Travel tips? Don't let the subway scare you from seeing and doing things. It is complicated, but with a map of the lines, you can find your way around cheaply, and the Japanese who speak English are more than willing to help. Make sure to use only a blue or black pen when filling out immigration forms at the airport, and stand in a very neat line; the Japanese attendant kept moving us inch by inch until we were orderly. Don't be afraid to approach people; we saw two sumo wrestlers on the train platform and asked to take a picture with them and they were very nice.

Two-weekend tournament brings out more than 60 golfers from Kwaj, Roi

The 44th annual Coral Open golf tournament hosted the largest number of golfers in recent years. More than 60 golfers participated, 10 of them from Roi-Namur, which is also a record. The tournament was held April 29 and May 6 at Holmberg Fairways. The event was co-sponsored by the Kwajalein Golf Association and Kwajalein Range Services Community Activities.

The weather was brutally hot the first weekend, with virtually no wind. Some relief came the second weekend with some morning rain showers, but again the day turned hot and muggy. While the weather may have affected a few golfers' games, others brushed it off and were still able to shoot "Lights Out" (exceptionally well).

Part of the fun during the Coral Open is the special events during the week between tournament days, and prizes at various holes during play. On May 1 and 3, the Mixed and Men's Horse Race was held at the golf course. Golfers with a high handicap were paired with a

low handicap and they played 5-6 holes in an alternate shot style. Pairs with the highest score at each hole were dropped until it came down to the three winning teams. During the tournament, certain holes hosted various prizes: longest drive, straightest drive and closest to the pin. There was even a chance to win a new Sun bicycle if you were lucky (or skilled) enough to shoot a hole in one at hole 4. Hole 6 was "target golf," where you attempted to tee off and land within marked circles on the green.

At the end of a two-weekend tournament, golfers and guests gathered together at Emon Beach for a banquet to recognize the winners and hand out highly anticipated door prizes. Chugach donated five \$50 gift certificates to Golfsmith, the Exchange donated two \$100 and two \$50 gift cards, Matson donated four \$75 gift certificates to the Hawaii Prince Hotel and five executive pen and pencil sets. The KGA bought two stained glass giveaways made by Jane Cavender, and four T-shirts from the Haole Open were raffled off. Anthony's Pizza gave out free pizza vouchers to tournament volunteers.

There were three "grand prize" giveaways everyone was looking forward to having a chance to win.


KGA will be sponsoring a Fun Tournament in July. Also look forward to the other big tournament of the year, the Kwajalein Open, which will be held in October.

Senator Daniel K. Inouye is serving his ninth consecutive term in the U.S. Senate and received the Medal of Honor for actions during World War II.




TAKE A ONE HOUR "security stand-down" to review your computer for Personally Identifiable Information (documents that have a social security number, age, marital status, race, salary, place of birth, mother's name or a variety of other personal details). Any document with these items are to be moved to your department's network drive and be deleted from your local computer immediately. If you feel you need to retain any PII on your computer, contact the KRS IA team to register the material.

TO SAVE ENERGY on lighting, you can: turn off all lights not in use, use bulbs of lower wattage, use natural sunlight when possible, keep bulbs and fixtures clean, focus light on your task and use fluorescent lights whenever possible. Small changes can make a big difference on energy conservation.

E-TALK. Exporting by any means an artifact, cultural or historic property, historic or archaeological resource from USAKA or the RMI without written permission from the USAKA Environmental Office and appropriate RMI agency(s) is prohibited.

"TAKE 5" FOR SAFETY. Your vision can be lost in the blink of an eye. Whether at home or at work, wearing protective safety eyewear when required may save your precious vision.
