Rumor: Spear fishing is going to be banned on USAKA.

The regulation governing spear fishing is being reconsidered in light of recent concerns brought forth by residents. Currently, spear fishing is prohibited in the roped area at Emon Beach and anywhere within 300 feet of that area. One planned change will expand the prohibited area to all of Area 8. A map of Area 8 is in the phone book under the Water Safety section. Other safety requirements and changes to the regulation are being considered; however, an outright ban is not one of them. The commander asks that users of spear guns and Hawaiian slings keep safety a top priority at all times.

SMDC safety stand down preaches safety always

Safety should be in the forefront of your thoughts during all activities, whether it be work or play.

Col. Joseph Gaines, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll commander, said it best at the USAKA safety council Sept. 23. "Our safety focus on Kwajalein must be all encompassing, focusing on safety in the workplace, at home and in our places of recreation. The safety of our residents and workers requires a commitment from everyone from contractors, to [Department of the Army Civilians] to the military. We must not become complacent or rest on our past safety record; we have to stay vigilant by identifying areas of risk and taking steps to reduce that risk."

The Space and Missile Defense Command Safety Stand Down Day continued that afternoon in the downtown area. Kwajalein Range Services coordinated informational booths to promote safety tips to the community.

Chase Engvall manned the radio frequency safety booth, showing off the equipment his department uses to measure RF fields around the radars.

Dentist Monte Junker gave out samples of chapstick with sunscreen and Xylitol gum with antibacterial and cavity-reducing ingredients.

Medical services offered blood sugar testing and blood pressure readings for safety stand down participants.

Torrey Landers was active at the wellness booth, giving out sunscreen, chapstick, pedometers and a handout on how to sleep better.

Explosive Ordnance Disposal had examples of the most common unexploded ordnance on-hand so residents could recognize them if they are ever found. The EOD team focuses on UXO awareness by distributing recognition guides, in both English and Marshallese, to children and residents. They

made sure everyone knew about their amnesty program – if you find or already have UXO, call the EOD team and they will come and retrieve it; all calls will remain anonymous.

Boat safety is a big concern at USAKA. Tweety Holbrook and Susie Marlow discussed proper scope when diving with safety stand down participants. For every foot of depth, you need five feet of scope.

Kwajalein Fire Department gave fire extinguisher training.

Safety is important. As Gaines said, "[It should be] a continuous process that happens every minute of every day at every level from the newest worker to the most senior leader."

KPD hosts rodeo to teach bicycle safety

Kwajalein Police Department shows concern for the safety of Kwajalein children every year at their annual Bicycle Rodeo. This year the event was held Sept. 23, downtown, as part of the SMDC Safety Stand Down Day activities.

“The focus every year is always bicycle safety, especially for Kwajalein’s youth,” said KPD Officer Christen Goodknight, who organized this year’s event. “We’re really focusing on using hand signals, stopping techniques [and] avoiding obstacles.” Their overall goal was to educate Kwajalein children on bicycle safety in order to avoid collisions. “There are no other formal classes throughout the year – this is it,” Goodknight said.

Children lined up to register with Tracy Pennington and Officer Holly Courson. Next, they took their bikes over to the safety check where officers Don Muse, Jerry Soesbee and Kevin Sikes checked their tires, brakes, cranks, chains and frame for fit and safety. Once their bike was deemed safe enough to ride, the children made their way to the bicycle course to test their driver safety knowledge. Officers coached the children on proper signaling and then tested them as they rode through a cone obstacle course. Once they completed the course, the children were fingerprinted and photographed for the Ident-a-Kid program sponsored by KPD. A D.A.R.E. booth was also set up providing information to parents and children about the ongoing program. Swanby Snow was on-scene providing tasty, chilled treats for the participating children. McGruff the Crime Dog made his way around the crowd, posing for photos and giving high fives to the kids.

At the end of the day, a raffle was held and prizes were given out to participating children. Bicycle helmets, flashlights, Exchange gift cards, Sunrise Bakery cakes and the grand prize – a new bike – were awarded at the raffle. Mason Aljure was the lucky grand prize winner this year.



Formally called "Macy's West" to stay in line with the cheeky names of other retail facilities, the Exchange PXtra has been through many transformations. First created in 1970 as a sort of "satellite" store to the abundantly-stocked Macy's, Macy's West carried everything from snacks to sporting gear. With the population of Kwajalein brimming at around 5,000 residents, there was more than enough business to support the two store's sales. The "Ten-Ten" store was added a few years later, and the merchandise in Macy's West eventually shifted into mostly household items, electronics and sporting goods.



Recipe: Herbed Fish Packets

2 pounds fish fillets (such as Salmon, Tuna or Mahi)
1.5 pounds red skin potatoes, sliced into thin rounds
Fresh herbs such as dill, oregano, basil or thyme
2 yellow squash or zucchini, julienned
1 pound sliced mushrooms
3 cups baby spinach leaves
Salt and pepper, granulated garlic

1 red onion, sliced
2 lemons sliced
1 stick butter

Cut the fish into six portions and lay out six large squares of aluminum foil. Spray each piece of foil with non-stick cooking spray. Lay the vegetables in the above order on the foil forming a pile, top with the fish fillet, season the entire packet with salt, pepper, granulated garlic and your choice of herbs. Add several slices of lemon on top of the fish

along with a pat of butter, approximately one tablespoon per fillet. Fold the foil for each packet so the seams remain at the top. Place on a grill over medium heat. Cook for 15-18 minutes, rotating the packets from the hottest area of the grill to the cooler areas. Cool slightly and serve the entire packet, allowing guests to open their own meal.

Following analysis of the proposed action, which includes implementation of mitigation measures, the USASMDC/ARSTRAT determined that no significant impacts to the environment are expected.
