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Kwajalein CDC achieves accreditation renewal

The Child Development Center on Kwajalein recently received their annual accreditation renewal from the National Association for the Education of Young Children. The NAEYC administers the largest and most widely recognized accreditation system for early childhood schools.

The Kwajalein CDC program met all 10 of the NAEYC program standards required, which are based on the latest research on the education and development of young children. Last year was the actual five-year renewal, where the NAEYC sends representatives to Kwajalein and they do a hands-on evaluation of the program and the facility.

“It is a five-year review process, so every year we must complete various tasks and compile a report to submit for renewal. Our report this year was accepted without any additional actions, so we are on the right track, we’re doing really well. Throughout the year, we are to meet certain requirements or criteria and report on those,” explained Cassie Rubly, George Seitz Elementary principal and the CYSS liaison. “We are required through IMCOM to be NAEYC accredited, so all of our programs meet the KRS contract requirements and the IMCOM requirements. We can’t be a Department of Defense certified facility without the NAEYC accreditation,” she said.

What does the accreditation do for pre-school children on Kwajalein? “Any childcare organization wants to have accreditation, because, well, it’s just like going to college—you want to go to an accredited institution. Parents want their children going to a school that meets and maintains accreditation; it makes it more account-

able, and a better school,” said Susannah Jones, training and curriculum/program specialist for Community Youth and School Services. The primary focus is keeping records of the children’s progress. “Every week, each teacher is keeping an individual portfolio on each child, a binder that has developmental checklists—how they are doing in the program; what they are doing; are they putting words together in sentences; are they using fine motor skills; are they socially playing with others at the appropriate ages. The portfolios also contain important work, like drawing something they have never drawn before, or writing their name for the first time; these get teacher comments and those are compiled and shared with the parents,” said Jones.

All the teachers have weekly training, and they have modules to complete in subjects like social, communication, health and safety. “They have activities and things to do in the classrooms to complete those modules, to test them out, to learn the concepts. It is an on-going process every day,” said Jones. According to Jones and Rubly, they constantly ask themselves, ‘What can we do better; how can we do it better?’

The portfolios will follow the children until they are ready to enter kindergarten. “They are really nice piece of evidence showing the development of the child for a significant timeframe. There is so much growth between the ages of 18-months and five-years that the parents can really see, ‘Oh this is when we started cutting, and this is when we started pasting on our own, and this is when we did letter-sound recognition.’ So we are working hard with our teachers and keep them updating and keeping work samples that are showing creativity and aren’t just worksheets. We want them to have meaningful evidence of progress in our program. And that is our number one goal,” said Rubly.

AAFES online shopping available to residents

The following information is intended to help Kwajalein and Roi-Namur residents with obtaining access to the Army and Air Force Exchange Services website.





In order for someone to set up a user ID and password for shopping at shopmyexchange.com, that person needs to be registered in the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System and the profile in that system needs to reflect they have Exchange privileges.

Service members and their Families have access to shop at the Exchange online no matter where they are stationed. Department of Defense employees, their de-

pendents and contractors have access to shopmyexchange.com if they are currently serving overseas. If someone attempts to access the online Exchange site and their information is not recognized, they either do not have access or simply are not enrolled in DEERS as an overseas employee. On-island hires with CACs and dependents of contractors are not given Exchange privileges in DEERS.

The CAC administration office near the airport has the ability to update DEERS, and anyone who suspects their information is not accurate should call to make an appointment with the CAC office. The office is open from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. Tuesday to Saturday and can be reached at 58496.

Follow these steps to register for online Exchange access. Once you enter your information, you will be prompted to create a user name and password. Specific guidelines for password creation are posted on the Exchange website. Educational material and tip sheets on the leading causes of home fires, information about protecting homes and families with life-saving technologies and the importance of home escape planning will be available from the Kwajalein Fire Department throughout this week.

The KFD has plenty of activities planned, including the popular fire muster obstacle course for kids and adults as well as a movie-making project for teens on island. The winning teen will have their movie shown at the Richardson Theater before the Saturday night movie on Oct. 15. Local firefighters will host a birthday party at the fire station

for their most recognizable mascot, Sparky. The popular Dalmatian turns 60 this year, and is planning to attend the festivities here on Kwajalein.

Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire that began on Oct. 8, but continued into and did most of its damage on Oct. 9, 1871.

In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation, and since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which Oct. 9 falls. Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record. The President of the United States has signed a proclamation proclaiming a national observance during that week every year since 1925.

Sparky the Fire Dog turns 60 this year!

Sparky has been visiting Kwajalein for over 20 years. Sparky visits the schools and participates in community events to spread fire safety messages, often accompanied by his firefighter friends. Sparky has made many

friends on Kwajalein.

In honor of his yearlong celebration, a new educational matching game was developed which teaches preschoolers about smoke alarms. The game is now available on Sparky's website, www.sparky.org. In the game, children are shown by Sparky himself what a smoke alarm looks like, the sound it makes, and what to do when they hear that sound. This message is especially important to small children, who may not recognize the sound or are unaware that hearing a smoke alarm means get outside and stay outside. In the game, kids will be rewarded for doing the right thing when a smoke alarm goes off.

"We know from NFPA statistics that children under age five are nearly one and a half times as likely to die in a home fire as the general public," said Amy LeBeau, NFPA's communications manager for public education. "Using a fun and interactive tool to educate young children about smoke alarms and what to do if one sounds is a great way to influ-

ence their safety behavior."


Sparky was born in 1951 for an Advertising Council campaign and has been the organization's official mascot and "spokesdog" since. Two years later his fire prevention campaign reached more than 68 million people through radio public service announcements and another three million through television.

Even though Sparky has gone through some changes over the last 60 years, his message of fire safety has remained the same: teaching kids and families what to do in case of a fire and how to prevent them.

"Sparky has allowed us to connect with millions of children and their families by making it exciting to learn about fire prevention and safety," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of communications.

"With this anniversary, we aim to reach more children, parents and educators with fun events and new educational programs throughout the year."

The game is just one of many online additions in store for Sparky's year long birthday celebration.

Funeral Custom in the Marshall Islands

Funerals are the most respected and observed of traditional customs in the Marshall Islands. Funerals reinforce bonds of relationships and loyalty to one's family, clan and island. The Marshallese funeral custom is not bound by religious affiliations; in fact, it crosses all religious denominations in its application. A traditional funeral involves five phases:

1. Emmej – Vigil held immediately after death. This phase involves around the clock vigil, serving two purposes: Someone to be with the deceased until burial and support for the family of the deceased.
2. Ilomej – Viewing of the deceased. This phase involves public viewing of the body. Viewing is often done in groups, or tal; each group has a special relationship to the deceased, such as clan members or classmates. While viewing, each group places gifts; this is followed by speeches by each group spokesperson.
3. Kallip – Burial. This is the shortest phase of the funeral. Usually, three speeches are given at grave site. First, the leader of family speaks; second, the landowner; lastly, the Iroij or traditional chief. The coffin is lowered after the final speech.
4. Anak – Time spent with the deceased spirit. The purpose of the Anak is two-fold. First, the Marshallese believe the deceased spirit stays around the house for a few days before it departs; thus, they want to be close to

the spirit before it departs. Secondly, the participants in the Anak discuss and resolve disputes that arose during earlier phases of funeral.

5. Eoraak – This is the final phase of the funeral; it is the time when family acknowledges or thanks the community of their support. This is also the phase when all differences and wrongs between family members are symbolically addressed and forgiven. This is symbolized by the spreading of white coral stones – a sign forgiveness and renewal – around the grave's immediate area.

Spc. James A. Butz, 21, of Porter, Ind., died Sept. 28 in Helmand province, Afghanistan, of injuries suffered when insurgents attacked his unit using an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team, 82nd Airborne Division, Fort Bragg, N.C.

Spc. Adrian G. Mills, 23, of Newnan, Ga., died Sept. 29 in Kirkuk, Iraq, of wounds suffered when his unit was attacked by insurgents using indirect fire. He was assigned to the 272nd Military Police Company, 519th Military Police Battalion, Fort Polk, La.

Staff Sgt. Nicholas A. Sprovtsoff, 28, of Davison, Mich., and **Sgt. Christopher Diaz**, 27, of Albuquerque, N.M., died Sept. 28 while conducting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. Sprovtsoff was assigned to 1st Marine Special Operations Battalion, U.S. Marine Corps Forces Special Operations Command, Camp Pendleton, Calif. Diaz was assigned to Headquarters Battalion, Marine Corps Air Ground Combat Center, Twentynine Palms, Calif.

1st Lt. Ivan D. Lechowich, 27, of Valrico, Fla., **Spc. Steven E. Gutowski**, 24, of Plymouth, Mass., and **Pfc.**

David A. Drake, 21, of Lumberton, Texas, died Sep 28, in Ghazni province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked their unit with an improvised explosive device. They were assigned to the 5th Engineer Battalion, 4th Maneuver Enhancement Brigade, Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

1st Lt. Andres Zermeno, 26, of San Antonio, Texas, died Sep. 25 in Wardak province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit with a rocket propelled grenade. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 4th Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade Combat Team, 10th Mountain Division, Fort. Polk, La.

Lance Cpl. John R. Wimpey Cagle, 19, of Tucker, Ga., died Sept. 28 while supporting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. He was assigned to 2nd Light Armored Reconnaissance Battalion, 2nd Marine Division, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C.

1st Lt. Ryan K. Iannelli, 27, of Clarksboro, N.J., died Sept. 28 while conducting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. He was assigned to Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron 269, Marine Air Group 29, 2nd Marine Air Wing, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Marine Corps Air Station New River, N.C.

Spc. Garrett A. Fant, 21, of American Canyon, Calif., died Sept. 26 in Helmand province, Afghanistan, of wounds suffered when enemy forces attacked his unit with an improvised explosive device. He was assigned to the 4th Squadron, 4th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, Fort Riley, Kan.

Lance Cpl. Franklin N. Watson, 21, of Vonore, Tenn., died Sept. 24 while conducting combat operations in Helmand province, Afghanistan. He was assigned to Company D, 4th Combat Engineer Battalion, 4th Marine Division, Marine Forces Reserve, based out of Knoxville, Tenn.

Recipe: Ceviche

2 pounds fresh, firm fish, such as Ono or Mahi	2 - 3 c. sea salt
Juice from 6 - 8 limes	3 - 4 large tomatoes, diced
1 red onion, chopped fine	1 bunch cilantro
1 jalapeno pepper (optional)	1 cucumber, peeled, deseeded and diced
1 can coconut milk	Olive oil

Trim fish, removing all dark areas leaving just white flesh. Dice in bite-size pieces. In a non-metal container, mix fish, lime juice and salt, submersing fish completely. Cover and refrigerate for at least three hours, or overnight. Remove from refrigerator, stir in half the coconut milk. Marinate an hour at room temperature. In a glass serving bowl, combine all the vegetables, cilantro and a small amount of olive oil (2 - 3 Tbsp.). Rinse the fish to remove most of the salt and lime juice. Mix into the vegetable mixture and add remaining coconut milk. Allow to sit for 30 minutes and taste, adding a little salt or lime juice if needed. Serve with tortilla chips.
