

Fire erupts in oceanside quarters

An electrical fire broke out early Tuesday morning at oceanside quarters 495-B. Stan Edwards, Kwajalein Fire Department assistant fire chief, believes the fire had been smoldering for about two hours before smoke alarms went off and a call was made to KFD. The family safely exited the quarters with no injuries.

After an extensive investigation, the source of the fire was traced back to a Wii remote dual charging station with rechargeable batteries, which was located on the floor next to the TV in the back room of the house. The charging station was plugged directly into the outlet behind the TV. The batteries overheated and caught fire. Edwards warns if you have similar devices in your home to unplug them when not in use.

"This was a slow burning fire," Edwards explained. It started at the Wii remotes and made its way to the TV. Eventually the heat caused the TV to explode; it was an older tube-style model. Oxygen made its way into the room through a dryer vent in the wall and fueled the fire; this caused the windows to blow out in the back room and into the kitchen. "We were probably looking at 1,200 degrees inside that room when all of a sudden it blew," Edwards said.

Most of the heavy damage was contained to the back room and part of the kitchen; however, smoke and soot spread throughout the house and into the bedrooms.

The most important part of this, Edwards said, was the alarms went off and the family got out safely.

WHERE ARE THEY NOW?



Kwajalein's highest point, coined "Mount Olympus," started out as a launch pad for the developing Spartan missile program. According to Brian Martin, pictured left with older brother Russ, around 1969 a Spartan missile was launched from Mount Olympus, but ended up less than a quarter mile from the original launch pad, embedded in the ground up to the tail of the rocket; this ended Mount Olympus as a launch site for good. Mount Olympus now serves officially as a radar perch, as well as Kwajalein's pet cemetery on the ocean side of the hill.



Keith Little served as a Navajo Code Talker with the U.S. Marine Corps from December 1943 until after the war. He fought in numerous engagements of WWII, including battles in the Marshall Islands. "My weapon was my language, and that language probably saved countless lives."



Van Barfoot, a Choctaw, is one of only eight American Indians to receive the Medal of Honor. On May 23, 1944, Barfoot knocked out two machine gun nests and captured 17 German soldiers. That same day, he repelled a German tank assault, destroyed a Nazi fieldpiece and carried two wounded commanders to safety.



Thick vegetation should be thinned out and leaves raked and bagged, not left in piles to harbor adult mosquitoes. A recent inspection found abundant standing water harboring larvae at nearly all BQs and family housing yards. All residents should walk around living quarters and work to ensure no water is left for mosquito larvae to live. If you have questions or concerns, contact Billy at 54738.
