the differences. "It's a lot better now. We didn't work like now, how we have safety for the people. Inside the DSC, before, we didn't teach people how to do things, people did not know what to expect. Now they do."

"From the day Lt. Ramsey and Officer Gooch showed up, the DSC is a lot better than before," Peter continued. "Here at USAKA we follow the regulations. We do not just write people up. We also teach the people how to follow the rules. This is the better way."

About improvements at the DSC and Yokohama Pier, Ramsey said, "It takes every member of the KPD team to be productive and proactive, that's exactly what happened here. I look forward to what the future holds."


